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



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CONNECTICUT LITHUANIANS WILL CELEBRATE THE 600th ANNIVERSARY OF LITHUANIA'S CONVERSION TO CHRISTIANITY

The conversion of the Lithuanian people to Chrisitianity occured during three time periods:

- 1./ In 1251, during the reign of King Mindaugas;
- 2./ In 1387, through the efforts of the Grand Dukes Jogaila and Vytautas, the former, also being king of Poland,
- 3./ The baptism of the Zemaiciai people in 1413.

The adoption of Christianity in Lithuania was a very important event in the nation's history. It eliminated the pretext of German crusaders to conquer Lithuania and to enslave its people. It made Lithuanians resistant to the Protestant Reformation and fostered a deep religious faith and was in part responsible for a keen sense of national consciusness. This deep religious and national consciousness remained unvanquished either by Russia's czars who attempted to convert the people to Orthodox faith and to Russianize them or by

The Lithuanian Catholic clergy, with the consent of the majority of Lithuanians, including those of other faith, have selected 1987 as the year to commemorate the 600th anniversary of the baptism of Lithuania.

Preparation for this commemoration is going on in Lithuania and in the free world wherever there are significant number of Lithuanians or people of Lithuanian descent. It should be understood that these commemoration celebrations cannot be conducted in occupied Lithuania in the manner in which people, particularly Catholics, may wish. But religious celebration, as such, is not forbidden by the government. It is impossible that ethnic and nationalistic feelings will find expression in Lithuania during the commemoration year even though these are forbidden, especially the latter. Outside of Lithuania a number of commemorations are being planned including Rome, where Pope John Paul II is expected to participate. Other major celebrations include Chicago and Toronto.

The State of Connecticut has a number of Lithuanians and people of Lithuanian descent. It contains 6 Lithuanian parishes, an order of Lithuanian monks and a Lithuanian convent. The Lithuanian Priests'



Soviets who have for decades attempted to instill atheism in an effort to make the people more accepting of Russianfication.

That the Lithuanian nation has remained tenacious to this day is in large part of the result of the adoption of Chrisitanity 600 years ago.


Jogaila christianizes Lithuania

League plans to have a commemoration in Hartford and has designated the following representatives in Connecticut:1./ Rev. J. Rikteraitis, Pastor of St. Andrew parish in New Britain; 2./ Rev. V. Cukuras, Chaplain of the Convent of the Immaculate Conception in Putnam, and 3./ Rev. J. Matutis, pastor of the Holy Trinity parish in Hartford.

Under the leadership of the Rev. Rikeraitis, a meeting of Connecticut Lithuanian Catholic organizations and American Lithuanian Community district and chapters' representatives was convened on the evening of January 15 of this year. This meeting took place at St. Andrew's parish hall in New Britain and was attended by some 30 people, including five priests.


The meeting was opened by the Rev. Rikeraitis. The opening prayer led by the Rev. Cukuras, was the specially prepared Jubilee Year prayer and was read by all. There followed a memorial of recently deceased Lithuanian activists, especially of Rev. G. Vilciauskas, former pastor of St. Joseph's parish in Waterbury. The Rev. Matutis offered a prayer for the souls of those being commemorated.

The following persons have been elected to the committee to plan the upcoming commemoration in Hartford: 1. Ingas Budrys, chairman. Mr. Budrys is also chairman of the Connecticut District of the American Lithuanian Community, a member of that organization's XI Council and the Chairman of the Council's Public Affairs Committee; 2. Delores Jonaitis secretary; and 3. Viktoras Vaitkus,

but all priests of Lithuanian parishes will be drawn into its activities.

It has been decided that the Hartford commemoration of Lithuania's conversion to Christianity will encompass three areas: Religious, national and political. The religious celebration will take place on May 17, 1987 in the Hartford Cathedral where the Archbishop promised to officiate, the bishops of the Archdiocese, and many other religious will be invited. The national facet of the commemoration will include such activities as a procession, a display of Lithuanian art and artifacts and a religious concert. Political activities will include the invitation of high administration officials to participate in the commemoration, explanations to them of important events in Lithuania's history and that nation's current enslavement and the persecution and destruction of its people. These officials will also be aquainted with the efforts of the Lithuanian people to regain independence. It is hoped that through these efforts the officials will become more disposed to assist Lithuania and Lithuanians.

Efforts will be made to acquaint by means of communication, as widely as possible, all Americans with Lithuanian affairs.

All Lithuanians and Americans of Lithuanian descent are invited not only to attend the commemoration events but to participate in their planning and implementation. They are also urged to invite their friends and acquaintances regardless of national ancestry.

In the future it is planned to hold meetings to plan the commemoration at approximately

In 1987, Lithuanians throughout the world will celebrate the 600th Jubliee of Lithuania's Christianity. Christianity actually came to Lithuania in three phases. In 1251, King Mindaugas adopted Christianity and a small number of Lithuanians also accepted the faith. But Christianity did not "take" in Lithuania until 1387, when, through the efforts of Grand Duke Jogaila, "Aukstaitija", the Highland Region, was baptized, and Lithuania joined the community of Christiam nations. In 1413, Grand Duke Vytautas completed the Christianization by bringing the Lithuanian Lowlands, "Zemaitija", into the Christian fold.

These three phases of Lithuania's Christianization are exquisitely portrayed on the Jubliee Medallion that is being struck to commemorate this important Jubilee. The Medallion, which is currently in production at the Medallic Art Company, was designed and sculpted in high relief, by the renowned Vytautas Kasuba, whose works, exhibitions, and awards span several continents. The illustrations above provide a glimpse of the artistic beauty and meaningful content of the Medallion.


The Medallion will be struck in bronze, with an antique finish. It will be 3 inches in diameter (as shown), done in art form with the three phases of Lithuania's Christianity portrayed in beautiful three dimensional detail. It can be yours, as a handsome addition to your own collection or a welcome gift to friends and associates. THE OBERSE SIDE . . .

portrays the Lithuanian leaders King Mindaugas and Grand Dukes Jogaila and Vytautas and indicates the year each led a specific phase of the Lithuanian nation's Christianization.

Each leader's profile is cast on a background of a shield. The rhythmic outline of the shields emphasize the unity of purpose of the leader's determination to bring Christianity to Lithuania.

Three crosses atop the crowns accentuate the three major phases of Lithuania's Christainization.




THE REVERSE SIDE ...

provides the text of the titles and honors assigned the leaders by the Holy See during the Christianization, and the names of the Popes responsible for the titles. The text is placed symmetrically at the top and bottom of the medal, again emphasizing the phases of the Christianization, and those responsible for those phases.

A central dominant cross symbolizes Christianity. In the background, the Vilnius Cathedral and Bell Tower symbolizes the strength of the Christian faith in Lithuania.

A Knight (VYTIS), the National Symbol, emphasizes the fact that the entire nation accepted Christianity.




Medallion Sculptor — Vytautas Kašuba.

The artistic beauty and meaningful content of the Lithuanian Christianization Jubilee Commemorative Medallion reflects the remarkable talents of sculpter Vytautas Kasuba, whose exhibitions and awards span several continents and two oceans, and include work at three World's Fairs, exhibitions in Paris, Tokyo, New York and his native Lithuania.

Born in 1915 in Minsk of Lithuianian parents, Mr. Kasuba returned to Lithuania in 1918, graduated in 1939 from the National Art School in Kaunas, Lithuania and later returned there to teach sculpture and serve as head of its Department of Sculpture. Kasuba emigrated to the United States in 1947 and currently resides in New York with his wife, Architect Aleksandra.

Since 1952, Mr. Kasuba has been engaged primarily in commissioned architectural work on liturgical themes, executing large scale works in hammered lead, cast, bronze, stone and wood. He is also responsible for several commemorative art medallions, including one commemorating the 300th Anniversary of Vilnius University.

Large or small, Vytautas Kasuba's work pulsates with



artistic insight. Aleksis Rannis of Yale University and member of the International Association of Art Critics, Paris, says of Kasuba's work:

"... The contour of his heavy, arcitectural figures show a hard and archaic quality, but the surfaces of these sculptures pulsate with an extraordinary, sensitive, lyrical colorfulness, infinitely faint yet severely disciplined...."





WHAT WOULD I TELL A PROSPECTIVE MEMBER ABOUT THE KNIGHTS OF LITHUANIA

1 would tell him or her since women are full members that there are many good reasons for joining.

First, meetings offer great opportunities for fellowship. Knights come from varied backgrounds that cross occupational and educational lines. At the monthly sessions of our small friendly Council 63, factory foremen talk and tell stories with sewing machine operators. Retired salesclerks serve on the same committees with school administrators. Department store vice presidents exchange opinions with truck assemblers. We all mix with interesting people whose paths we otherwise might not cross.

Second, there are cultural reasons. Certainly we don't speak enough Lithuanian at our meetings. But for many of us younger members, council and district activities provide the only chances to hear and to talk a little Lithuanian. We open every meeting with prayer in our ancient tongue and by singing the national anthem of independent Lithuania. Members bring in records and tapes of Lithuanian folk songs. We have had slide shows about Trakai, the seat of medieval Grand Dukes, and art displays featuring Our Lady of Vilnius.

To hear those old prayers and traditional songs takes me back to my earliest boyhood memories when my grandmother would worship in Lithuanian.

Third, membership in the Knights increases political and ethnic awareness. Members trade books and magazines dealing with Lithuanian history and culture. There is discussion of current events in the Soviet Union and the status of Catholics in an officially atheist country. The Knights also serve as a consciousness-raising group for the community and for political leaders. We try to make non-Lithuanian aware of how different Lithuanian and the other Baltic nations, Latvia and Estonia, are from their larger neighbors, Poland and Russia.

UNDERGROUND PRINTING PRESS CLOSED IN LITHUANIA

Five men have been sentenced to terms ranging from one to three years for running an underground printing press, according to the January 21st edition of the Moscowbased Sovietskaya Kultura.

The printing press allegedly operated for seven years in the city of Gargždai, in the region of Klaipeda, northwestern Lithuania.

According to the report, sixty Catholic priests were summoned to testify against the men, but only two of them appeared at the trial, the date of which was unspecified.

Stanislovas Murauskas, identified as the director of the illegal printshop, was sentenced to three years by the Supreme Court of the Lithuanian SSR. His partner, Donatas Jonutis, received a two year sentence. Zigmantas Murauskas and Alfonsas Vaičekauskas, received two year suspensed sentences, whereas a one year suspended sentence was passed on Stasys Mitkus.

Zigmantas Murauskas, by profession an excavator, and Vaičekauskas, Chronicle of the Catholic Church in Lithuania. This underground publication has been documenting human rights violations in predominatly Roman Catholic Lithuania since 1972, despite Soviet efforts to close it down.

The latest issue of the Chronicle, No. 67, reported the arrests of Stanislovas Murauskas and Jonutis at the begining of 1985. The two men, reported the Chronicle, were charged with dealing in illegal commerce and imprrisoned in Vilnius prison pending trial.

The expose by Sovietskaya Kultra special correspondent H. Maidanskaya portrayed the five men as profiteers and alcoholics. In her article, she labelled Stanislovas Murauskas a "parasite" and "embezzler".

According to Sovietskaya Kultura, the men were caught red-handed, after a neighbor, suspicious of the nightly going-ons in their second story apartment, located in a condemned building, informed on them. The militia raided the apartment and found one man working a printing press, and the others manning a photo enlarger and duplicator, while religious cards were still drying on a line hung across the room. countraband goods, i.e. religious cards, calendars and prayerbooks, were "church personnel".

The author therefore concludes that the priests of Lithuania contributed to the delinquency of these men by supporting their criminal habits. She further reprimands all who "closed their eyes to what was going on" for seven years, from the landlord of the building to other local residents, including the militia.

Towards the end of her article, Maidanskaya mentions another man by name, Communist Party member and propagandist, Vyacheslav Nesterov, purportedly involved in producing religious cards, too. She condemns the collective, of which he was a member, for not expelling Nesterov from the Party.

A VITAL BOOK

S. PAUL ZUMBAKIS, ESQ.

(Chicago: Americans For Due Process, 1986) 168 pp., paper cover. Available from: Americans For Due Process, P.O. Box 85, Woodhaven, NY 11421; single copies — \$15 donation; \$20 donation to permit handdelivered copies to people in Congress.

"Due Process," in layman's language, means basic fairness. The phrase refers to a cluster of legal checks and balances that purports to provide justice, giving each accused his or her day in court. Due Process derives from a sound tradition of law in United States history. Regrettably, from time to time and from place to place in this country, Due Process has suffered erosion, to the detriment of a particular defendant, and to the shame of the nation's legal system. From the past, one finds well-known, extreme examples in the deplorable narrative of lynchings, and the activities of the anti-Semitic Ku Klux Klan.

In Soviet Evidence, Attorney S. Paul Zumbakis of Chicago, raises some serious contemporary issues relevant to Due Process that make one wonder about the arrival of another era of decline in respect shown to Due Process. Is the United States right now undergoing a lack of honoring Due Process in subtle and not so subtle ways? Zumbakis thinks so, and marshalls considerable, convincing proofs to support his assertions.


Through nine, tightly-knit chapters, Zumbakis presents his case. His Introduction furnishes the background of World War II and its "Victims and Villains." He then mentions the U.S. law that created the OSI (Office of Special Investigations) to track down Nazi collaborators, and next focuses on the "Key Issues" that are at stake. Here it is worth listing the subsequent chapter titles to show the scope of Zumbakis' study.

- III Gathering the Evidence: "A Wildly Improbable Marriage"
- IV Why Is Communist Evidence Suspect?
- V Evidentiary Problems with Communist Source Evidence
- VI Historical, Political, and Moral Considerations in Using Communist Source Evidence

- VIII Damage to Our American-Canadian Fiber
- IX Conclusion

The volume is thoroughly researched and frequently illumined with highly pertinent quotations from Soviet publications as well as U.S. court records of cases that have been settled or are now in progress. Nearly twohundred-fifty footnotes underlie Zumbakis' both fascinating and disturbing memorandum. It is a persuasive and provocative piece of writing that gives each thinking person reason to reflect on matters that do not always find their way into the general press. The information that Zumbakis calmly offers makes one flinch and shake one's head, musing: "Can this be happening right in our own country?"

Concerned citizens, and presumably Knights of Lithuania are surely among them, should immediately put this volume in every library in the country, into the hands of every attorney, and on the reading list of every person in public office, local, state, and especially federal level. Historians of another generation will pronounce a verdict on the present issue with their wide perspective and retrospective vision. Meanwhile, caring people everywhere must remain informed and vigilant about this truly vital question of Due Process.



He once called 68 strikes in one year. He once was accused of inciting a riot during a strike in 1960. He once told General Electric officials he would guit his union job if they would rehire 15 fired workers.

On February 28th, Stanley's 38 years of work for the International Union of Electrical, Electronic, Technical, Salaried and Machine Workers, AFL-CIO, Local 320, came to an end. More than 400 people gathered at the Hotels at Syracuse Square for a tribute to the man who during the 1950s and '60s represented as many as 7,500 General Electric Co. employees in Syracuse.



KIPRAS PETRAUSKAS (1886-1968)

Lithuanians throughout the world are celebrating the 100th birthday anniversary of tamous soloist Petrauskas.

Born in Lithuania on November 23, 1886 in Ceikiniai and died at the age of 83. He is buried at Rasų cemetary in Vilnius.

His parents had great musical talent. His father not only had a good voice, but was a self-taught organist, so it's not surprising that both he and his older brother Mikas leaned towards music.

By the age of 13 he was an organist at Gervečių parish and a director of the choir at which he did solo parts in his young soprano voice.

As he got older, his voice changed to a manificant sonorous lyric tenor of broad range.

He studied at St. Petersburg Conservatory art and music. In 1906 he joined his brother Mikas in staging the first Lithuanian opera "Birute", in which he did the part of Birute's brother. That was his first appearance on stage and was greatly applauded. After receiving financial help from a group of Lithuanian people, he again entered St. Petersburg conservatory to study voice.

to participate in his organized concerts at which he earned 50 rubles for his first appearance. Thereafter, he got many offers to sing and earn as much as 120 rubles.

Luck had smiled at him again in 1910, while in conservatory he had a chance to appear in Rimsky-Korsakov opera, where prof. Stanislav Gobel really noticed him and started to prepare him for the "Romeo and Juliet" opera to be staged in Moskava's biggest opera theater, at which he appeared in March 5, 1911. Highly acclaimed by the critics, he signed a 1 yr. contract with Marian theater in St. Petersburg. Did a role of Herzogo in Verdi's opera "Rigoletto".


Thereafter, he appeared in many operas, such as Barber of Seville, Eugene Onegin, I Pagliacci, Mefistofeles, La Traviata, La Boheme, Madame Butterfly. At the same time he also undertook concert tours through Russia and Western Europe.

While at the conservatory, finding it hard to make ends meet, he started to look for work. By luck he was sought out by famous St. Petersburg pianist Zilotte visit his homeland, but when Lithuania gained her independence, Kipras returned home in 1920 and started to perform in Kaunas & Vilnius in operas such as Radvila Perkunas, Carmen, Aida, Tosca, Queen of Spades and etc. He also taught voice in Vilnius conservatory where he ended his famous musical career in Jan. 17, 1968.

The recording is a Lithuania rendering of Theodore Dubois' "The Seven Last Words of Christ." It features soloists Algirdas Brazis, Praurime Ragiene and Rimas Strimaitis; the combined choirs of the K of L, St John Fischer and St. Barnabus Churches. Under the direction of Faustas Strolia, these noted soloists, choirs and an orchestra, have created a unique and beautiful recording. But for Mr. Strolia, the importance of making this tape was also of a personal nature.

According to Mr. Strolia, the dedication to Algirdas Brazis, expresses the sincere regard many Lithuanians have for Mr. Brazis. He has served the Lithuanian community at large, and the Knights of Lithuania in particular, for many years and in numerous ways. When asked to comment on what meaning music holds for him, he said, "I think it is nice when the second, third and even fourth generation Lithuanians in America hear the cries of occupied Lithuania, embrace it in their hearts and sing it out so that more people would know of the injustice done to the Lithuanian nation."

"The Seven Last Words" features three moving solos for Soprano, tenor and baritone. Selected to sing the Soprano solo was Praurine Ragiene, a Chicagoan who has sung in many cities throughout the United States and Australia. She has sung with the Pirmyn Chorus and has released a record, "Yra Salis" with string en-


unstintingly for the benefit of us all. No one knows this better or has observed this more closely than Faustas Strolia.


However, beds, conveniences, and buildings aren't sufficient to provide hospitality. One also requires people who can create a comfortable atmosphere. Arriving

And how does he find the time from all his duties and responsibilities associated with caring for the needs of visitors! Struck by vanity, I assumed that he was giving me special attention, but having talked to other

the yard amongst carefully tended flowers.

Thanks to the reverend, I had the opportunity to visit the cemetery and see the Lithuanian chapel. We also looked over the huge Salesian press, whose director, Br. Aleksandravičius, kindly showed us. I have to admit, though, that I didn't really care for the print shop: it was too orderly and much too clean.

Indeed, the buildings are there primarily for that reason. About 100 Lithuanians have passed through this college, having acquired the necessary education. And now, throughout the world, they perform the difficult tasks associated with their spiritual calling.





Gertrude Romeika, president of C-74, led the singing of the American and Lithuanian national anthems.





Prayers, he declared, was is, and will be the only way to the conversion of Russia and the freedom of Lithuania.




