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
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MINTER

When the great hunter, Orion, rides high in the sky at night, followed by his dog (star), Sirius, then we know that beautiful winter is here. For the winter stars are the brightest and a full moon in January, shining on a snowcovered earth, turns our world into a land of brilliance and fantasy.

It is then that the snow lovers break out of their cocoons where they have been polishing their skis and cleaning their sleds and are ready with zest and vigor.

It is then that the indoor swimming pools, the racquest ball courts, the bowling alleys and health clubs are crowded to capacity.

The activities of summer can be simulated indoors but winter's sports cannot be duplicated. Winter can seduce you. Winter is heaven sent.

Winter is the time to gaze at the snow in rapture. It is a time to read a good book by a fireside. It is a time for families to gather together with games and hot soups and feel warm and secure.

It is also a time to get out your woolies and your mittens and go outdoors. Enjoy God's miracle of wonder. To catch a snowflake is to look at an angel's wing. To step on the layers of soft snow is to walk on a cloud. To see the sparkle of sunlight on a patch of ice with its millions of facets and brilliant colors is to see a diamond bigger than any mined from the earth.

Our ancestors, the descendents of the tribes who followed the tundra after the last ice age, survived the climate. Perhaps our genes remind us of those days and we are a little homesick for them. To be out in the snow is to be carried back through time to the days of our ancestors thousands of years ago. Some little part of us "remembers" and feels "at home."

In true snow country, people have learned to adapt to the ways of winter. Perhaps snowshoes were the first equipment devised for they have changed very little since the time of primitive man. Where snow has piled up more than two feet is is almost impossible to walk without them. Each step will carry a man's body down into the snow above the knees. It is a very simple task to take a long twig of

an ah tree, bend it into a round shape, fill the inside of the shape with a webbing of leather strips and tie them to your feet. Presto - you can glide over the snow as easily as walking on water with water skis.

With snowshoes, a winter hike in the woods is possible. It takes no special skill to "snowshoe" and it is one of the safest "winter sports." Snowshoes are very light in weight and seldom skid, even on slopes. Different types of snowshoes have been engineered for various terrains and uses. Long, narrow snowshoes are used for fast travel on windpacked



snow in open country. Oval-shaped ones are very maneuverable for hikes in brush country and hill climbing.

Our great grandparents in Lithuania probably owned snowshoes and used them often. Snowshoes, survival equipment of ancient man, is now an \$80 per pair industry to satisfy the needs of snowshoe clubs which have been organized all over the world.

Early man who devised snowshoes, also probably found out that long, flat board attached to the feet would glide over the snow very quickly and skiing was born. It is a mistake to think that you have to live in the hills or travel to the hills to ski. Considering the world wide participation in this sport, cross-country skiing is the most popular version. People who love to walk, hike, jog and run in the summer months take up cross-country skiing. It was used as the primary means of transportation in northern Europe for many, many years.

A more accomplished skier can take to the hills and to the mountains and race downhill with the wind. The sport of skiing has developed into a billion dollar industry all over the world. Machines that make "manmade snow" have been devised and, what used to be everyday fun for the poor, has become a favorite sport of the wealthy.

In archeological digs, traces of rounded bones attached to shoes have been found. Ice skating is a very ancient sport. Wooden runners replaced



the bones and ice skating was a popular means of transportation during the middle ages. Metal skates were known in northeastern Europe during the 17th century,

As in many such diversions, the sport became a form of competition. The art of staying on balance and appearing graceful and elegant resulted in certain movements, becoming classified into "steps" and choreographed into "dances" and figure skating was born. In 1849, in Philadelphia, the first skating club was organized in the United States. Olympic competitions, speed skating, and ice hockey are the results of machining tempered steel into various types of skates that can be purchased today. Indoor rinks are found all over the world for the less hardy skater.

In books about the history of



Lithuania, we read about the "book carriers" who, with the help of their woodcarving friends, managed to keep the Lithuanian language in print alive by the secret pockets in their sleds and sleighs. Lithuanian museums show wonderfully carved, ornate sleighs that were the handwork of many hours of loving, skilled hands. Sleds, sleighs and toboggans have been known to mankind before written history. By attaching a horse or a team of dogs to a sled, early man found his quickest way of travel, for runners on snow would go faster than wheels on dirt.

Sledding is the most popular sport in winter and every child in snow country has his own sled. In 1974, sled manufacturers made some changes in the steel used in small sled runners and now they are faster than ever. Also, the one-piece, rigid control bar has been developed into a two-piece, cross-piece steering device that gives the sledder about 50% more control.

Here in the United States, children glide downhill on the snow on sliding mats, innertubes and cardboard boxes. They play games which they think are new but which are really ages old.

In Scotland, Ireland and Wales, a fun game which all of the members of the family can play is called "curling." All you need is a flat rock and some old brooms. A player gives a push to a flat rock toward the goal and the rest of the team guides the rock to the goal by sweeping a path ahead of it with brooms. Shouting and hollering as they sweep in frenzy, the players spend a "warm" and exciting afternoon.

In the old, old days, if you got hungry, you could catch a fish by chopping a hole in the ice and luring the fish that could live in the icey waters. If you get together with a group of anglers today, they will start on their fish stories and talk about the fun of ice fishing.



The industry that has developed with the sport of ice fishing is great indeed. Besides battery-powered augers to cut smooth holes in the ice, fishermen are tempted to but special little stoves, special tents, and even tiny houses made especially for living in - next to the ice hole.

Then there is hunting, trapping and a myriad number of other activities such as snowball fighting, making snowmen, special snow games and ice-sculpturing. People travel further north to view glaciers and to wonder at the brilliant display of the aurora borealis in the north countries.

Meteorologists will tell you that the weight of the snow falling pushes all of the particulate matter down ahead of it and the air is purer and cleaner than usual in the winter time. With proper clothing, care and common sense, winter can be a joyful, healthful, cleansing period.

So get up, get out, and get going. Now is the time to enjoy all of God's wonder and glory in our magical world of winter.

ARCHBISHOP GEORGE MATULAITIS

We, Knights of Lithuania, learned about Archbishop George Matulaitis from Father Joseph Dambrauskas, MIC, Provincial of the Lithuanian Marian Fathers. The "MIC" means Congregation of Mary Immaculate, the organization of religious priests and brothers that was saved from extinction and renewed by Father George Matulaitis in 1909 by his taking of vows at the feet of the last remaining Lithuanian Marian Father. Vincent Senkus. The Russian Tsars has suppressed all religious Orders and Congregations in the 1800's, so by 1909 there was only one Marian Father left. Father Matulaitis joined the congregation with the express intention of preserving and renewing this congregation that had done so much for Lithuanian Catholics in the past.

No wonder Father Dambrauskas is so zealous and tireless in working for the Beatification of Archbishop George.

We have agreed by National Convention Resolution to help in this project.

Archbishop Matulaius was an exceptional man: learned, a leader, a planner, strict with himself, but gentle and most considerate of others, a very holy priest and bishop. He died on January 27, 1927 in Kaunas, at the age of 56.

After his death, it dawned upon the many people who knew him in Lithuania, in Rome, in the United States, that here was an exceptional man, who was outstanding, even heroic, in virtue, with a strong faith and an all embracing charity. These are the ingredients of sanctity. Further information and events of his life supported these suspicions. Here was a man who seemed worthy of the honors of the Church, to be recognized and proclaimed a Sain of God.

In 1953, the Marian Fathers began the official process of Beatification. After each step of these rigorous investigations, it became more and more evident that Archbishop George possessed the qualifications of Sainthood. But, as is well known, only the Pope can officially declare a person a Saint, or Blessed.

At the present time, according to Father Jonas' Vaisnora, MIC, Postulator of the Process (a "postulator" is the priest-director of this whole effor), all the documentation and testimony of witnesses and even notarized reports of the miracles

worked through the prayers of Archbishop Matulaitis have been collected and printed in one huge volume (almost 1,000 pages).

This volume with the Latin title: Positio super virtutibus (Statement concerning virtues) must now be formally presented to the Holy Father, together with the prayers and petitions of the Lithuanian people, begging Pope John Paul II, in his wisdom, to honor the saintly Archbishop with the title of Blessed.

Here is where we, Knights of Lithuania, come in.

In the past two or three years we have been gathering signatures, requesting the Holy Father to approve the heroic sanctity of Lithuania's truly outstanding Church leader, Bishop of Vilnius, reorganizer of the Marian Fathers, Founder of the Poor Sisters of the Immaculate Conception, who laid the foundations for the dioceses of independent Lithuania.

To date, between five and ten thousand signatures have been collected. (I cannot be more accurate than that; I do now know the exact figures.)



PHASE TWO of this project is to collect many, many thousands more. How many more?

Well, I ask you to think for a few moments about points A and B as follows:

A. Lithuanians in the United States, youth and others (including help from the K of L) collected and presented 150,000 signatures to the United Nations requesting freedom for the Baltic countries.

B. Catholics in Lithuania collected and sent over 149.000 signatures to Brezhnev, requesting the return of their parish church in Klaipeda, built with their own funds and albor and then taken over by the government for a concert hall.

I feel that we K of L'ers can hope to equal or better those numbers to place on our letter to Pope John Paul II, asking him to proclaim a new Saint for Lithuania.

No, we can't.

Yes, we can...

No we...

Yes, we can, yes we can, YES, WE CAN!

Here's how.

Previously, we collected individual signatures and we obtained thousands. Now, we are seeking signatures by families. We can easily collect many times more.

This past year, 1980, was obsved as the YEAR OF THE FAMILY. What we are doing is prolonging the impetus of this Family Year into 1981, as we use our families as a starting point in this PHASE TWO.

Come on, look over my shoulder as we do some more figuring. There are about three thousand members of our organization. Each member is related to two families: the father's side and the mother's side. Authomatically, we reach 6,000 families, reaching parents, uncles, aunts, children, cousins, and a whole additional family of in-laws.

But, we do not intend to stop there. After we have signed up every single member of our families, we plan to approach our next door neighbors. We might get five, ten or even more such signatures. We then branch out to our co-workers and friends.

Now, take a step further. It is no secret that we Knights of Lithuania have a very solid reputation in the United States. In the parishes in which we have councils we are known for our activities. We plan to approach our sister Lithuanian organizations for support in this PHASE TWO: Choirs, Scouts, Ateitininkai, other parish organizations.

We will ask their support and signatures to persuade the Cardinals and the Holy Father that Archbishop Matulaitis is the Saint for our troubled times, especially for the Catholics in Lithuania, a Saint who would encourage and inspire Lithuanian Catholics in their homeland, now so harshly oppressed by their atheistic rulers.

The possibilities are not yet exhausted. What about the parishes in which there are no K of L councils? They are on our list also.

Now, where's my calculator? Let's press a few buttons...

If each K of L'er (3,000) collects 10 family signatures and 10 neighbor's signatures, we have $3000 \times 10 = 30,000$ plus $3,000 \times 10 = 30,000$ which results in 60,000 signatures. Am I right?

If each K of K council distributes 50 signature leaflets to fifty other families in the city or town in which they live we could get 50 families time 10 signatures = 500 signatures in each council area, and this times 55 (number of our councils) we get another 27,500 signatures. Right?

And finally, if we approach the pastors where we do not have K of L councils, we can hope to obtain another 30,000 signatures. The grand total could be well over 120,000 signatures.

One last thing, as I conclude: Do you remember The Chronicle of the Catholic Church of Lithuania, Number 37? That was the issue that singled out the Knights of Lithuania as an organization having shown noteworthy moral support for the sturggling Church in Lithuania in petitioning the Catholic Conference of Bishops in the United States for a Day of Prayer nationwide for the suffering Church in that country. The Chronicle's editorial, expressing the appreciation and thanks of Catholic leaders in Lithuania, is our inspiration and stimulus now. Our PHASE TWO efforts will hasten the day for the Beatification of Archbishop Matulaitis and will bring untold blessings upon our people in Lithuania. Our 100% dedication and support of this project will renew our solidarity with out Lithuanian Catholic brothers and sisters in the land of our heritage. Our zeal will prove that our concern for human and religious rights in Lithuania is genuine and stronger than ever.

For the past year, the Sisters of St. Casimir have been taking serious measures to promote the Cause for the beatification of Mother Maria Kaupas, the foundress of their community. Such information is essential in this the preparatory stages of the Beatification process.

A Letter from HM Bishop

Bound up with personality is the far-flung apostolate of the Sisters of St. Casimir in the U.S.A., Lithuania and Argentina. No other Lithuanian congregation or organization in our country can match what the Sisters of St. Casimir have done for the people of Lithuania or Lithuanian emigrants.

Mother Maria Kaupaite personally guided the development and work of the Sisters of St. Casimir until her death on April 17, 1940. While still alive, Mother Maria was so highly regarded by the entire Lithuanian nation that in 1933, the Lithuanian government honore dher with the Order of Gediminas.

After being mislaid for several years, her papers were located in 1979. These papers were so in-

teresting that a non-Lithuanian specialist who examined them wrote an interesting report, and together with other competent individuals has urged the Sisters of St. Casimir to initiate proceedings for the beatification of Mother Maria Kaupaite.

OFICIAL NEWS

From The President's Desk

Let me first take this opportunity to wish all members the very best in the New Year! The start of the New Year usually finds people planning ahead and manking all kinds of resolutions. This is the ideal time to start doing the same for an important Knights of Lithuania event, the 1981 National Convention. Too early, you say? Not al all.

As per our National Constitution, the Convention date is fixed by the Host Council and announced by the Supreme Council President six months in advance. Let's make it official then. The 1981 National Convention will be held August 19-23, 1981 at the University of Scranton and hosted jointly by Council 46 Forest City PA, Council 74 Scranton, PA and Council 143 Pittston, PA. I had the opportunity to inspect the facilities and meet most of the Host Committee and feel assured that both will provide a satisfying experience.

I would like to address two other areas intimately associated with the National Convention that benefit from advance planning. The major vehicle for change in the Knights of Lithuania is the National Convention RESOLUTION. All Districts, Councils and Individuals should be formulating Resolutions *now* and should forward them to the Supreme Council through their District Presidents. Please keep in mind that Resolutions dealing with Constitutional changes must appear in VYTIS at least three months before the Convention. That creates a dealine of about March 31st. If a resolution does not require a Constitutional change this deadline does not apply. Early submission of all Resolutions is encouraged to give the entire membership time to discuss and consider

proposed changes and as needed, to prepare for Convention debate. Maximum advance work serves everyone's best interests. The hasty spur-of-the-moment effort often reflects poor planning and proves ill-advised. To paraphrase the League of Women Voters, formulating organization policy is not a spectator sport.

Just as important as organizational policy, are the leaders chosen to implement and initiate new policy. The 1981 National Convention will be faced with the responsibility of filling a number of vacancies on the Supreme Council and National Chairmanships. Constitutional limitations on succession will produce vacancies in the offices of President, II Vice President, Treasurer and one Trustee. In addition, several National Chairmen have announced their intention of stepping down. Again, advance planning appears most desirable. Councils and Districts should be looking within their ranks for prospective candidates for National office. Ideally, each District should present a slate of officers. Candidates should make themselves known so that there is some opportunity for the membership to learn what their priorities are. Decisions to take on a year of national responsibility should not be made lightly, nor on the spur of the moment.

Discussing and setting organizational priorities and selecting leaders are responsibilities we all share and aare worthy of more than our passing attention.



Knights of Lithuania Convention Site

the site of the 68th National Convention, co-hosted by the Forest City, Scranton and Pittston Councils, will be the University of Scranton. The University, since its founding as St. Thomas College by the Christian Brothers in 1888, and with the coming of the Jesuits in 1942, has stood in the Catholic tradition.

It has a modernistic "city" campus overlooking downtown Scranton. The historic nucleus of the campus is the Victorian mansion built in 1870 by Joseph Scranton, great grandfather of William Scranton, former Governor of Pennsylvania and U.S. Ambassador to the United Nations. The mansion and estate grounds were given to the University by the Scranton family.

Scranton, the 4th largest city in the state, is the principal city in Northeastern Pennsylvania. It is the county

seat of Lackawanna County and was chartered as a city in 1866 when the boroughs of Hyde Park, Providence and Scranton were merged.

Scranton had its beginnings in coal in 1840. The entire Lackawanna valley had one of the richest hard coal deposits in the world. The mining industry attracted thousands of immigrants from diverse nationalities who were signed up on the docks of New York for work in the mines. Coal was king and jobs were plentiful. The people brought with them their customs and traditions. Today, 30 ethnic groups are represented, giving Scranton one of the most diverse populations in America. An example of the various groups working together was the "Ethnic Christmas Tree Exhibit" held at the Everhart Museum in the city's Nay Aug Park during the month of December.

There were ethnic trees on display, including our Lithuanian tree decorated with beautiful, white straw ornaments.

With the collapse of the Anthracite industry, the city faced a great challenge. Today Scranton is principally a manufacturing city with a wide range of industries.

Scranton is located in the midst of scenic beauty abounding with mountains, streams and over 150 natural lakes. The Pocono Mountains, the Endless Mountains and the Susquehanna River resorts are only an hour away. The city is the center of a network of interstate highways. It is less than 3 hours by car from New York and Philadelphia. The Scranton-Wilkes Barre International Airport at Avoca is served by EAstern and Allegheny Airlines as well as a fine commuter service.



The "Nasvytrac" looks like the inside of a bank-vault lock. It's something engineers know as the planetary traction drive. This invention is due to the genious of ALGIR-DIS NASVYTIS of Cleveland. It was named to the Industrial Research 100, a prestigious annual listing of the top technical innovations worldwide. Nasvytis brought the idea to the space agency's Lewis Research Center in Cleveland, Ohio, about 10 years ago. In place of gears, the Nasvytrac transmits power via a cluster of smooth, cylindrical rollers, which look like steel hockey pucks. The Nasvytrac will turn up initially in high-speed pumps and industrial tools, but Nasvytis is developing a traction dirve with plastic rollers to make air conditioners and other household appliances quieter and more efficient. He predicts that the gas-turbine auto engine, long deemed impractical because of its high speed overwhelmed gear transmissions, will benefit noticeably from the Nasvytrac transmission.

Now 70, Algirdis Nasvytis, inventor, came to the U.S. after being imprisoned briefly during the Soviet invasion of Lithuania.



The late LEE BALKUS, who had been principal of Stony Creek School in Alsip, Illinois, for 20 years, was honored recently by School District 126 when one of the schools in that district was renamed "The Lee Balkus Learning Center." Miss Balkus, who died May 9th after an illness of several months, had been responsible for many innovative programs within the district as well as at Stony Creek. 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COOK'S CORNER

PORK CHOP-POTATO CASSEROLE

Great for a cold, wintry day

- 8 lean pork chops
- 6 medium potatoes (sliced) salt & pepper (to taste) Crisco oil
- 1 large onion (chopped)
- 1 can mushroom soup
- 1 pkg. onion soup mix
- ½ cup water (hot)

Slice potatoes into a buttered casserole or roasting pan. Season with salt and pepper. Brown chops on both sides in a little oil until lightly browned. Add the onion and fry until the onions are transparent. Place all on top of potatoes in casserole.

Blend the musroom soup, onion soup mix and the hot water. Pour over the chops, covering completely. Cover



and bake at 350 for 1 hour. Uncover and bake for 20-25 minutes more adding about 3/3 cup boiling water at the side of the pan. Serve with sauerkraut and applesauce on the side.






