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
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
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## MARIJOS POEZIJA



Are there many lilacs, did you see them?


And in our native country, there, where we lived,




If you are in close contact with a group of Lithuanians for a period of time, you can easily get the impression that Lithuania is covered with nothing more than birch trees and ruta plants. 'Tis not so, of course.

For its size (26,173 square miles), it has a great variety of growing greenery located in diverse situations ranging from bogs to desert lands.

Altogether, more than 3,200 species of floral life have been found in Lithuania.

Five thousand years ago, 75% of Lithuania was covered by forest lands. Now, that number has dwindled to 24%.



Conifers make up 61% of the forest lands. Pine, spruce and juniper trees are the most commong.

One fifth of the trees in Lithuania are birch. Other trees commonly found in Lithuania are white alder, black alder, aspen, oak, ash, elm, basswood and hornbeam.

A great deal of Lithuania is covered by meadow lands. Here, broadleaved herbs, tufted grasses and other grasses that favor acidic soil, can be found.

Some of the rivers of Lithuania overflow almost every spring and many types of grasses such as meadow-rue, sage and foxtails grow in these flood plains.

Near the sea and at other saliferous locations, salt marsh, bulrush and sea arrow-grass grows in abundance.

Two types of peat bogs exist in Lithuania. The "high peat bogs" are covered with plants such as peat moss, cotton-grass, sundew, cloud-berry, cranberry and bog rosemary.

The meadow peat bogs ("low peat bogs") feature sedges, buck-beans, marsh marigolds, birches, willows and other plants.

Aquatic flora include duckweed, yellow pond lily, horsetail, great bulrush and common reed grasses.

The coastal sand dunes contain a few desert species such as sea lymegrass, marram and seabeach sandwort.

Plants are used for different purposes. Trees, such as pine, spruce, aspen, black alder, birches and oaks are cut for lumber.


Blueberry, cowberry and cranberry bushes are sources of food. Also, many types of mushrooms and nuts are harvested in Lithuania.

Medicinal plants include bearberry, alderbuckthorn, linden, foxglove, lilly-of-the-valley and buckbean.

Around two hundred botanical gardens are maintained in Lithuania which are remnants of parks of ancient estates.

It has always been a tradition for every family to grow its own flower garden called "rue garden". The most popular flowers found in these gardens are ruta, peony, bleeding heart, mignonette, sweet peas and periwinkles.

JOHN MASLAUSKAS, a 31-year old transformer repairman from Chicago, had been trying for three years to get his ideas through the doors of the big toy companies without success, until he ran into the Great Bison Toy Corp. It needed ideas for products to get its business going, and Maslauskas needed a sponsor. Since last summer, Maslauskas has sold Great Bison ideas for four board games, several card games, and a space age tricycle design the firm plans to have in store this Christmas season.

Maslauskas is a chess player and science fiction fan who seriously began creating games when he lost his job a few years ago. He and a friend bought some board games with their unemployment checks but found they were "childish", so he decided to make his own. Creating a game "is like writing a book," Maslauskas said. "You have to come up with a subject and plot and figure out what you want the 'characters' to do. Then you have to put it in game form with risk and strategy."

Maslauskas said he tried for three years to get a major toy firm to consider his first board game and was ready to give up. Now he expects to see that game on the shelf this fall and has 20 others in mind.

"Panorama", a publication of the Palos Community Hospital, Palos Heights, Illinois, recently featured an article about LEON SEIBUTIS, M.D. A year ago, Dr. Seibutis taught urology surgery for six weeks at the University of Vilnius in Lithuania. The University recently celebrated its 400th anniversary and Dr. Seibutis was invited back to participate in the celebration. During his recent four week stay in Lithuania, Dr. Seibutis was involved in an exchange of information and knowledge in urology at the University and at other hospitals throughout that country. He found that although academic knowledge of the physicians was very good, the application of this knowledge was somewhat inferior, due to the lack of proper instruments and modern drugs.

Dr. Seibutis stated that all hospitals, as well as businesses and housing are owned by the government. Everyone works for the government, including physicians, and 80% of the physicians are women. The hospitals are overcrowded but patients do not have to worry about expenses when they are ill as the government pays their full salary during their illness.

Two of the luxuries that the people of Lithuania clamor for are coffee and American-made jeans. One thing Dr. Seibutis learned while traveling in the Soviet Occupied Lithuania was that the Lithuanians were very hospitable people.

## Cooks

## DAFFODIL CAKE

1 cup cake flour 3/4 cup sugar 1/4 cup plus 2 T. sugar 6 egg yolks

12 egg whites (1½ cups) 1½ t. vanilla

1½ t. cream of tarter
½ t. almond extract
Lemon Glaze (See below)

Heat oven to 375°. Blend flour and ¼ cup plus 2 T. sugar and set aside.

Measure egg whites, cream of tarter and salt into a large mixer bowl. Beat on medium speed until foamy. Add ¾ C sugar — about 2 T. at a time beating on high speed till the meringue holds stiff glossy peaks.

In a small mixer bowl, beat egg yolks until very thick and lemon colored, about five minutes.

Fold flavorings into meringue. Then sprinkle the flour-sugar mixture, folding in carefully until the flour-sugar mixture disappears. Pour half the batter into another bowl, gently folding in egg yolks.

Spoon the yellow and white batters alternately into an ungreased tube pan (10" x 4" Angel Food pan). Gently cut through the batters to make a swirl effect.

Bake on the lowest rack of the oven about 40 minutes or until the top springs back when touched lightly with the finger.

Immediately invert the tube pan on a large funnel and let hang until the cake is completely cooled, at least 2 hours. Spread with Lemon Glaze. Decorate with icing daffodils if you are handy at cake decorating.



Dear Knight of Lithuania,


I decided to write this letter, a very personal letter, to you, because something came up that is more than I can handle. I need the assistance only you can give. Will you help me, please?

Here's what happened.

The Boston Convention, you remember, voted to get into that "PHASE II' thing. You have been reading about this in the "VYTIS" and so have I.

Supreme Council got all excited about this and gave this project TOP PRIORITY. It even threw in a bunch of bucks to fund it. They asked me to spend that money. I did. I bought 10,000 sheets of paper, not just plain paper, but imprinted Petition Sheets, which I sent out to all the Councils. I had to make two trips to the Post Office to mail out close to 6,000 sheets. Do you have your sheets already? If not, ask your Council President.

Once you get those sheets in your hands, PHASE II will be up to you. This is a K of L Family and Friends activity. First, get all members of your family to sign (including cousins and in-laws). Do you think anyone will refuse to request our beloved Pope John Paul II to hasten the Beatification of Archbishop George Matulaitis? Then ask your neighbors, friends and coworkers to sign. They will be glad to do so. It is just as easy as that.





that "tens of thousands of signatures" is the goal. Between you and me that is nonsense. We K of Lers can get a hundred thousand!

Here's how.

While we are gathering signatures from our family and friends, bring up and discuss the idea of xeroxing a couple of hundred more sheets of that petition at your coundil meeting. 

# FROM THE DIARY OF A NINTH GRADE STUDENT

(Taken from the "Chronicle of the Catholic Church in Lithuania, No. 38")

For a long time homeroom teacher "S" tried to persuade me to join the Communist Youth League. She told me to keep up with my classmates, she praised me for being first-rate, for adapting and finding time for everything, only unfortunately I deny myself the "best", and when she learned that I regularly attend church she became terribly angry and ordered me to bring my parents.

At the end of November, Father came to the school to see the principal and explained to him that none of the children in our family will ever join the Communist Youth League. He disapproves of the organization and we children don't want to join. And as for attending church, Father objected strenuously and explained, on his way out, that he is a Lithuanian and does not want to be anything else.

After my parent's visit, my homeroom teacher again gave me no peace. She urged me to disobey my parents and tempted me to join the Communist Youth League without their knowledge. She also ordered me not to go to church. She

asked that I willingly choose the way offered by them. I thought, but did not dare say, "You are urging me to swim with the crowd, with the current. Thank you, dear homeroom teacher, I've seen many such 'happy ones' who follow the path you offer."


The teacher did not give up hope and continued to ask me. I told her but one thing: "No, I will certainly not join the Communist Youth, and will continue going to church." Then the homeroom teacher cajoled: "You can go to church, only join the Communist Youth." Although she compromised, that compromise is unacceptable to me: I want to be a person, not a hypocrite.

When she saw she was not moving me, the homeroom teacher dragged me to the principal. He tried to lull me with gentle words, but when this did not work, he removed his mask and began to shout terribly. "Either join the Communist Youth League or leave our school!"

He did not frighten me. It is better to be uneducated than an educated traitor. They stopped summoning me for talks, although the principal had said he would. Most teachers began giving me much lower department grades. Lithuanian is taught by the homeroom teacher herself. She therefore finds it very convenient to get back to me. I compared my compositions with other girls. For similar "mistakes" they were given B's, and a D.

The vice-principal who is also the art teacher was very angry at me. I could never please her. She began to tall me a religious bigot, always adthet this is not a church. Well, that is their will, and that will of theirs is very unjust and malevolent.

Beca I could not stand this atmosphe. I told my homeroom
teacher wanted to transfer to
another school and asked for a letter
of recommendation. The letter of
recommendation listed all my vices
with considerable elaboration. It
even included the detail that while in
the fifth grade, I wiped my shoes
with my scarf. And as a crowning
touch to all my vices, that I am very
religious.

He also studied theology at St. Thomas Seminary, Denver and at St. Procopius Seminary at Lisle, Illinois.

In 1948, he became an active member of Council 112 in Chicago. He stayed there until 1957. During his nine years with the K of L in Chicago, he served one term as President of the council, two terms as IID District President and two terms as National Vice President.

John represented C-112 at IID Conventions, as a delegate, for six years. He served on numerous committees and as chairman of many functions in the area. He helped reorganize K of L councils in Gary, Indiana and Indiana Harbor and Council 24 in Chicago, and traveled around the area giving speeches.

He has written more than 500 letters in behalf of Lithuanian Affairs in the past 27 years.

In community involvement, he served eight years as Personal Bailiff to the late Judge John T. Zuris of Chicago. He took an active part in Lithuanian politics and he helped Lithuanians get citizenship papers. In 1976, he worked on the Lithuanian Bicentennial Committee. He represented St. Casimer's Parish for three years as a member of the Diocesan School Committee.

In the field of religion, he served as acting chaplain for the Don Varnas Post, American Legion in Chicago at 43 services. He was a sponsor of Our Lady of Siluva Chapel in Washington, D.C. and the Lithuanian Chapel at the Vatican in Rome. John was L.C.R.A. chairman and he has also served at numerous religious events.



# ST. ANTHONY'S AND THE FOREST CITY REGION

Council 46, Forest City, host of the 68th National Convention to be held at the University of Scranton along with Council 74, Scranton and Council 143, Pittston welcomes all to one of the oldest areas of Lithuanian settlement in the United States.

Council 46 is sponsored by St. Anthony's Parish in Forest City which is twenty-five miles north of Scranton. The parish was formed in 1894 when Bishop O'Hara of the Scranton Diocese instructed Rev. Peza of the Lithuanian Roman Catholic Church of Scranton to organize a parish for the many Lithuanians working the anthracite coal mines in the area. St. Anthony's was the first "ethnic" parish in the area and initially served Catholics of a number of different ethnic backgrounds.

The dedication of the Lithuanian Catholics to the religion and culture was tested in 1899 when the first church was destroyed by fire. A second church was dedicated in 1905. This edifice too was destroyed by fire in 1917 and the building of the present structure was immediately begun. The small community of Lithuanian Catholics under the guidance of Rev. Ben Toloczko continues to this day to maintain their Lithuanian heritage.



St. Anthony Church

St. Anthony's Church, as is often the custom in Lithuania, was built on the highest hill and overlooks the town of Forest City. Forest City is the northern-most town in the anthracite fields. The town is named for the beautiful forests surrounding the community. Forest City is between two areas of Northeastern Pennsylvania well known for their outdoor recreational opportunities. The Pocono Mountain resort areas are to be the southeast and the Endless Mountains are to the north and west.

The area immediately surrounding Forest City contains dozens of lakes and streams well known for their fishing and water sports. Hun-






## C-102 Detroit, Mich.


## C-149 Saginaw MI
