
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

Now we can follow through the pages of our history from the very beginning in 1913 till the present of 1988. The book which is in English, was written by Father William Wolkovich. There is a small Lithuanian section which was written by Dr. Algirdas Budreckis. Both gentlemen are members of the Knights of Lithuania. There is a number of photographs in the book which adds to the richness of it.

As I have stated earlier, don't hesitate to purchase this book because in a short while they will be sold out. Don't be left out in the cold! We are one of the few Lithuanian organizations who is 75 years old and which has its own history book. We have much for which to be thankful. Good luck to all of you and happy reading.

CULTURAL CORNER

MAIRONIS

1862 - 1932

About 8000 patriots gathered in Kaunas on Nov. 2. 1987, to honor the great poet and priest Maironis commemorating the occasion of his 125th birthday.

It has been reported that approximately 300 people paid their respects at the site of his tombstone, which is by the wall of Kaunas cathedral, by singing religious songs and reciting poems composed by Maironis. During the Mass at the Cathedral, Bishop Juozas Preikštas, reminisced about Maironis' life as priest and poet.

We, in the free world, also remember the great contributions which Maironis bestowed on us his fellow Lithuanians.

Pavasario balsai (Voices of Spring) his first collection of poems appeared in 1895 under the pseudonym of Maironis. His real name is Jonas Mačiulis. He was born at the estate of Pasandravys, county of Raseiniai, on Oct. 21, 1862. He graduated from a Russian high school in Kaunas. He studied literature at the University of Kiev

in 1883. Shortly, he withdrew from it, because he was not atune with his lectures and the spirit of the students. He attended Kaunas Theological Seminary from 1894 - 88, and from 1888 - 92, he studied at the Theological Academy of St. Petersburg, getting a master's and doctor's degrees in theology.

In 1909 he became the rector of the Kaunas Theological Seminary. He addressed the seminarians publicly in the Lithuanian language, thus breaking the custom of using only Polish or Latin.


In 1922 he was elected honorary professor and taught moral theology, as well as Lithuanian and world literature. He received an honorary doctorate in literature in 1932.

Some of the popular poems by Maironis are: Kur bėga Šešupė, (Where the Šešupė Flows), Aš norėčiau prikelti, (I Would Like to Awake Them), words of the popular religious hymn Marija, Marija; a prayer — Ačiū

tau Viešpatie, (Thanks, O Lord), One of Maironis' finest poems are: Vasaros naktys (Summer's Nights), Lietuva brangi (Beloved Lithuania). He also wrote a ballad about the goddess of the sea and her mortal lover — Jūratė ir

Kastytis.

Many of us agree that his poems are permeated with a delicate idealism and patriotism.

WHAT?

WHEN?

1988 — ALL Year, culminating at the 75th National Convention

THEME?

Celebrate our past — look to our future, and thank God for our Blessings, as we let the rest of the world know what we're about!

HOW DO WE CELEBRATE?

On a National Scale:

- The 75th National Convention
- Publication of our Knights of Lithuania history.
- Special issues of VYTIS, and a special section of VYTIS to advertise National, District and Council Jubilee activities.
- Added donations to the Knights of Lithuania Foundation
 - Special Scholarships
- Perhaps a "Time Capsule" at the Archives, to be opened at the 100th National Convention.

But a proper celebration requires more than activities on a National scale. It requires "grass roots" activity, by each member, each council, each district.

WHAT IS PLANNED?

Each council and district will be asked to plan some special activity to properly celebrate this Jubilee Year. They will also be asked to plan some special activity to properly celebrate this Jubilee Year. WHAT SHOULD WE DO?

Several councils and districts have already begun planning their Jubilee activities. If your group has begun plans, congratulations!

For example:

- The New England District plans a Mass in Lawrence, MA, followed by a visit to the grave of our Founder, Mykolas Norkunas.
 - C-74, Binghamton is trying to obtain funding

trom a local business to donate the Lithuanian Encyclopedia to all schools in New York State.

If you need some ideas, here are some suggestions:

- A concert of Lithuanian performers, open to K.
 of L-ers and other members of the community.
- A Holy Hour or Mass, with local Bishops and clergy presiding.
- A special Memorial Ceremony, honoring Knights of Lithuania Founders on a national or council level.
- A special speaker, etc., at District or Council Communion Breakfast

Donation of Lithuanian books or the Knights of Lithuania History to the local public library.

 A ceremony or event to honor your Council's Charter Members or oldest members.

Activities geared especially toward bringing more youth into the council and district activity.

Organization or improvement of a Junior Council in your council, to guarantee the organization's future.

The list can go on and on. It is limited only by your zeal, energy and imagination. What is important is that something be planned.

The committee investigated a number of hotels by mail, phone, and actual visit, to select an apropriate site for the Convention.

The site chosen is:

The dates: July 28 - July 31, 1988

The Hotel is located on 12 ½ acres of beautifully landscaped land. It is well equipped to handle Conventions, has beautiful meeting and banquet halls, many formal and informal restaurants and cafes. It is just a few miles from the Washington Zoo, a short taxi ride or subway ride from the White House and other sights in Washington.

Special rates were promised for the Knights, at a considerable discount from the normal "off the street" rates. The quoted rates are as follows:

Drive, but has lost 5 members by not renewing their membership for this coming year, the lost members will be reduced from the total of new members recruited or giving a total of 20 new members ie 25 less 5 equals 20. The lost members would not include the deceased.

Transfer from other councils — WILL NOT BE CONSIDERED.

Records of the Supreme Council Financial Secretary will be used in determining the winners.

Special circumstances may arise during the drive and they will be judged on an individual basis.

Now its up to everyone to get out and recruit these new members that are out there. Talk to them personally, call them on the phone or whatever, and see how your council as well as the National Organization grows.

It's not too late — DEADLINE JUNE 30, 1988.


Mielas p. Pranai Petrauskai,

Membership in the Knights of Lithuania is a new but none-the-less moving experience for me. I have always been proud of my Lithuanian Catholic heritage, but, as a member of the Knights of Lithuania, I have not only learned a great deal about my heritage, but also, I have had the privilege of becoming involved in movements defending Lithuanian Catholicism.

The council to which I belong has an annual flag-raising ceremony in celebration of Lithuanian Independence Day, February 16. It takes place after Sunday mass in our local Lithuanian parish. As part of the ceremony, the Lithuanian and American flags are raised, and the Lithuanian National Anthem and the Star Spangled Banner are sung. I find this ceremony to be an extremely symbolic experience, in that it ties together my three cultures: Lithuanian, Catholic and American.

Our council continues its work in March with the feast of St. Casimir, Patron Saint of Lithuania. Our celebration again takes place with Sunday mass at our Lithuanian parish. The ladies and men of our council come dressed in their Lithuanian costumes. Specially chosen gifts are presented during the Offertory, and the symbolism of these gifts to Lithuanian Catholics is read. Appropriate Lithuanian hymns are also sung. The celebration of the feast of St. Casimir in this manner reminds me that I am not only Lithuanian, but also Catholic. This celebration gives the members of the Knights of Lithuania a chance to work more closely with our local Lithuanian parish and to participate more fully in the sacrifice of the mass. Through my preparation for, and participation in this celebration, I found deeper meaning in the sacrifice of the mass.

I, as all members of the Knights of Lithuania, find the trials and tribulations of the native Lithuanian people, both past and present, extremely meaningful. I have a deep-seated love for that Soviet-occupied country in Eastern Europe and sincere sympathy for its people and its problems. Ernie Sutkus — 3rd place

It is a well known axiom that environment and association with people, will affect one's character — which means that if you choose your friends wisely you will certainly worship God and be loyal to your country. In becoming a member of the Knights of Lithuania, such purpose can be achieved since that is the primary goal of that organization.

While in Lindbloom High School in Chicago from 1936 to 1941, I joined the Knights of Lithuania Choir and even went to New York to sing with it when Antanas Pocius was its Director. Later Juozas Sauris became the Director in 1946 after the War years. We practiced our songs at Mark White Square, then when Leonard Simutis Jr. became Director we had our rehearsals at Gage Park. After that we transferred to the K. of L. Hall on 47th Street. I was very happy to belong to the Choir since I met my wife there in 1939 and we were married in 1941.

We sang in all of the Lithuanian churches, and at various public functions. Our Catholic religion was definitely instilled in our hearts since we sang songs worshipping our Maker. I COULD FEEL.....THE BEAUTY AND SOLEMNITY OF THE MASS AND SENSE THE SANCTITY OF THE CONSECRATION OF CHRIST. Our songs did relate various episodes of life in Lithuania too, We also joined the Choir of the Immaculate Conception Church.

In the past year Council 5 has been growing and I was proud to help increase its membership. In fact my wife's brother Richard Kass and his family were induced to sign up, a total of 9 members. Together our Lithuanian spirit was thus rejuvenated and there is a closer tie to the Church and Lithuania. The new members read my VYTIS and were happy to find most of it is written in English, so they could enjoy and learn from its contents. They cannot read Lithuanian, having been exposed to the process of Americanization in our schools, and in life generally. They too are proud of what the Lithuanians are accomplishing in the political and educational fields, as revealed in the VYTIS. Previously they had no idea how badly the Church and priests, and the Catholic people were discriminated against in Lithuania. The

600th Anniversary of Lithuania accepting Christianity would also have escaped their attention if they had not read about it in the magazine.

In a direct or indirect way, belonging to the K. of L. has increased our interest in the Church, since that organization participates in all important holidays of the Church and its other functions. The special recognition for its patron St. Casimir each year makes us feel closer to God and our Country. The K. of L. is the only organization of American-Lithuanian Catholics surviving since its inception in 1913—and I feel in time every Lithuanian will belong to it like I do.

We know too that every Council gives a member the chance to prove what he can do, in leadership or initiative. He can start organizing a religious celebration with the Council's approval, or an educational event, or an athletic contest, or promote a cultural affair in drama, song, or dancing. It will make him a greater individual if he does accomplish a worthy objective — and if he can't lead, he can follow as a loyal member. I concentrated on the K. of L. Choir and was President of it too, and I enjoyed singing the songs in Church with the Choir praising our Lo l. May He bless all of us in such endeavors.

Mary Lucas, HM — honorary mention

When I heard Father Prunskis' appeal for essays, I immediately recalled the many events and happenings which have brought me to realize the many ways in which I became a better Catholic. When our council was organized in 1936, I was sixteen years old and was accepted into the organization as a charter member and remained with the council to the present time. I was active from the beginning and accepted offices in the Council, District and finally advanced to National First Vice-President of the Supreme Council.

Reading the Constitution helped me to realize that our work involves many phases. I was especially drawn to our motto, "For God and Country", it brought home the fact that this organization means more than fun and games.

Our parish is small and therefore we had no Catholic school. I learned my Lithuanian prayers at my mother's knee. After I entered grade school, our pastor, Father Slavinas decided to hold catechism classes every day after school hours to prepare us for First Communion, Confirmations and general religious training. This continued for years until Father returned to Lithuania.

We scheduled monthly Communion days and attended in a body. We joined the church choir and sang Lithuanian hymns during Lent on Wednesday, Friday and Sunday afternoons. (This was one of my mother's strict rules). She also encouraged us to learn to read and write in Lithuanian at which I became very affluent, since our K of L minutes had to be written and read in Lithuanian during those first years.

In later years, we organized Ladies and Mens Retreats. The ladies went to the Dominican Retreat House and the men attended the Franciscan Retreat House in Milford. We planned evenings of Recollection, also sent for Lithuanian Missionaries to preach in our church. We also attended week-end Retreats at Bergamo Center from which we returned filled with the Holy Spirit and a feeling of deep spiritual renewal.

C-96 organized Pilgrimages in various cities of our District in conjunction with our Spring Meeting. Our latest Pilgrimage was a bus trip tp the National Shrine of Our Lady of Consolation on May 3rd in Carey, Ohio. While there, we celebrated the 600th Anniversary of Lithuanian Christianity.

During our national letter writing campaigns, we wrote to Senators, Congressmen and Presidents urging the freedom of Lithuania. Our letters continued to the prisoners of conscience. Other projects are: annual cemetery visits to our deceased members, visits to the elderly members of our parish, St. Casimir's celebration are never forgotten.

The highlite of my life in the K of L was the trip to Rome to participate in the blessing of "Our Lady of Ausros Chapel", also receiving Holy Communion from Pope Paul, then the trips to Fatima and Lourdes Shrines with Dr. Stukas' excursions. All these participations are unforgettable events which have brought me closer to my God and I thank Him every night for giving me the opportunity to serve Him.




DR. LIUDAS JAGMINAS – MEDICAL DOCTOR

A short time ago, I learned of the death of Sister Paulette, who had been my teacher in the third, fifth, and sixth grades of the Annunciation elementary school in Brooklyn, more than half a century ago. Having her in those three grades was not due to a shortage of nuns, but reflected her rapid promotion in the school. I have often thought of Sister, a dedicated and highly-intelligent religious, who, with good grace, firm discipline, and the patience of Job taught classes of thirty and forty children of Lithuanian immigrant parents who themselves had little or no schooling. Mixed in her classes, as throughout the school, were the handfulls of misguided hellions who made her life more difficult than it need have been, but not more difficult than she made it for them. Somehow, she managed to instill into us the academic knowledge mandated by the New York State of Regents, and, more importantly, the moral and social values to guide us in our mature lives.

Sister Paulette, and the other Lithuanian nuns at Annunciation, are the unsung heroines of an earlier age, teaching members of St. Dominic's great Order of Preachers, to whom we owe a long—deferred tribute for having done so much for so many of us and for having asked so little in return.

Ave atque vale, Sister Paulette. You and the other good nuns of the old church have left behind a rare and precious heritage that is like a light shining in the darkness of our strident and self-centered world.

In October we had elections and Betty Skricki was voted president. We all have faith in her and know she is a good leader.



Praised be Jesus Christ!

As the pastor of St. Joseph's and moderator of council 72 in Binghamton, New York, I would like to share with our VYTIS readers the following information in which our council was involved.

Council 72 even though it is a small council has been very active since 1984, when it was reactivated by the new pastor, yours truly, Rev. John E. Mikalajunas, within one month after my appointment to the small but lovely parish of St. Joseph. Since my appointment, many items with a Lithuanian flavor have appeared in the parish church, and the newly renovate Cultural Center. The parish church has received new main doors with a Lithuanian Cross forming the main theme of the doors which are made of aluminum and stained glass of red, yellow and green. The back wall of the church, which had previously depicted the horrors of hell as portrayed in the Book of Revelation now has a four by seven foot hand painted picture of the Blessed Virgin of Siluva framed in a gold leaf frame.

The processional cross of the church is an original, which I had commissioned by Wlodzimirus Janickas of Krakow, done in silver, gold and amber crystal. There is absolutely not another like it in the United States.

All of the covers of the sacramentaries and lectionary have the Lithuanian cross embroidered as well as special altar hangings with the folk cross.

The interior of the parish hall, which has now changed its name to St. Joseph's Religious and Cultural Center, now has 18 oil paintings which measure 4x12 feet, featuring the entire cycle of Lithuanian family traditions, painted in the Lithuanian Folk Art style.

In 1985 the parish produced a lovely cookbook of 242 pages of many Lithuanian and various other ethnic recipes, as well as Lithuanian customs, and sections on how to make Lithuanian Christmas ornalments, poetry, etc. The book is enclosed in a beautiful red, yellow and green cover. The price — \$7.50 including postage and handling. (Cookbook, St. Joseph's Church, 1 Judson Ave., Binghamton, N.Y. 13905)

Most recently our Knights celebrated *Kūčias* in January. A group of 90 gathered, including both Roman and Byzantine Catholic Priests to share the *plotkeliai* in a spirit of Christian love.






