
Being that January is also a special month to reflect on Blessed George Matulaitis, I've included one of my favorites from his Spiritual Diary:

St. Francis De Sales Bishop of Geneva, Doctor of the Church, Co-Founder of the Order of the Visitation Patron-saint of Journalists

In all probability when one hears mention of St. Francis, one's thoughts probably recall St. Francis of Assisi or possibly St. Francis Xavier. There are at least ten men with the given name, Francis, that have been formally recognized for their sanctity and canonized by the Roman Catholic Church. In the present Church calendar, January 24 is designated as a memorial to one of these, St. Francis De Sales. His ardent love of God and souls, his great kindliness, rare wisdom and sure teaching made St Francis exceptionally influential in bringing about conversions and in guiding souls in the spiritual life.

He was born at the Chateau de Sales in Savoy on August 21, 1567, the eldest son of a noble family of Savoy. He was educated privately by his mother with the

assistance of a tutor, but at age 14, he left home to study at the University of Paris, which at the time was a major center of learning. Here, he distinguished himself particularly in rhetoric and philosophy. Francis completed his formal education in Padua where he received a doctorate in law at age twenty-four. Returning to his family, he confided to his mother and a few intimate friends his long felt desire to devote his life entirely to God. After overcoming the objections of his father, who still had plans for a secular career for his eldest son,

Francis finally was ordained on December 18, 1593. At this time, the religious condition of the people of the Chablais, on the south shore of Lake Geneva was deplorable due to the inroads made by the Calvinists. In response to the Bishop of Savoy, Francis and his cousin, Canon Louis de Sales. set out in September 1594 to work among these people. He was not welcomed. Rather there were at least two

assassination attempts; he was attacked by hostile crowds which both insulted and beat him. He persevered and more people began to listen to his preaching. Eventually, there was a steady stream of lapsed Catholics seeking reconciliation. In all he is credited with the conver-

sion of between 70 -72,000 people.

During this time, he began writing leaflets setting forth the teaching of the Church. These were later collected and published in one volume.

In 1602, he succeeded to the see of Geneva and took up residency at Annecy. He organized the teaching of the catechism throughout his diocese; at Annecy, he did the teaching himself with great fervor and glowing interest.

He was St. Jane de Chantal's director and with her he founded

the Order of the Visitation; it was for the Visitandines that he wrote his famous "Treatise on the Love of God." Another work, "Introduction to the Devout Life" was written for the spiritual guidance of lay people and has had a deep and lasting influence until our own times.

St. Francis de Sales-died at Lyons in 1622. He was beatified the same year and canonized three years later. He was declared a Doctor of the Church in 1877.

It may be noted that the work of St. Francis de Sales to reclaim souls lost to Calvinism is contemporary with the apparition of Mary at Šiluva in Lithuania with the same objective. We might do well to jointly invoke the help of Mary of Siluva and St. Francis de Sales to inspire the hearts, minds and souls of today's Lithuanians in overcoming the devastation of the modern "heresy" of atheistic communism.

Five Short Years Ago

A look back at recent Lithuanian history January 13, 1991 Bloody Sunday in Vilnius

Just five short years ago, Lithuania filled the front pages of all major newspapers. Americans of Lithuanian heritage were awestruck that all of a sudden everyone knew of our little Eastern European country by the Baltic Sea.

After re-reading newspaper articles I had clipped and saved from that time, I'm convinced it was the determination, stamina and raw courage of the Lithuanian people en masse which triggered the downfall of the Soviet Union.

JAN. 10 - NYPost

"Hundreds of Lithuanian demonstrators, some singing songs and waving nationalist banners, guarded Lithuania's parliament building yesterday after Kremlin troops made a show of force then withdrew."

JAN 11 - NYTimes

"Thousands of Lithuanians surrounded the Parliament building today in a vigil of support, while inside scores of unarmed republican militiamen in black berets kept guard. Lithuanian President Vytautas Landsbergis told reports that Kremlin intervention would be met with widespread civil disobedience.

Soviet army troops using tanks and live ammunition today stormed the Lithuanian press center and a building occupied by the Lithuanian civilian militia, leaving seven people hurt, including an unarmed civilian guard shot in the face by an enraged (Soviet) army colonel who sprayed the press building with machine gun fire after being doused by a firehose."

JAN 12 - Audrius Butkeviucius, the 30 year old doctor who heads the department of Territorial Defense, said he has a force of about 2,500 young men prepared to resist the Soviet Army.

Hundreds of them stood together in the lobby of Parliament today to be sworn in by President Landsbergis with an oath committing them to give their lives if necessary in defense of the republic.

Although they have access to hunting rifles and sporting weapons, those who patrol various Vilnius buildings were armed only with sticks.

Strikes began in several Vilnius factories that make equipment for Soviet industrial ministries, and tonight organizers asserted that 23 enterprises employing about 20,000 people had been idled.

JAN 13 - The National Salvation Committee, a faceless group of Communist Party loyalists, imposed a series of repressive measures on Lithuania today after the Soviet Army, with tanks and machine guns, had seized power for the committee overnight. The

committee ruled today in force but not in spirit, after a night of violence that left 13 dead and more than 100 wounded by bullets or tank treads, according to official reports.


...The democratically elected Lithuanian Parliament, which dared Moscow's wrath last March by declaring independence, refused to surrender, working in its barricaded building in constant expectation that its members would be the next and final target.

As the Parliament worked, ambulances filled with the dead and wounded, raced across the city."

JAN 14 - William Safire, NYTimes

Barricades around the Parliament building were being decorated by each new contingent of guardians. Medals were placed on the effigies. Slogans said, "Violence should not be honored," "Lithuania will be free," "Soviets hands off Lithuania". Photo by V. Korkutis





"The winner of last year's Nobel Peace Prize, the politition who entranced a gullible world with talk of reform and glasnost...has just ordered his tanks into Lithuania to roll over the bodies of patriots resisting his dictatorship."

JAN. 16 - Editorial, NYTimes - Jeri Laber & Catherine Cosman

"The violence in Lithuania differs from previous incidents...The (Soviet) army was especially brazen, acting in full view of the Western press, its violence recorded on cameras. The images are devastating. ...The United States should not support a Soviet government that crushes peaceful protesters under tanks."

In total, 14 young people gave their lives, over 500 were injured physically. No one but those who were there bear the emotional scars.

Because it's been 50 years since Lithuania had last experienced liberty, the transition from that communist state five years ago to a democracy and free market economy has been a very rough one. The greatest work still lies ahead. Armed with the memories of this most recent past, the tough transition may take many years to accomplish, but indeed does not remain an impossible dream. ***

<u>New York City's Our Lady of Vilnius Parish</u> 90 YEARS FOR GOD AND COUNTRY


On October 15, 1995, parishioners of Our Lady of Vilnius in New York City celebrated its 90th Anniversary by hosting a special dinner in the church hall attended by over 150 people. Along with Knights of Lithuania C-12, Our Lady of Vilnius has become a haven for Lithuanians from all waves of immigration, to students and visitors from all over the world. At the special parish dinner, present and past pastors were honored, along with others who made a difference in the life of this little parish at the New York entrance of the Holland Tunnel.

Father Nicholas Langenfeld, Professor Emeritus of Fordham University was a permanent fixture at Our Lady of Vilnius, from 1934 until his death in 1992. He knew every administrator and pastor since the beginning. In 1988 he wrote a short history of our parish and I have used it, with his prior permission, to supplement this history.

One scarcely needs a preface for world famous New York City. business. a communications, and entertainment metropolis, One needs only to recall that New York Harbor houses the prime port of entry for millions of immigrants who caught their first glimpse of the Statue of Liberty, as their first impression of America. This city is home to nearly every known ethnic group. Almost lost in these huge communities is a Lithuanian remnant, a little Lithuanian island in Manhattan - Our Lady of Vilnius parish.

Founding Pastor Father Joseph Seštokas -1909 - 1937

Father Joseph Šeštokas was born on July 4, 1867 in the village of Trilaukis, parish of Pajevonys, Lithuania. Upon arriving in the United States he held a variety of jobs -at the Havemeyer's sugar refinery in Brooklyn, as a long shoreman,



and later 'he opened a small grocery store. With money he saved he entered and graduated from St. John's college in Brooklyn. Feeling the call to the priesthood he entered the St. Bonaventure Seminary in Allegheny, N. Y. Father Šeštokas was ordained in 1903 and his first Mass at St. Mary of the Angels Lithuanian parish in Brooklyn. How ironic that our founding pastor offered Mass at the parish from which many years later we received our beautiful stained glass windows, After serving at St. Francis' parish in Lawrence, MA he returned to Brooklyn in 1904 and decided to organize a Lithuanian church in Manhattan, whose need was so much felt by the Lithuanian population. The project became reality when it was decided in 1905 to start with the construction of a church in Manhattan, at 568 - 570 West Broome Street. At that time this part of Manhattan had a look of a small provincial town, consisting of small two or three storied buildings, one of which serves as our rectory until this day. The rectory was acquired in November 1912. As Father Joseph Šeštokas put it, when he first came to New York, that giant city ended at 14th Street. The first rector met with

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much generosity, good will and unusual readiness for any sacrifice in favor of the new parish and church. Before the church was completed on March 5, 1911, Father Šeštokas ministered the sacraments to the Lithuanians in St. Theresa's church in lower Manhattan. Father Šeštokas endured in his shepherd's duties until 1937, when compelled by diminishing health he had to resign. Rev. Peter Lambe took over.

Fr. Nick added, "In 1934 I joined the faculty of the Fordham University Graduate School of Social Services. I lived in the Leo House, 332 West 23 St, N. Y. City. Rev. Joseph Osterman, the rector of the Leo House, doubled as professor of German at Cathedral College. His friend, Rev. Peter Lamb taught mathematics at the same college and served as administrator of Our Lady of Vilnius until 1944. Priests at the Leo House were often invited to help out in parishes. My very first call to pinch hit came from Our Lady of Vilnius. I liked

the little, cozy church at once. The property of the church was dilapidated since Father Lamb had little time to keep it in good repair. I continued to fill in at Our Lady of Vilnius on rare occasions until 1941 when Father George Gurinskas became administrator and I became a regular supply priest".

Father George Gurinskas, 1941 -1980

Father George Gurinskas, driven to this country by the Communist invasion of Lithuania, was born April 23, 1900, in the village of Galkiemis, parish of Višytis, diocese of Vilka viškis. After having completed his secondary education he entered the Theological Seminary of Vilkaviškis to study for the priesthood. He was ordained June 18, 1926. With the Communist invasion of Lithuania and the various harassment by the enemy forces, it became impossible for him to do his work. Aided by his brothers and sisters residing in New York he reached America's shores on June 13, 1941.

Father Nick continues: "Father George came to Our Lady of Vilnius July 26, 1941, as an associate of Father Lambe until 1944 when he assumed full charge. The parish was reborn. Father George and I became very good friends. The parish was flourishing. The choir loft extended half the length of the church along both walls. On holidays

this loft and the lower church were filled at all seven Holy Masses. The large Heide candy company brought about 30 employees to the holiday Masses. His daughter Constance was one of my Fordham students. At the holiday banquets after the Masses Gerard de Sapio shared the table and entertained us with his lusty singing. He and his son, Carmine, donated the large St. Anthony of Padua painting over the west side altar.

After the Heide factory moved to New Jersey and large commercial buildings replaced the homes of many parishioners, church attendance declined. But Father George hung on. His recreation was cycling in the West side highway, and visiting his Mastic beach home. Here he harvested mushrooms under the oak trees. He gave me jars of delicious canned mushrooms every fall. Father George reached the official retirement age in 1975. But after a lapse of one year, he returned for another four years, 1977 - 1980, as "priest in charge". After

> he fully retired in 1980 a series of part time priests administered the parish.

Father Nick wrote about another pillar of Our Lady of Vilnius:

Vincent K. Mascola, 1945

Vincent is a zealous lay apostle, who has long been active with the parish. In 1945 he became Father George's right hand man. He served as

sacristan, Eucharistic minister, custodian and lector. As Father George's health decreased Vincent's role increased. When Father left in 1980 Vincent became the manager and lay administrator of the parish, president of the church council. He secured the help of several temporary priest administrators. Among them was Father John J. Tomalonis, the poet priest. (Father wrote the beautiful poem to Our Lady of Vilnius printed on page 8). He compiled an excellent history of Our Lady of Vilnius parish to commemorate its 75th anniversary". Father John Bida succeeded him. He stayed for about year.

Rumors began to spread that our parish was about to be sold. The parishioners and the local Knights of Lithuania Council 12 under the leadership of Mid-Atlantic District president Larry Janonis, sprang into action. Petitions and delegations were send to the Cardinal but of no avail. Then a miracle happened. From Rome came Monsignor Ladas Tulaba. A longtime parishioner

Re. John J. Tomalonis With Ecclesiastical Approval: Mar. 18, 1980, NYC

Antanas Dédinas asked monsignor Tulaba to intercede for us to Terrence Cardinal Cooke about our Lady of Vilnius. The Cardinal told the monsignor that he never received any petitions and does not know anything of this situation. When the Cardinal returned to New York a miracle happened. Things turned in favor of the Lithuanians. Monsignor Ladas Tulaba and the faithful parishioners would not give up. A Mass of Thanksgiving was offered and a banquet prepared in honor of our great benefactor, Monsignor Ladas Tulaba.

Father Nick told how we found a new pastor: "Then there began a period when there was no resident priest at all. Vincent and I collaborated to keep the parish afloat. I unlocked the doors of the church for the 8 o'clock weekday Masses. I also celebrated weekend Masses the five o'clock Saturday evening and the 9 o'clock Sunday Mass. This Mass was attended mostly by the Portuguese parishioners. In the absence of a housekeeper, I often "free- loaded" at a nearby restaurant. All the while Vincent was hunting for a permanent priest administrator. He canvassed the entire United States, sending out 25 letters to prospective priests, inviting them to come to our Lady of Vilnius. Finally he succeeded in persuading Father Vytautas Palubinskas to come here from his parish in Paterson, NJ. He was a God send!

Father Vytautas Palubinskas 1982 - 1989

Affectionately known as Father Vito, he breathed fresh life into the parish. He is a great scholar, linguist and philologist with a great love of N.Y. City with its in inexhaustible cultural riches. He at once made many improvements. After redecorating the church he "rescued" the beautiful stained glass windows from Our Lady of Angels Lithuanian church in Brooklyn which was about to close They were created by the Lithuanian artist Jonynas. Father Vito installed six of these

magnificent windows into the church, transforming it into a large "jewel box", gleaming with glorious colors. An electronic bell system was installed which fills the whole neighborhood with sacred music as it calls the faithful to church.

The lower hall was turned into "Father Gurinskas Hall", where the dedicated and talented "Kitchen Brigade" have served many a delicious parish dinner.

When the pastor of Annunciation the Lithuanian parish in Brooklyn Father Jonas

Pakalniškis retired, Father Vito was asked to take over. Father John is also associated with our parish. He was born in Manhattan on January 1, 1915 and baptized in our Lady of Vilnius on January 17th by Father Šeštokas with the name Jonas Leonardas. His parents were married here: Jonas Pakalniškis and Ona Dyglytė.

Father Eugene Savicki 1989 -

When Father Vito left he did not leave us as orphans, we were in the good hands of Father Eugene. Father Nick continues: "The parish has been greatly enriched by the coming of the talented and genial Father Eugene Savicki. In addition to his parish duties he wears many hats and has just as many various degrees. Among them is an RN and a doctorate. Father Eugene was ordained by Bishop Paul Baltakis, OFM on December 6, 1986, at St. Patrick's cathedral in New York. After Father Vytautas Palubinskas departed to serve at Annunciation parish in Brooklyn, Father Eugene became OLV administrator. In the short years Father Eugene, with the help of Tony Zagarino his right hand man and jack of all trades, have accomplished a few miracles. Perhaps the best of them happened in January 1995 when the parish had paid off all its debts and we were in the black.

This is truly a renaissance for our little parish. As Lithuania regained her independence we acquired new members who came over from our Motherland and proved to be active in the parish. joining the Knights of Lithuania and other parish activities. During Father Savickis "reign" we had a few adult conversions, few marriages. On February a Lithuanian - American couple Algis 9, 1994 Jonas and Caren Matyckas went to Raseiniai, Lithuania and adopted two four month old twin girls. Father Eugene baptized them Lina Deanna and Ona Carina. Our talented organist Aldona Kepalaite is an invaluable part of the parish. Not only does she lead the choir during Mass, composes the music for the choir, but after that rushes down to make coffee for our brunch after Mass. Two generous parishioners, Grace and Richard Austin donated the huge painting of our Lady of Vilnius created by the Tadas and Helen Sviderskis. Turn of the century Lithuanians, the World War II arrivals with our Portuguese American neighbors join after the Masses in a beautiful get-together. Invaluable to the parish is

also the local Knickerbocker council of the Knights of Columbus who uses the hall for their meetings and other activities. They are expert repairmen and aid Father Eugene in many ways fixing this 90 year old grand dame, - Our Lady of Vilnius. Last but not least is the parish cat, Jellybean, who deigns us with his presence in the hall on special occasions.

Father Nick continued:

"While serving Our Lady of Vilnius close to 60 years I have learned to love and respect the great Lithuanian people. Their friendliness, hospitality, piety and sturdiness have made a lasting impression on me. As a token of regard the Knights of Lithuania C - 12 based in the parish, have made a honorary Knight of Lithuania. I even know my name in Lithuanian, Nikalojus Ilgalaukis."

Father Langenfeld passed to his eternal reward, and was buried in his home state of Wisconsin. We had a beautiful memorial Mass for him. Amžiną atilsį Father Nick.

Let us thank God the Almighty for sparing this church many times in the past. The construction of the Holland Tunnel in the early twenties, the Great Depression of the early thirties, World Wars I, II, the Korean and Vietnam wars.

These indeed had left Our Lady of Vilnius with scars and loss of membership. But like the Phoenix we are survivors and rise from the ashes awaiting our 100 anniversary. As experience has already proven, we can rest assure that Our Lady of Vilnius - The Worker of the Aušros Vartai will lead us and our future heirs to brighter days in the years ahead.

Did you know?

Lithuania once proclaimed the stork as its national bird. But the white stork in Lithuania, as in other Eastern European countries, has been on the endangered species list. However, in recent years, ornithology organizations are

finding the stork population is slowly coming back. Progress has been made to restore the stork's natural ecosystem and habitat.

The Four Wives of Jogaila King of Poland (1386-1434)

It is interesting to note how Jogaila, the ruler of the Grand Duchy of Lithuania, became involved with the Polish royal family and his eventual marriage to their young queen. Very little mention is made by some historians that he was widowed three times, and that his fourth marriage resulted in his becoming a father at the age of 74.

As an unmarried monarch of a powerful nation, Jogaila attracted the attention of Dimitrii Donskoi, the Grand Prince of Moscow. He offered his daughter Sophie to become his wife, but Jogaila did not accept this proposal. Some

historians speculate that if he had agreed to marry her, would he have converted to the Greek Orthodox faith, or would he have remained a pagan like his father Algirdas?

Poland's problems in 1382 not only influenced the future of Poland, but also that of Lithuania as well.

The King of Poland at that time was also the King of Hungary, Louis d'Anjou. It was his wish that his older daughter Mary occupy the Polish throne after his death, but instead she was crowned the Queen of Hungary. Queen Elizabeth, the dowager mother, sent her younger daughter Hedwig, who was about nine years old at that time, to Poland in her place. This presented a problem for the nobles of Poland.

Hedwig (called Jadvyga in Polish) was engaged at the age of four to Austrian Duke William, and if everything went according to this prearranged plan,



they would someday marry. This did not please the Polish nobility for they did not want the future King of Poland to be of German descent. They turned their attention to Lithuania, which ruled vast Ukrainian lands to the east by the border of Poland, and who also shared the same enemy, the Teutonic Order.

The Poles offered Jogaila a deal. They wanted him to accept the Roman Catholic faith, to marry their queen and become the King of Poland. These negotiations were going on even before Hedwig was crowned Queen of Poland on October 15, 1384 at the age of eleven.

Poland and Lithuania were

in a position that the marriage of Hedwig to Jogaila would benefit both countries.

Poland wanted to end their undesirable union with Hungary. They wanted a king who was not from the German Hapsburg family, who were becoming so powerful in Central Europe that the Polish nobility feared they might someday threaten Poland's political independence.

Jogaila, Lithuania's ruler, was engaged in a bitter struggle for power with his cousin Vytautas, who allied himself with the Teutonic Knights. He felt that if he turned to Poland, his position would be more tenable. Also, the question of Lithuania's acceptance of Christianity would be finally resolved.

Hedwig was reluctant to break her engagement to Duke William and marry a pagan who was almost three times her age. The Polish Council of Lords convinced her that this marriage was in the

best interests of Poland, and stressed its importance to the cause of Christianity.

Preparing for an agreement with Poland, Jogaila made peace with Vytautas. As later events proved, this was but a temporary one. A delegation from Poland arrived at the castle of Kriavas (or Kreva), an important Lithuanian political center once ruled by Algirdas, Jogaila's father. Today, it is a part of Belarus, not far from the present Lithuanian border. As a strange footnote to history, it was here that Grand Duke Kestutis, father of Vytautas, was imprisoned by Jogaila, and where he was murdered under mysterious circumstances.

An agreement was made on August 15, 1385 and became known as the "Act of Kriavas". It was signed by Jogaila in the presence of a number of Lithuanian nobles and Polish delegates. Jogaila agreed to be baptized and accept Christianity together with all his nobles, princes, and the entire Lithuanian nation; he would pay 200,000 Austrian florins to Duke William for Hedwig's breaking their engagement, and that he would unite the Grand Duchy of Lithuania with the Kingdom of Poland under his rule. This was the beginning of the Lithuanian and Polish political and cultural closeness, known in history as a union. The so-called Jagiellonian dynasty, which ruled Poland and Lithuania for about 200 years was a continuation of the Gediminas family.

Jogaila arrived in Cracow, which was the capital of Poland at that time, with his brothers and cousin Vytautas on February 14,1386. The next day he was baptized with the name of Ladislas, but in Polish history he is known as Wladislaw II Jagiello. Polish historians often omitted the fact that he was a Lithuanian.

Jogaila and Hedwig were married on February 18, 1386. He was 36 years of age, while she was a young teenager of 13. He was crowned King of Poland on March 4.

The union was childless for thirteen years until 1399 when Hedwig gave birth, prematurely, to a daughter, Elizabeth Bonifaca. Hedwig died four days later on March 17 and the infant failed to survive a few weeks.

Jogaila was anguished at losing his wife and daughter within such a short period of time.

WHAT POLISH HISTORIANS WRITE ABOUT LITHUANIA

I enjoy reading about Lithuanian history, and I must admit that my sources of information are found in books and publications written by Lithuanian scholars, both here and in Lithuania.

I decided to go to my local public library to see what Polish historians wrote about Lithuania and its rulers. I picked up one book, "The Polish Way" by Adam Zamoyski, and was quite surprised at what the author wrote about the planned marriage of Queen Hedwig to Grand Duke Jogaila. It was not very flattering to him, and here is an excerpt of what he wrote:

"They found a husband for her in Jogaila, Grand Duke of Lithuania. She was so frightened by the prospect of succumbing to this hairy heathen much older than herself that she pleaded with the lords, and was only placated after a favourite young knight of hers, Zawisza of Olesnica, had been sent to inspect Jogaila in his bath-house and reported back favourably on the details of the barbarian's body."

I thought this was an interesting bit of history.

After they were married, the author made this comment: "Poland had linked its destiny to a backward pagan state three times its size, which it never quite managed to control. The benefits to Poland of this arrangement were not always clear."

SCHUYLER SAVINGS BANK Serving Lithuanians And The Community Past & Present

"LET THESE MEN, Your Neighbors, Serve You Thru SCHUYLER B. & L. Ass'n". So read an early handwritten flyer, distributed in 1924 to advertise the opening of the new Schuyler Building and Loan Ass'n., organized to serve the Lithuanian community by providing the Lithuanian immigrants a means of investing



hard-earned savings and borrowing to purchase homes, and thus begin building new lives in the US as viable

and self-sufficient citizens. Today, 71 years later, the institution, now called Schuyler Savings Bank, continues to serve the community and provide not only a place for financial dealings, but also for local people to come for financial advice and friendly help. It also continues to serve the community in other ways, by enhancing the neighborhood and aiding institutions that also serve the community.

Back in 1924, many Lithuanian immigrants, who arrived in the US after World War I or earlier and settled in Kearny, were seeking a better life in a free and independent nation. As new arrivals, they needed help assimilating. Considered "foreigners" by the Kearny community, most of whom at that time were of Scottish origin, Lithuanians were hard pressed to break into the community, to obtain credit or other financial aid. A few innovative Lithuanian immigrants who had overcome the first traumas of immigration decided that, one way or another, they would establish a means for their people to become financially independent.

The idea was good and useful, but its realization was difficult. A significant capital investment was needed to guarantee the new

institution's existence. Few of the new immigrants, whose jobs paid minimum wages at best, had achieved enough financial stability to be able to contribute much to this capital. But some older immigrants who had saved some money willingly and without question brought in larger sums to allow the institution to start. Once by-laws were written and legal matters were settled with the State of New Jersey, the new Savings institution was organized and took its first steps into future success.

The first directors of the Schuyler Building and Loan Association were Lithuanian immigrants, who enjoyed the trust and confidence of the association's first investors. This was important, because in the early days, savings were not federally insured, so confidence in and conscience of the institution were essential. That displayed confidence did not go unrewarded, for even with its difficult beginnings and progression, Schuyler grew, its investors prospered, its borrowers improved their ways of life, and the community enjoyed the fruits of a profitable financial institution catering to its needs.

In its first ten years, by 1934, Schuyler's assets reached \$84,685, a notable achievement, considering that during that time period the nation suffered

the depression, unemployment and other problems. Although the institution also suffered from these woes, it nonetheless maintained its authority and not one investor or borrower suffered financial loss from his/her relationship with Schuyler. By its fiftieth anniversary in 1974, Schuyler assets were over \$9,000,000. Today, its assets are just under \$100,000,000!

In 1978, Schuyler moved into its own building at 24 Davis Avenue. This year, Schuyler expanded into a new, auxiliary building, at 20 Davis Avenue, which now houses the Mortgage Department.

Today, the institution continues to serve the community, which now includes members of many other nationalities. Its directors (now called managers) are still Lithuanian Americans, several of whom are descendants or family members of the original directors. An interesting sidelight of the Schuyler story is that all members of its Board of Managers as well as the Board Attorney are not only Lithuanian Americans, but also active members of the Knights of Lithuania. It is probably the only Bank that can make that Managers include: Chairman John statement! Nakrosis (C-90), Rev. Dominick Pocus (C-90), Peter Gibbas (C-90), George Katilus (C-90), Eleanor Rokas (C-90), Jack Salvest (C-90), and Loretta Stukas (HM, C-29). The Board Attorney is Vincas Vyzas (C-90).

Throughout its history, Schuyler Savings Bank has been closely associated with the local Lithuanian community. Schuyler helped the members of the community become financially stable -- and the community supported Schuyler Savings with its investments and loans. It became a central part and a stabilizing force of the Lithuanian community of Kearny and surrounding areas. Schuyler has contributed to charitable and cultural causes of Lithuanian and civic organizations and the city of Kearny itself. For many years, it was a major contributor to the "Memories of Lithuania" Radio Hour, run by the late Dr. Jack J. Stukas, HM, who was also a director/manager of Schuyler for over 25 years and board chairman many of those The Bank contributed generously to the years. Deborah Hospital Lithuanian Program, to Aid to Lithuania and other causes of the Knights and to the Lithuanian Press. They donated cases of toys to Lithuanian hospitals and orphanages and helped many other causes. The gift of 76 trees planted along Kearny's Davis Avenue by Schuyler this spring added beauty to the area, and brought countless compliments from impressed and grateful clients and local citizens.

Schuyler Bank's most recent project is aiding another Lithuanian institution. Most of Kearny's Lithuanian activity centers around the Lithuanian Roman Catholic Church, Our Lady of Sorrows, just down the road from Schuyler. When members of the parish Holy Name Society, in 1939, established the Lithuanian Catholic Community Center (LCCC) and purchased the building at 6 Davis Avenue, Kearny, Schuyler Savings came to their aid, providing a mortgage, and advertising the club's availability to its clients. The two institutions fed on one another -- LCCC clients brought their business to Schuyler, Schuyler rented LCCC for its social activities and otherwise supported its activities. Together, they continued to enhance the

local Lithuanian community, and encourage its stability.

The Lithuanian Catholic Community Center has been an important part of Lithuanian activity, not only in Kearny but also in the State of New Jersey. Of course, the founders hold their meetings and other events there as do the parish Sodality, Senior Citizens, and others. It is a regular site for Showers, Weddings, and Funeral Luncheons. Council 90 of the Knights of Lithuania considers LCCC as their headquarters, conduct their monthly meetings and most social and cultural functions there.

When Lithuania was in crisis after she reestablished her independence then fought to obtain recognition of that independence, Lithuanians of New Jersey chose LCCC as the headquarters of the new organization "Americans for an Independent Lithuania", which rallied at LCCC weekly, planning demonstrations, letter campaigns, information meetings and other activities to gain USA recognition of their fatherland. The AIL members also used the Club to gather and pack donated clothing, toys and other gifts for Lithuanian children.

LCCC was the site of AIL social events, as well as of socials of the "Memories of Lithuania" Radio Hour, New Jersey Baltics, and others. When Gov. Florio wanted to meet with New Jersey Baltics after the savage Soviet attack at Lithuania's TV Tower, or when Sen. Bill Bradley wanted to tell local Balts about his visit to Lithuania, LCCC was the meeting site.

Recently, LCCC has fallen into bad times. Schuvler Savings Bank managers, many of whom are also involved in helping LCCC recover from its current problems, recognized that to lose the Club would be to deny assistance to the community and so many other causes. Keeping the club alive and enhancing its appearance would work to benefit many. For Kearny, it would revitalize the area, prevent urban blight and beautify the surroundings. For Lithuanian Americans of New Jersey, it would mean saving the only Lithuanian Club remaining in New Jersey. Improving the facility would serve to bring more people and activity to the club, and introduce new clients to Schuyler Savings, thus also helping its growth. The Bank, as a part of its Community Relations activity, has begun providing financing to LCCC to improve its safety features, modernize and add handicap access facilities, and will finance other repairs, and make the Club a shining jewel in Kearny and New Jersey.

Over the years, "people helping people" has been the name of the game for Schuyler Savings Bank. The Bank began its life for the purpose of helping the local Lithuanian community. Its reward was a successful 70+ year life of financial stability and growth. Today, it continues to serve the community not only by providing a safe haven for investment and borrowing, but also by helping keep alive other institutions that service the community and enhance the physical surroundings. The partnership between Schuyler Savings Bank and the Lithuanian Catholic Community Center is just another example of Schuyler's community service --"people helping people" in the finest sense. ***



LITHUANIAN LASAGNE

2 lbs. ground beef
1/2 cup instant rice (or 3/4 cup regular rice) cooked until partially soft
1 cup tomato soup
1 small jar Ragu Sauce (regular or marinara)
2 eggs
2 large onions, coarsely chopped
1 med.- large head of cabbage salt, pepper to taste
Cut cabbage into several

wedges, cover with water and boil until quite soft. Pare thick ribs off leaves when done.

Mix in Ragu and soup.

Mix meat, eggs, seasonings, chopped onions and 1/3 of the sauce. Add rice and mix well. Cover pan with foil and bake 1 1/2 hours at 350 degrees.

When done, lift off one corner of foil and drain off excessive liquid. Return to oven at 200 degrees for 10 minutes, so it settles. Cut into square pieces to serve. Enjoy!

LITHUANIAN VEAL STEW WITH MUSHROOMS & SOUR CREAM Versiena Su Grybais Ir Grietine

2 1/2-3 lb.

stewing veal 3 carrots, cut up 3 potatoes, cubed 2 ribs celery, sliced 1 large onion, chopped 2 Tbsp. butter or oleo 2-4 oz. cans or 1 lb. fresh mushrooms 1 bay leaf salt and pepper to taste 1 pint sour cream

In boiling water, quickly boil off veal, 4-5 minutes. (Do not put meat into water until water is at a full boil.) Remove from heat, drain, and wash veal. Save broth.

In large stew pot, place all ingredients except mushrooms, butter and sour cream. Add just enough water to cover. Cover and cook for 45 minutes or until meat and carrots are nearly done.

Then mix about 1/2 cup of the broth in a bowl (so the cream doesn't curdle). Add sour cream and mix to make a gravy, add to stew with mushrooms and butter and simmer for 15-20 minutes. Remove bay leaf before serving. Serve with fresh rye bread.

OLD FASHIONED APPLE OR BANANA BLEENIES Obuoliniai Blynai


cup milk
 eggs
 Tbsp. oil
 1/2 cup flour
 tsp. vanilla
 1/2 tsp. salt


<u>C-100, Amsterdam, NY</u> Smile & Sparkle



In the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit, we begin the new year! Vardan Dievo Tėvo. ir Sūnaus, ir Šventosios Dvasios pradedame naujus metus!

Dates to remember:

- January 3: On this date in 1958, the first-ever Bishop of the Diocese of Panevėžys died in Vilnius. **Bishop Kazimieras Paltarokas** was also known as the author of a modern Lithuanian-language catechism which has been used universally within Lithuania for teaching prayers, basic Catholic precepts and responsibilities.
- January 6: The 12th Day of Christmas; The Feast of the Epiphany (in the U.S. transferred to the Sunday between January 2 and 8; this year - Jan 7); also known as the Feast of the Three Kings (Magi). Accordings to an old custom in Lithuania, blessed chalk is used to inscribe the initials K + M + B on the doors of their homes by "believers" in honor of the three wise men - Kasparas, Merkelis, Baltazaras.
- January 13 It was on this date in 1991 that the movement toward sovereignty and separation from the Soviet empire reached a fateful culmination in Lithuania at the TV tower in Vilnius. Fourteen civilians lost their lives during the brutal assault by Soviet special forces (OMON) troops backed up by tanks and armed personnel carriers on the unarmed Lithuanian patriots ringing the TV tower precincts. It is a day to pray for the souls of all those who lost their lives fighting for Lithuania's freedom.
- January 27 Archbishop George Matulaitis (Matulevičius) died in Kaunas on this date in 1927. Proclaimed "Blessed" in 1987, the cause for his canonization is still being pursued. We should all be praying for speedy resolution of his cause and his canonization as a saint of the universal Church.
