Mes lietuviai tikrai galime didžiuotis savo paveldėjimu: gražia, sena savo kalba ir giliu religingumu. XIII amžiuje su Gerosios Kristaus Atpirkimo Naujienoskrikčionybės atėjimu ir kunigaikščio Jogailos krikštu 1387 m., Lietuva tvirtai įsijungė į Katalikų Bažnyčią. Pamaldumas į Kristų ir ypatingai į jo Motiną Mariją greitai jaugo į visų lietuvių širdis. Tai todėl ir dabar 1982 m. paskelbtuose LIETUVISKŲ PARAPIJŲ METUOSE mes kreipiamės į Mariją, Bažnyčios Motina.

AUSROS VARTŲ MARIJA.—Mūsų gilesniam savo tikėjimo pažinimui ir jo sustiprinimui, lietuviškų parapijų gyvastingumo atgaivinimui, — mes kreipiamės į Vilniaus Aušros Vartų Mariją, Gailestingumo Motiną.

Aušros Vartai /vartai į rytus/buvo vieni iš keturių vartų Vilnias tvirtovės apsaugos sienoje, kuri saugojo ja nuo totorių. Kai tie Aušros Vartai buvo baigti statyti, viršuj buvo iškelti, išlaukinėje pusėje, Jėzaus Išganytojo ir, vidinės pusės koplytėlėje, Nekaltos Mergelės Marijos paveikslai. Jiems, laikui bėgant, sunykus, jie buvo pakeisti naujais. Dabartinis Marijos paveikslas, manoma, buvo nutapytas 1570 m. Aušros Vartų Marijos paveikslas pasižymi gausių malonių ir stebuklų suteikimu tiems, kurie meldėsi į Mariją prie to paveikslo: Šimtmečių bėgyje ta koplytėlė tapo Marijos kulto Lietuvos tautine sventove. 1927 m. Ausros Vartų Marijos paveikslas buvo vainikutos auksine karūna suteikiant jam popiežiškąsias privilegijas. Besimeldžiantiems prie to paveikslo į Mariją, Popiežius Klemensas XIV suteikė atlaidus.

Ir šiandien, nežiūrint komunistinės priespaudos, tûkstančiai žmonių meldžia Marijos užtarymo savo religijos išlaikymui. -

Cia, savo namuose, mes meldžiamės, kad Aušros Vartų Marija, Gailestingumo Motina, suteiktų ištvermės Bažnyčiai Lietuvoje ir padėtų mums atnau jin-

ti savo parapijas. ŠILUVOS MARIJA.—Viduramžių ir šių laikų Popiežiai Lietuvą pavadino Marijos Žeme, nes 1608 m. Švenčiausioji Motina apsireiškė piemenėliams prie Šiluvos. Tuo laiku protestantizmas skverbėsi į Lietuva naikindamas Katalikų bažnyčias ir Siluva jos jau nebeturėjo. Su kūdikiu rankose Marija pasirodė stovinti ant didžiulio akmens. Ilgi plaukai dengė pečius. Ji verkė. Vaikai nubėgę pas Kalvinistų pastorių papasakojo ką matę, bet jis jiems nepatikėjo. Sekančią dieną tas pastorius nuėjo į Marijos pasirodymo vietą. Švenčiausiajai Motinai vėl pasirodžius, jis paklausė jos: "Kodėl tu verki?" Ji atsakė: "Anksčiau šioje vietoje mano mylimasis Sūnus buvo garbinamas, bet dabar šioj



vietoj yra ariama ir sėjams." Tų pasirodymų sukeltas pamaldumas į Siluvos Mariją iššaukė naujos Katalikų bažnyčios statybą apsireiškimo vietoje ir visoj apylikėj paskatino žmonių grįžimą į Katalikų tikėjimą. 1656 m. Popiežius Aleksandras VII patenkino karaliaus Jono -Kazimiero prašymą suteikdamas Siluvos Marijai Lietuvos ir Lenkijos Globėjos titulą. Tai buvo gegužės 13 d.

FATIMOS MARIJA.—1917 m., keistu sutapimu, taip pat gegužės mėm. 13 d. Portugalijoj, netoli Fatimos, Nekaltoji Mergelė Marija pasirodė trims piemenėliams: Liucijai, Jacintai ir Pranciškui. Iš šešių pasirodymų šis pasirodymas buvo pirmas su svarbials ir primygtinais nuodėmėj skęstančiam pasauliui.

Marija prašė atgailos, maldos ir pasiaukojimo jos Nekalčiausiajai Širdžiai. Ji nurodė, kad kasdien kalbamas Rožančius ir Atsilyginimo Komunija kiekvieno mėnesio primąjį šeštadienį yra tikras kelias atskirų žmonių ir valstybių sugrąžinimui prie Tėvo.

Nepaprastos reikšmės ir neatidėliotino būtinumo yra Fatimos Dievo Motinos Marijos pranašystės: "Jeigu mano pražymai bus išpildyti, Rusija atsivers ir bus taika. Priešingu atveju, Rusija paskleis pasaulyje savo klaidingumą, kuris sukels karus ir Bažnyčios perseikiojimus. Gerieji bus kankinami, Sventasis Tėvas turės daug kenteti, daugelis tautų bus sunaikinta."

1951 m. gegužes mėn. 13 d. Romoje susirinkę lietuviai vyskupai tremtyje paaukojo Lietuvą ir visam pasaulyje išblaškytus lietuvius Nekalčiausiajai Marijos Sirdžiai.

DIEVO MOTINA MARIJA JUSŲ NAMUOSE.— Ruošdamiesi 1984 m. kovo mėn. 4 d. šv. Kazimiero 500 metų mirties sukatį paminėti, Lietuvos vyskupai prašo atkreipti 1982-se metuose ypatingą dėmesį į šv. Kazimiero skaistumą ir jo meilę Marijai, nes tauta pašvęsta sv. Kazimierui turi būti "moraliai sveika, jos jaunimas skaistus, jos šeimos tikinčios ir tvirtos."

Per šiuos Lietuviškų parapijų Metus kiekviena šeima yra skatinama ugdyti didesnę meilę Marijai. Kristui mirštant ant kryžiaus, Evangeliojoje toliau skaitome: "Ir nuo tos valandos mokinys pasiėmė ją pas save."

EXCERPTS OF TALK GIVEN BY LORETTA I. STUKAS, NATIONAL PRESIDENT, KNIGHTS OF LITHUANIA (at the C-96 50th Anniversary Dinner-Dance, Marriott Hotel, Dayton, Ohio — April 24, 1982)

On behalf of the Supreme Council of the Knights of Lithuania, I am pleased to extend greetings and congratulations on this wonderful anniversary and to thank you for your loyalty and contributions to the Knights of Lithuania. Please accept my personal good wishes too. Dayton has many happy memories for me and your council members have been my dear friends for many years.

Although this is officially the 50th Anniversary of "continuous" activity of C-96, in reality, the Knights of Lithuania came to Dayton long before...

In April of 1916, when the Knights could boast of over 4000 members, Dayton organized C-96, and began K of activity with 23 members. The council stayed active for about 5 years, until 1921.

The year 1932 was a year of national pride for Lithuanians in America. Jack Sharkey became Heavyweight Champion of the World. Darius and Girenas planned for the historic trans-Atlantic flight...and in Dayton, Holy Cross Lithuanians reorganized the Knights of Lithuania council and joined in again with other Knights to promote their Lithuanian heritage and to strengthen their Catholic faith.

Council 96 history is too full and varied to provide all the details tonight, but it has a history to be proud of, in the true tradition of our motto, "Dievui ir Tevynei". In their lifetime, C-96 Knights have collected thousands of dollars for Lithuanian cultural, political and religious needs. They have been the backbone of Holy Cross Church, providing constant moral and physical help whenever needed.

They have been active in every phase of National Activity. Why, as early as 1937, just 5 years after their reorganization, they hosted an outstanding National Convention of the K of L, with Bishop Reimys of Lithuania as their special guest.

In my memory, C-96 has produced many leaders, on a National, District and council level...Juniors, Seniors, Cultural committee, VYTIS, all have enjoyed the pleasure of C-96's talents.

It is truly a credit to C-96 activity that there is so much family activity, and that parents and children, brothers and sisters, all are active together. It is not surprising that this closeness has led to C-96 leadership in Junior activity, that so many young adults are active in the council, and that Associate Members...Non-Lithuanian spouses of members are almost as active as (or in some cases more active than) some full-bred Lithuanians!

In a word, the Knights of Lithuania in Dayton, as elsewhere, have expended much work, time, energy and expense promoting the causes of the Knights. One might ask "Why bother with this Lithuanian activity", especially when it is much easier to just "blend in" with the American Melting Pot? Just why are we so anxious to "be different"?

As members of the Knights of Lithuania, we are reminded of how fortunate we are, compared to our kin in Lithuania, and we can participate in a united effort to help them. As part of a National organization, we speak with a strong voice to spread our culture or help our less-fortunate kin. Through the Knights of Lithuania activity, we have all made numerous new friends, friends with the same background, the same traditions, the same Lithuanian genes. And many of us, myself included, have found our life's partners in the Knights of Lithuania.

It is up to us to educate ALL Lithuanian Americans and their spouses about Lithuania, its culture, and their heritage, so that they too can speak intelligently about Lithuanian history, the Lithuanian language, and the plight of Lithuanians behind the Iron Curtain. How can we educate them? By bringing them into our organization, and encouraging them to become active.

Most important, assure the Knights of Lithuania a future by bringing local youth into your activities. Dayton Knights of Lithuania should be proud of their Junior program...which over the years has brought intelligent and active young people into the regular council. Keep up the good work, and continue giving these beautiful young people jobs of responsibility and respect, so that they don't lose their love of their heritage.

Finally, for 50 years, the Knights of Lithuania has helped you and your fellow Dayton Lithuanian Americans find yourselves in this great mass of cultures we call America. Stay true to the ideals of the organization and its motto, DIEVUI IR TEVYNEI by strengthening your resolve to work harder than ever to promote your heritage, to support Lithuania's fight for freedom, and to cherish your Catholic faith.

We were privileged to have with us Marie Wareika Preidis, Bernadette Sluzas Noriekas, Mary Sinkwitz Lucas and Veronica Sinkwitz Omlor all Charter Members of C-96. Bernadette, Mary and Veronica shared with us some of their memories of the past fifty years and we hope you enjoy these reminiscences...

VERONICA SINKWITZ OMLOR —

In the very late 1920's, it became very obvious to me that Holy Cross Parish needed a young people's organization. Our mothers had their Ladies' Society, our fathers had St. Peter's Society. At one time we had a young ladies' Sodality, and Irene's Club that were pretty active but soon after I was old enough to join them, they disintegrated. Most young women stuck around but the young men sought out other parishes and a few of them even started to stray away from their

religion. Yes, we had a strong choir and the Theatrical Circle but they were for both the older and younger parishioners. The Theatrical Circle was fun but it drew only the young people who spoke fairly good Lithuanian and there weren't too many of us, especially young men. There was nothing in the parish to draw both young men and young women of our generation. I was old enough at the time to know that this was not good and it bothered me.

About that time, Ed Pavis was a frequent visitor to Dayton.

He was a very ardent worker for the Knights of Lithuania and tried to organize a council here but, hard as he tried, he didn't succeed. But he told me enough about the K of L organization that I remained very interested.

Not too long after that, Vincent Damasas came to make Dayton his home. We knew Vincent well. He was a seminarian with the Lithuanian Marianist Fathers and he liked to spend his summers in Dayton and helped our pastor with parish work. He also started Lithuanian classes and many of us learned to read and write from him. One summer Vincent came to stay permanently.

One evening at the church hall, there were a few of us young people for some kind of an occasion. Later, Vincent asked us, "How would you young people like to have your own young people's organization?" I was the first to answer, "Yes, let's organize a Vyciu council." He said, "If you want a Vyciu council, we'll have a Vyciu council."

After a month or so we decided we were ready to organize. Anthony Lapinskas, then national president, came to Dayton one week-end. We called a meeting of all the young people in the parish for that Sunday afternoon. Again, its hard to remember how many showed up but evidently, enough that Anthony Lapinskas was impressed. he spoke to us and encouraged us to organize. We did just that. Our first officers were Rev. S. Bystras, Spiritual Advisor; Frank Gudelis, President; Helen Zilinkas, Vice-President; Teophla Wareika, Recording Secretary; myself, Veronica Sinkwitz, Financial Secretary,

The Supreme Council notified us that we will be known as Council 96 since that was the number given to the council formerly organized in Dayton in 1916 and that we actually reorganized an old council. This came as a real surprise to us as no one, even our parents, ever mentioned that once a K of L council existed in Dayton and in our parish.

But it seemed that our reorganized council 96 was destined for success right from the start. We invited young relatives and friends to join and we grew. No matter what function we planned, we were successful.

We were fortunate to have members like Joe Goldick who pulled in the young men. He started the athletic program. The trophy case in our church hall is witness to it's success under Joe's leadership. When the boys won championships, we held a testimonial dinner inviting prominent Dayton speakers.

In 1935 the American-Lithuanian Catholic Students organization was planning an excursion to Lithuania and invited the Knights of Lithuania to come along. This gave me the opportunity to realize my lifelong dream to visit Lithuania where I was born and all my relatives there. When Anthony Mazeika, national president, learned I was joining this excursion he wrote asking me to represent the Knights of Lithuania at Lithuania's First World Convention to be held that summer in Kaunas. Also at the Pavasarininku national convention to be held in Telsiai. Pavasarininkai was also a young peoples national organization in Lithuania and considered a sister organization to America's Knights of Lithuania. Anthony Mazeika met me in New York and gave me my credentials. That trip to Lithuania was a dream trip for me never to be forgotten. Being a K of L delegate gave me the opportunity to meet people from President Smetona and on down. In turn I tried to represent the Knights of Lithuania to the best of my ability and make a good impression for our young American-Lithuanians. On my return, I wrote a full report to the Supreme Council which was later published in the VYTIS.

I have never mentioned this before, but in April when the council commemorates Founders Day, honoring Mykolas Norkunas, founder of the Knights of Lithuania organization, I say a silent prayer for Vincent Damasas. If not for him and strong members like Frank Gudelis, we may not have a Council 96 at Holy Cross.

BERNADETTE SLUZAS NOREIKAS —

Bee, as she is fondly called, recalls of how active the council was in the beginning. She, too, remembers all the Sports activities and banquets the women prepared for. Not only did the council support euchre parties every Tuesday but every other Thursday they held socials. In 1932 the council formed a Theatrical Circle. One particular performance was the council's first Operetta in Lithuanian "Apkalbos Ir Meile." Approximately ten members took part in it.

In March of 1933 the council celebrated its First St. Casimir's Day Mass. Bee, Veronica and others prepared the breakfast following Mass. The council held may Hay Rides, trips to Coney Island and other activities that formed the foundation which has held the council together all these many years.

Bee recalls the council's first trip to visit an out-oftown council. It was in August of 1933. Host council was C-25 Cleveland. It was a picnic held at Hinckly, Ohio.

In October of 1938 the council held a Recession Party. Everyone wore old clothes. The ticket for the party, which included everything, was \$.25! In 1937 C-96 hosted the national convention. It was a big job for these young members but everything went well. In 1939 the council formed its first Junior Council. It was in existence until 1942. Members from that Junior council still active were Patronella Zelinskas Alexander, Mary Ann Ambrose Blum, Jimmy Kavalauskas and Eleanor,

On this joyous occasion of our 50th Anniversary, I am going to speak of "Memories," and we all have so many, of the years that we have been members of the Knights of Lithuania.

In Websters Dictionary, the word "GLUE" is defined as: an adhesive, to bond, to stick together. Well, that's what we really have plenty of. This "GLUE" has kept us sticking together for the past 50 years.

In 1932, having just been organized, we were still in the depression years and times were tough, but we were a determined small group and started planning small affairs at the church hall.

Later we got into summer picnics at the old Valley View Picnic grounds.

Other times we had Camp Suppers on Saturday nights

We were all single then and it was fun to see which girls and fellows would pair off for the evening. Nothing serious at first but eventually we did have quite a few weddings which culminated from these gettogethers. Our first wedded couple was Victor and Betty August (now of C-147, St. Petersburg). A week later Veronica and Ernest Omlor were married.

Our first out-of-town excursion was to Cleveland (which Bee also recalls). This was the beginning of our long lasting friendship with C-25. Later we traded invitations with Cleveland and Detroit C-102. I'm sure many of you have fond memories of those visits which lasted thru these many years.

We always stayed at the homes of our hosts and, we too, opened our homes to our visiting guests. This was especially true in the year 1937 when Dayton hosted the national convention. That was the first of four conventions held in Dayton.

A few years later, a group of us singles journeyed to our neighboring city of Springfield and there, in an old time Lithuanian "Kripas" Bar", in a back room, we organized C-16 of Springfield.

As we grew in age, so we grew in activities. Everyone had so many good ideas. There were trips to Coney Island (Cincinnati), boat trip aboard the Delta Queen on the Ohio River, successful basketball teams under the direction of now deceased member Joseph Goldick. The team was city champions in 1937 and 1938. Bowling leagues were formed and participation within the district at tournaments began. During one bowling tournament in Gary, Indiana, the Gary Hotel where we stayed had a big fire in their kitchen and all of us were routed from the hotel until things were under control.

During World War II, our council was on a little "shakey ground". With a lot of our male members being called into service and our married couples raising families, we didn't have time for participation in club affairs and our membership dwindled. Thanks to our Junior K of L members who were now transferring into the regular council because of age, they took over the reins and our council was able to function as before without any lapse in membership.

Our traditional events were the Annual Mother's Day Parties honoring our mothers living and deceased. We have movies taken by George Mikalauskas of these eventful happenings.

Annual "Lithuanian Day Picnics" at Eintracht Park were initiated and most times chaired by Mike P. Petkus who dedicated many, many hours toward the success of the picnics. Mike was also instrumental in setting up the "Building Fund" which has been our financial lifeline for the many special projects which we sponsor. Mike's name comes up again as being the instigator of our Annual Cemetery Visits to the graves of our deceased members, This tradition is still carried on to this day, with Mass being offered at 8:30 A.M., a light breakfast, then on to the cemetery where we go from grave to grave, one member carrying a cross, hand carved by George Mikalauskas, then prayers are said. Other members armed with grass shears, clip around tombstones while Elinor Sluzas reminisces about some outstanding or comical situation describing the deceased member. Flowers are placed at each grave. Here again is where our friend "GLUE" is with us, sticking together through life and death. This is not a morbid event, but a truly happy and satisfying time when we feel close to each other and to our deceased members, remembering the good times we had together.

We have contributed to our Spiritual obligations by attending many Retreats. The women attended at the Dominican Retreat House in Dayton while the men traveled to Gethsemane, KY and later to Milford Retreat House in Cincinnati. We also attended mixed retreats at Bergamo Center in Dayton. We have held Evening of Recollections at Holy Cross with such moderators as Rev. Dambrauskas, Revs. Fortkamp, Greise and Mahoney.

Another annual event is our Christmas Caroling to the aged and in imparishioners of Holy Cross Church. We sing carols in Lithuanian and English and have gifts of fruit or flowers for each stop. The joy it brings to these people is only exceeded by the feeling of love and comradarie of the caroling group.

In our lifetime we have had many joys, happiness and successes. We have shared these together in weddings, christenings, graduations, and other happy occasions. We sent gifts to the newborn, to our newly weds, hospitalized or those members seriously ill at home. Our council members come through with cards, visits, gifts and prayers. The saddest times are when death has called our members. That's when our pal "GLUE" comes especially to join us together in sympathy and consolation.

We have fond memories of the many social events that we had arranged just for our own merriment or as money making projects...Dances, Bingo Parties, Card Parties, Fashion Shows, Luaus, Talent Shows, Mexican Fiestas, German Octoberfest, St. Patrick's Day, Hobo Party featuring "This is YOUR life — Frank Gudelis", baseball and football excursions, Palm Sunday Bake

In 1948, Rev. Vaclovas Katarskis, having arrived in the United States, was welcomed into our council during a breakfast at Suttmiller's Restaurant. To this day Father remains as our Spiritual Advisor and our Special Friend.

During the next several years, groups of displaced Lithuanians began arriving in Dayton. We welcomed several of the families into our council. They have become very active members and a great asset to our organization, especially in the revival of the Lithuanian Language and culture of our fatherland.

Our District and National Conventions are the highlights of our membership in the K of L. We have traveled to cities throughout the United States from the shores of the Atlantic to the Pacific and have come home with glowing reports on the progress of our national organization.

We are also proud of our Non-Lithuanian members for whom we fought tooth and nail at national conventions to gain for them recognition as Associate K of L Members. These are persons who are married to a K of L member and who have contributed a great deal in many ways to our organization. They come from several ethnic extractions. They have faithfully worked with all of us toward our ideals and goals to make this outstanding council. In C-96 we have seen many fine persons elected to the office of council President. The first and for several years was Frank Gudelis (D), Joseph Goldick (D), Charles Goldick, Bill Chappel, Anthony Alexinas (D), John Scott (D), Stanley Kavy, Stanley Sluzas, Ernest Sakalauskas, Peter Petkus (D), Mike P. Petkus (D), Charles Vangas, Ted Sluzas, Charles Petkus, Stanley Vaitkus, Judy Petrokas, Mary Lucas, Joe Noreikas (D), Anne Scott, Mary Ann Blum, Elinor Sluzas, Aldona Ryan and Eleanor Mantz.

In our 50 years of existence we have had only 2½ treasurers. The half Treasurer was Veronica Omlor who served as Financial Secretary-Treasurer for the first years of our organization. Frank Gudelis served many, many years and Sally Miller has faithfully held the post for eleven years. All our officers, past and present, have done a fabulous job.

As our council grew older, and our bank account grew larger, we became more generous. We have given gifts (monetary) to well known Lithuanian organizations. ...Balfas, Altas, Supreme Council Scholarship Fund, Lithuanian Religious Aid, Holy Cross remodeling, Shrine-Convent-Seminary Funds, and our latest to the Lithuanian Legation Remodeling Fund.

Well enough of this rambling, I'll end my reminiscing with the title of an old song which was popular in our younger days, "Memories are made of this". So, with the help of our old friend "GLUE", may we keep on sticking together for another 50 years and as we say in Lithuanian — "Kas bus, Kas nebus, Daytono Vyčiai nepražus."

The Great Poet— Maironis 1862-1932

June 28, 1982 was the fiftieth anniversary of the death of one of Lithuania's greatest poets, Maironis. Jonas Mačiulis was born on Oct. 21, 1862 in Raseniai District. He was graduated from Kiev. The Kaunas Theological Seminary and the Theological Academy of St. Petersburg which awarded him a Masters and Doctors Degree in Theology.

In 1909, he took up a position as rector of the Kaunas Theological Seminary. he publicly addressed the seminarians in the Lithuanian language, thus breaking the custom of using only Polish or Latin. He supported the cultural endeavors of Lithuanian organizations beyond the walls of his seminary.

Upon the founding of the University of Kaunas in 1922, he was elected honorary professor and taught moral theology as well as Lithuanian literature and world literature. Earlier, he had been raised to the office of Prelate of the Samogitian Diocesan Chapter. He retained rectorship of the seminary until his death. He is buried at the wall of the Cathedral of Kaunas.

His first poem "Lietuvos Vargas" (Lithuania's Sorrow) later changed to "Miškas Užia" was first published in the underground newspaper "Ausra" in 1885. Under the pen-name of Stanslovas Zanavykas, he published this first book, "Lietuvos Istorija" (history of Lithuania) in 1891. His first collection of poems, "Pavasario Balsai" (Voices of Spring) appeared in 1895 under the pseudonym Maironis"

Maironis was not only a poet but a modern prophet. With his beautiful verses, he aroused the nation. He spoke of Lithuania's natural beauty, of her glorious and ancient past. Through his works, he inspired all with the love of Lithuania, of its language and of its people. His poetry urged love of the past, the language and the traditions. He was the first Lithuanian poet to use tonic verse, opening up more ways of creating music in poetry.

During the years of national awakening, Maironis' poetry won universal recognition and enthusiastic acceptance among the Lithuanian public. His poems were accessible to the ordinary reader because of their musical straightforward, lucid structure. The characters of his epic poetry were close to the Lithuanian Patriot of the Day.

Then and later, many Lithuanian composers set his verse to music. The popular poems became widely sung tunes, among these "Marija, Marija," "Lietuva Brangi," "Kur Bega Sesupe," "Ten Kur Nemunas Banguoja" and many others.

The Soviet Regime in Lithuania, at first did not allow anything of his to be printed. They were, however, unable to squelch the admiration for the Nations Great Poet. In 1947, on the 15th Anniversary of his death, the Soviet government allowed the people to commemorate this date. In the introduction to a selected edition of his writings in 1956, it was recognized that the best poetic works of Maironis have become an irreplaceable part of Lithuania's Cultural Heritage.



In this year of the 50th anniversary of his death, let us call to mind the beautiful words of his famous poem put to music, "Lietuva Brangi."


LIETUVA BRANGI

For a game of beisbolas baseball, for the uninitiated), you need a velenuota aikštė (level field). The field is in the shape of a kvadratas with two long sides (su pailgintais šonais) which wet the lauko ribos (bounds or limits). On each corner of the kvadratas are aikštelės. They have specific names: mušėjo aikštelė (home), pirmoji aikštelė, antroji aikštelė and trečioji aikštelė.

The equipment used by the beisbolininkai is rather basic. First, you need a leather ball. Though standard Lithuanian calls this missile a sviedinys, the true grit beisbolininkas prefers kamuoliukas or muštukas. Another basic piece of equipment is the medinė lazda, one end of which is a storas galas. You hold the plonas galas. For protection some players or žaidėjai cover the face with a kauke, the gaudytojas and teisėjas (umpire) also wear a krūtinsargis and on their legs are padded blauzdisargiai. The gynėjai (defending team) wear minkštai prikimštas pirštinės on their right hands, but if they are "kairiarankiai" wear them on the left.

The žaidimas or game of beisbolas is played by dvi komandos with 9 players-žaidėjai. The komanda at bat is called puolėjai, while the team covering the aikštelės (bases) and laukas (field) is called gynėjai.

Let's start with the gynéjai. In the center of the kvadratas on a specialiné aikštelé stands the metéjas with the kamuoliukas. Directly in front of him, standing behind the mušėjo aikštelé (homeplate, for the uninitiated) is the gaudytojas. At the pirmoji aikštelė is a gynėjas. There are also gynėjai at II and III aikštelė. As a backup to the metėjas is the pusiaugynėjas (shortstop). Lauke (in the outfield) are three lauko žaidėjai. When the teisėjas bedecked in black gives the signal (Ženklas), "metėjas svaido kamuoliuką gaudytojo link." Which to every aistruolis (fan) knows to mean "the pitcher pitches the ball at the catcher."

Let's stop briefly to see what the puolejai (team at bat) are up to. One at a time, they step up to the musejo aikštelė (plate) with the medinė lazda. The puolejas with a lazda is called the musejas. His object, as the radijo sporto komentatorius says, is to "atmusti ore lekianti kamuoliuka i lauka", that is, "slug the ball to the outfield."

If the musejas is successful, he drops the bat (meta lazda), begins to run (pradeda begima) He must reach first base (tikslas pasiekti pirmą aikštelę), before the pitcher receives back the baseball (kol kamuoliukas griš į metejo rankas) or before the gynėjas prie pirmos aikštelės gauna kamuoliuką. When the mušėjas starts running, he is called a begikas. If the ball is way out in the field, the begikas tries to 'pasiekti antra, net trečia aikštele" (reach second and even third base). If the laukc žaidėjai fail to catch the ball (pagauti sviedinį) or fumble (apsirinka or susimaišo), the bėgikas dashes for his own (mušėjo) aikštelę. Having completed the whole kvadratas he has earned his team a run (begima baigdamas, laimi savo komandai vieną bėgimą). Of course, the begikas cannot notice all of the moves of the gynéjai. So he is often advised by the vadovas of his komanda as to moves.

The mušėjas is out (turi išeiti iš žaidimo), if one of the following occurs: 1. nepavyksta pasiekti norimas aikšteles (fails to reach a base), 2. gynėjas, stovintis prie aikštelės, palies jį kamuoliuku (a baseman touches him with the ball), or 3. tris kartus iš eilės nepataikys lazda į kamuoliuką (strikes out three times at bat). The teisėjas would then shout: "autas!" Trys autai ir pasikeičiya vietas gynėjai su puolėjais! (Three out and the teams change sides).

As the old Lithuanian umpire would say: "Kiekvienai komandai devynis kartus puolima sužaidžius, žaidimas baigiamas. Laimi komanda, kuri padaro daugiau bėgimų." Or to put it in simple English: each team is up at bat nine times before the game ends. That team wins, which makes the most runs.

So you see: galima ir lietuviškai žaisti beisbolą!

Historical note: The terms and expressions used by the editor are not his own concoction. Baseball was actually played in Lithuania! The famous aviator Steponas Darius of the Trans-Atlantic flight team of Darius-Girenas, introduced baseball to his homeland. The sport was played by the Lithuanian military aviation, and athletes of Marijampole. The first Lithuanian baseball championship was played in 1922 between the aviators and the sports association players. This Lithuanian "series" lasted five games. In 1923 a series was played between the Lithuanian and Estonian Air Force teams. The Lithuanian aviators won. Their coach was Steponas Darius Later baseball declined in Lithuania.

The rules of the game were described in two Lithuanian publications: "Beisbolo taisykles" in Lietuvos Sportas (issues 8-10 in 1922) and Steponas Darius' booklet "Beisbolo taisykles" (Baseball Rules, 1924).

COOK'S CORNER

(Here is a tangy dessert for warm Autumn days.)
Drain 1 can (30 oz.) apricots and 1 can (20 oz.) crushed pineapple, reserving juices. Cut apricots into quarters.

Dissolve 1-6 oz. package of Apricot Jello in 2 cups of boiling water. Add 1 cup of the reserved fruit juices and chill until slightly set.

Fold in 1 cup miniature marshmallows, the drained apricots and pineapple. Pour into 9"x13" pan. Chill until firm.

Combine 1/2 cup sugar, 3 tablespoons flour, 1 egg and 1 cup reserved fruit juices. Cook and stir over medium heat just until thick. Remove from heat. Add 2 tablespoons butter.

When cool, fold in 1/2 cup whipped topping. Spread over gelatin. Sprinkle with 1/2 cup chopped pecans. Chill until serving.

Makes 12 servings.

PETER P. MOLIS of Shrewsbury, Mass. was presented to Pope John Paul II by His Eminence Cardinal Huberto Madeiros during his visit to the Vatican this past Spring. Mr. Molis and his daughter, Danute, a student at the Freiburg University in Germany, in the name of the World-Wide Association of Lithuanian Scouts, presented the Holy Father with a book entitled "Lithuanian Scouting." Following the audience, they spoke over the Vatican Radio to Lithuania about their impressions of the Holy Father and described scouting in the free world.

Mr. Molis, President of the Power Engineering Co., Inc., of Shrewsbury, Mass., is Vice President of the World-Wise Association of Lithuanian Scouts, Staff member of the Wood Badge Training Course of the Algonquin Council, Boy Scouts of America, and an active member of St. Casimir's Parish in Worcester where he is a lector and a member of the parish council. He is also a member of Council 116, South Worcester, Mass.

From "The Cleveland Press" — Security for Pope John Paul II's British tour, after two attempts on his life, was the largest police operation that country ever had. Unlike security for the Royal Family and government leaders, police closely protected the pope in seven major British cities, and operations involved 20,000 police and cost millions of dollars.

The Pope himself had been persuaded to wear a special bullet-proof vest and was guarded by an entourage of security men, many from Italy's top antiterrorist unit. His personal bodyguard, 59-year old ex-American football player ARCHBISHOP PAUL MARCINKUS — also known as the "Pope's gorilla" — never left his side.

Governor Thornburgh of Pennsylvania recently announced the appointment of ANNIE MORGALIS, C-144, Harrisburg, as the Lithuanian-American Commissioner on his Heritage Affairs Advisory Commission.

The Heritage Affairs Advisory Commission is a nonsalaried, bi-partisan group of community leaders working together to provide and encourage the awareness, understanding, and appreciation of the traditions and cultures of Pennsylvania's ethnic people.

Governor Thornburgh based his selection of Annie on her past involvement with the Commission and on her outstanding contributions to the "Christmas... An Ethnic Experience" programs of the past two years. Annie is known throughout much of the United States for her creativity and the beauty of her work in Lithuanian scratched Easter eggs, Lithuanian straw art, mushroom art, and her knowledge and love of Lithuanian culture.

She is Cultural Chairman for Anthracite C-144 and has also served as Cultural Chairman for the Mid-Atlantic District. A member of St. Francis of Assisi Church in Minersville, she works with the youth of the parish teaching them the arts and crafts of the Lithuanian culture.

With his 94-year-old mother in attendance, Father JOSEPH PRUNSKIS celebrated the 50th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood on May 23rd at St. Symphorosa Church on Chicago's Southwest side. Mrs. Ona Prunskiene, whose release from Lithuania was made possible after Father Prunskis personally confronted Nikita Khruschev, was in the congregation for her son's golden jubilee Mass and the reception in the parish center.

Father Prunskis has written over 30 books and some 10,000 of his articles have been published. Many of his writings deal with life in Lithuania under Soviet occupation.

A graduate of the Theological Seminary of Kaunas, Lithuania, he was ordained in 1932. After escaping arrest by the Soviets in 1940, he fled to Germany where he was held in a Nazi concentration camp. He came to Chicago in 1941.

Active in journalism since 1936, Father Prunskis has served as editor of "Musu Laikrastis," "Laivas," and one of the editors of "Draugas." In November 1980 he traveled to Madrid, Spain, to attend a conference of 35 countries to review the 1975 Helsinki agreement. He attended a conference to make a plea for freedom for Soviet-occupied Lithuania. In 1979 Father published a booklet documenting efforts by Lithuanians to save Jews from the Holocaust during the Nazi occupation of Lithuania.

Father Prunskis currently serves as director of information at the Lithuanian American Council in Chicago. He has resided at the rectory of St. Symphorosa parish for the past six years and devotes much of his weekends to duties as a priest at the parish. He still makes time to contribute articles to newspapers and magazines, among them our own "Vytis" magazine.


The June 1982 issue of the "Chicago" magazine lists as one of its favorite places Ajay's Pizza and Lithuanian Cuisine, 2653 West Pope John Paul II Drive, Chicago, Ill. This is the only combination pizza shack and Lithuanian snack shop that they know of in Chicago, and undoubtedly, the only one in the world. Here you can feast on a 14-inch cheese and sausage pizza, or enjoy such treats as kugelis, virtinai, and cepelinai.

Recommended is the kugelis, a dense, perfectly textured grated-potato pudding sparked with bacon. Pair it with sauerkraut mildly spiced Lithuanian sausage, which the owners, JOHN and ANITA BOSAS (both members of Council 36, Chicago), stuff and season themselves. Another delicacy is virtinai, light, crimpedged dumplings filled with either meat or cheese. Add a cup of cold beet soup, awash with sour cream and loaded with finely diced beets, cucumbers, scallions, and hard-cooked eggs.

It is suggested that since the food takes a while to prepare, either call ahead or, while you wait, tour the immaculate streets of Brighton Park. REGINA BELECKAS, daughter of ANTHONY and ANN BELECKAS, members of Council 100, Amsterdam, N.Y., has been awarded a \$100 John P. Gomulka Scholarship by the Montgomery County Women's Democratic Club.

Regina is a graduate of Amsterdam High School this year, where she was a member of the National Honor Society and co-editor of the "Rambler," the school newspaper. She plans to become a journalist and has been accepted at Johns Hopkins University.





Delegates were selected to the K of L Convention at Cleveland. Further plans and activities will be discussed at the next meeting.


Our prayers and warm wishes are extended to our faithful C-19 member, Stella Zoog, who recently underwent major surgery, and is recuperating at her home.


