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
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
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"The Early Years of Vytis in the Immigrant Press"

The Knights of Columbus, founded in 4884, did not begin their house organ, the Columbiad, (later - Columbia) until nine years later. In contrast, within a little over two years after foundation, the Knights of Lithuania started publishing their own voice - Vytis. The Lithuanian Knights' haste to have their own journal can be understood and appreciated only in the context of events in the Lithuanian community at the outset of the second decade of this century.

Though churchgoers were in the majority among Lithuanians, a large and articulate dissident minority of immigrants opened their wallets in supporting a variety of newspapers and magazines reflecting socialist and freethinking views. As a part of the Catholic countermovement to the inroads of their antireligious churchless brethren, the Lithuanian Priests' League was revived in 1909 by Father Antanas Staniukynas. As clergy priority endeavor, the weekly Draugas hit the newstands in July of the same year from Wilkes-Barre, Pennsylvania. This newspaper was to become the leading religious voice among Lithuanians, alongside several other endeavors. There was Katalikas in Chicago (1899-1917), a weekly that became a daily in 1914, and again a weekly in 1916 shortly before its demise. At one time the paper reached a peak of 9,000 subscribers. Possibly the competition of Draugas, transferred to Chicago in 1912, contributed to the cessation of Katalikas. Editorial staff members included future lights of the Knights of Lithuania such as: Ignas Sakalas, Leonardas Šimutis, and Matas Zujus. Only a few other notable Catholic publications could be found in the immigrants journalistic marketplace. E.G. Father Antanas Milukas was providing essays and local newsbits in his Žvaigždė (1901-1923, 1926-1944). Likewise, Catholic workingmen had just launched their Darbininkas in August 1915 as a semi-weekly in Boston. Otherwise there were no substantial Catholic publications on the scene when Vytis was to fill a dire need to give Lithuanian youth its own outlet.

journal, enthusiastically pooling together \$50 for the venture. The monthly got off to a good start in the capable hands of three Lithuanian-born youths, then college students: Aleksandras M. Račkus and Kazys Pakštas as coeditors, with Leonardas Simutis as administrator. Račkus - future surgeon, numismatist, journalist, and well-known activist - was then studying at Loyola University. Even as a youth, he displayed intense ethnic zeal, earning from his peers the amusing knickname "trumpas Vytautas," an allusion to his small stature. Pakštas - the future geographer, geopolitist, eloquent orator and famed activist - a fresh arrival from the homeland the previous year was a student at Valparaiso University. He was quickly named "storas Kestutis" because of his patriotic fervor and physical bulk. Šimutis, enrolled at St. Bede College in Peru, Illinois, likewise would eventually establish himself in a distinguished career as journalist and activist in many organizations, including the Knights of Lithuania. He too merited a popular name, "ilgas Leonardas," a jocose reference to his notable height.

The editorial policy indicated that the journal would be non-political, though, the staff would monitor contemporary events and report on their significance. The board disclaimed any intention to polemicize with enemies of the Knights' ideals, but would not remain timid in the face of attacks. Declaring a spirit of tolerance, *Vytis* would seek to answer charges, not with slander and sarcasm, but by the power of persuasion. The editors disclaimed any notion of trampling on the goals of others with whom they disagreed, asking only that dissenters not impede the K. of L pursuit of its ends. *Vytis* aimed to be "wholly ethnic in Catholic

Not surprisingly, therefore, delegates at the Chicago convention of July 1915 mandated the publication of a

The magazine began at 731 West 18th Street in Chicago, with the first issue dated October 1, 1915. It appeared in a 6 $1/2 \ge 9 1/2$ " format of twenty-four pages, with artwork by Izidorius Ileikis adorning the cover. (In August 1917, the size was increased to 7-7/8 \ge 11"). The Lithuanian-born Ileikis was then a student of sculpture and art at the Chicago Institute of Art. He

later excelled in museum science and diaroma. His drawing for Vytis shows a knight astride a steed rearing up on its hind legs, perched atop of castle remains. In the distance below are a pair of wayside crosses. Ileikis' design continued in use as the magazine cover through the end of December 1916. (One cannot tell for some issues hence, since unfortunately the ALKA copies of Vytis for this period are lacking covers). The August 30, 1917 issue carried a new logo, combining the charging knight, Vytautas' castle at Lake Trakai, and the famed sculpture - "Lietuvos Mokykla," (mother at spinning wheel, with child and family dog) by Petras Rimša.

Contents of the inaugural issue include: editorials; an essay on culture by seminarian "Pr. J-as" (Pranciskus M. Juras); a poem "Meile" (Love) by "L. Silelis, pseudonym for Leonardas Simutis, and the musical score of Aleksandras Aleksandravičius (later shortened to Aleksis) for another Simutis poem, "I Darba" (To Work); photo of the entire assembly at the Chicago 1915 convention, with identification of each participant; the first segment of a one-act comedy, "Kumutes" by "Leonardas" (most likely Simutis); photo and obituary of Petronele Laurinaite, the seventeen-year-old Knight of Cicero, Illinois who perished when a pleasure-craft capsized. The correspondence column, "Kas Jaunimo Veikiama" (What's Going On With Youth), that was to be a standard feature, carried notices from Boston, Chicago, Cicero, and Cleveland. The closing pages included comments by the Supreme Secretary, P. Mulevicius; editorial responses to questions; acknowledgements of donations for the press fund; and the roster of supreme officers. The final page contained a list of recommended publications: 1)Draugas, 2) Darbininkas, 3) Zvaigždė, 4) Pažanga, 5) Moksleivis, 6) Iseivių Draugas, 7) Tikyba ir Dora, 8) Tautos Rytas, 9) Sviesa, 10) Žvirblis. The little-known local papers were No. 6, published at Shamokin, Pennsylvania by Father Joseph Norbut; No. 7-Forest City, Pennsylvania; No. 8-Westfield, Massachusetts; No. 9-Waterbury, Connecticut; and a surprising No. 10-a comic publication from Mossend, kanarkshire in Scotland.

Despite a momentary, initial, optimistic mood, Vytis went to press under an uncertain, shaky financial cloud. With little cash on hand, the editors barely managed to put the first issue into print, as the "Knights began to



per-cent commission. The November 1915 issue listed names and addresses of salesmen in Akron, Ohio; Athol, Boston, and Worcester in Massachusetts; Chicago and Cicero in Illinois; Cleveland; Hartford; Lewiston, Maine; and Waterbury, Connecticut. Overseas promoters included four agents in England, reaching subscribers in that country and in Scotland. Despite the hazards of overrun, the staff undertook to print 2500 copies by summer of 1916, and 3350 a year later.

Under adverse conditions, the paper just managed to survive its first few months to the end of 1915. For this first quarter year, Pakstas received a salary of \$70, and Rackus pocketed \$62.87. Simutis generously waved his wage to allow the Vytis to survive. Still, the journal periodically struggled to avoid deficits, sometimes running late in meeting deadlines. A chronic complaint by the business manager was the failure of most members to pay for their subscriptions. Eventually, the staff was forced to solicit paid announcements as an obvious means of income. The Supreme Committee voted to permit such advertising, with the first two notices appearing in the issue of May 30, 1920. In December of 1927 a successful drive netted many Christmas greetings from businessmen and professionals. By winter of 1928, there were numerous notices, including full-page ads for presidential candidate Al Smith, and for the team of Hoover and Curtis.

grumble and engage in impatience," wondering aloud if the magazine would last. Immediately councils were urged to submit the reduced rate of fifty cents per member, as the annual subscription cost. The regular fee was \$1.50 for the year, with a \$2 charge for foreign readers. To reach beyond the membership, agents were recruited in various locals with the lure of a twenty-five

Overcoming financial pitfalls, nevertheless, Vytis was destined to play an essential role in the internal life of the Knights. The annual convention, to be sure, provided a platform for expression of viewpoints and resolutions. But travel costs limited access for the majority of members. Meanwhile, the journal furnished members with a readily-available forum for airing ideas, recommendations, and criticisms. The journal itself was a target for adverse views.

In the early years, readers did not hesitate bluntly to criticize and to recommend style-change of Lithuanian, admixture of English, selection of contents, and frequency change from monthly to weekly. Periodic curt editorial replies drew several district resolutions for more politeness. Contributors too had to be toned down. Some correspondences reeked with personal attacks, and accordingly were refused publication. In response to requests, a news review-"Apzvzalga"-was added to the layout. Self-initiated improvements soon appeared, such as a book review column called "Bibliografija ir Kritika."

A momentary critic in 1918 was the future renowed writer, Vincas Mykolaitis Putinas. While an exile in Russia, he came across a few issues of Vytis which to him "truth to tell, seemed rather mediocre." But in Switzerland, he later changed his mind when he became better acquainted with the journal, coming to regard it as "one of the respectable and attractive" Lithuanian publications.

Essays and letters-to-the editor touched on debates such as: opposition of the clergy to the Knights; use of English instead of Lithuanian, at council meetings; members' participation in organizations or publications inimical to Catholic ideals; dangers of assimilation to the host culture! In regard to the last-named dispute, certain styles of dancing (e.g. the tango), loitering in poolrooms and saloons, and use of cosmetics were among the contested issues. Chronic were complaints about apathy in membership ranks and failure to pay dues and subscriptions. Loss of ethnicity ("istautejimas") was the most common topic of concern, provoking many letters and essays.

In response to the prime issues of the era, World War I and happenings in Europe received major attention in Vytis, coloring the selection of material. Activities in behalf of the homeland were regularly transmitted to the readership, such as the nationwide "Lithuanian Tag Day" in the fall of 1916 to aid war victims. As Knights entered military service, their departure receptions were publicized. Gratis copies of the Knights' publications were sent to various military camps around the country. Accounts of injuries and fatalities began to darken the pages of Vytis. Along side other Lithuanian publications, this voice shared in promoting the drive for restored independence, and pioneered in fostering the formation of a Lithuanian Brigade. This military unit was to travel overseas to fight with homeland forces for total liberation.

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To support revival of Lithuanian, editorials often urged readers to enroll in night courses to equip themselves in basic learning. Furthermore, Vytis encouraged as a partiotic duty the acquisition of crafts and skills and entry into professions in preparation for, permanent return to Lithuania. This fervent though unrealistic call was frequently sounded in the columns of the journals.

In its own endeavors to enhance cultural awareness among readers, Vytis periodically printed short plays, poems, and musical scores. Among contributors who were to carve a niche for themselves in Lithuanian circles one finds: the above-mentioned Putinas; also, Aleksandras Aleksis, Faustas Kirša, Stasys Pieža, Leonardas Šimutis, Simas Sužiedelis, and Tumas-Vaizgantas.

The early editors' efforts were not always appreciated. Their scholarly bent was perhaps above the heads of many of the readers of limited literacy. An anonymous article of May 15, 1921 pleaded for greater variety in content, asserting that "Today it's (Vytis) too serious, indigestible to our youth, serving only those who are educated." In time, competent writers like Pakštas and Račkus withdrew from their editorial duties, to pursue full-time careers elsewhere. Subsequently editorial hands changed a number of times. The sophisticated efforts of Stasys Pieza notwithstanding, by 1927 the quality of the journal plainly deteriorated. Pieža had been running a series of remarkable articles under the title-"Criticism, Reviews, Poetry." But there was nothing else of comparable value. Meanwhile, the lengthy correspondence columns were splattered with childish prattlings that the editors hesitated to edit or omit. Such nonsense became a further topic of controversy, some favoring wide latitude in accepting such copy, while others clearly saw through such vacuous scribblings. The debate over such "trash" spread over many months. On one occasion even a column on astrology found its way into the pages of Vytis!

Happily, in time to come the K. of L. organ regained its stature, and achieved some admirable heights of contemporary vintage, for example, under the hand of Loretta Studkas and Aldona Ryan. To name only a few achievements, there come to mind the commemorative issue of St. Casimir's 500th anniversary of death and splendid articles on Lithuanian language by Algirdas Budreckis, Ph.D. But these later accomplishments are another story that remains to be told. 



At the third National Convention which was held in Chicago in July 1915, it was decided to publish a Knights of Lithuania organ. The first issue of VYTIS appeared on October 21, 1915 edited by Dr. Al Račkus and Dr. K. Pakštas with Leonard Šimutis as business administrator. I. Ileikis designed a symbolic cover with a knight on a horse. The first issue contained 16 pages "filled with pictures, plays, prose, poetry, official news, council news and articles to inspire action."

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After Dr. Pakštas and Dr. Račkus, the editors were M. Zujus (1916-1920) and Ignas Sakalas (1920-1926). The practice of publishing VYTIS every two weeks in the Lithuanian language continued through 1926.

For a short period, K. Jonaitis took over editorship. He was followed by P. Zdankus as editor from 1927 to 1930. The English language was introduced in 1927 over much controversy.

Mr. Zdankus returned to Lithuania in 1930 and the helm of VYTIS was taken over by A. A crisis was reached when many male writers went off to war in 1942. Ed Kubaitis, J. Pilipauskas and Ignas Sakelas returned for awhile.

In 1946, the VYTIS press was liquidated and the publication of VYTIS was transferred to S. Boston for printing by the DARBININKAS presses. It was then edited by Phyllis Grendal and J. Kumpa.

In 1947, Dr. Pakštas came back for a short term. In 1948, A. Vaiciulaitis assumed editorship with Phyllis Grendal.

Dr. Juozas Leimonas worked with dedication from 1951 to 1961. During that time, the Sisters of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary in Putnam, CT printed VYTIS.

It should be noted here that Phyllis Grendal was listed as an "assistant" for 15 years but it was her devotion as a promoter and writer that made VYTIS become a wellknown publication by the Lithuanian community.

In 1961, the cost of publishing VYTIS became greater than the dues money and donations available. The Supreme Council looked into "offset" printing. VYTIS was moved to Chicago to be printed by Vladas Vijeikis, owner of ViVi Printing Company. Fr. P. Cinikas was appointed editor with Marilyn Kareiva as assistant editor. Father Cinikas had to resign due to unexpected change in duties and Loretta Kassel, Eleanore Laurin and Marilyn Kareiva assisted by Irene Sankus and Ignas Sakalas launched the "new" VYTIS.

For the years 1961-1963, Loretta Kassel, with her staff, edited VYTIS encouraged by the expressions of appreciation for dependable scheduling, interesting use of photography and continued monetary savings.

When Loretta was forced to devote less time to VYTIS, Ann Pieza (for several issues) and Linda Vaicekauskas (1964) took over the helm.

When Irene Sankus took over editorship in 1965, she found yet another way to save K of L money with the institution of a Christmas Greeting campaign which helped offset a portion of the printing expenses.

Irene found it necessary to resign in 1970 and Loretta (Kassel) Stukas became the editor. During her term, staff members included Rita Ochs, Regina Malakas, Josephine Zukas, Marilyn Kareiva and Lucille Kilkus.

Loretta Stukas continued as Editor-in-Chief for ten years with many improvements and interesting innovations taking place. VYTIS was a stable publication and monetarily sound.

Due to her organizational abilities and devotion to Knights of Lithuania causes, she was elected National President in 1981. Her VYTIS duties were taken over by Aldona Ryan from Centerville, Ohio.

Aldona started writing stories for VYTIS in 1965. She had spent terms as National Cultural Chairman, Mid Central District President and she had a journalism background as a special feature writer for the DAYTON DAILY NEWS. She gave up her job at the NEWS to become editor of VYTIS in 1981.

Lapinskas followed by Rev. A. Valančius and K. Savickus in turn. The editors for next four years were M. Petraitis (1938-1939), Antanas Skirius (1939-1941) and Ed Kubaitis (1941-1942).

She continued many of the features as started by Loretta Stukas and added some others such as "Language Lore" by Algirdas Budreckis, and "Cook's Corner" by Mary Lucas, Honorary Member.

She was assisted by Stefanija Rastikis as Lithuanian Editor, and Vida Gecas doing lay-out. Gerry Mack became the new Circulation Manager and was later replaced by Scottie Zukas of Chicago.

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
When Aldona Ryan suffered a serious hand injury from a fall in the summer of 1984, Bernice Aviza was appointed Associate Editor and took over many of the duties. Ruth Kazlauskas remained as the "Lithuanians in the News" editor and Helen Chesko has been the "Council Activities" editor for the past four years.

Throughout all its changes in

staff, format and language, VYTIS stood firm in its role as the "Pulse of the K of L". Its effectiveness is the result of a joint effort of the staff, writers and readers.

The question of vocations to the priesthood and religious life is of vital importance to the CHURCH at the present time. The future of the Church and its missions depends on how this question will be solved. The concern for vocations is the concern of all of us.

The Holy Father repeatedly brings up this question. On Good Shepherd Sunday, Vocation Sunday, the Pope turned to the entire Catholic world, urging the people to be concerned with vocations. This past March, he issued a letter to the youth of the world on the occasion of the International Youth Year. He speaks about religious values, moral consciousness, and openness to the call of Christ inviting them to leave all and follow Him.

The Vocation crisis is acute throughout the whole world, but especially the the West. Many of the so called Catholic countries are beginning to fear for the existence of their faith. In Western Europe, for example, 40% of the parishes already have no priests!

The Vocation crisis is also very real to us Lithuanians! Not too long ago, the deep faith of our nation was manifested in a family's deep concern that one of its sons would be called to the priesthood. Even today despite. severe religious persecution, Lithuania is not lacking in vocations to the priesthood or religious life. In spite of the mandatory atheistic education, the youth of Lithuania are drawing closer to religion. This year 19 seminarians were ordained to the priesthood! As for the free world? We must admit the prospect is a very sad one. Vocations do not come of themselves. Various current statistics confirm this. Vocations take root and are nurtured in a proper Christian environment: by community phaver and penance, a strong communal faith and virtuous living. This is what will inspire youth to follow Christ fearlessly.

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One the occasion of the anniversary of our Christianization, let us deepen our interest in our nation's Christian vocation, and our responsibility for the future of its faith.

SCHOLARSHIP FOR LITHUANIAN SEMINARIANS

Father Joseph Prunskis, Associate Pastor at St. Symphorosa Parish, Chicago and also Director of Information for the Lithuanian-American Council, has established a scholarship fund for Lithuanian students for the priesthood.

The Father Joseph Prunskis Scholarship Fund is to be administered by the Brooklyn-based Lithuanian Catholic Religious Aid. Recipients of scholarships will be chosen by a committee consisting of the Bishop for Lithuanians outside Lithuania, the President of Lithuanian Catholic Religious Aid, and the president of the World'Lithuanian Roman Catholic Priests' League. The jury currently consists of Bishop Paul Baltakis, OFM, Bishop Vincent Brizgys, and Fr. Augusutine Simanavicius, OFM, Provincial of the Lithuanian Franciscans.

In general the shortage of priests to

staff over 100 Lithuanian parishes in the U.S. alone, is particularly acute. Moreover the cost of training a priest has risen along with all other costs.



This year's honorees included our own Father Anthony A. Jurgelaitis, O.P. of the Class of 39. A Professor of Spanish, he was cited for 36 years of dedicated service as a priest/educator. 





THE ENDOWED CHAIR OF LITHUANIAN STUDIES UNIVERSITY OF ILLINOIS AT CHICAGO

AN ACADEMIC AND COMMUNITY ENDEAVOR

The academic community and Lithuanians throughout the world celebrated the 400th anniversary of the founding of the University of Vilnius, capital of Lithuania. The year-long festivities gave special cause to conder the future of Lithuanian studies in North America, where the majority of persons of Lithuanian descent live outside of Lithuania.

The network of Lithuanian cultural school and classes, informal study groups and special courses for students at local levels, summer programs and regular courses with credit at several American universities provide a basic, though variable, foundation for Lithuanian Studies.

On the eve of the anniversary of Vilnius University in 1978, delegates to the Fifth Lithuanian World Congress in Toronto, representing 15 Free World countries, voted to find the most appropriate and favorable location for a permanent seat of Lithuanian Studies in North America. The Executive Committee of the Lithuanian World Community was entrusted with the task and, aided by a special ad hoc committee, supported by the Lithuanian American Community of the USA, the Lithuanian Canadian Community, and the Lithuanian Foundation, selected the University of Illinois at Chicago in 1981.

Representatives of the University of Illinois Foundation and the Lithuanian World Community Foundation signed the gift agreement in Chicago on November 20, 1981 establishing a fund of \$750,000 for the Endowed Chair of Lithuanian Studies at the University of Illinois at Chicago.

The fund of \$750,000 is to be raised jointly by the two Foundations. The University of Illinois Foundation will The net income from the endowment will be used to provide salary and additional support for the professor occupying the Chair, for secretarial services, special equipment, supplies, research and library resources, publications, conferences, and other assistance to enhance the educational quality of Lithuanian Studies.

The Endowed Chair is a permanent center for Lithuanian Studies in a major American university with modern resources on a new campus with 25,000 students/over 500 students of Lithuanian descent/in 66 buildings located over 163 acres of land and situated near downtown Chicago. It is located in the largest Lithuanian population center in the United States and it is the first Endowed Chair in the university sponsored by an ethnic community.

The Endowed Chair of Lithuanian Studies began its work in September of 1984 for the 1984-85 academic year with several graduate students working towards their advanced degrees. A well known Lithuanina scholar, Dr. Bronius Vaskelis was appointed as the first professor to hold and occupy the Chair.

His address is:

Dr. Vaskelis prepared new courses for graduate students and programs for the advanced degrees. The Endowed Chair of Lithuanian Studies now offers work leading to the master of Arts and Doctor of Philosophy in Lithuanian Language and Literature degrees.

The Chair complements the existing program of

solicit \$150,000 and the Lithuanian community, through the Lithuanian World Community Foundation, promised to raise the Lithuanian contribution of \$600,000 over a five year period. The first Endowed Chair of Lithuanian Studies in the free world will be financed by the interest and dividends from the \$750,000 principal, or endowment, and it will operate for an indefinite period of time.

Lithuanian Studies in the Department of Slavic and Baltic Languages and Literatures. This program, now in its twelfth year, supported in part by the Lithuanian Foundation and the Lithuanian American Community of the USA, provides 16 undergraduate and advanced courses, a Lithuanian minor and major. These courses are taught by Assistant Professor Dr. Violeta Kelertas and a student assistant, and they lead to a Bachelor of Arts degree.

The recently established Endowed Chair of Lithuanian Studies will be spreading knowledge about Lithuania and its people from one of the largest campuses in America. Its scholars - both professors and students -will over the years produce scores of articles and books on Lithuanian subjects in English and Lithuanian for the enlightenment of anyone who cares to learn about them. Because they are a part of a great prestigious university, the Chair's staff will draw private and government foundation grants for the pursuit of new research topics in as yet unexplored areas of Lithuanian studies, especially those which cannot be freely studied or researched in the occupied Lithuania under the Soviet subjugation.

The Endowed Chair will never run out of funds, because it will run on an endowment. That means it will operate for an indefinite period of time, for as long as there is anyone in the world speaking Lithuanian or intersted in Lithuanian studies. The Endowed Chair now stands as a living and working memorial to one of the world's oldest and most beautiful cultures - the Lithuanian culture. And it will help establish for the Lithuanian community a reputation as a proud and educated community interested in advancing the values of the mind for the betterment of the mankind.

Before the end of 1984 the Lithuanian community had contributed \$300,000 or half of the pledged ammount. \$235,000 came through the Lithuanian World Comm nity Foundation, \$60,000 from the Lithuanian Founcation in the USA, and \$5,000 from the Lithuanian Canadian Foundation.

The Execuyive Committee of Lithuanian World Community and the Board of Directors of Lithuanian World Community Foundation proclaimed the year of 1985 as the year of a special fund drive to raise the remaining pledged amount throughout the free world.

All contributors to the Endowed Chair of Lithuanian Studies will be properly recognized and honored. Their names and contributions/starting with \$1/will be listed in two special books of Contributors to the Endowed Chair of Lithuanian Studies. One book will be permanently kept at the University of Illinois at Chicago, and the second book will be at the Lithuanian World The names of persons or organizations contributing \$500 or more will be listed on two special Plaques of Honor. One plaque will be displayed at the University of Illinois at Chicago, and the second plaque will be at the Lithuanian World Community offices in the Youth Center in Chicago.

Remember our Present Day Martyrs By Fr. Joseph Prunskis

The great scientist Max Planck stated, that people need science to understand the world, but men also need religion to know how to act. We are happy that we have complete freedom of religion in this country and can enjoy its benefits. However, we should not forget that millions of other believers are enslaved by atheistic communists, they are living the times of the catacombs and many of them are real martyrs. We can alleviate their plight by our prayers and by spreading the message about their sufferings and so influence public opinion in their favor.

Such severe oppression is now suffered by the believers of Lithuania, the only Catholic country by force incorporated into the Soviet Union. That incorporation is not recognized by the U.S.A. and many other countries of the free world.

I am reading underground papers secretly brought to the U.S.A. In the last issue (No. 66) of the "Chronicle of the Catholic Church in Lithuania", we receive information that of 142 churches in the diocese of Telsiai, including the region of Klaipeda, only 84 have residing priests. Many priests in Lithuania were murdered, deported. Three seminaries preparing candidates for the priesthood are closed and the one that is open has restrictions to accept only a limited number of students. Priests from other parishes are forbidden to have devotions in the church unless officials of the red institutions give special permission.

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Fr. Antanas Grazulis for organizing a Christmas tree for children on December 26, 1984 in Alytus was fined 50 rubles. In the city of Zarasai on February 16, 1985 the funeral of the mother of the pastor of the Kalesnykai parish, Fr. Jonas Vaitonis, took place.

After the funeral the participants were invited for a meal in a public restaurant. The administration warned that if some person would dare to make the sign o[°] the cross before the meal he would be forced to leave the restaurant.

On All Saints Day, 1984, the pastor of Linkmenys, Rev. Jonas Lauriunas, after devotions went with the people to the cemetery to pray. After a short while he was called by the president of the administrative committee of that region and warned that he should not dare to repeat "transgressions" such as that.

Rev. Jonas Tamonis, pastor of Vidukle, received three written warnings that he should not say Mass for the priests who are condemned to prison. In Moletai students who received First Communion were interrogated as to who prepared them. In the technical school of Alytus on December 24, 1984, students were ordered to be in school on Christmas Day and they were admonished not to go to church. In Lithuania, which by military force was made a colony of Moscow, the Church cannot take part in any charitable work, cultural activity. All Catholic papers are confiscated and all Catholic associations and convents are closed.

Priests are forbidden to organize any sport activities, theatrical performances, outings, meetings, pilgrimages, processions. They cannot teach children religion even in church, they cannot have any devotions in private homes. For believers it is forbidden to have any religious meetings, libraries, reading rooms. Children cannot be altar boys. Priests are forbidden to visit members of their parishes, as was the custom around Christmas time. According to government statistics in 1983 in Lithuania 144 churches already did not have a residing priest.

Disregarding that oppression in 1983, 37,000 believers traveled to the most famous shrine of Lithuania-Siluva. In spite of various difficulties, believers in Lithuania are so attached to their religion that numbers of members of the religious, functioning secretly, is increasing considerable. One believer, Balys Gajauskas, in his letter from the Kuchin slave labor camp writes: "The peace of the Bolshevik empire is the peace of the concentration camps. That is what we have now. Peace proponents outside the U.S.S.R. freely present their demands and demonstrate their convictions. Ne, who have the peace of the Bolshevik empire, cannot express our views freely. We gaze through prison bars and concentration camp barbed wire and see that the way of the so-called friends of peace leads directly to us. So their peace will not bring happiness to mankind. It will only reenforce the chains of the captive nations and impose them on other nations. The modern slavery of the twentieth'century will grow even more. Therefore, peace cannot be bought at the price of freedom. Peace must be honorable and humane, without chains, without prisons, without concentration camps, without physical or moral terror. This is the only peace to seek".




