It is good like this, but exactly so is My Heart in respect to souls which are even ugly, bespattered with paint, filthy. My love always considers them beautiful."



# Rights for Minorities

Dr. Petras Anusas, Consul General of Lithuania, recently wrote a rebuttal to a March 24, 1996 *NY Times* article which cited the Russians as the new "despised" minority in Lithuania. He said that minorities in Lithuania enjoy not only equal political, economic and social rights but also privileges in education, elections and cultural life. Although Russians constitute only 8 percent of the population, they enjoy state-sponsored, Russian-language preschool institutions, schools, newspapers, television and radio.

# Resolution to Amend the Constitution of the Knights of Lithuania

as

# Proposed by the Supreme, Council on March 23, 1996

WHEREAS the Supreme Council has previously established the position of VYTIS business manager, and

WHEREAS the business matters of the VYTIS are of importance to the deliberations of the Supreme Council, and

WHEREAS, the presence of the VYTIS business manager has been essential at Supreme Council meetings,

BE IT RESOLVED by this 83rd National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania that the Knights of Lithuania Constitution be amended as follows:

1. Article X, Section 1, which now reads, in part:

"The Supreme Council shall consist of... district presidents; VYTIS editor; legal advisor,

#### will read:

"The Supreme Council shall consist of... district presidents; **VYTIS** editor; **VYTIS** business manager; legal advisor.

- 2. Article X, Section 2, which now reads, in part:
  - " ... editor and the legal advisor are appointed by the Supreme Council and are nonvoting members of the Supreme Council."

#### will read:

..."VYTIS editor, VYTIS business manager, and the legal advisor are appointed by the Supreme Council and are nonvoting members of the Supreme Council. "

Article XI, Section 8, which now reads, in part:

" The appointed members of the Supreme Council are the VYTIS editor and the legal advisor."

#### will read:

" ... The appointed members of the Supreme Council are the VYTIS editor,

VYTIS business manager, and the legal advisor.

Article XI, Section 8, will have added subsection c. to read;

" c. The **VYTIS** business manager handles the mailing, subscriptions, advertisements and other business matters of **VYTIS**.

(Note: Proposed additions are printed above in italics for clarification.)

# PROPOSED BY-LAW CHANGE:

WHEREAS the Knights of Lithuania within the last year have placed part of its assets with Smith Barney Inc. through Lynx Investment Advisors,

BE IT RESOLVED that the part of ARTICLE XVI, SECTION 2 of the Constitution of the Knights of Lithuania reading:

"These assets are kept in the Knights of Lithuania name in federally insured banking institutions."

be changed to read:

"The Supreme Council may select a corporate institution to handle, invest and maintain the Organization's funds; provided, however, that such institutions must be regulated by the Federal Reserve Board or Securities and Exchange Commission or must provide adequate and sufficient insurance, as determined by the Supreme Council, for all accounts maintained by the Organization with such institutions."

Applications for 4th Degree, along with a check for \$8.00, must be received by the National Ritual Committee before June 30, 1996.

# Displaying the Flags Properly

To all Sergeants at Arms - now that we're nearing Memorial Day, Armed Forces Day, and the summer holidays, you may need a reminder on how to properly display flags.


According to US Flag Etiquette flags when displayed on a church pulpit, the flag of the United States should be flown from a staff placed on the clergyman's right as he faces the congregation. All other flags on the pulpit or chancel should be on his left side.

However when the flag is displayed on the floor of the church, on a level with the congregation, the position of the flag is reversed from that above. It is placed on the right of the congregation, as one faces the pulpit or chancel.

When used on a speaker's platform, the flag should be displayed above and behind the speaker. It should never be used to cover the speaker's table nor to drape over the front of the platform. # "I AM WOMAN"

In a strange way these lyrics from a Helen Reddy song of 1972, which became the anthem of the women's movement, seems quite appropriate for these outstanding women of the 15th century. Although contemporaries, they led distinctly different lives. One, a submissive housewife and mother, had to contend with abusive and brutal husband and sons. The other broke out of the expected submissive role of women, donned men's clothes and armor, and led her nation's army to victory over British forces. Throughout their life despite scorn and abuse, both retained their complete trust in God and followed their conscience wherever it led. One died at age 76, quietly as a nun; the second was burned at the stake as a heretic at age 19. Both were recognized for their heroic virtue and canonized in the twentieth century.



St. Rita of Cascia May 22 Patroness of Impossible Causes

St. Rita of Cascia was born at Roccaporena near Spoleta, Italy, of elderly parents. She was a dutiful and devout child, who early on expressed a desire to become a nun. Her parents, however, had decided to arrange a marriage for her when she was but 12 years of age. She accepted her parents decision as reflecting the will of God. Her parents' choice was unfortunate, her husband proved to be dissolute and violent. For eighteen years. Rita bore her husband's insults and infidelities, as she prayed for his conversion.

There came a time when he repented and begged for forgiveness and was forgiven. Shortly after that, he became embroiled in a fight in a tavern and was stabbed to death. Her sons, who had grown up emulating their father had not disdained showing equal disrespect for their mother. Since they had sworn to avenge their father's death, Rita prayed that God might intervene to prevent them from becoming murderers. Before they could carry out their revenge, both contracted what proved to be a fatal illness. Rita gently nursed them in their affliction while fervently praying for their salvation. In the end, they, too, repented and begged forgiveness.

God, through the prayers of St. Rita, may we learn to bear our crosses in life in the same spirit in which she bore hers.

Amen.

Left alone in the world, Rita decided to fulfill her childhood dream and enter the Augustinian convent at Cascia. The convent, however, had a rule to accept only virgins, so that she was refused entrance. Rita persevered and after several requests, she was finally admitted. She lived out her life in prayer, meditation and obedience. She died on May 22, 1457, but was not canonized until 1900.



St. Joan of Arc May 30 Patroness of France

St. Joan of Arc was born in the obscure village of
Domremy in the Champagne region of France. Her
parents were of the peasant class; they had six children
of which Joan was the youngest. At the age of thirteen,
she experienced the first of her supernatural visions. She
described the first vision as a voice emanating from
nearby and accompanied by a bright light. Later visions
included additional voices and eventually she could see
three of the speakers who were identified as St.
Michael, St. Catherine and St. Margaret.

The initial visions imparted personal messages; but in May 1428, she received her major mission: to save France by aiding the Dauphin Charles to reclaim his kingdom. The Dauphin, the son of the insane Charles VI, had been prevented from assuming the crown by the losses incurred during the Hundred Years War between France and England. Following the instructions from her "voices,"

she went to see the commander of the military forces in the region. At first, she was laughed at and sent back home.

But her "voices" were insistent and she returned and, guided by what she had been told, predicted a serious defeat of the French forces. Later she immediately recognized the Dauphin even though he had assumed a disguise. Having overcome the skepticism of authorities, she was given a small expeditionary force with which she raised the siege of Orleans. This momentous achievement was followed by additional victories. Finally, on July 17, 1429, Charles was crowned Charles VII at Rheims, with Joan standing at his side.

Although the mission, imparted by the "voices," had been accomplished, Joan continued her campaign to drive the English from France. But each of her subsequent battles failed. She was wounded and finally captured by John of Luxembourg, then allied with the English.

After a few months confinement in Burgundy, she was sold to the British, who subsequently summoned an ecclesiastical court to try her for witchcraft and heresy.

Eventually found guilty as a lapsed heretic, she was burned at the stake in Rouen on May 30, 1431. She was nineteen. Thirty years later, at the request of her family, Pope Callistus III appointed a court to review the case. The court found her innocent; it quashed the trial and the verdict with a complete rehabilitation of Joan. She was canonized in 1920.

Lord, You wondrously raised up St. Joan to defend the Faith and her country. Through her intercession, grant that the Church may overcome the snares of her enemies. Amen.

# A Long Overdue Book Your Journey to Success

It is with great enthusiasm that we announce a just released book - Your Journey to Success: A Guide for Young Lithuanians,©1996 by Raimonda Mikatavage. 183 pages, \$14.95 Published by Melodija Books, P. O. Box 689, Hampstead, MD 21074, Fax: 410 374 - 3569.

The author Raimonda Mikatavage, was born in Kaunas Lithuania in 1962. When she was ten, her family, consisting of Father Zigmas Butkus, his wife Dr. Danute, eleven year old sister Loretta, and three year old brother Rimvydas, all defected to the U.S.

Raimonda's three loves - personal development, writing, and Lithuania - have come together in this book; I feel that this book is a valuable starting point of practical advice for young Lithuanians in search of a quality life, especially in these rapidly changing times and in their new capitalistic society.

Although it lacks the detail of a scholarly work and the inspiration of a good self help book and is rather thin on content, I found it to be a pleasure to read. It contains practical advice for young Lithuanians in search of personal success, filled with humorous anecdotes and inspirational quotes. The author's respect and love for the people of her homeland is quite evident and communicates well.

The soft cover book, features the author on the cover with the title in the colors of the Lithuanian flag - yellow, green and red. The book is divided into 5 chapters /I - You; II - You and God; III - You and Others; IV - You and Work, V - You as a Leader. It ends with a poem by Raimonda, written when she was eleven years old in Lithuanian - Mano Tevyne, and a questionnaire: What do you think of this book?

Our organization's past Supreme Council president Anna Klizas Wargo, had this to say," As a longtime social worker I find the authors insight on today's problems valuable not only to Lithuanian youth, but to Americans as well." Svajūnas Nekrašas, a Fulbright scholar from Lithuania

remarked: "A remarkably personal and articulate analysis of the importance of our values, beliefs and choices. A diary that is too good to be kept secret."

Some little gems from the humor break: Sound really does travel slower than light. The advice parents give to their 18-year olds does not reach them until they are 40. How do you like my dress? It reminds me of water. You mean it is seethrough? No, it has no taste. Or some - food for thought: The proper function of a man is to live... not to exist. - Jack London.

May I urge you to order a few of these books for your council and use them during the meeting. We promise you will enjoy them and enrich your meetings. It would also make a wonderful gift for an American - Lithuanian or anybody.

# WE HEARD THE PEWITS CRY GYVI! GYVI!

Many years ago, we sailed from US to visit our grandparents in Lithuania. While we were there, little brother and I, often heard the screams of the pewit (pempe) and mother - with her keen imagination - interpreted their

screams in this way: beg-kit beg-kit na-mo vai-kai GYVI! GYVI! (run-run-home-children ALIVE!)

We believed all the interpretations offered by those older, wiser and more knowledgeable in bird lore. Time and again we searched for them in the meadows and since we were restricted to creep and search, our efforts went woefully unrewarded. So we pressed for satisfaction. "They are there!" insisted our new countrymen, aunts and cousins. "They are there! But young Americans can't see them!"

When other birds called out loud and clear: kukka-cot kuk-ka-cot-



vai-kai-jau-pa-vaaaaaa-sa-ris (children now it is spring time), we knew and let everyone know that Jau gegutes kukuoja (now the cuckoos call) enjoying their cheery cuckoos, but they were more often heard than seen. When we would ask to be shown the trees in which they nested, the answers would be in "Mikolojaus Dvare" (Michael's Manor). "Where

was the manor?" We were favored with smiles, and the directions were - "Toli. Toli.( Far. Far.)" We never saw the manor, nor heard it mentioned in their conversations of events. In time we began to think for ourselves and began to interpret some of the answers to be 'made up'.

As for the popular storks (garnai), they were very visible nesting on the chimneys, but their calls were disappointing and not memorable. They did not chuckle like the gegutes nor scream like the' cheerful pempes. They were just huge and handsome.

# "GYVI! GYVI!"

The little bird perches on the mound, its crest standing up. It flies away. Quickly it hides among last year's browned meadow grasses, crest still upright. Suddenly, it rises striking the air with broad flapping wings rising still higher in the air, over the meadow and ploughing, turns over and shrieks in a shrill triumphant call: "GYVI! GYVI!"

Even the snipe hearing the pewit's scream begins to chirp flamboyantly, more

cheerfully. The pewit turns in the air, the air is so clear, so blue. The pewit can't just calmly fly. She rises, dives, rises again, always turning. Near the meadow, on moist land, golden bridges of marsh marigolds bloom. A real Spring banquet for all the goatsuckers and finches. If a cloud appeared then cold slushy weather would come. The pewit then huddles somewhere next to a hillock and waits for sunny days. When spring's sun shone the pewit's call was heard by all. However, not everyone sees the pewit, but everyone hears her and everyone praises her. The snow just sprinkled and the first leaves from the black earth came up.

Where the pewit shrieks there it will nest. It is now the middle of April. A nest is necessary to set the eggs in the meadows hillock. The pewits like the damp meadows best, but also will nest in the smaller marshes, or sometimes, they will weave a nest on the ploughed land. Having found a satisfactory hollow, the cock sits into it, turns, and with his chest he settles it a little, smoothens it out somewhat and lines it with dried vetch. This is how their nest is woven.

The female lays four eggs in the nest. The eggs in the nest are nicely arranged, all sharp points toward the center. If someone touches and leaves them in disorder, the pewit, upon her return, instantly notices the disarrangement. All eggs are turned and put back in order and only then will she sit upon them again. These eggs are beautifully colored and camouflaged, so one must be careful while walking, you could step on them, accidentally. What trouble, what anxiety, until the little pewits break out of their eggshells.


Often if a man walks near the nest, or a dog runs by, or a crow flutters above, carefully investigating his next meal, the pewits rise to attack the enemy - they plunge - they shriek and protest. When the little birds hatch from the eggs they are covered with dark yellow fluff. A little downy ball with a small beak, with no sign of a crest on its head. When they hear the elder pewits cry of alarm, they crowd around a hillock, snuggle into a small hole in the ground and just melt into it. If only one pair of pewits nest in the area, there is trouble. But, hearing the cry of alarm, other pewits arrive flying from their nests to help drive the crow away.

With many worms, many kinds of insects, caterpillars, the pewits rear their chicks until they sense it is time to leave.





# KLAUSIMAI Questions

To form a GENERAL QUESTION in Lithuanian you do not have to change anything in the sentence. In order to ask a question, you have to use the verbal intonation of English general questions. For instance, in "Do you speak Lithuanian?" you may add the word ar (if, whether) or gal (perhaps, would you). Here are some examples:

(Tu) supranti Lietuviškai? - Do you understand Lithuanian?

(Compare: Tu supranti Lietuviškai. - You understand Lithuanian.)

Tu gyveni Amerikoje? - Do you live in America?

Norite pailsėti? - Do you want to rest?

Ar norite valgyti? - Do you want to eat?

Gal galite man padėti? -Could you help me?

Gal norite kavos? - Would you like some coffee?

Possible answers to a general question:

taip - yes, ne - no, ačiū - thank you, labai ačiū - thank you very much

Note: Unlike in English, AČIŪ can be used both when you accept an offer or refuse it.

Gal norite paragauti lietuviško vyno? - Would you like to taste Lithuanian wine?

Taip, noriu. Labai ačiū. Yes, please. Thank you very much.

Ar norite sriubos? - Would you like some soup?

Ne, nenoriu. Aš ne alkanas. No, thank you. I am not hungry.

SPECIAL QUESTIONS begin with an interrogative word, but htere are no other changes in the sentence. The most often used

# LITHUANIAN NAPOLEON TORTE

1 pound lightly salted butter, softened

4 cups all-purpose flour 1 pint dairy sour cream

#### FILLING No. 1:

3/4 cup sugar

5 tablespoons all-purpose flour (or 2 1/2 tablespoons cornstarch)

1/4 teaspoon salt

2 cups milk

4 egg yolks, beaten

1 teaspoon vanilla

#### FILLING No. 2:

2 cans (14 ounces each) sweetened condensed milk (not evaporated)

6 egg yolks, well beaten

2 teaspoons vanilla

1/2 pound butter, softened

In a large mixing bowl, cut butter into flour for pie dough. Blend into sour cream. Form into 11 or 12 balls. Cover and refrigerate overnight. At baking time, let dough stand at room temperature for 15 minutes. On a lightly floured board, roll out each ball to an almost wafer-thin

round. Fit each round into an ungreased

12-inch pie pan; prick all over. Bake at 350 degrees 4 to 5 minutes or until lightly browned. Cool. When all rounds are baked and cooled, place

one on a flat platter and thinly spread with either filling. Continue stacking and filling until one pastry layer remains. With a dull knife, trim off irregular edges to make torte smoothly round. Frost top and sides with remaining filling. Crush remaining pastry layer and completely cover torte with Refrigerate crumbs. several hours. Torte yields 32 servings; cut a circle in center, then cut entire torte into 4 quarters; center yields 4 pieces, each outer quarter can yield 7.

FILLING No 1: in top of a double boiler, mix together sugar, flour and salt. Gradually add hot milk, stirring constantly. Cook and stir over simmering water until thickened. Pour a small amount over egg yolks, mix thoroughly, then return to pan; cook and stir 2 minutes. Remove from heat and stir in vanilla. Cool.

FILLING No.2: in top of double boiler, over hot but not boiling water cook sweetened condensed milk, stirring frequently, until thickened, about 30 minutes. Add eggs slowly, in a thin stream, stirring constantly. Cook and stir 10 more minutes. Chill. In a large mixing bowl, beat

butter until fluffy. Slowly beat in chilled milk mixture.

Note: for each torte, use either one of these fillings but not both.

#### RASPBERRY TORTE

CAKE

1 1/3 cups flour

1 teaspoon baking powder

1/3 cup sugar

1/2 cup butter or margarine, softened

1 egg

1/4 cup seedless black rasp. jam

Heat oven to 350 degrees. Grease a 9 inch springform pan. In a medium size bowl, cut or process the butter into the dry ingredients. Mix in egg until moistened. Press dough on the bottom and sides of the pan. Spread jam over the dough and chill while making the filling.

FILLING:

1/2 cup butter or margarine

2/3 cup sugar

1/2 teaspoon almond extract

2 eggs

1 cup almonds, ground or chopped

1/4 cup seedless black raspberry jam

Cream butter and sugar. Add vanilla extract and eggs, beating after each addition. Stir in the almonds. Spoon filling over the cake layer. Bake for 50 minutes or until golden brown. Carefully remove the sides from the springform pan. Spread the remaining jam over the cooled cake.

GLAZE:

1/2 cup powdered sugar 2 teaspoons lemon juice

In a small bowl, blend sugar and juice until smooth. Drizzle over torte. Serves 10.







# LITHUANIAN BAKED BEER AND THE SMITHSONIAN

Tom Cizauskas, son of Gene and Al of Council 142, spoke November 2 at the Smithsonian, Washington's renowned historical and cultural institution. Tom, a graduate of the Siebel Institute of Chicago, the MIT of the science and art of brewing, lectured on beer as the liquid history of mankind, before 250+ beer enthusiasts. He traced its origin to the shores of the Baltic where it appeared as baked beer or "keptinis alus," the fortuitous result of Lithuanian women baking bread.

While engaged in this domestic chore, Lithuanian women noticed a yeasty residue in the batter they prepared for baking bread. Being both imaginative and innovative, they began to experiment by adding various grains and water to the bread to produce what turned out to be a most unusual beverage. Sipping their handiwork, these early brew meisters liked what they had by chance concocted, not least for the pleasant glow it imparted. So popular did baked beer become that it spilled over into neighboring countries like Poland with the same enthusiastic approval rating.

The intriguing story of Lithuanian baked beer was one of a number of side trips on which Tom took his rapt audience during a tour d'horizon of the liquid history of beer. While doing so, he also gave a detailed critique of American specialty brews largely hand crafted in the small breweries proliferating throughout the U.S. During the short span of the past five years, Tom maintained that Americans have changed the way they drink and think about a beverage that is now rivaling wine among a growing number of discerning drinkers.

As a result, professional beer connoisseur's in this country are today extolling the good qualities of Lithuanian baked beer. One of them hailed it as a classic thirst quencher and dismissed some of the popular American beers as no more than "lawnmower" brews. He also came upon a Polish cook book containing the recipe for Lithuanian cooked beer while on a beer hunting trip to eastern Europe. He had the recipe translated and featured in an American trade journal. Here are a few of the steps for brewing this ancient and exotic beer to give VYTIS readers a hint of its very special qualities:

".....coarse ground rye and oats are mixed with water and clean straw to form a still dough that is kneaded. Loaves are formed and baked until crusty and then broken up and added to a barrel of hot water with hops and linden blossoms added. The resultant mash is then covered and allowed to sit until fermentation takes place."

Folklore has it that Lithuanians drank "keptinies alaus" from the cask which leads me to speculate whether they might also have amended the Our Father slightly: "Duok mums šiandien duonos ir keptines alaus. (Give us this day our daily bread and baked beer.)"

To which I would respond with a hearty "Amen."


# We Remember Fr. Vincent J. Parulis

He later received a doctorate in philosophy from Cracow University. He died on May 5, 1485. A life of extraordinary piety led to his beatification in 1544.
- May 5 Mother's day in Lithuania.
- May 12 Mother's Day in the USA
- May 18 Armed Forces Day in the USA
- May 26 Pentecost Sunday Sometimes referred to as the Birthday of the Church.
- May 27 Memorial Day. Inaugurated in 1868 on May 30 as a date to decorate the graves of the Civil War dead, it has come to be a day of commemoration of all dead and has been transferred to the last Monday in May. Also known as Decoration Day.
