Perhaps hundreds, maybe thousands of articles, poems and stories have been written about Christmas. But an article for Christmas entitled "After Christmas . . . what?" may be a first in journalism. In this case, it is a first for me.

This question is important. For many, maybe most people, pre-Christmas is a busy, confusing, distracting time, a mixture of plans of activities, card writing, shopping, with a somewhat vague thought of the Birthday of the Lord. So, we can ask ourselves: were our preparations for Christmas really a preparation for the celebration of the Birthday of "God become Man"? Did that activity prepare us for a better understanding of that deep mystery in which we all are involved as recipients of God's greatest gift?

The Babe of Bethlehem was "born for us, given to us". It was a gift to us to make us happy. Did we get a chance at any time before Christmas or on Christmas to exclaim: "Thank you, Almighty Father, for your precious gift?"

After Christmas we have the time to think more seriously, more personally about Emmanuel — "God with us".

In our troubled times we need a stronger reassurance that God is with us, if we look around at what is happening in our world. With so much ungodliness around it is not too difficult to become bewildered, overwhelmed and shaken up in our faith. In this situation we do need proof that God is with us in spite of the pressures and the attacks of the ungodly.

How wise Mother Church is in establishing not only the Solemni-

ty of the Birth of the Savior, but also the Christmas Season that gives us time to recall the Massacre of the Innocents (December 28th), the Motherhood of God (January 1st), the visit of the Wisemen, the Holy Family, and the Baptism of Jesus by Saint John.

This Solemnity and these Feasts of the Church are part of the Christmas event, event hough celebrated after Christmas.


THE MASSACRE OF THE INNOCENTS (DEC. 28)



1. The Holy Innocents, baby boys, born around the time that Jesus was born, were killed, slaughtered "for political reasons": Herod was afraid that the "new born king" the Magi was seeking would one day pull off his crown, push him from his throne.

It is not known how many died. Perhaps about one hundred. "After Christmas" is a very good time to make a meaningful comparison.

During the years after the Supreme Court decision legalizing a woman's right (?) to privacy, her right to choose between keeping or killing her unborn child, there have been one million five hundred thousand plus abortions in the United States. Just as in Herod's time, so now, these crimes were committed "for political reasons". The Supreme Court made God's Law a non-law by permitting abortion on demand.



2. We believe that Jesus, the Babe of Bethlehem is God, the

Father's co-equal Son. The angels, the shepherds, the wisemen adored him as such. And Mary? Mary gave birth to Jesus. Saint Luke records this: "And she brought forth her first born Son... and laid him in a manger". (Luke 2,7).

No honor or privilege is greater than this: to be Mother of God.

Mary, the Virgin of Nazareth, the Mother of God, was also given to us to make us happy and keep us happy. The two short sentences in Saint John's Gospel: (To Mary) "Woman, behold your Son." and (To John) "Behold your mother." (John 19,26-27) reveal this truth. The Mother of God is mother of the Church. She is our mother in a very special way. Mary's Son is Mediator between the Father and us, his children. Mary is Mediatrix between her Son and us, her children. This is one reason out of many why she deserves our warmest love and highest praise. And obedience, too.

3. The visit of the Magi, representing the non-Jewish, non-believing world at the time, reveals to us that God's plan of Salvation included all of the daughters and sons of our first parents, Adam and Eve. The Wiseman traveled long, they arrived, they adored: "We have come to worship him . . ." (Matt. 2,2).

And notice this: Saint Matthew writes "And opening their treasures, they offered him gifts of

gold, and frankincense and myrrh". (Matt. 2,11). Their Christmas preparation was a long and difficult journey, not really knowing their exact final destination. They were actively searching, inquiring, yearning to find "the newly born King of the Jews" of whom the Prophet Micah had prophesied that he would be born in Bethlehem, that he would be ruler in Israel, the one "whose going forth is from the beginning, from the days of eternity (Cf Micah 5,2)

4. What the Magi saw, when they made their way into the cave - shelter, first of all, was the Child, then his mother and Saint Joseph — a Family. The liturgy of the Church rejoices in and celebrates this Holy Family, which is the perfect family, whose family life was based on love, devotion and sacrifice for each other. It does not matter in the least that Saint Joseph was foster father of God's Son. Poor, though he was, he willingly assumed the duties and worries of supporting his wife and foster-child. Jesus was his God-Son, in a way no other earthly godfather can say about his godson. In celebrating the feast of the Holy Family we cannot avoid thinking about our own family as parents, or as children. How helpful the Sacred Liturgy which reminds us of how Mary and Joseph brought up their Godgiven Child, and how the Child grew in wisdom and age and grace" in their poor, humble home in Nazareth.



5. Next, there is a jump of a full 30 years to the beginnings of Christ's public ministry, which he began by submitting to the Baptism of Saint John the Baptizer.

Can you recall the whispered conversation between the Baptizer and the Savior of the world?

John: "It is I who ought to be baptized by you, and you come to me?"

Jesus: "Let it be so now, for so it becomes us to fulfill all justice." (Matt 3, 14-15).

Jesus seems to be saying "John, let me fulfill what is required of all faithful and righteous Jews. It is fitting that I give a good example in all things." I am in this world to show that I love and obey my Father, who sent me."

We have about three weeks of "after Christmas" — the Christmas Season. We can waste it and deprive ourselves of the full measure of Christmas joy, which God offers us. Or, we can prolong the celebration of the Birthday of the Lord.

There is a simple formula that can guide us in prolonging Christmas joys: "B plus W plus G equals PCJ." In other words: Being with God equals prolonged Christmas joys.

God took the first step. Wisely, He chose to become man to be born of the Virgin Mary, to be called Emmanuel — God with us. This is the Christmas joy we celebrate. If we think about and make part of our lives the "after Christmas" events and mysteries, we will better understand the real meaning of Christmas and find ourselves more eager to follow the Light of the World, shining through the Good News of the Gospel he spread among God's people.

This is how we can prolong our Christmas joys after Christmas and even into the entire New Year.





MIELI BROLIAI, SESĖS LIETUVIAI,



Popiežius Jonas Paulius II savo inauguracijos dieną pareiškęs, kad jo popiežiavimo programą yra nustatęs II Vatikano susirinkimas, ištikimai tai vykdo. Audiencijose, kelionėse ir enciklikose jis nuolatos ir pabrėžtinai primena kiekvienos tautos epcialią misiją Dievo plane, kiekvieno žmogaus asmeninę vertę ir didingumą bei religijos, ir kultūros tamprų ryšį.

Kadangi žmogus nėra koks nors beveidis internacionalas, jis yra reikalingas jo prigimčiai, jo būdui atitinkamos diasinės, kultūrinės ir socialinės aplinkumos, kad galėtų vispusiškai išsiskleisti, išaugti pilnu žmogumi, naudingu savajam kraštui, Bažnyčiai ir visai žmonijai. Gyveną gimtajame krašte, normaliose sąlygose, žmonės tai gauna savaime. Kitokioje padėtyje yra išvietintas, svetimame krašte atsidūręs žmogus. Bažnyčia, tai suprasdama, visuomet stengėsi ateiti tam žmogui į pagalbą, o II Vatikano susirinkimas primigtinai iš vyskupų reikalauja, kad atskirų tautybių tikintieji, gyveną tame pačiame mieste ar valstybėje, būtų netik aptarnaujami jų gimtąja kalba, bet ir kad būtų gerbiami jų papročiai, tradicijos bei sudaromos sąlygos puoselėti jų savitą kultūrą. Tautinės parapijos turi būti ne vien religiniai, bet sykiu ir kultūriniai bei socialiniai centrai. Tačiau teorija ir praktika dažnai yra du skirtingi dalykai. Kiekvienas vyskupas ir klebonas turi savo nuomonę, ir kartais labai aiškius Bažnyčios potvarkius savaip interpretuoja bei pritaiko.

Šv. Tėvas Jonas Paulius II, žinodamas su kokiais sunkumais kartais susiduria etninės bendruomenės, pertvarkė jų sielovadą, paskirdamas jom po vyskupą, kad jie, kaip popiežiaus specialūs įgaliotiniai ir teisioginiai jam atsakingi, rūpintus, kad II Vatikano susirinkimo nutarimai ir šioje srityje būtų įgyvendinti. Kad vyskupai atkreiptų į šį potvarkį reikiamą dėmesį, dar prieš viešai paskeibiant, kad tautinei išeivijos

bendruomenės sielovadai yra paskirtas vyskupas, Vatikano nuncijatūros specialiu raštu apie tai raneša visiems vyskupams, kurių diocezijose gyvena tos etninės grupės tikinčiųjų.

Nors išeivijos etninėm bendruomenėm paskirti vyskupai neturi tiesioginės jurisdikcijos tautinių parapijų ir jose dirbančių kunigų atžvilgiu, tačiau, kaip liudija mūsų vyskupų Vincento Brizgio ir Antano Deksnio patirtis, nuoširdžiai bendradarbiaujant su lietuvių bendruomenės organizacijom, galima joms pozityviai ir daug pagelbėti.

Mažėjant lietuvių kunigų skaičiui bei neturint naturalaus, emigraciniu būdu tautinio kraujo transfuzijos, mūsų lietuviškom parapijom patikėta misija kasmet darosi sunkiau atlikti. Iškyla visa eilė naujų problemų, reikalaujančių centralizacijos, kooperacijos, persitvarkymų.

Kadangi pastoracija išeivijoje yra neatskiriamai susijusi su visu mūsų gyvenimu, aš visų prašau nuoširdžios kooperacijos ir maldų. Kada žmonės tarpusavyje sutaria ir vieningai ko nors kilnaus siekia, Dievas visuomet laimina jų pastangas.

Dėkodamas mūsų ilgamečiams ganytojams vyskupui Vincentui Brizgiui ir vyskupui Antanui Deksniui už visokeriopą pagalbą mano naujose pareigose, bei Jums visiems, mieli broliai, sesės lietuviai, už išreikštus linkėjimus, maldas bei dovanas "vyskupo fondui" konsekracijos proga, reiškiu viltį Jus aplankyti artimoje ateityje.



A NEW BISHOP FOR LITHUANIANS

Ordination of Bishop Paulius Baltakis, Portland, Maine

The day broke bright and beautiful over the rocky, ocean-splashed coastline of Maine. A gentle breeze brought with it the subtle essence of a fading summer, yet also the promise of a golder autumn.

This day, as unpretentious as it seemed, would witness a historical event, an event that brought with it much good news and golden promise of its own to Lithuanian Catholics throughout the world.

On this Friday, September 14, 1984, a Lithuanian-born priest living in the free world became the very first to be appointed Bisho of all Lithuanians in the Free World.

Two beloved men, Bishop Vincentas Brizgys and Bishop Antanas Deksnys; Auxiliary Bishop of Kaunas living in exile in the U.S. and Bishop for the Spiritual Assistance of Lithuanian Catholics in Western Europe respectively, have come to be closely associated with such a ministry. They are both of retirment age, however, and Pope John Paul II has formalized the position in his appointment of 59 year-old Bishop Paul Antanas Baltakis, O.F.M.

The new bishop was born in Latavenai, Lithuania, the second son in the family of eleven children. After high school, he applied for admission to the seminary, but met with deportation during the Nazi occupation in 1944. He faced forced

labor in Germany and Finland. Following the cessation of hostilities, Paul completed his studies and was ordained as a Franciscan in Belgium in 1952. In 1953, he emigrated to Canada and served as assistant pastor to Resurrection Parish' in Toronto, Ontario. In 1969, he was transferred to Brooklyn, New York, where he oversaw the construction of a new friary and the adjacent Lithuanian Cultura1 Center, serving as local Franciscan Superior simultaneously. In 1979, he was elected provincial of the Lithuanian Franciscan Vicariate of Saint Casimir, headquartered in Kennebunkport, Maine.

His new position brings him an even further-reaching ministry. He must shepherd Lithuanian Catholics around the Free World into the next century.

The Concelebrated Mass of Episcopal Ordination took place on Friday, September 14, at the Cathedral of the Immaculate Conception in Portland, Maine, as the seat of the Lithuanian Vicariate of Saint Casimir is located in that diocese.

The standing-room only congregation of several thousand Lithuanians from the United States and Canada packed the modest Cathedral. The sanctuary itself was bedecked with yellow, green and red banners. The concelebrants in-


cluded 19 bishops and over 100 priests. Principal Celebrant was the Holy Father's personal representative to the United States, the Most Reverend Pio Laghi, who described himself as "the shadow rather than the Light", in referring to Pope John Paul II's pilgrimage through Canada. In his homily, Laghi defined the role of a bishop. He explained its origin as a Greek word meaning, "to see clearly". A bishop must be a teacher of doctrine, a priest of sacred worship and a minister of government. He must be "a man of the mountains, a man that stands tall". He called upon the new bishop to be an "administrator to the sons and daughters of the Lithuanian diaspora".

The Apostolic Letter confirming the appointment was read aloud and held aloft. The congregation consented through vigorous and sustained applause.

After the homily, Archbishop Laghi "examined the candidate" regarding his resolve to preserve the Faith and carry out his duties.

Following in succession came the "Laying on of Hands" invoking the Holy Spirit by all consecrating bishops present and constituting the heart of the ordination rite, the "Prayer of Consecration" offered while two deacons held the Book of Gospels over the new bishop's head, the "Anointing" signifying the call

to service and the power of the Holy Spirit and finally the "Investiture with Ring, Miter and Pastoral Staff", the traditional symbols of episcopal office.

The entire service was punctuated by spontaneous outbursts of warmth and applause.

In his own remarks during Mass, Bishop Baltakis pledged himself to care for the needs of the world-wide Lithuanian community and to devote the rest of his life to work with the Holy Father for the restoration of a genuine image of Christ in every Christian. In Lithuanian, he greeted all of his beloved parishioners and asked for their continued prayers.

At the conclusion of Mass, Bishop Baltakis strode to all corners of the chruch, bestowing his blessing upon the cheering throngs of people.

Music throughout the morning was provided by Saint Casimir's Choir of Brockton, Massachusetts, and the Portland Diocesan Choir, augmented by solosits and cantors.

Without doubt, the organization with the largest representation was the Knights of Lithuania, and so it should have been as the new bishop has been a member of the K of L for serveral years, enrolled in Maspeth, New York's Council 110. Council 110 members travelled to Portland via bus, automobile and plane. The crozier bestowed upon the Bishop was a gift of the council to its distinguished member.

K of L members from throughout New England, Pennsylvania, Ohio, New Jersey and New York could be found among the crowd.

K of L-ers among the concelebrants included Archbishop Charles Salatka, Bishops Vincentas Brizgys and Antanas Deksnys, Fathers Jurgelaitis, Contons, Pugevičius, Janiunas, Bartkus, Raila, Baniunas, Pakalniskis and others.



The Offertory Procession included Jonas Adomenas and Nancy Miro, who presented a handwoven linen of the Lithuanian National Anthem, Marian Skabeikis who presented a desecrated crucifix depicting the suffering Church in Lithuania; and Philip Skabeikis, who carried the altar wine.

The Supreme Council was represented by National President Loretta Stukas, and Dr. Jack Stukas.

One of the readers during Mass was Lithuanian Affairs Bulletin Editor, Bernice Aviza.

In a recent interview with Marian Skabeikis for the Lithuanian R. C. Federation's English-language newspaper, "The Observer", Bishop Baltakis said that in speaking of the future, "One very real hope for the future is the Knights of Lithuania, where there can be found a deep appreciation of Lithuanian culture, quite apart from whether or not individual members can speak the Lithuanian language."

Following the Consecration Mass, a literal column of cars and buses moved south to the resort town of Kennebunkport, and the vast, grassy knolls of the Saint Anthony Friary, where nearly one thousand people dined beneath a huge tent. During the evening, National President Loretta Stukas presented the bishop with a check for \$500.00 on behalf of the Supreme Council, and announced that the 71st National Convention had voted unanimously to bestow Honorary Membership upon the new bishop during its next Convention.

For all who participated in the day's events, the memories will linger a great while, but they were not alone in their joy. A spiritual communion existed with their brothers and sisters in Lithuania. The news of the bishop's appointment that broke in June, 1984, had quickly reached Lithuania. In the 63rd issue of the "Chronicle of the Catholic Church in Lithuania", dated July 1, 1984, that recently reached the West, Catholics of Lithuania greeted the new bishop


LITHUANIAN Sin the NEWS

Bishop Welsh blesses Pennsylvania Shrine



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
DR. JACK J. STUKAS, National Lithuanian Affairs Chairman, has been appointed to the Governor's Commission on Eastern European and Captive Nation History, reports the "Echoes-Sentinel", Warren, N.J.

His aim will be to correct the inaccuracies New Jersey's students read in their history books about the nations and peoples living under Soviet oppression.



people into the group. Dr. Stukas works with joung adults every day as a professor of business and international business courses at Seton Hall University, South Orange, N.J.




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A LITHUANIAN CHRISTMAS

For Lithuanians, Christmas is one of the happiest holidays of the year. The day before Christmas, known as "Kūčios" everyone arises early to begin preparations for Christmas. Young people take turns grinding the poppy seeds for the aguony pienas (Poppy-seed milk). Hard square little biscuits (sližikai) were put into the poppyseed milk and left to soften. "Kisielius", a jellied type of pudding made from cooked oats was prepared. Several kinds of fish, hard peas, sauer kraut salad and the other Kūčios foods were prepared.

When the sun disappeared and the evening star appeared in the sky, "Kūčios supper" began. Fresh, clean hay was placed on the table and a heavy linen cloth was placed on the hay. The hay is the symbol of the hay-filled crib in which the Child Jesus lay at his birth. In the center of the table, a cross, laid flat was placed. At its side, in the household's prettiest dish, were placed the Christmas wafers (plotkelės). The head of the household gave the dinner blessing, prayed for those who were gone and for the Christ Child who was about to be born. He then broke the wafer and passed one to each member who passed this to each other, wishing each other good health and good fortune. One place was left vacant at the table for the Christ child.

Many games were played after dinner — pulling straws to determine who would live the longest,

going out to hear a dog bay. If a girl heard this, this would be the direction from which her future husband would appear.

In many Lithuanian house-holds, the family would decorate the tree after dinner. Beautiful straw ornaments made by family members were used. The father had cut the tree early in the morning and brought it home. After the tree was trimmed, the entire family gathered around the tree and sang Lithuanian hymns and Christmas Carols.

Suddenly, what is the sound from outdoors? It is "Kalėdų Senelis" a jolly old soul who has goodies and gifts for all the Children. The family exchanges their gifts. After each gets his gift, the hay from the table is taken to the animals in the barn. It is Christmas for them too.





At Midnight, all dressed warmly, they attend the Bernelių Mišios. In some villages, the Bernelių Mišios is held at 6 o'clock in the morning. The church is decorated with fresh pine trees. In one corner is the crib. From this crib were tied streamers. Each one waited in line for the joy of rocking ever so gently, the Little Christ Child. A gift of money was left beside the crib for the Baby Jesus. After Mass, everyone went happily home.

Christmas Day was spent with family at home. The Christmas table was laden with tasty foods. There would be a roasted suckling pig with stuffing, mushrooms (baravykai) dried from the summer. There was sausage, lamb, cabbage slaw, pickled beets, horseradish, vegetables, home made pyragas (Lithuanian raisin bread) and cookies, cakes and fruit. There was wine and the favorite, krupnikas.

After dinner, everyone sang songs and visited with family.

The Christmas Holidays were celebrated from Kūčios to the Feast of the Three Kings.

ROAST GOOSE WITH APPLE AND APRICOT STUFFING

12 lb. Goose. It is advisable to rub the goose with salt, pepper and onion inside and outside the night before roasting. Next morning, wash and dry goose before stuffing.

STUFFING

2 lbs. Apples, washed, cored & cut into quarters.
1 — box dried Apricots, soaked in water overnight.
Drain & cut.

2 cups white dried breadcrumbs or seasoned croutons.

1 large onion, sauteed in butter. Enough broth from cooked neck, tail, wing tips and giblets to moisten. Cut up giblets, neckmeat. Mix all together adding more seasonings and broth to taste. Stuff goose inside and also the neck cavity, pulling the skin over and sew up. Roast in open roaster until browned. 350' oven. When browned, add 1-1/2 cups boiling water over goose. Cover with lid and roast until tender, basting occasionally.

To serve, remove to a large platter, garnish with half slices of Calif. navel oranges, place a pitted stewed prune in front of the orange slices. Garnish with parsley sprigs between each orange slice. Serves 8-10.

LITHUANIAN SAUERKRAUT

1 lg. can sauerkraut

3 lbs. fresh cabbage, thin shreds.

1/4 lb. bacon, diced thin.

1 large onion, diced thin.

1 Bay Leaf.

4 whole Allspice

1/2 teasp. Caraway seeds (Optional)

Salt to taste

1 Tsp brown sugar (Optional)

Brown bacon till transparent.

Add onions and fry till light golden.

Add the sauerkraut, shredded cabbage and spices. Taste for salt if needed.

Simmer slowly until cabbage is tender. This may be cooked two days before serving to blend the flavors. Then refrigerate.

RED BEET SALAD

2 cans (Julienned) Beets

1/4 cup Cider Vinegar

1 teaspoon dried or fresh dill

1 large Cucumber (Julienned)

2 whole green onions, also white part

1/4 pint sour cream

Salt, pepper and sugar to taste.

Mix beets, beet juice, vinegar and sugar in medium bowl.

In another bowl, place the julienned cucumber, salt and green onion.

Cover and place both bowls in refrigerator overnight.

Next day, drain juices from both bowls and mix together. Add sour cream and additional salt if necessary.

POTATO PANCAKES

4 Large Potatoes — Grated

4 Eggs (whisked)

4 Tablespoons fine cracker crumbs.

1/2 teaspoon Salt

1/4 teasp. grated Onion

1 teasp. Baking Powder

Oil for frying, 2 Tablespoons hot milk.


After potatoes are grated, pour mixture into large strainer to reduce the liquied.

Mix all together, adding 2 Tablespoons of hot milk.

Fry in oil in skillet. When one side is well browned,
turn over and brown the other side adding more oil as

needed. Place on paper towels. Keep hot in warm oven.

May be served with sour cream or applesauce.



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





Vice President Gene Gobis again presided at the October meeting for President Radzevich who was relaxing at Cape Cod.



After Mass, Elaine Pacovsky, Mary Lucas and their crew prepared a delicious buffet dinner of Lithuanian favorite foods.


