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

JO EMINENCIJA VINCENTAS SLADKEVIČIUS

This year, the Feast of the Most Holy Trinity was a special one for Lithuanians here and in Lithuania. Our Holy Father, Pope John Paul II presented us with a great gift — a Cardinal.

The future cardinal was born in August 20, 1920 in the Guronių village, the county of Zasliai, district of Kaišiadoriai. Born from poor parents, he completed his preliminary education with the aid of the pastor of the parish of Zasliai — the Rev. M. Cijūnai. Vincentas attended the high school of the Lithuanian Jesuits in Kaunas. In 1939 he was accepted at the Kaunas Seminary. He finished with a degree of Sacrae Theologiae and in 1944 was assigned as an assistant in Kietaviskes and later became chaplain in the High School of Merkinė. From 1952 he was an instructor at the only seminary in Lithuania in Kaunas. At the same times he served as prefect of the seminary. In 1952 Father Sladkevičius was concecrated bishop by the late bishop-martyr Teofilijus Matulionis. Having gone through years of physical and mental torture by the soviets, and at 80 years of age Bishop Matulionis envisioned Sladkevičius as his possible successor. He presented Sladkevičius name among others for the governments approval (cropping) and then put them through a waxing process for paste-up purposes, thereby destroying the pictures for further personal use. 75

as candidates for consecration. All were rejected. By secret means Matulionis got the list to the Holy Father. A reply was received on December 2, 1957. The Holy Father had chosen Father Sladkevicius to be Bishop and gave Bishop Matulionis permission to consecrate him by any means possible (even in secret). So, on Christmas eve in Bishops Matulionis private chapel in Birštonas, Rev. Sladkevičius was consecrated bishop. On the next day, Bishop Matulionis presented the newly consecrated bishop to the then Minister of Religious cult J. Rugienis. The minister was enraged and screamed: "This so called Bishop which you "baked" (iškepiai) shall never rule a diocese!"

From the day of his consecration, Sladkevicius was forced to move to a parish in the outposts of Lithuania as far away as possible from his diocese, at the border of Latvia — Nemunėlio Radviliškyje. He refused to assume these duties and onlyⁱ with the death of the pastor there in 1970, the Bishop

agreed to assume the duties at this now priestless parish.

After long and arduous bargaining with the Soviet Government the Holy Father finally succeeded, in 1982, to have Bishop Sladkevicius accume his seat as Bishop of Kaišiadoriai. In 1983, together with other bishops, he was permitted to make his first "Ad limina" visit to Rome. Here, far away from our native land, we know very little about the new Cardinal. But we respect the choice that the martyr-bishop of Lithuania — Teofilius Matulionis had made and rejoice at this generous gift of the Pope.

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He is to receive his red hat in Rome at St.

Peter's bazilika on June 29, the feast of SS Peter and Paul Let's all pray that our new cardinal will be permitted to come to Rome and receive his red hat from the hands of the Holy Father. Te Deus Laudeamus!

It seems like only yesterday... A REVIEW OF THE HISTORY OF THE KNIGHTS OF LITHUANIA

According to the records of the Federal Government, it did not start keeping records of the Lithuanian immigrants arriving to the United States until 1910. Up until 1918 immigrants coming here stated that they had came from Poland or Russia. One historian, A. Kucas stated that before 1900 there were between 50 and 100,000 Lithuanians in the United States. From 1913 when the Knights were organized until 1921 the largest number of immigrants which joined the Knights was 4655.

What do these numbers mean? Several priests, back in 1921 stated that there were only 400 really "patriotic" Knights. In 1921, a Catholic could not join an organization unless it was under the guidance of a priest. Many did not approve of such "dictatorships" and did not join any Lithuanian - Catholic organizations.

For this reason, at this time, the Socialists and Communists started organizing into groups. Many immigrants flocked to them. These radical organizations attempted to solicit members, even Knights by their biased newspapers and books. Many Catholics did give up their religion, joined these groups "to make new friends".

The Knights started to lose members. Dues were not paid and various squabbling took place not only on the council level but even nationally. Many members quit the organization never to rejoin. Many of the newspapers began to question the benefits gained from the Knights of Lithuania organization in the Lithuanian community. Norkunas was angered and hurt at such smear tactics and accusations. He wondered how the media could pick on an organization with such high ideals.

A few words on the languages. The Constitution

caused some of the hard liners to leave the organization. Now, even in the Lithuanian churches it was mandatory to read the Gospel in both languages. The VYTIS in 1923 had some articles in English which resulted in many letters of protest. But the practice of using both languages continued. In 1933 the editor reported that one half of the readership did not read Lithuanian at all. In 1933 HM Joseph Boley-Bolevičius in a forceful article urged the Knights to return to their beautiful Lithuanian Iⁿguage.

Up until 1960 the idealists and realists were debating the use and value of the Lithuanian language. It was well known that many of the 3rd and 4th generations of youth had no interest in the Lithuanian language. In many cases at this time the meetings were opened with the Vyčių Hymnas and a Lithuanian prayer, the rest of the meeting was in English.

Dear Brother and Sister in Christ,

On April 24 — World Day of Prayer for Vocations, we prayed for Lithuanian vocations as well, which we need so very much. Strong and continuous prayer is one of the conditions the Lord set so that "the Father may send out more labourers into his harvest". Therefore we should not limit ourselves to just one day of prayer, but through our daily prayers and good works we ought to implore God for more saintly Lithuanian vocations.

For the very first time I am turning to all our fellow Lithuanians concerning the more earthly and material affairs of our College (seminary) in Rome.

The Lithuanian College (seminary) of St. Casimir is not only a seminary but also the only Lithuanian spiritual center in Rome and all of Italy. Besides, it is and will remain in the future the only unofficial permanent link (representation) of the Lithuanian faithful, especially those outside of Lithuania, with the Holy See. Until now the College has been supported by Lithuanian Benefactors in the free World. If some day in God's plans the doors to Lithuania's freedom will open, the Lithuanian episcopate will already have its College (seminary) in the center of Christianity built on strong foundations, and will then be able to administer it by itself. But that time may still be far away.

Thus I turn to you with the matter which should have been raised several years ago: the further support of St. Casimir's College and especially the guaranteeing of its future. We turn to you at this present time for various reasons: the depreciation of the dollar to half its original value, the constant increase of the already high cost of living in Italy, the urgent and necessary renovation required for some of the College's buildings, as well as more rapid growth of the COLLEGE'S SUPPORT ENDOW-MENT FUND (CSEF).

The question of the College Support Endowment

carry the weight alone. We invite every Lithuanian priest and layperson in the free world to contribute to this Fund.

In every country, wherever there is a Catholic Diocese, there is a yearly diocesan collection for the support of the seminary. This is not only permitted but also required by the Code of Canon (Church Law) (especially can. 263 and 264). Therefore, with the blessings of H. E. Bishop Paul Baltakis, O.F.M., we turn for the first time to the whole Lithuanian Catholic community inviting all to help us: ONCE A YEAR TO MAKE AT LEAST ONE MATERIAL DONATION TO THE ONLY LITHUANIAN SEMINARY OUTSIDE OF LITHUANIA. Not every family can offer to God a son or daughter, but every family can and is obligated to help the cause for vocations not only through prayer, but also through material support.

On May 29th of this year the Holy Father ordained the College alumnus deacon Paul Maliska to priesthood. This is a big feast not only for the College but also for all Lithuania and the Universal Church as well. Then, on July 10th of this year, in the Our Lady of Vilnius church in New York, Bishop Baltakis will ordain the College alumnus Robert Rakauskas to the diaconate.

Unfortunately, the number of Lithuanian vocations, as elsewhere, is substantially reduced. We hope with the financial campaign to begin publicizing broader this dear institution of ours as well. We have no doubts that not only in Lithuania but also in the free world there is a good number of first rate young men who would be ready to offer their life, energy and talents for the glory of God and the well-being of their Nation.

Thus, we turn to you, dear Lithuanian believers, in this important matter, since after 40 years of the College's existence the time has come not only to modernize it somewhat, but especially to do the urgent repair work, which is required not only for some comfort and a nicer exterior image, but indeed for the safety of the buildings and inhabitants themselves. Moreover, it is already required by the Italian government itself. Laws change, and old buildings (our College is truly old and not properly suited for a seminary's work and living requirements) have to adapt themselves to the demands of our day.

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Fund is quite urgent. We began it in 1984, on the occasion of the St. Casimir's 500 year Jubilee, when the Knights of Lithuania "adopted" the College (71st National Convention - Chicago) and began to send donations to this Fund. The Knights of Lithuania's contributions so far total more than 50,000 dollars. On this occasion we wish to express much appreciation and thanks to all the Knights for their generosity and continuous support. But they cannot

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About a month ago we personally contacted every Lithuanian priest concerning this problem, asking that they not only send a donation but also approve and bless our project. We sincerely thank all those priests who have

already responded to our call. As we asked them so we ask you, dear fellow Lithuanians, not only for a single offering or pledge, but we dare to request that you remember in your last will (testament) this very important in-

THE ONLY LITHUANIAN SEMINARY in the free world is the Pontifical Lithuanian College of St. Casimir in Rome (PCL).

1945.X...: The PCL began to establish itself in Rome. **1948.V.1:** the PCL was officially recognized by the Vatican.

1950.X.31: the Vatican recognized its statutes and rules.

1952.VIII.30: by a special decree the Government of Italy officially gave the College/Seminary juridical status. 1963.XII.18: Pope Paul VI granted to the newly established Lithuanian seminary the title of "Pontifical College". 1979.VII.6: Pope John Paul II personally visited the College.

1984.IX: the Knights of Lithuania (the first and only Lithuanian Organization) at the 71st. National Convention "adopted" the College to give her moral, spiritual & financial support.

- The College is intended to form young men of Lithuanian origin for the priesthood and for pastoral work among Lithuanians everywhere.
- To date the College has had over 80 Lith. seminarians and more than 50 were ordained for the priesthood.
- Any young man having finished high school or the equivalent may apply to be accepted to the College.
- Lithuanian language is not a prerequisite for acceptance.



Special word of thanks to JUDITH A. PETROKAS, of Dayton, Ohio, who protested the pro-soviet bias in Ted Turner's highly promoted "Portrait of the Soviet Union". In her lengthy letter of protest, she pointed out the many inaccuracies on the historical backgrounds of the Baltic States, and the failure of the television series to document true conditions: religious oppression and cultural genocide. She also wrote to Robert Wussler, Exec. V.P. of the **Turner Broadcasting System.**

K of L archivist LARRY ŠVELNIS, of Needham, Mass., protested to the editor of the *Needham Chronicle*, which published an inaccurate and biased article by Elizabeth T. Graw, "USSR Christians Celebrate," The author, among other inaccuracies, stated: "Religious instruction can be given in church classes or in private." NOT SO!

RITA ZAKARKA, of Chicago, Ill. sent us copies of two letters of greeting, received from imprisoned Lithuanian Catholic activist, VIKTORAS PETKUS. JOSEPHINE ŽUKAS, of Port Washington, N.Y., (Great Neck Council), sent us two very interesting articles from the Long Island Catholic, PO Box 700, Hempstead, N.Y. 11551. One of them concerned statements in mid-April by Pope John Paul II and Soviet political and religious leaders, bringing a clearer focus to Church - state problems in the USSR. The second article quotes the Holy Father...calling for restoration of religious liberty in Lithuania, as "winds of renewal" blow through the USSR. In a Latin-language talk April 18 to visiting bishops from Lithuania, the-Pope said the Church there was still struggling against government restrictions in a "decidedly atheistic" environment. He described Lithuania's estimated 2.5 million Catholics as a suffering Church and consburgh Press, written by John-Thor Dahlburg of the Associated Press from Moscow, entitled: "Glasnost Awakens Long-Suppressed Ethnic Sound, Fury." the wellwritten article gives a good analysis of the historical backgrounds of the Soviet-suppressed ethnic republics, present conditions and reasons for the unrest. Correspondent Elenor Chute, in an article "People Here From Baltic Hope For the Best," quotes the feelings of a Latvian, also Lithuanian, K of L'er Vyto Yucius. Mary also included an article from the Pittsburgh Catholic on claims by a Lithuanian activist nun, NIJOLE SADŪNAIATE, that she was beaten on the streets of Vilnius by the KGB, for helping organize Lithuanian Independence Day celebrations last February.

HELEN VENIS, of Woodhaven, New York, gave us two articles from the Archdiocesan publication of Brooklyn, *The Tablet*. Both NC articles; one from Rome, concerns religious oppression in Lithuania. Correspondent **Greg Erlandson** writes on Konstantin Kharchev, chairman of the Soviet Department of Religion, saying "Soviets Seel To Improve Religion Laws"; the other, from Toronto, by **Patria C. Rivera**, saying: "Glasnost No Help to Lithuanian Church."

ANNIE MITCHELL-MATALAVICH, of C-52, Elizabeth, N.J. and an Honorary Member, sent us several articles on the Lithuanian Independence Day celebration in St. Petersburg, Fla.; from the*Catholic Review* on St. Alphonsus Church of Baltimore 'Pastor, Rev. Anthony Dranginis, about the rosary made by Kazė Puraitė while serving a 10 year prison sentence in Siberia for teaching catechism in Lithuania, which was being displayed, also articles on Niiolė Sadūnaitė.

On March 3rd, a group of U.S. Senators wrote to the Minister of Justice in behalf of imprisoned Lithuanian Catholic Priest, Alfonsas Svarinskas.

SENATOR CARL LEVIN, of Michigan, in recent talks in Moscow, with top Soviet officials, brought up the cases of **Bishop Julijonas Steponavičius**, who has been forced to live in internal exile for 27 years, also two Lithuanian priests serving lengthy terms in labor camp for their religious activism: **Rev Alfonsas Svarinskas**, 63 and **Rev Sigitas Tamkevičius**, 49.

trasted this with the social liberalization under way in the Soviet Union. He praised the tenacious faith of Lithuania's Catholics and said they have much to offer their society — above all, a "serene conscience, well-formed, rich in the highest valus of truth, justice, brotherhood and peace."

MRS. MARY VAGLIA, MCD Lithuanian Affairs chairlady, sent us a lengthy article which appeared in the *Pitt*-

and asking him to investigate the abuse of military reserve duty as a method of political repression: PETRAS GRAŽULIS.

FROM THE PRESS AND CHURCH LEADERS

KEN ADELMAN,, of the *Washington Times*, on April 1st, called Nijolė Sadūnaitė "The Joan of Arc of Lithuania", and a "Martyr of Our Times," in his beautiful article.

In his March 28th letter to Konstantin Kharchev, Chairman of the Council for Religious Affairs of the USSR, Monsignor Daniel F. Hoye, wrote a strongly worded letter, criticizing Soviet treatment of Catholics in Lithuania, especially the imprisonment of the two priests already mentioned and the internal exile of Bishop Steponavičius. Msgr. Hoye is the General Secretary of the U.S.Catholic Conference. In an earlier letter to Yuri Dubinin, Soviet Ambassador to the U.S., Msgr. Hoye took issue with Soviet handling of efforts on Feb. 16th to commemorate the 70th anniversary of the reestablishment of independence on predominantly Catholic Lithuania., He mentioned the attacks against protestors, reprisals against the leaders, etc.

the Arlington Catholic Herald, of March 24th, (2100 N. Globe Rd., Arlington, VA 22203), published a guest editorial, written by Congressman Frank R. Wolf, in behalf of a Lithuanian Catholic, imprisoned most of his adult life by the Soviets for his religious beliefs: VIK-TORAS PETKUS, arrested in 1947 at the age of 17, and sentenced to 10 years in a hard labor camp for his participation in the local Catholic Youth organization. He was released in 1953. Four years later, in 1957, he was arrested again for "keeping and distributing anti-Soviet propaganda." He was sentenced to 8 years for this offense. In 1976, when the Soviet government signed the Helsinki agreements, which promised full human and religious rights, Petkus helped set up a monitoring group to make sure the agreements were kept. Nine months later, he was arrested for the third time and sentenced to 7 years in prison, 3 years in a special regime camp, and 5 years in exile. He has spent most of his life in Soviet prisons, and remains there today.

The President of the International P.E.N., Francis King, and the Executive Director of the P.E.N. American Center, Karen Kennerly, have urged Mikhail Gorbachev to release an imprisoned Lithuanian writer and to return his confiscated manuscripts to him. The writer, GIN-TAUTAS IESMANTAS, sent a letter to the P.E.N. President last August, informing him that his entire poetic output, which has escaped seizure at the time of his arrest, in 1980, had been confiscated in 1986 in Vilnius, while he was still in prison. Iešmantas asked P.E.N. to help him to get his manuscripts back. Iešmantas, born in 1930, was sentenced in 1980 to six years at hard labor and five years in internal exile for his poetry and his role in publishing the underground journal Perspektyvos (Perspectives) in soviet oppressed Lithuania. He was named Honorary Member of the American Center of International P.E.N. in the Spring of 1986.

Kastytis Matulionis, Jadvyga Bieliauskienė, Petras Cidzikas, Vytautas Bogušis and Antanas Terleckas.

On the occasion of U.S. Secretary of State George Shultz visit with Soviet Foreign Minister Shevardnadze in Moscow, on April 21st., Shultz met with 3 Lithuanian dissidents: Petras Pakenas, Povilas Pečiulaitis, and Dr. Algirdas Statkevičius in the American Embassy. About 30 people met with Shultz who wish to leave the USSR. U.S. Undersecretary of State for Human Rights, Richard Schifter, met a day earlier in the U.S. Embassy with 100 Human Rights activists from Lithuania, Latvia and the Ukraine. Each talked about conditions in their respective countries. Sadūnaitė was queried for 30 minutes, Dr. Statkevičius — 15 minutes.

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As RITA ZAKARKA has done, we should write letters to help Petkus gain his freedom and to console him in his involuntary solitude.



KALBĖKIME LIETUVIŠKAI LET'S SPEAK LITHUANIAN

Lietuvos ir kitų rūsų šalies miestų valgiai.

Lietuva yra nedidelė, tačiau kiekviena sritis turi labiausiai mėgstamų patiekalų.

Aukštaičiai — blynus, varškę, kugelį, dešras, šaltieną. Suvalkiečiai — rūkytos mėsos patiekalus, didžkukulius (cepelinus), vėdarus. Dzūkai — valgius iš grybų, bulvių. Žemaičiai — kąstinį su bulvėmis, sūrį, šiupinį, rasalą.

Rasalas gaminamas taip: Išverdi burokėlius (raudonus), supiaustai, dedi į virintą karštą vandenį su pipirais, lauro lapeliais, svogūnais, paskanini silke ir valgai su karštomis bulvėmis (tinka kūčių vakarienei). Kitas žemaičių valgis: špirginė, kanapinė, druska. Tai su svogūnais, pipirais druska keptuvėje paskrudintos ir sugrūstos kanapės (hemp).

Žemaičiai antros vestuvių dienos rytą mėgsta saldumynų persivalgiusius svečius pavaišinti rasalu, spirgine (kad širdis atsigautų). Mėgsta avižinių miltų kisielių. Šiais laikais avižinį kisielių galima pagaminti ir be avižiniu miltų. Avižinius dribsnius (rolled oats) užpilti vandeniu, įdėti juodos duonos (rugienės) porą riekelių ir užmerkti 24 valandoms ir išvirti. Dzūkai tą kisielių valgė su mėšiniu medumi ar cukrumi pasaldintu vandeniu. Mėšiniu pasaldytas kisielis tinka kūčių vakarienei. Žemaičiai jį valgė su sviestu ir spirgučiais.

Aukštaičiai — virtinių pyragėlių tęšlą darė iš miltų ir įdarydavo grybais, mėsa, varške, šutintais rūgščiais kopūstais, uogomis, bulvių koše. Vidurio lietuviai mėgo pyragėlius iš virtų bulvių. Netikėtą svečią vaišino medum, sūriu, kaimiška duona, rūkyta dešra, kumpiu ir t.t.

Lietuvoje labiausiai mėgstama pasigardžiuoti silke su grybais, žemaičių kastiu, žuviene, šaltibarščiais, gira, skilandžiu, lietuviškomis dešrelėmis, koldūnais-virtiniais, pyragais, kūgeliu su kiaulės kojytėmis, didžkukuliais-cepelinais.

Vokiečių gurmanai G. Lindė ir H. Knoblochas po nedidelių sociologinių tyrimų nustatė, kuo rusų šalies miestuose labiausiai mėgstama pasigardžiuoti. Lietuvoje —

Vilniuje jau gana seniai cepelinai nukonkuravo virtinius (koldūnus). Cepelinai tai irgi apvalainiai kukuliai (iš tarkuotų bulvių), prikimšti įvairiaus įdaro: mėsos, silkės, varškės, grybų... Paduodant į stalą, jie palaistomi lydytu sviestu arba grietine, spirgučiais, valgomi su įvairiausiais padažais.

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Dear Vytis Staff:

As a new member, I am very happy with VYTIS and your dedication to the cause of free Lit huania.

There is some disturbing news from Lithuania pertaining to a new method of persecution of Lithuanian dissidents, especially the religious and the nationalists: The use of immediate draft into the USSR military forces. Many have died in Afganistan and others are forced to serve in the Red Army, facilitating the oppression of People in the Soviet Union.

Recently, a young Catholic activist, Petras Gražulis, was sentenced to a 10 month labor camp regime for refusing to join the military forces. At his trial, he was physically beaten right in court and eyewitnesses were harassed, also beaten and some were arrested.

As lawyer and a member of the American Bar Association, I requested the president of the ABA to intervene on behalf of Mr. Gražulis with the Soviet Association of Soviet Lawyers (ASL), with whom the American Bar Association has entered into an ill-advised agreement to "advance the rule of law". The ASL agreed to allow the ABA to participate in Soviet trials to witness the fairness of their procedures.

The trial of Petras Gražulis was an outrage, yet in an attempt to inquire into the proceedings with the Soviets, the ABA has refused to assist me. So much for the agreement to "Advance the rule of law".

I ask that you urge the Knights of Lithuania to contact their lawyers, especially those who are members of the ABA, to press the ABA's action on behalf of Petras Gražulis. We must be heard on this! If the ABA is so gullible as to believe the Soviets, they must account to the Americans for participating in the farce.

It appears that the ABA is not interested in the oppressed Lithuanians, but only in the commercial potential of the USSR. If Lithuanians have no rights, the ABA should not promote Soviet law as a moral equivalent of ours.

We can make the difference. Our fellow Lithuanians are doing their part under harsh Sovet rule, we can at least support them with our demand that the American Bar Association act on our behalf.

Happy Birthday to NYC St Patrick's Cathedral [1958 - 1988]

The first stone — the cornerstone of St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City was placed in the earth in 1858.

March 4, 1898, at the celebration of Archbishop Michael Corrigan's twenty-fifth anniversary of consecration as a bishop, the chimes of St. Patrick's rang out for the first time. A newspaper account reported:

St. Patrick's chime of bells rang out today in the great white Cathedral at Fifth Avenue and Fiftieth Street. It was its first ringing for the nineteen bells of the new chime have waited long in silence since they were first placed in position. The first deep tones came thundering at the stroke of 10 o'clock, and in the vibrant throbbing chords that followed there was heard a clear high melody, It was the Hymn to St. Casimir, played in honor of the patron saint of the day.

The first Lithuanians began arriving in the
Athol area in the late 1880's. They left their
Russian dominated homeland for various
reasons: not to be drafted into the Russian army (for 25 years); to better their living standards;
to enjoy freedom of the press and use the
Lithuanian language. (At this time the Latin
alphabet and use of Lithuanian was forbidden
under a penalty of death). Above all, Lithuanians flocked to America's shores to enjoy their
ethnic heritage and the ability to practice their
Catholic faith freely.

75 The first Lithuanians to arrive in Athol was Jonas Breška closely followed by Antanas
75 Andraliunas, both from the Vabalninkas
75 parish.

75 Realizing the benefits to be organized, 75 they founded various societies and ethnic parishes. On of these organizations was the 75 Knights of Lithuania founded on April 25, 1913 by Mykolas Norkūnas, in Lawrence, Ma. This 15 society took quick root and Athol was granted 75 75 a charter on May 29, 1914, the same year the parish of St Francis was founded. It is worthy to note that Fr. Juozas Montvila had agreed 75 **75** to come to St. Francis as its first pastor but all were saddened by the news that he went down 75 in the Titanic disaster. (see April 1988 issue of 15 VYTIS)

At the first organizational meeting held in 75 75 the old Eagle Hall, 98 young Lithuanians 75 joined Council 10. The speaker at that occasion was Mykolas Norkūnas. The officer slate was: 75 Spiritual Advisor — Rev. Francis Meškauskas, 75 President – Domininkas Karablis, Vice Pres-75 ident — Magdalena Verabauskas, Secretary — Juozas Lešcinskas, Recording Secretary - An-75 tanas Grigaliūnas, Treasurer — Elžbieta Braška, and the Trustees - Jonas Tamašaus-75 kas. Dues collected were \$3.25. A collection netted \$3.37. With a gift from Father Meškauskas the treasury was \$16.70 rich. 15

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The newly formed council was a beehive of activity. English language classes were held, picnics, dances and concerts were the norm. A drama club was directed by Antanas Lošius. On August 24, 1914 a library was established for members. After World War I, many members bought bonds to aid their brethren in Lithuania, who at time were trying to win their independence. It is interesting that such a \$50.00 bond was recently found tucked away in an old sofa. The first member to die was Emilija Vinciunas. Some of the more active members in the early days were: Domininkas Karablis, Ladis Matulis, Jonas Gailiunas and Anton Losius.

In later years, when the second generation prevailed, the council participated in the New England District basketball, baseball and bowling tournaments. One of the more outstanding baseball games took place between Athol and Hartford. The local girls' bowling team was the district's champion from 1927-1930.

The council was generous in supporting for many years St. Francis parish. It was also famous for its Winter Carnival and annual Mother's Day programs.

Many members never returned home 7. after World War II. Membership fell and in 1952, a group from Gardner was admitted to our council which makes up a large segment of our council. 7.

Our motto: "For God and Country" was 75 well lived each year as we commemorate the 75 Feast of St. Casimir, our patron saint. We have a Lithuanian cultural day with various prog-75 rams. President Simmons read a tribute to our recently deceased honorary lifetime member, Česlovas Butkys, as published in the Bethlehem Globe-Times at our April meeting. Dr. Adolph Butkys reported that he will arrange with the Lithuanian Research and Study Center in Chicago for place-ment of his father's papers, books and documents and also those of his mother. Česlovas Butkys was a playwright and author in addition to being a justice on Lithuania's Supreme Court. His mother, Mina, was also a playwright and authoress of one of the most widely used children's books used in Lithuania during that era. The center was selected to be the

archive for use in present and future studies of Lithuania.

A contingent of council members consisting of Joseph and Trudy Simmons, George Deriscavage and Joseph Ogint served as a "truth team" when they attended a lecture at Muhlenberg College, Allentown, on April 7. The lecture was delivered by a Lithuanian Soviet Economist, Raymundas Rayatskas, visiting professor at Harvard University. The lecture was entitled, "Gorbachev's Economic Reform: Problems and Prospects. In essence, it consisted of the usual Communist diatribe praising the merits of glasnost and Perestroika and how it promises a better life for the citizens of the Soviet Union once the restructuring of goods distribution and financial systems are completed. He noted that the programs are encountering some resistance but that Gorbachev, intent on bettering the people's lot, is steadily pushing onward.

When he solicited questions from the audience, our team told him that glasnost and perestroika will be full truths only if and when Russia withdraws her Red Army from the Baltic States which she illegally occupied by armed force in June of 1940. We further advised to free the Baltic States and the need for glasnost and perestroika will cease to exist because they are already embodied in free societies. We suggested to him that what he had just said was a lot of empty rhetoric. Rayatskas angrily countered with, "What does this have to do with economics?" Our reply was, "Everything! We want this audience to know that Lithuania, Latvia and Estonia did not and still do not want to be included in the 'Communist Paradise.' Communism has failed in the past, is failing now and is destined to fail in the future in that it is a system which must be imposed with force and therefore cannot replace the natural economic system of supply and demand." And so went the discussion. We made our point and recommend that all councils do the same when the opportunity presents itself.

Currently, Gorbachev is busy sending cadres of propaganda teams to the United States by the dozen in an effort to mesmerize the American public into believing that glasnost and perestroika will correct all Communist wrongs. We must negate and expose the Communist lies and distortions on the spot. When the opportunity presents itself, go to the event in a body as a "Truth Team." As Lithuanians and Knights, we are obligated to bring Lithuania's suffering to the public's attention.



In the 1700's three wooden crosses were erected on a hill overlooking Vilnius. Even the casual observer could not help be reminded of that other hill by Jerusalem. The Hill of Three Crosses as the site began to be called became a favorite of pilgrims who often ascended the hill on their knees. Eventually, the wooden crosses gave way to concrete ones which were lit in the evening and could be seen for many miles. The crosses were dynamited by the Soviets.

The Cathedral of Vilnius, named after St. Stanislaus, graces a siteich originally was a pagan sanctuary. The first Christian church was built on the site in 1387. The church in its present form is the work of the Lithuanian architect Laurynas Stuoka-Gucevičius. Lithuanian kings were buried here as were the bishops and other prominent people. It was the "bishop's seat" of Matulaitis.

In 1952 the Soviets ordered the Cathedral closed and the statues of Sts. Casimir, Stanislaus and Helen were removed. The relics of St. Casimir were moved to the Church of St. Peter and Paul also in Vilnius.

On a hill overlooking Vilnius is the tower of King Gediminas where

put St. Anne's in the palm of his hand and take it back to Paris.

The City Hall of Kaunas with its unique graceful design earned for it the nickname of the "White Swan." It is now a Soviet wedding palace where on weekends a wedding occurs every 15 minutes.

The statue known as "The Book Smuggler" commemorates the time when Lithuanians were forbidden by the czars to have goods published in their native tongue. Some thirty to forty thousand books were smuggled into the country from Prussia. The Soviets have allowed this statue to remain standing in Kaunas assuming it was against czarist oppression and not the Soviet system.

The Kaunas War Memorial was constructed of stones taken from the battlefields where Lithuanians fought for independence. Every morning a ceremony was held by war veterans who paid tribute to their fallen comrades in arms. In 1930 the body of the unknown soldier was placed here. The monument which took the form of an elongated pyramid is now only a memory. In its place are buried four communists, two of whom were executed in independent Lithuania as terrorists.

In addition to the above-mentioned, Robert Novak in his well-researched paper included the Sanctuary to Perkūnas in Palanga, the Hill of Crosses in Šiauliai and the Kaunas Liberty Monument.
