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


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Buy A Book




There were no gifts that night. Saint Luke says nothing about that. They arrived later with the visit of the Wisemen.

There was a news flash transmitted by living, angelic satelite. It certainly was "GOOD NEWS" to God's people carrying the burdens of Original Sin and overwhelmed by the malice and ignorance of sin. Today, the news we read or hear is bad news: abortions, bombings, calamities (all the way down the alphabet) famines, murders and muggings, all sorts of evil things.

Christmas reminds us that there is good news that burst upon the world that cold winter's night. Even though this "GOOD NEWS" was a one time event — "Son of God becomes Son of Mary," nevertheless, it became ongoing, neverending "GOOD NEWS", because it linked God and man, eternity and time, deserving proclamation every year, and even daily. The good news proclaimed by the angels became the cornerstone of our Faith.

We recall that gifts were brought to the new born Child by the wealthy Wisemen...and by poor shepherds, as well. I suppose that this started the whole idea of Christmas presents. Now, if we place God at the top of our Christmas gift list, our gift to Him will, also, have to be symbolic. Think for a minute: what symbolic gift could we offer to God in order to express oru faith and love and service?

How about a book? A book for the Babe of Bethlehem.

This may seem silly at first sight: babies can't read. Absolutely right. But adults can read to children. Parents always do this. So, if we buy a book for the Baby, we will have to read it.

CULTURAL CORNER




The solemnity of "Kucia" ends with the Shephers's Mass on Christmas Eve. Christmas Day is a time for resting, singing of carols and enjoying good food.

On the first day of Christmas, no one goes visiting. It is a day to be spent with family. The Christmas table is laden with food. The traditional menu includes ham, goose roasted with apples or sauerkraut, a suckling pig, leg of veal or mutton and various sausages, among these is "Skilandis". All this is accompanied by relishes, vegetables, freshly ground horseradish and "Kaledu Pyragas." There are cakes, pastries and cookies. The poppy seed rolls and special cookies are in the shape of mushrooms, birds, walnuts, etc. There is much to drink and, in many households, the favorite "Vyritas" or "Krupnikas" served hot and made with honey and spices.

On the second day of Christmas, the hired help would leave to go to their homes for the holidays. The farmer and his wife would try to talk them into staying on another year. They would then give the hired help, whether they were staying on or not, some good food and drink to take home. this was a kind of Christmas bonus. The help would then leave, some to return after the holidays and other to remain in their homes.

The rest of the second day was then spent visiting friends and relatives and guests would be entertained with song and dance, good food and drink late into the night.



The third day of Christmas was observed as "Day of Hail". No work was done in the fields. This was supposed to be a precaution against hailstorms in the summer.

During the whole Christmas season, which lasted until Epiphany, no hard work was done. There was no spinning or milling; there was no heavy work in the fields. Often this time was used to make the feather pillows and comforts used in the household. There was much merry-making and some form of entertainment every evening.

The final day of Christmas was January 6th, "Trijų Karalių". On this day, whatever Christmas decorations were used were put away. The hired help returned from their homes and the following day it was work as usual. Another Christmas season had passed.



The Christmas tree did not become popular in Lithuania until the early twentieth century and then it was not widespread. After World War I, the custom spread in the cities and, later on, in the country.

In earlier times, the wedding tree, a symbol of youth and fertility, was used among Lithuanians. At the wedding feast, it hung from the ceiling above the Bridal Pair. It was usually decorated with beautiful straw ornaments.

The Christmas Tree (Kaledu Eglute)

When the Christmas Tree was introduced to Lithuania, all agricultural materials were used in the decorating of these trees. The Lithuanians excelled in the use of supple grain straw. From wheat and rye, they wove ornaments of great delicacy; chandeliers, baskets, stars, chains and an infinite variety of beautiful geometric forms.

They fashioned some lovely ornaments related to the harvest and, on their Christmas trees, one might see figures of farmers carrying wheat and others holding candles to light the way for baking. Tiny birds were made of walnut shalls with wings and tails of birch bark or small feathers. A straw cross was generally placed on top of the tree made to resemble the beautiful Lithuanian Wayside Cross.

Underneath the tree was always placed a humble manger some figures were carved of wood and some made of straw. The tree was decorated by all members of the family on early Christmas Eve or, in some homes, several days before Christmas.

The tree and manger were left standing until the feast of the Epiphany, in Lithuanian "Triju Karaliu."



Sister Anne, OSF Sister Anne Adomavicius

Sister Anne was born on June 7, 1899 in Westfield, Mass. She, Helen, was one of ten children born to Thomas and Onna Adomavicius. The other children were John, Kate, Peter, Thomas, Francis, Mary, Ann, Joseph and Julie. Her father worked on the railroad.

I met Sister Anne through my sister-in-law, Julia Siedlicki. Sister Anne and Julia belong to a Rosary Group which meets every Thursday.

We invited the Siedlicki's, Sister Anne and another nun to our house for Thanksgiving Dinner, 1980. We' have been good friends ever since.

Sister Anne celebrated her Golden Jubilee as a nun in 1980. She is of average height and size. She has a radiant smile and a good word for all with whom she comes in contact. She has a little difficulty walking, so she uses a cane or walker.

Sister Anne is in semi-retirement at the Franciscan Motherhouse, 1024 Court Street, Syracuse N.Y. 13208.

She attends some of our K of L doings when she is able. She is a pleasant person and a real joy for our members. She is a real inspiration to all of us. We think she is a living saint.

She worked very hard with the lepers under difficult conditions.

Here is her own story:

It was Sunday, June 24, 1923. I went out to pray at the Shrine in Fiskdale, Massachusetts, in honor of St. Anne. I stayed there all day, praying for a change in my state of life. I was thinking about being a nun, but was afraid to take the step.

Two days later, on a Tuesday nite, at 4:45 p.m., I was about to leave the box factory where I was working. I was pushing up the window because of a lightning and thunder. storm. The wind blew my hair into the machine pulled me up about a foot from the bench upon which I had been standing. I had no pain, but I was getting very hot and I tried to get away. The scalp was pulled off. The weight of my body pulled me down. I sat on the bench. I was bleeding to death but had no pain. I looked up at the scalp and started praying: "Sacred Heart of Jesus, have mercy on me. Holy Mary, pray for us. Good St. Anne pray for us."

I looked up at the scalp again and from the very place I heard St. Ann say: "Don't be afraid. you'll be all right." I repeated the same words again. I felt strong, had no pain, and waited to see what would happen.

My employer heard the commotion, came downstairs, had the power shut off, and said the doctor would be there in a few minutes. For fifteen minutes I sat there praying until the doctor and ambulance arrivee. I was still conscious. They brought me to the hospital and all the way I talked to the ambulance

driver, Peter Simon, a friend of my brother's. I said: "Peter, why don't you go faster? The blood is getting me all wet!" Peter said the doctor told him not to shake me up too much.

"We were met at the hospital by the doctors and nurses, whom I heard whispering words to the effect that I would die. The doctor said: "Miss Adams, you'll have to take ether." I said: "Doctor, I want to see a priest." I remembered that the Sisters in school always said that if we went to the hospital, we should have a priest! When Father Shaunessey came in, the nurses and doctors stepped aside. I said to Father: "Father, I went to confession Saturday and received Holy Communion Sunday. Father, I want to be a Sister." Grace came to me then, because I could never say those words before. Father said: "When you get well, Helen, you can be a Sister." But he anointed me and prepared me for death.

I was given ether. The doctor tapped my skull to let it drain. Then he sewed up my neck, which had been ripped in such a way that my head hung on my shoulder. My right ear had been torn off but I never lost my hearing. Over a period of eleven months, I had twenty-four skingrafting operations. The skin was taken from my own body to cover the head. At the end, about twenty doctors examined me and said it was a miracle that the skin grafting was so successful!

My mother's prayers helped me a great deal. One eybrow was gone and in its place was a hole deep enough for me to insert the end of my finger. My mother applied Our Lady of La Salette water. The next morning the doctor looked and found skin growing there. He never had to try to do skin grafting again on that spot.

The Sunday after I left the hospital, I went to Fiskdale to thank St. Anne for what she did for me. It was here that I met Mr. Andrew Ahearn for the first time. My head was bandaged and I wore a black cape. He said: "Little girl, were you in an accident?" I told him my story and he said: "Next Wednesday we go to the big Shrine in Canada. Would you like to go?" I asked my mother for permission, and she said yes. I used some of my insurance money to go. I went six times with Mr. Ahearn's pilgrimage before I found the place where God wanted me to work.

Six years later, on September 24, 1929, I entered the Franciscan Order of Syracuse, New York. At that time, they had a novitiate on the Island of Oahu in the Hawaiian Islands. This is where I entered the convent and received the beautiful name of Sister Anne. I was given charge of the babies of leprous parents at Kapiolani Home, and for the past sixteen years I have been with the leper women and young girls of the Island of Molokai, made famous by Father Damien.

This is where my friend Agnes Doviak helped me. We had just come from Forty Hours' Devotion and Agnes invited me for breakfast. She handed me the Sunday Visitor and I put my finger on an ad that said: "Mother Marianne wishes Sisters to work with the lepers." A Honolulu address was given. I said to Agnes: "This is where I want to go." She said: "I know you will be happy there as you have always wanted to be a nun. Let's sit down and write the letter now." So we wrote it together and mailed it. I waited three months for an answer.

At last a letter arrived stating that I could come. I made my last trip to Canada to say goodbye to St. Anne, and then began my long trip to Westfield, Massachusetts by train and then by ship from the West Coast to Honolulu. I left September 13 and landed September 24.

After twenty years, I am back again on a thanksgiving jubilee trip to St. Anne de Beaupre, thanks to Mr. Ahearn and very kind benefactor, Father Joachim.

I was a missionary for thirtyone years in Hawaii. I cared for leper people and children there in Molokai. I loved my work. God's will be done.

I'm with the Legion of Mary now in Syracuse, and we pray the rosary and visit the sick and shut-ins. Please pray your rosary every day, as Our Lady of Fatima wishes it for peace in this world.





As we proceed with our review of parliamentary and meeting procedural terms, it should be noted that the words or terms listed are or have been used by Lithuanian Seimas (parliament), political, civic, and cultural organizations both in Lithuanian and America. In other words, they have become standard useage. Of course, pronunciation is fifty per cent of mastering a language. Unfortunately, it is out of the question for us to give you phonetic sounds on papers. However, we hope that this terminology will become familiar to you, at least in a visual sense, so that, it you see: dienotvarke on a sheet of paper, you will recognize that it means; agenda. New District Presidents







Entertainment Ideas for the Holidays

This month I will give you several recipes which you may like to try for the pleasure of your guests during the Christmas and New Year's Holidays.


The Stuffed Mushrooms recipe is an original creation of my own. It won me first prize in a recipe contest sponsored by Rudolph Foods, Inc. (A trip to Las Vegas for two).

The other recipe: "Chick-Kabobs", also one of my prize winners, is a favorite of many of my friends. Try the recipes which appeal to you and Bon Appetit!

Pieninis Krupnikas Milk Ligeur

- 1 Bottle Whole Grain Alcohol
- 2 Lbs. Cube Sugar
- 1 Vanilla Bean Stick
- 6 Oranges
- 3 Lemons
- 1 Ot. Fresh Milk

In a flat bottom pan, cut up oranges and lemons into small wedges. Mash fruit with a potato masher. Put all in a wide mouth glass gallon jar. Add sugar cubes, vanilla stick and the alcohol. Stir well. Let stand for 3 days. At the end of 3rd day add 1 quart milk and let stand for 10 days. On the 11th day strain thru coffee filters lined in med. size mesh strainer. Use spoon to squeeze out all juice. You will have to change filters occasionally. Discard the fruit pulp then filter the liquid again several times. It will now appear as a beautiful clear amber color. Put into 2 bottles.



"Porkeyrooms" (Stuffed Mushrooms)

20 Medium Size Mushrooms

- 1 Bag 2-3/8 Ozs. Fried Pork Rinds
- 5 T. Margarine
- 2 T. Finely Chopped Onion
- 1/8 t. Black Pepper
- 1/2 C. Fine Bread Crumbs

Wash Mushrooms under running water. Drain on paper toweling. Remove stems and chop fine.

Put pork rinds thru fine blade of food grinder or blender, or food processor.

Place 3T. margarine in a medium size skillet, add the chopped onion and mushroom stems. Fry till onion is transparent and mushrooms release their juice. Add the ground pork rinds, pepper and M.S.G. Blend thoroughly till mixture is moistened. Fill mushroom caps with this mixture. Melt remaining margarine in skillet, add bread crumbs and mix together.

Dip filled mushroom caps into buttered bread crumbs. Place in a 9" pie pan and bake for 15 minutes in 350° oven. Dust with paprika and garnish with parsley.

These may be made ahead, refrigerated, then baked before serving. Makes 20.

Chick-Kabobs

- 4 Bonless Chicken Breasts each cut into 8 cubes
- 1 Can Water Chestnuts cut into 16 pieces
- 16 Med. Size Fresh Mushrooms
- 8 Wooden Skewers (City Chicken size)

Sauce

- 1/3 C. Honey
- 1/2 C. Soy Sauce
- 1/2 C. Dry White Wine
 - 1 Clove Garlic (crushed)

2 Grated Fresh Ginger Root 1/3 t. Crushed Dry Red Pepper

Mix all above ingredients together. Using 4 cubes of chicken. 2 halves water chestnut and 2 whole mushrooms, thread the meat and vegetables onto each skewer beginning with meat and alternating the vegetables between each meat cube.

Arrange Kabobs in a 9"x13" pan. Pour sauce over, cover and let marinate overnite, turning several times.

Three-quarters of an hour before serving, place the pan in preheated oven 375°. BAke uncovered till glazed, turning occasionally, for about 45 minutes. Serve hot or at room temperature.

(For smaller Kabobs, use 16 shorter skewers and use one-half as much meat and vegetables on each skewer.

Makes 8 large or 16 small Kabobs.



Lithuanian Straw Art

Lithuanian Christmas Tree Ornaments

Made From Paper Straws and Glue

By Aldona Ryan

About ten years ago, the women in our parish learned how to make Lithuanian Christmas Tree Ornaments out of white, plastic straws. We sewed them into intricate shapes and designs with a large needle and white crochet thread.

This type of art form remains a very popular item in our area. We have advanced to bird cages and other accessories for year around use.

Then, about three or four years ago, we learned a different type of straw art. We started making ornaments out of white paper straws by gluing them together.

This type of art form does not take any more skill but, possibly, it does take a little more patience. Perhaps you might like to try it.

The nine patterns that you see on the next pages are only a small part of a great variety. Due to lack of space, large patterns could not be included. By changing the hanger threads to different locations, a total of fifteen different ornaments can be made.

These patterns have been drawn by hand on homemade graph paper and are not perfect, but quite useable.

The bell, church, and Christmas tree are my own design. The designer of the other patterns remains unknown. It might be fun to make your own patterns at some future date.

You will need:

A pattern printed on graph paper

A piece of stiff cardboard

Clear, plastic sheeting such as Saran Wrap (or plate glass)

White paper straws

Elmer's Glue (Or Sobo or any craft glue that dries clear)

A bottle cap

Toothpicks

Single edge razor blades

A pancake turner

White crochet thread (Or any strong white thread)

Place pattern on cardboard and cover both with plastic sheeting. (This is done so that glue isn't put onto pattern directly.)

Put some glue into bottle cap. (Putting out too much glue will be wasteful as it dries quickly and becomes unusable.)

With a sharp, single edged razor blade, cut a piece of straw the length needed for the longest piece in the pattern. (Or start from the center and work outward. Sometimes it is better to turn the pattern upside down and work from bottom up.)

With a toothpick, place two or three dots of glue directly on plastic on spot where the cut piece of straw is to be placed. Put straw down and allow it to dry to the sheeting.

While the first straw piece is drying, cut straws the right lengths for the second row.

Put dots of glue on the SIDE of the pasted down straw where the second row will touch the first straw.


With the help of your toothpick, slide second row into place.


Continue cutting and gluing the rows to the sides of the preceding rows until pattern is finished.

Cut a three inch piece of thread and tie ends together to make a loop.

Put a drop of glue into top straw and push knot of looped thread into the glue for a "hanger".

With a pancake turner, gently lift ornament from the plastic sheet and place on flat surface to dry thoroughly.





PAPER STRAW ORNAMENTS

Helpful Hints

If you plan to make a number of ornaments, you may want to pre-cut your straws. In five containers, cut pieces the lengths most often used: 1 space, 2 spaces, 3 spaces, 4 spaces and 5 spaces.

Use a sharp razor blade to cut the straws and try to make the edges as straight as possible.

Using glue too generously will end up in a sloppy back side as the glue will ooze down and fall to the bottom.

Try to match the straws with your graph paper. If straws are too big, they will cover the pattern too soon to continue with the work. You can make your own graph paper to fit the width of your straws.

Learn to work deftly with your toothpick to push pieces into place and to hold them together.

Homemade Clay For Ceramic-Type Ornaments, Figures or Jewelry

Dissolve 1/2 cup of cornstarch in 1/3 cup of water in a bowl. In a separate pan — mix 1 cup salt and 1/3 cup of water and heat stirring constantly until brine starts to bubble.

Remove from heat and stir in the cornstarch solution. Stir hard until mixture is stiff enough to knead. Knead until smooth.

Store in airtight container or plastic bag.

Can be rolled flat with rolling pin and shapes cut with cookie cutter.

No baking is needed. Air dry to hard texture.

For lasting beauty, paint with clear varnish for white ornaments.

Can be painted with oil colors or poster paints. DO NOT PUT INTO KILN.





Chain Stitch Wreath

By Aldona Ryan

You will need:
3-ply yarn (rug type)
large crochet hook
plastic lid from coffee can

Cut the center of a platic lid leaving a 1/2 inch circ or ring to use as the base for the wreath.

Put one chain stitch on your crochet hook.

Place crochet hook through the center of plastic rin and pull thread through the chain stitch — thereb casting one loop over the plastic ring.

Make 10 chain stitches and then cast another loo over the ring. Pull thread through the last chain stitch

Make 10 chain stitches and then cast another loo over the ring. Pull thread through the last chain stitch

Make 10 more chain stitches and cast loop over th plastic ring.

Continue with this process until the plastic ring i completely covered.

At the very end, make 18 or 20 chain stitches and pul through the last loop. This long loop will be your hange at the top of the wreath.

Decorate with flowers and ribbons.






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JOSEPH F. GRIBAUSKAS EXECUTIVE SECRETARY





The Central Avenue Betterment Association, sponsor of the biggest parade in Kansas City, on October 10th awarded trophies for the three best entries out of 47 floats in the parade. First prize went to the colorful LITHUANIANS OF AMERICA float which featured costumed twirling folk dancers.

RITA AND TONY SAKALYS of Clarendon Hills, Illinois, and their children, Richard, Audrey and Paul, follow many of the traditions of their Lithuanian heritage at Christmas, according to an article featured last November in the "Doings" newspaper, published in Hinsdale, Illinois. There is usually a large family group at the Sakalysis' home on Christmas Eve where gifts are exchanged after Santa's visit or after dinner and then they attend midnight Mass together.

Christmas Eve dinner is heaped in tradition — a meatless meal consisting of 12 dishes, one for each of the 12 Apostles. An extra place is always set in memory of members of the family who have died. The tablecloth is spread over straw, symbolizing the lowly manger Jesus was laid in. After dinner, each person draws a straw from under the cloth. The person drawing the longest straw, it is said, will live longest.


The meal begins with sharing of the bread, together with a prayer. A large wafer is split and each person receives a share. This in turn, is divided so that each person gives the other persons a piece of their wafer. Dinner consists mainly of fish, stuffed or baked, herring, beet salad, fruit compote, cranberry pudding, and "little ears". A Christmas Eve biscuit with poppy seed milk is always included.

The Lithuanian Christmas tree traditionally is put up and decorated on Christmas Eve day and taken down on Epiphany. The tree is completely decorated with straw ornaments handmade into intricate shapes. In a Lithuanian home, Santa Claus comes on Christmas Eve after dinner to deliver his gifts to the young children.



Elena Jurgėla, R.I.P.

Elena Apollonia Jurgela died on March 3, 1981, at Sibley Hospital in Washington, D.C. Elena, the colorful and active American-born daughter of Michael Čepinskas and Antonia nee Banylis, was born in Brooklys, NY, on Jan. 5, 1912. As a two-year-old she accompanied her mother on attrip to Lithuania — they did not know a war would intervene — returning only in 1928 after World War II, the German occupation, and Lithuanian wars for independence.

While in Lithuania, Elena was supported by her father's brother, a Lithuanian physicist and Rector of the University of Kaunas, Professor Vincas Čepinskas.

On her return to New York, she attended Queens College, sang and acted in the Lithuanian Operetta Chorus, as soloist in "Išeivis" (The Emigrant), and was active in sponsoring the Trans-Atlantic Flight to Lithuania by Captain Stephen Darius and Stanley Girenas in 1933.

Married to Dr. Constantine R. Jurgėla, the Secretary of the Consulate General of Lithuania in New York, she was active in the women's organizations, the Baltic American Society, the Lithuanian Day at the New York World's Fair in 1939 and the Baltic States Day in 1940. During the war she was very active in the "New York at War" Parade, in the American Red Cross and the War Bonds campaigns, the Lithuanian American Council, the Baltic American Society, United Lithuanian Relief campaigns, and in the presidential campaigns of Franklin Delano Roosevelt in 1932 and 1936, for Wendell Wilkie in 1940, and in the Thomas Dewey, John Foster Dulles, Fiorello LaGuardia and other political campaigns. Her husband entered the State Department service as Chief of the Lithuanian Service of the Voice of America in New York in 1951, in which capacity they moved to Washington, D.C. in 1954 and settled in Bethesda, Md. She became very active in the local Lithuanian American Society, Knights of Lithuania, United Lithuanian Relief Fund, and various charity drives.

She is survived by her husband, Historian Dr. Constantine R. Jurgėla, son Algis and grandson Algis in New York, daughter Elena and granddaughter Elytė Mangis in Bethesda, and an aunt Vicotira Andruška in Putnam, Conn.

In Council 142 of the Knights of Lithuania, Elena Jurgėla was known as the "Hostess with the Mostest", and for her gracious hospitality. Every Council affair displayed some of her culinary specialties. She was such an active and vital person, that she will be greatly missed in Council 142.
