

#### A Message from the Spiritual Advisor

As you well know, this past summer's Jubilee Convention in Washington observed the 75th Anniversary of the Knights of Lithuania. In conjunction with this event, I accepted the privilege of being named your new Spiritual Advisor to continue the fine work done by Fr. Jurgelaitis. Personally I am most humbled by this show of confidence, and I pledge to you my interest and my best effort.

Let me share with you at this time a few direct thoughts about our role as Knights of Lithuania. 1987 and 1988 have been momentous years for Lithuanians throughout the world. In 1987, we marked the 600 Jubilee Year of Christianity for Lithuania. Celebrating those festivities, we were painfully aware of the sufferings, pain and anxiety of those living in our oppressed ancestral land. Our celebrations honored the courage of these people and the glory of our forefathers. 1988 brought with it a time of optimism and hope, as a new climate of openness and restructuring swept across much of the Soviet Union, in particular the Baltic Republics. It seemed as if all the dashed hopes and prayers of the years since 1940 had suddenly found new life. To witness the flag of the Lithuanian Republic flying proudly in the breeze, to understand the in-

tense emotion of people's hearts as in Vilnius they sang fervently Lietuva Tevyne Musu, and to receive reports of honest and frank discussion for a better daily life in Lithuania - all these have caused our souls to swell with dignity, pride and a prayerfully optimistic hope for the future.

In line with these events, we, Knights of Lithuania, have before us a golden opportunity. We must rededicate ourselves with a fervor to doing all we can to bring to pass a new chapter in Lithuanian history. Remarkably we stand much in the same position as the founders of our movement in 1913 who looked forward to a new Lithuania freed from Czarist domination. Hopefully, the Lithuania of the future will be the master of its our national fate, preserving its religious and cultural identity and offering its heritage as a gift both to the East and to the West. What lies ahead we do not know, but of this much we are sure the blood, tears and trials of this Amber people, ancient and noble, have brought us to a new "dawn" in our history. We must love and cherish our heritage as never before.

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#### OUR LADY OF SILUVA SHRINE IN MAIZEVILLE, PA

The first Lithuanians came to Maizeville in 1871. For over 30 years some went to Shenandoah and others to Mahanoy City for Sunday Mass until Rev. Antanas Miliukas, the pioneer priest, in 1907 came to organize a parish for them. The following year Rev. S. Pautienas had the Church of St. Louis built and blessed but in 1914 it was destroyed by fire.

A larger church was constructed the following year by Rev. P. Augustaitis. Because the small parish could not support a parochial school at the time, classes in religion and Lithuanian hymns were taught to the children in church and in the hall below the church. Lithuanian language and culture classes were added by Rev. A. Alauskas in 1934 to 1938. When Rev. A. Degutis was appointed pastor he invited the Sisters of St. Casimir to teach the children on week-ends.

In 1955 Rev. J. Neverauskas as next pastor embellished the church interior, renewing it tastefully and artistically. However, Rev. Albinas Bielskis, appointed to the parish eight years later in 1963, saw the entire edifice go up in smoke when on November 6, 1965, a huge fire destroyed the church and rectory. A Lithuanian parish of 50 years was left in ruins under an open sky.

After such a catastrophe the new pastor, Rev. A, Bielskis, approached the bishop for permission to rebuild the church as a shrine to Our Lady of Siluva. At this time Lithuanian Catholics in the United States were responding generously to a drive for funds to include a chapel of Our Lady of Siluva in the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC. It became a reality and was blessed in September of 1966 before thousands of pilgrims of Lithuanian descent.

Skeptical that Maizeville's small parish could shoulder such a burden the bishop was reluctant to grant permission. However, with the next visit to the chancery Rev. A. Bielskis was able to give tangible proof that a shrine could be built in Maizeville. Many Lithuanians in Northeastern Pennsylvania who heard of the pastor's place to build a shrine in honor of Our Lady of Siluva, the Patroness of Lithuania, sent sufficient offerings to make the shrine a reality. Constructed in two years it was blessed on November 26, 1967.

From the outside the shrine is not too impressive. The general appearance is reminiscent of the style of the architect J. Mulokas. However, upon entering the shrine the feeling uppermost is one of seeing a part of Lithuania's history emerge. The religious and national details are the inspired work of the Lithuanian artist Vytautas Jonynas

whose creative art of impressive beauty is also found in Our Lady of Siluva Shrine in the Basilica of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC,

On the front wall above the altar is a mosaic of the Annunciation designed in three dimensions. The stain-glass windows radiating a variety of brilliant colors on both sides of the shrine reflect the artistic creations of the same artist. At the back of the shrine a huge stain-glass window contains a reproduction of the three crosses which had been built in Vilnius in memory of the early Franciscan martyrs. The Gate of Gediminas is at the side of the crosses.

Also included in the artistic creations is a likeness of Saint Casimir, the patron of Lithuanian youth, whose feast day is marked on March 4th. Among the folk creations is a monstrance, a likeness of a true masterpiece of Lithuanian folk art. On a bright sunny day a rainbow of colors streaming on the crosses and the Gate of Gediminas enhances and accents their beauty. The yellow, green and red of the Lithuanian flag at the altar leaves no doubt in the minds of visitors that this is a Lithuanian national shrine.

Every third Sunday of each month a Lithuanian Mass had been celebrated at the Shrine of Our Lady of Siluva. A choir from Easton led by the organist of the parish sang Lithuanian hymns. Each year beginning on September first, a Novena in honor of Our Lady drew pilgrims from far and near. Reporters from Lithuanian newspapers would be there to record the event. All this activity at the Shrine was planned and led by a tireless leader, Rev. Albinas Bielskis.

Rev. A. Bielskis, responsible for the building of the shrine, although born in the United States had lived in Lithuania from his childhood. Here he completed his studies in jurisprudence before studying for the priesthood. When ordained he served as chaplain at the Cathedral in Vilkaviskis. After World War II in 1946 as a citizen of the United States he was allowed to return to this country.

When faced with the responsibility of building a Church for the people of Maizeville his love and veneration for the Blessed Virgin Mary was the source of strength and perseverance in attaining his goal. All the national and religious past of the Lithuanian people as embodied in the shrine dedicated to Our Lady of Siluva can be found in a coal region of Pennsylvania. It is a monument to the efforts of a humble, hard-working people, the Lithuanians.

As at Cedar Lake in Crown Point, Indiana, as at Sts. Peter and Paul Parish in Elizabeth, NJ, as at the Shrine in Washington, DC annual pilgrimages and solemn novenas can draw the faithful to Our Lady of Siluva Shrine in Maizeville.

Lithuanians in their own country are forbidden by the Soviets to make pilgrimages to the Shrine of Our Lady of Siluva. No better choice can be made by the Catholics of Northeastern Pennsylvania to atone for this restriction than by going to Maizeville in organized groups to sing Lithuanian hymns, to hear the word of God, to pray for

freedom for Lithuania and all suppressed nations. The little town of Maizeville will come alive as a Lithuanian Marian Center, especially in this year dedicated to Mary, the mother of Jesus.










Early in 1988, the Diamond Jubilee Year of the Knights of Lithuania, the Knights of Lithuania Foundation, Inc. announced its 1988 Essay Contest. The task of increasing membership in our regular council is attacked by me in the following method. When I see someone whom I believe would be an asset to the organization, I approach the person and give my sales pitch. In many instances, I get a "bite" and a new member is signed up.

#### Lithuanian Financial Wellspring

To dream the impossible dream - to fight the unbeatable foe ... The former is disparaged by a skeptical society, keenly aware that tilting at windmills breaks bones. The latter idea is, likewise, frequently misunderstood because of a tendency to externalize the adversary, rather than to perceive the enemy within. Apathetic or fatalistic attitudes whimper defeat before a finger is lifted in challenge. To overcome these odds, even a relatively modest ideal requires a certain combination of foresight, fortitude and faith.

At its inception, the Lithuanian Foundation must have appeared a somewhat Utopian verbal panoply to the doubting Thomas league. The not-for-profit corporation, which last year celebrated its silver anniversary, was established with the goal of raising \$1,000,000 toward the eventual reconstruction of a free Lithuania. At the core of this venture is the specification that the donated sum not be touched, but rather saved for the day Lithuania would regain its independence.

The Lithuanian press, radio, authorized Foundation representatives, and prominent leaders at the local level helped to popularize the idea and to raise substantial sums. Soon bequests also became a major source of funds. Since many people are understandably hesitant to donate their hard-earned money to a cause of which the results are not immediately visible, the Foundation began to sponsor concerts, recitals, plays and banquets.

Colliding head-on with the obstacles of the real world, however, how long can beautiful dreams, noble intentions, and a handful of devoted individuals sustain themselves on empty words and meaningless promises? Recognizing the necessity of fulfilling the short-term needs of Lithuanians abroad, the founders of the Foundation had determined at its conception that capital earnings would be employed for this purpose. Thus, through its generous monetary support, the Lithuanian Foundation facilitates the transferral of ideas from wagging tongues to industrious hands.

A Finance Committee is assigned the task of ascertaining that the capital is invested in the safest, most profitable manner under the given economic conditions. Investment counselors are employed to manage liquid assets consisting of government obligations and corporate shares. The Foundation also owns real estate and, through its subsidiary, the

Lithuanian Institute for Fine Arts, some works of art: paintings by critically acclaimed artist Pranas Domsaitis and collections of work by V. Dobuzinskis and Viktoras Petravicius. The Institute is incorporated in the state of Illinois where it operates independently from the Foundation and has its own tax-exempt status.

This year the Lithuanian Foundation's annual press conference was held on June 10th at the Lithuanian Youth Center in Chicago. Since the meeting was open to the public as well as correspondents, the Grants Committee was able to present its distribution of the 1988 income to a larger and a more diverse audience. Marija Remys, Pres. of the Foundation's Executive Committee, first greeted the assembly and introduced her committee members.

The Chairman of the Board of Directors, Stasys Baras, took pride in asserting that the Foundation is a rarity of sorts, due to its unreserved disclosure of its financial statements to both members and interested public. This year, by helping to send several South American students of Lithuanian descent to the Vasario 16 (Feb. 16-Lithuanian Independence Day) High School in West Germany (the only one of its kind functioning outside of Lithuania), the Foundation hopes to invigorate a somewhat abated drive to preserve Lithuanian culture in that part of the world. Mr. Baras emphasized that scholarships represent the Foundation's surest investment in the next generation, thereby preparing it to assume the older generation's responsibilities in the future. He dreams of a day when Foundation membership would considerably surpass the present 5,966 members, when capital would skyrocket over the present \$4,200,000-mark to total \$10,000,000. Subsequently, the Foundation would be able to satisfy 100% of its requests for support. Until then, a relatively large chunk of Lithuanian activities suffers from a lack of adequate funding.

The corporation's founder, Dr. Antanas Razma, next ascended the podium. He acquainted the audience with the members of the Grants Committee and the Scholarship Subcommittee and began a detailed reading of the Summary of Grants, copies of which had been earlier distributed to those gathered. According to the Foundation Bylaws, the Grants Committee comprises 3 delegates of the Lithuanian-American Community of the

USA (in conjunction with which the Fo indation had been established) and 3 appointees of the Board of Directors of the Foundation, all endowed with equal voting rights. Over its brief existence, the organization has distributed over \$2.25 million in grants anscholarships. This year the Committee was authorized \$271,000 for allocation: \$11,000 undistributed past funds added to the \$260,000 allotted directly by the Board. Seventy organizations and individuals submitted 118 project proposals totalling nearly \$600,000, of which 60 were approved for partial or complete funding. Of the 57 scholarship requests received for a sum of \$130,000, 30 were partially or fully met.

In the 3-page hand-outs, the grants were divided into 4 general categories. Lithuanian education (including funds apportioned to Lithuanian language schools, seminars and summer camp, books and audio-visual materials) received \$54,525 in grants. Cultural preservation work (book publishing, awards, films, exhibitions, theater, and other fine arts projects) was given \$93,800 in support. Yet another \$53,985 was allotted to social affairs: summer fellowships, the press, radio programs, institutions, youth organizations. Finally, \$68,600 in scholarships were distributed to students of Lithuanian descent, including those attending the Vasario 16 High School and the University of Illinois at Chicago Circle Chair of Lithuanian Studies. Foundation Information Committee chairman and Board member Antanas Juodvalkis mentioned that 3 factors are taken into consideration when evaluating scholarship requests: academics, family financial standing and, most importantly, participation in Lithuanian activities.

After an exhaustive question/answer session, participating members of the 18-person Board of Directors and the 3-person Audit Committee were introduced. At the annual meetings, these officers are elected by Foundation members, who receive one vote for each \$100 contributed to the organization. All of the leadership, except for the salaried general manager and accountant, donate their time and efforts to the Foundation and, therefore, deserved the appreciative applause with which their introductions were met. In her concluding remarks, Mrs. Remys invited everyone to partake of some refreshments.

Thus, the Lithuanian Foundation tangibly confirms that small miracles can arise from sincere endeavors and a firm sense of commitment. Never contented by past achievements, the words of each of the evening's speakers reverberated the same restless note: the

#### A KNIGHT IN DANCING SHOES

I don't know about your own, but here in Kansas City, there is NO central gathering place for those of us of Lithuanian ancestry. There is no Lithuanian parish church and few, if any, first generation Lithuanians to teach us the language. Some of us over 50 can remember a few words ... a couple of songs ... a custom or two ... that our Grandmothers taught us, but that's it.

We hear about the "Bendroumene" ... whatever that is (but to most of us it's just a big word meaning "Lithuanian family" and not much else).

Yes, we have a chapter of the Lithuanians of America, but all it ever does is have picnics or polka dances, thereby putting us all to work sewing banners, cooking semi-Lithuanian food and selling supposedly Lithuanian items at various Ethnic festivals around town. Those of us who have served several years on the Board of the LOA have been exposed to these items and have learned a little, but the vast majority of Lithuanians in Kansas City will only come to party, not to preserve and/or perpetuate or *learn about* our heritage.

So what has kept the Kansas City Lithuanians together? How do we make our area aware of us? By dancing! And since 1982, by K of L activities for those who can qualify for membership. What has held the Kansas City Lithuanians together since a family/factional argument threatened to tear us apart before we even had a good start? It was truly our dance group!

Named \*Aidas" (Echo), as a small gesture of thanks to the dozens of people from Omaha who helped us organize our first festival, only those of us in the dance group and on the Board worked to keep in-fighting OUT and members IN! Then we heard about and attended our first Sokiu Svente ... in 1984 in Cleveland, OH. Being a part of such a large presentation was a thrill. Meeting Lithuanians from all over the United States, Canada and many, far-off countries was almost overwhelming!

This year, the Eighth Sokiu Svente was held in Hamilton, Ontario, July 2 and 3. This time, we had a fair idea of what was going to happen. We really enjoyed our days of practicing and dancing (even though the tickets for the banquet were sold before we had our letter translated into English and knew there was going to be a Banquet!) Again, we met Lithuanians from all over the world ... including a group from Lithuania. Again we experienced the thrill of a magnificent choir singing in Lithuanian ... inspirational ... although none of us understood a word! We performed our assigned folk dances and marvelled to be accompanied by 20

At the last minute, we were informed that married women had to cover their hair and one of our dancers hastily whipped up pin-on babuskas (that came flying off as we danced). Our biggest regret was that none of us knew about a *full week* of Lithuanian activities that went on in Hamilton and Toronto before the dance festival even began ... many of us would have attended if we had known what was going to take place!

Nevertheless, being one of over 2,000 dancers is a thrill, no matter how many shows one has performed in before. And knowing that our Lithuanian dancing has made thousands of people aware of the tiny Baltic country of Lithuania is a step forward in making the world conscious of the grave injustices done to our tiny Motherland at the turn of the century, in the 1940's and continuing today, much the same way the Knights of Lithuania publish these injustices.

So perhaps a Knight (of Lithuania) in dancing shoes can accomplish as much as a Knight in battle armor! Who can say? Entertaining people and making them smile might even be the best way to melt the Communist Iron Curtain ... sort of like catching flies with honey instead of vinegar!



#### HE WORKS HARD TO GET LITHUANIA BACK ON THE MAP

A full-page article appeared in *Bristol-Phoenix Providence*, *RI* regarding our ever-popular associate member, VICTOR MATHIEU. Victor is an American of French ancestry who has spent 40 years working for a country he has never seen. The country is not France; it is Lithuania. He has also painted red, green and yellow stripes on the telephone poles in front of his home.

Few younger people remember Lithuania when annexed by Soviet Union in 1940. "Many times, when you say to people 'Lithuania', they reply, 'What, Lutheran?' " said M. Mathieu. He and fellow members of the Knights of Lithuania work to keep the memory of the independent nation of Lithuania alive, hoping some day it will again be free. The enthusiasm he puts into this cause earned Victor national recognition this summer when the K of L presented him with a distinguished member award at the annual convention.

It all started when he married Beatrice Savickis, a firstgeneration American whose parents came here from Lithuania. A curate at the church where the Mathieu's attended, told Victor that "the French could get along

without Victor, but the Lithuanians couldn't get along without Beatrice - there are so few of them". These words moved M. Mathieu to become the most enthusiastic adopted Lithuanian a country could hope for. "I've devoted much time to the cause since then," is how he puts it.

Every year he is heavily involved with activities such as the "terrible June Days", the New England Cultural Festival in Worcester held during October, and the Feb. 16th Lithuanian Independence Day in Providence wherein it

is the center of celebrations.

Mr. Mathieu worked with a company for 43 years, wherein he donated his retirement award to the University of Illinois toward establishment of a chair for Lithuanian studies.

Getting the award at the K of L Nat'l Convention was "a complete surprise" to Mr. Mathieu. The award had never been given before. He and his wife hope to get a first-hand look at the Lithuanian situation this summer. They are planning their first trip to Lithuania. The Mathieus presently are members of C-103 in Providence, RI and Victor is their Vytis correspondent. Congratulations!

#### ARCHAEOLOGICAL DIGS Unearthing Indian Secrets

The Baltimore Magazine, June 1988 reports that Nomadic Indians came to the Chesapeake Bay region as early as 4000 B.C. but didn't settle down, even though seafood and wild game were plentiful and setting up shelters was easy in this temperate climate. Four millenia later - in about 200 A.D. - the Indians returned to the same part of the Chesapeake and did settle. This shift in life-style has puzzled archaeologists and anthropologists for years.

LAURIE STEPONAITIS, a professor of archaeology at the University of North Carolina, will lead a group of volunteer archaeologists in an effort to unearth clues to the Indians' culture. The project will train volunteers in the basic skills of excavation before digging begins.

Steponaitis says the Indians may have settled after developing stronger ties among themselves and creating command storage facilities to guard against the vagaries of nature.

Steponaitis' interest in the Chesapeake Bay settlements was sparked when she met descendants of the original settlers while conducting an archaeological survey along the Patuxent River in 1981. "Once I'd worked in the area and found the archaeological record to be so rich and yet so overlooked, I found it hard to stay away", she says.



#### STANLEY BENDER – HERO OF WORLD WAR II

Among the Lithuanian Americans the name of Stenlis Benderis (Stanley Bender) the World War II veteran is well known. For exceptional bravery he was awarded the highest award for bravery — The Congressional Medal of Honor. That is the highest award by Congress, granted by a special request of the President of the United States. The medal was established in 1862. Through all the wars until the year 1945, it was given out only to 2190 Americans among them Stanley Bender. Stanley at present resides in Fayettville, West Virginia.



## A Diamond Among the Coal

As the Knights of Lithuania celebrate 75 years the Anthracite Council is one of the babies of the National organization, but it is a big baby.

In 1974 Rev. Algimantas Bartkus was pastor of St. Casimir's Church in St. Clair, PA. During his time a monthly Lithuanian Mass was offered after which coffee and cake was served in the church hall.

Those who attended decided they would like to form a Lithuanian organization. At first they called themselves the Lithuanian Ethnic Committee. One of the organization's first project was in the Winter Carnival Parade of 1976. They entered a beautiful Lithuanian Float which won the Queen's Trophy. As the organization expanded, it was asked to assist the Lithuanian Priests League at the annual Lithuanian Day festivities which were held yearly in Barnesville, PA.

As the Bi-Centennial Year of 1976 dawned, the Ethnic Committee produced another beautiful Lithuanian-American float which was entered in many parades and won many accolades.

It was at this time that the late Honorary member of the K of L, Joseph Yanulaitis, started to attend meetings and introduced the membership to the merits of the Knights of Lithuania. For many months, Joe came all the way from Philadelphia to St. Clair. It was in January 1977 that the Anthracite Council was born.

On St. Casimir's Day 1977, at a Mass concelebrated at St. Casimir's by Rev. Casimir Pugevicius, Rev. Al Bartkus and Msgn. Joseph Neverauskas, the first officers were installed. Pres.: Bernice Mikatavage, V.P. Joseph Martunas, Sec. Anna Klizas Wargo, Treas. Nell Klizas, Fin. Sec. Natalie Yuriconis and Spiritual Advisor Rev. Al Bartkus. Godfather of the council, Joseph Yanulaitis, did the installing. At the banquet, Bernard Terway was Master of Ceremonies and guest speaker was Jack Stukas. Loretta Stukas presented the charter to the President.

As the council grew, the Lithuanian Priests League suggested that it should sponsor the annual Lithuanian Day, which up to 1984 was held at Lakewood Park in Barnesville, PA. When the park closed, the celebration

moved to Rocky Glen Park in Moosic and was cosponsored by Pittston C-143.

Throughout the years, proceeds from the Lithuanian Day celebration were sent to the Lithuanian Committee of the Eucharistic Conference, to Lithuanian Catholic Religious Aid and the St. Casimir's Lithuanian College in Rome.
