
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


to my fellow knights:

Dear Editor:

It is with interest that I read the Guest Editorial in the April 1996 issue of the VYTIS, "WHATEVER HAPPENED TO BLESSED GEORGE MATULAITIS?" What Dalia Bulvicius writes is, unfortunately, true. Many have "closed" the books on Blessed George and do not even speak of canonization.

The Knights of Lithuania worked very hard and well for the beatification cause, collecting signatures and spreading the case.

Beatification is not the end, but a step to canonization. One more miracle, approved by the medical authorities of the Church, through the intercession of Blessed George, is still needed. Favors received through his intercession should also be recorded and sent to either the Vice-Postulator or to the General Postulator in Rome.

I, therefore, salute Annunciation Parish in Brooklyn, N.Y. for its initiative in "reopening" this matter among the people.

In honor of my hero father...

THE PEN IS MIGHTIER THAN THE SWORD

Once again we are celebrating the beautiful month of June. It is this month which is especially sad for the Lithuanian nation. All Lithuanians remember the terrible June days when thousands of their countrymen were deported to the wilds of Siberia to suffer and die.

But June is also a happy month. We have Fathers' Day when we honor our Dads. But for me Fathers' Day holds no joy. I was four years old when my father, Vytautas Bulvičius, was taken away and shot. He was born on May 5, 1908 in the town of Bartininkai, the district of Vilkaviškis and would have been 88 years old this year. He was one of seven children. His father Juozas Bulvičius, a prosperous farmer and community leader, saw to it that all the children received a college education, which in those days was rare. Juozas was a former book smuggler, and books were held in high esteem in the Bulvičius family.

Vytautas Bulvičius was a very bright and industrious fellow. His patriotic family was a perfect fertile field in which to nurture his love for his country and fellow Lithuanians. He finished the military academy in 1924 at the age of 16. At the age of 25 he was already a captain in the army. At 30 - a major serving in the Lithuanian equivalent of the Joint Chiefs of Staff. Vytautas wrote dozens of manuals about military warfare. He always stressed that to be a good soldier one had to have a well rounded education. He believed that the pen is mightier than the sword.

In 1940 when the Soviet Union invaded Lithuania, Vytautas with other fellow officers secretly organized the Lithuanian Activist Front. He believed that war between Germany and Russia was inevitable and started to plan an insurrection. He kept in contact with Lithuanians serving in the Soviet army and supplied them with vital information for the upcoming uprising. The insurrection took place on June 23, 1941, and lasted for a brief period before the Nazis crushed it. Father did not witness this brief glimmer of

freedom for which he worked so hard. On June 8, he and his fellow officers

were arrested and transported to Gorky prison, where they were brutally tortured, but he never revealed the names of his co-conspiritors. Father's face was so swollen that his closest friends could not recognize him. On November 26th, the military tribunal in Moscow found Vytautas Bulvičius and seven others guilty of treason and sentenced them to death. He was executed on December 18th, 1941. Father was 33 years old then, mother was 28, my sister Laima -6 and I was 4.

I can hardly remember Dad, only that whenever I saw him he had a book in his hands. But he left us something precious of himself - the love of our native language. Therefore it is not surprising that both Laima and I have for years worked in the Lithuanian newspaper field.

Now that Lithuania is independent again, I wonder if it is the kind of Lithuania for which Father died. I doubt it. It is independent, but is it free? At the opera, while listening to Giussepe Verdi's "Aida" one of Aidas phrases comes to mind which reminds me of Dad: "O patria, o patria quanto mi costi!" - "O my native land - how much are you costing me!" For Vytautas Bulvičius there was no cost involved. He gave his all to Lithuania - including his life.

A Tribute to Tom

Thomas Francis Bruzga was born May 21, 1932 in DuBois, Pennsylvania which made him 63 years old when he died on April 11, 1996. He was married to Jeanne Brown who died June 12, 1994. Tom was a member of St. Joseph's Roman Catholic Church in DuBois, the Lithuanian Independent Club in DuBois and the Knights of Lithuania C- 86. He was the 1st Vice President of the Supreme Council, and members shared how they remember Tom:

"My first meeting with Tom was at the Chicago Convention in 1994 where we were both elected to office. He would be my assistant and First Vice President. I'll remember him for his candor blended with good humor. If I had promised to call him on K. of L. business, and I was a day late, he'd remark jokingly, "I waited. You didn't call!"

I knew he accepted me as a friend when after our second Supreme Council meeting, he shook my hand and said, "You run a fine meeting."

He was eager to do his job, eager to please and seemed to relish the difficult assignments that I had asked him to do. Most of all, he was understanding, but had his opinions which I'd admired.

His last Supreme Council meeting in Pittsburgh in March ended on a happy note as we teased him about his red Corvette with the license plate, "Su Diev". Little did we realize Tom was saying goodbye...go with God. Thanks, Tom"

"My first meeting with Tom was in 1981, when he came from DuBois to attend a Supreme Council meeting in New Jersey. He was the new MCD President, and it was my first meeting as National President. When he asked us to suggest a motel for the night, my husband, Jack and I insisted he stay with us. Tom's comment..."Only the K of L. would treat him as a long lost cousin." Our response..."isn't that what the K. of L. is all about?"

My last meeting with Tom, was in Pittsburgh when I asked him why his spiffy red sportscar bore a license plate that read "Su Diev" - a Lithuanian good-bye! His response -- "I just wanted to be



different, and besides, it's not 'Good-bye', just 'God be with you!'

For all of us in the K. of L., it was indeed a sad good-bye, for two weeks later Tom was with God! We will miss this gracious, happy, beautiful gentleman, and pray God grants Tom peace and happiness in a new life"

"I remember Tom Bruzga as a take charge person, a good organizer and motivator. One of my first remembrances of Tom, about 1973, was his part in organizing a bus trip from our church in DuBois to Lithuanian Day in Eastern PA in August. It was my first Lithuanian Day and I had such a good time that I made more trips there. His organizing efforts were continual. I had made a point in the past few years to send Tom information on the Pittsburgh Folk Festival, which I'd hoped he could convince some of his friends from DuBois to attend. I could tell Tom was disappointed each year when I asked him afterwards why no one was interested. It took a few years, but Tom surprised me last year by organizing a group of over 20 members to travel to Pittsburgh in vans to attend our "Lithuanian Day".

get Actions Speak & Words Teach

A man of words and a man of action, St. Anthony was a humble Franciscan Friar, whose influence can still be observed 800 years after his birth. He was a gifted and immensely popular orator and an effective advocate for social justice champion-

ing the disadvantaged and dispossessed. may have been the original source of that well known quote, "Actions louder than speak words." It was in a sermon he preached on the feast of Pentecost, in which he said, "The man who is filled with the Holy Spirit speaks in different languages. The different languages are different ways witnessing to Christ, such as humility, poverty, pa-

tience and obedience; we speak in those languages when we reveal in ourselves these virtues to others. Actions speak louder than words; let your words teach and your actions speak. We are full of words but empty of actions."

Popularly known also as St. Anthony of Padua because of his long and final residence in that Italian town, St. Anthony was actually born in Lisbon, Portugal, in 1195 as Ferdinand de Bulhoes. His father was a knight in the court of King Alfonso II of Portugal. His

parents entrusted his education to the priests, Canons of St. Augustine, at the Lisbon cathedral; and, at age fifteen he joined that order at the chapter house near Lisbon. To avoid the distractions of friends and visitors, he requested a transfer to the Augustinian priory at

> Coimbra, Portugal, where he completed his preparations priesthood and ordained in 1219. While at Coimbra, he witnessed the solemn transfer of remains of five martyrs from Morocco. This experience motivated him to want to pursue a missionary life and potentially earn a martyr's crown. Unable to accomplish this end as an Augustinian Canon,

he requested and was granted a transfer to the Franciscan Order of Friars Minor. Upon entering the Franciscan community, he took the name Anthony.

Shortly thereafter, Anthony embarked for Morocco to preach to the Moors; however, his stay was shortened by a serious illness which forced him to return to Spain. Enroute, violent storms blew the ship far off course so that eventually it reached port in Sicily.

Having learned that a Franciscan

General Chapter meeting was about to convene, Anthony went to the mainland and travelled up to Assisi both to attend the Chapter and to meet St. Francis. At the end of the meeting, he received an assignment to a hermitage at San Paolo. It so happened that an ordination took place at a nearby town but no one came prepared to deliver the homily. last resort they asked Anthony to give the sermon. He accepted the task without enthusiasm but once he began to speak, his natural eloquence added to the depth of his knowledge of scriptures amazed all in attendance. In due time, he was recalled from his hermitage and assigned duties as an itinerant preacher. For the next several years he travelled across Italy, France and Spain with ever increasing success and fame.

He was short in stature and tended toward corpulence. Yet he had an attractive, magnetic personality that drew people to him. Wherever he went, he appeared to radiate holiness; crowds flocked to see and hear him. Hardened criminals, lapsed believers and heretics were converted and brought to reconciliation.

After the death of St. Francis, Anthony was recalled to Italy. Shortly thereafter, he took up residence in Padua where he had worked earlier and was well regarded. He devoted himself to preaching, attacking corruption and wrongdoing wherever he saw them. He completely reformed the city; he worked to

abolish debtor's prisons; and, helped the poor. (Even, today, alms distributed through the Franciscans are called St. Anthony's Bread.) Exhausted by his labors and plagued by dropsy, he became seriously ill and died in 1231.

He was 36 years old.

Even during his lifetime, Anthony was regarded as a legendary hero and many striking miracles were attributed to him. At one point, a visitor reported observing Anthony in a rapturous state holding the child Jesus in his arms. (Thus he is usually depicted in art as holding the Holy Child in his arms.) He is said to have been instrumental in the return of a psalter that had been stolen and is now widely invoked for the return of lost articles.

He was canonized within a year of his death; and, declared to be a Doctor of the Church in 1946. He is the patron of the poor For us the relevance of St. Anthony is his fidelity to the gospel, his zeal in dialoguing with those in error and his loving concern for the poor.

"Almighty God, you have given St. Anthony to your people as an outstanding preacher and a ready helper in time of need. With his assistance may we follow the gospel of Christ and know the help of your grace in every difficulty."

ALEXANDER AKULE CANDIDATE FOR HONORARY MEMBERSHIP



His council and district members look upon him as a "beacon leading us to emulate his zeal, his energy and is loving dedication to God and Country." ALEXANDER AKULE, a dedicated, loyal, active and energetic Knight since joining the organization in 1947, has truly earned that description for his many activities in the organization, the Lithuanian community, and his parish. His efforts for and belief in the values represented by the Knights of Lithuania have encouraged members of his C-17 to participate greatly in all of the K of L activities and those of St. Peter's Lithuanian parish in South Boston.

Alex Akule was born and raised in Lynn, a city north of Boston. He became a member and active officer of the Lithuanian Club in Lynn and continues to be involved. He served with distinction in the US Army during World War II, principally in Europe. After his release from the service, Alex met his future wife,

Patricia Zibutis, at a good Lithuanian polka dance.

Pat encouraged Alex to join the Knights of Lithuania in 1947. Since then, he has actively participated in K of L activities and for his efforts, he received the Fourth Degree in 1980. Although he now lives in Saugus, 15 miles north of Boston, he and Pat are ever present at all K of L and parish functions. Most often, both are willing volunteers for committees. Their presence is felt at Parish annual reunions, St. Casimir's Day Communion Breakfasts, and Senior Citizen parties.

Loyalty to and love of Lithuania are truly a big part of Alex's life. When representatives and supporters of the Lithuanian community attend ceremonies in recognition of Lithuania's Independence Day on Feb. 16 and the State House and City Hall, Alex is proudly present.

Alex has held many offices and chaired many committees in his local council. He served as C-17 Seniors President, and aided in a smooth transition when C17 Regulars and Seniors merged. He was vice-president of the merged C-17 in 1975, 1977 and 1980, and trustee from 1970 to 1972. He has been C-17 President since 1981.

Alex has been greatly active in the New England District as well. He served as Third Vice-President in 1973-74, advanced to Second Vice-President in 1976 and held that office until 1978. When NE District President Al Jaritis died suddenly, Alex took over the duties of District President and was elected to serve in that capacity for three consecutive terms. While President of the District, he oversaw the process of updating the District By-Laws and (see continued on pg. 14)

ARCHBISHOP PAUL C. MARCINKUS CANDIDATE FOR HONORARY MEMBERSHIP

Many vears ago. the MOST REVEREND, ARCHBISHOP PAUL C. MARCINKUS, was proposed, in Committee, for Honorary Membership in the Knights of Lithuania, to honor him for attaining the high rank in the hierarchy of the Church as Governor of the Vatican and right hand man of the Holy Father. Because he was in Rome, it was deferred until such time as he would return to the US. Now that he has returned to the US and is living in Sun City, Arizona, it is our privilege to confer on him the status of Honorary Member of the Knights of Lithuania. as an "outstanding Catholic Lithuanian whose achievements for God and Country have been preeminently outstanding and exemplary of the ideals of the organization."

Archbishop Marcinkus was born in Cicero, Illinois in 1922. He was educated at St. Anthony Lithuanian R.C. Elementary School, Quigley Preparatory Seminary, University of St. Mary of the Lake (Mundelein Seminary) in Illinois, then the Pontifical Gregorian University in Rome and Pontifical Ecclesiastical Academy (the Vatican Diplomatic School). His education earned him a Master of Arts Degree, a Licentiate in Sacred Theology, and a Doctorate in Canon Law.

Paul Marcinkus was ordained a priest in May, 1947. He was named Titular Bishop of Orta in December, 1968, and Titular Archbishop of Orta in September, 1981. His priestly assignments are most impressive! They include Associate Pastor of St. Christina and member of the Marriage Tribunal in the Archdiocese of Chicago, Vatican Secretariat of State, 1952 to 1968, and Vatican Ambassador



to Bolivia and Canada. From 1962 to 1965, he served as Director of the American Bishops' Council Office.

From 1964 to 1982, Archbishop Marcinkus organized numerous Papal Trips and served as an unofficial "body guard" for Popes Paul VI and John Paul II. It was indeed exciting to see this tall, strong Lithuanian American clearing the way for the Holy Father and making sure the Pontiff was on schedule, especially when Pope John Paul II visited the US in 1979 and so many Knights all over the country took part in the Papal audiences.

Archbishop Marcinkus served as Secretary and President of the Institute for Religious Work from 1968 to 1990, and was Pro-President of the Pontifical Commission of Vatican City State (Governor or Executive Officer) from 1981 to 1990. The Archbishop retired in October 30, 1990 and now resides in Sun City, Arizona, where he has been since January, 1991.

Lithuanians from all over the world (and among them many K of L-ers) witnessed first hand Archbishop Marcinkus' influence in the Vatican during the blessing of the Lithuanian Martyrs' Chapel in the crypt of St. Peter's

Basilica, in 1970. Without question, he was the master planner of the Blessing Festivities. He kept the gathered Lithuanians informed of what was to be and cleared the way for Pope Paul VI to reach the Chapel without problems. He presented the official greeting and a gift of an amber "Rupintojelis" to the Pontiff on behalf of the world's Lithuanians, and after His Holiness' response, again cleared the path as the frail Pope passed through the crowd greeting those gathered for the event.

During another outstanding Vatican event for Lithuanians, the Knights were specially honored to meet the Archbishop personally in his office. It was the 500th Anniversary of St. Casimir's death, in 1984, when Pope John Paul II invited Lithuanians to participate in a special Mass at St. Peter's Basilica in St. Casimir's honor. Some of the Knights attending, including several Supreme Council members, were received by the Archbishop between

festivities, and presented him with a wood crosier, specially carved for him by K of L'er George Mikolaitis. Again, Archbishop Marcinkus responded warmly to this expression of our respect, talking of his love of his Lithuanian roots and heritage.

The most recent Vatican event for Lithuanians, the 600th Anniversary of Lithuanian Christianity, Lithuanians were again treated to warm greetings by the Archbishop, who again had much input into the planning of the events.

While at the Vatican, Archbishop Paul Marcinkus used his influence to help Lithuanian causes, and was especially kind to members of the Knights during their pilgrimages and visits. We thank Archbishop Marcinkus for his care and are indeed privileged to confer on him the status of Honorary Member of the Knights of Lithuania.

Lithuanian American Religious Orders and how they came into being

The Sisters of Jesus Crucified

Editor's note: This is the first in a series of Lithuanian American Catholic religious orders, how each started and evolved. Because this year's National Convention will be held in Brockton, MA, home of the Sisters of Jesus Crucified, we thought we'd begin with this order.

Lithuanian Religious Communities were established in the United States by Divine Providence, not by chance. The need for them arose when Lithuanian immigrant priests established national parishes and schools. These priests fled Lithuania in the late 19th century and early 20th century to avoid suppression and oppression of their Catholic faith. They were determined to keep the Catholic faith, Lithuanian language and culture alive in the colonies established by immigrants from the fatherland.

Julius Urbanavičius came to the United States from Lithuania in 1902 and settled in Scranton, Pa. He grow aware of the needs of the Lithuanian immigrants particularly in the mining areas. Following his ordination as a Passionist priest in 1915, Julius (now named Father Alphonsus Maria, C.P.) directed his indefatigable missionary labors among the Lithuanian immigrants.

The sad plight of the aged and orphans inflamed him with a burning desire to establish a Community of Sisters to care for them. He planned on forming a Lithuanian branch of a well established community. The Sisters of St. Dominic whose novitiage is in Amityville offered their services. Bishop McDonnell, Bishop of Brooklyn, approved of the plan.

Anna Stanaitis of South Boston, Mass. and Mary Bugaliskis of Brooklyn, N. Y. were the first candidates. They received the Dominican Habit and began their novitiate in 1920. They applied themselves assiduously to religious life in order to

render service to the poor, aged and needy. However, difficulties arose and the project had to be abandoned. An entirely new community had to be established.

Difficulties had to be surmounted in order to begin a new Community. Since the Sisters of St. Casimir and Sisters of St. Francis were already established, many felt there was no need for another Lithuanian Community. The plan, therefore, received little or no cooperation.



Father Urbanavičius was undaunted. He know that the two existing Lithuanian Communities were engaged in education. The few in numbers in both Communities did not allow for other works of mercy.

As in the past, Bishop Michael Hoban once again came to the help of the Lithuanian people. He gave his full approval to Father Alphonsus Urbanavičius and he offered his diocese once again to cradle a new foundation of Religious Sisters.

Father Alphonsus turned to Mt. St. Mary's in Scranton. Mother M. Berchmans at Mt. St. Mary's was well acquainted with Lithuanian girls since she served as Mother and Guide to the Sisters of St. Casimir. She knew how to help Father Alphonsus and his proteges to attain their desired goal.

In 1921, the two Lithuanian novices left the Dominican Novitiate in Amityville and entered Mt. St. Mary's in Scranton, Pa. They received a warm welcome from Mother M. Berchmans and the IHM Community.

Since Father Alphonsus wanted his now Congregation to become Passionists like himself, he sent two candidates to a Passionist Community

in Bolton, England to be trained.- His plan did not succeed; both candidates returned to Mt. St. Mary's after one year in England.

During the training of the postulants at Mt. St. Mary's, Father Alphonsus succeeded in locating property in Elmhurst, Pa. to establish a motherhouse for his Community. With the aid of Msgr. Dennis Kane and Mr. John Buckley, he purchased the Wehrum property with 144 acres of land and several wooden buildings. Father Alphonsus named it St. Mary's Villa.

In October 1923, the postulants from Mt. St. Mary's arrived at the new motherhouse in Elmhurst, Pa. Mother Monica, I.H.M. came later as their director. Shortly after the postulants arrived in Elmhurst, they were asked to teach Catechetical classes in Pennsylvania and in a newly established parish school in Massachusetts. Although the purpose for the establishment of the

Congregation was to work among the aged and orphans, the Sisters accepted both offers.

Father Alphonsus had relatively little difficulty obtaining Rome's sanction for his now Community. With the approval of the Sacred Congregation on January 21 1924, the Community was granted the title of "Poor Sisters of Jesus Crucified and the Sorrowful Mother". The novitiate of the Sisters officially began on August 2, 1924 on which day they received the black habit. On August 4 the following year, eleven Sisters were invested with the habit, four entered the Community and the first five Sisters of the Congregation made their profession.

Bishop Hoban's message at this time affirmed the need for the new Congregation. "My dear Lithuanian people, you need institutions like this..., Your establishing this Community is a credit to you. I congratulate you! My sincere congratulations also go to you, dear Sisters, who willingly place upon your young and feeble shoulders the cross of Christ Crucified and the cross of your nation. Christ I know will repay you for this, but it is also my sincere wish that your nation remain ever grateful to you." (2)

The following year Father Alphonsus converted one of the buildings on the Elmhurst property as a home for the aged, later renamed St. Mary's Villa Nursing Home. St. Mary's Villa remains a place of solace and peace for the aged and infirm who receive loving care from the Sisters and the Bay staff. At the same time a small building was opened for the orphans. Father Alphonsus' dream became a reality.

The first group of CJC'ers to come to Massachusetts were missioned at the Immaculate Conception School in Cambridge in 1926.

Mother Monica, I.H.M. worked with Father Alphonsus to direct and strengthen the Community. In August 1927 Mother Monica's work was completed and she returned to Mt. St. Mary's.

The pioneer Sisters were on their own with the close supervision of Father Alphonsus, Sister Paula (Mary Dailidas) was elected first Mother General; Sister Dolorosa became first novice-mistress. The Passionist Rule was revised and adapted to the needs of the Sisters in 1928.

On October 27, 1930, at the call of his religious superiors, Fr. Alphonsus ended his

residency at St. Mary's Villa. It was a tearful day. Meanwhile, Sisters were being trained for nursing and teaching, catechetical centers were opened. By 1934 Sisters had various college degrees. Like their forerunners, the Sisters of St. Casimir and Sisters of St. Francis, two Sister of Jesus Crucified were sent to Lithuania to become more acquainted with the Lithuanian

language, history and literature. They, too, became victims of the Soviets and with the outbreak of World War II returned to United States.

Tragedy struck when in 1943 the orphanage was completely destroyed and the children had to be placed in Diocesan institutions.

The Community grew in numbers, and living quarters in Elmhurst became inadequate, During the mission labors of the Sisters in Massachusetts, Archbishop Richard Cushing showed unlimited kindness and interest in the now Congregation. He succeeded in purchasing the vacant City Farm or Dr. A. F. Peterson Memorial Infirmary in Brockton, Mass. for the Sisters. By mutual consent of Bishop Hafey of Scranton., Pa. and Archbishop Richard Cushing of Boston, the CJC motherhouse was transferred on July 11, 1945 from Elmhurst, Pa. to Brockton, Mass.

When the first outdoor social was held on the convent grounds -- Labor Day, 1945 -- the new motherhouse was blessed by Archbishop Cushing and was renamed Our Lady of Sorrows Convent. Picnics at OLS grounds became a tradition which continued annually for 47 years through 1991.

A building on the motherhouse site was transformed into a rest home for men in 1949 and in 1950 a rest home for women was opened.

Charitable guilds called "CJC Ladies' Auxiliaries" began in 1952 in several New England parishes. Their purpose was to offer financial support to the sisters and to their apostolates.

Two buildings on the motherhouse property were renovated into Mater Dei Academy, a high school for girls from 1961 to 1971. Subsequently, a kindergarten and art, music and tutorial classes were held there. Currently it provides places for child day care and adult day care services.

In 1963, a new chapel and dining area were added to Our Lady of Sorrows Convent, and the



Founder's Wing with additional rooms was added to the motherhouse in 1985.

St. Joseph Manor Nursing Home was completed in Brockton in 1965. It was expanded from a 56-bed capacity to 120 beds in 1980. Its name was changed to St. Joseph Manor Nursing and Extended Care Facility in 1994 to identify its increased healthcare services.

When he died in Massachusetts in 1949 the founder, Father Alphonsus, was buried at St. Gabriel's Monastery Cemetery, Brighton; in 1967 his remains were exhumed and reinterred at Our Lady of Sorrows Cemetery, Brockton.

Sister Virginia Vytell, CJC, in her book summarizes the work of the Community. "Together the sisters will pray and work. Obstacles will be challanges of their love. They will keep the treasures the founder had brought with him and share them with others...above all, her (Lithuania's) deep and abiding faith in God"(1.)

The Sisters of Jesus Crucified continue to offer their lives in service of God and they strive to respond to the spiritual and social needs of our times. From their Elmhurst beginning with six sisters in 1924, the congregation reached a peak membership of 109 sisters in 1965. At present there are 56 professed CJC sisters and their religious lives continue to unfold as they strive daily to express the compassion of Jesus Crucified. As their degree of apostolic involvement narrows some sisters are able to redirect their abilitiess within the ministries associated with their primary fields of education or healthcare; some strive to collaborate with other religious; many sisters have heightened their prayer responsibilities. All are seeking a preferred future for the congregation in its efforts to serve in God's Church.

The Sisters of Jesus Crucified have been called to labor for the Lord in Pennsylvania, Massachusetts, Michigan, Kansas, Connecticut and New York. Throughout the years the Sisters of Jesus Crucified have esteemed the works of the Knights of Lithuania. Many CJC'ers remain personally active with you in those works...and I am happy to be counted among them

Memorial Service for Lithuanian and Danish Peacekeepers

Senior Lieutenant Normundas Valteris, a 23 year old Lithuanian volunteer from Tukums, Latvia. was killed near Tuzla, Bosnia, when the patrol vehicle in which he was riding hit an anti-tank land mine. The driver, a Danish peacekeeper, was also killed. Two other Lithuanian soldiers, Valdas Zalpys and Gintaras Putys, passengers, were injured and taken to an American hospital where they were reported to be in fair condition.

Despite the first loss of a Lithuanian life in the peacekeeping operations in Bosnia, the country's leaders have affirmed their resolve to continue their contribution to peace and stability in Europe. Defense Minister *Linas Linkevičius* said that the tragedy of Valteris' death would not change the country's position on participation in international peacekeeping exercises. Valteris was a veteran peacekeeper and had served from August 1994 to May 1995 in the UN peacekeeping mission in Croatia. He received a UN medal for service as a peacekeeper as well as a medal from the Danish army. After his death, he was awarded the Vytis Cross.

Lithuanians seving with the NATO Implementation Force (IFOR) are formed into a platoon attached to a Danish battalion. Having arrived in Bosnia, Valteris wrote home that he expected the task would be more difficult than that which he had faced in Croatia; but, he looked forward to gaining more experience in working with Western soldiers.

Valteris was not married and is survived by his mother and two sisters.



Lithuanian Cabbage Rolls

16 cabbage rolls

1 1/2 lbs. ground beef 1/2 lb. ground lean pork 1/2 cup rice in 1 cup of hot water

2 medium onions, finely chopped.

salt and pepper (season so you can taste salt)

1 toe garlic, chopped or mashed

1 16 oz. can of sauerkraut 1 head cabbage (3 1/2 lbs.)

2 cups catsup

4 cups water

CABBAGE: Remove core and place cabbage head in pot of boiling water. Cover and let cook for a few minutes until leaves start wilting and are easily removed from head. Remove the wilted leaves but continue cooking until entire head is used. With a sharp paring knife, shave off the

heavy center seam from each leaf of cabbage. (Do not cut into the leaf.)

MEAT:

Combine beef, pork and rice in hot water. Add onions, salt, pepper and

garlic. Mix well. Use 1/3 generous cup of meat mixture for each cabbage roll. Make into balls.

ROLL: Use largest leaves first. Put a meat ball at thickest end of cabbage leaf and roll. As you are rolling this up, push in the sides. (This will eliminate having to use a toothpick to keep the rolls from falling apart.) When you have used all the meat, take the leftover cabbage and chop it up.

ROAST: Sprinkle half of chopped cabbage in bottom of roaster and half of sauerkraut over the chopped cabbage. Put cabbage rolls on top of this. Over the top of the cabbage rolls, sprinkle the rest of the chopped cabbage and sauerkraut. Mix the 2 cups of catsup and 4 cups of water together. Pour over cabbage rolls. (If you need more juice, use above ratio of catsup and water.) The juice should come to the top of the cabbage rolls. Cover roaster. Cook in oven at 350 degrees for approximately 2 1/2 hours. Makes 16 to 18

cabbage rolls. Best if made a day ahead and then re-heated.

Beef Stroganov

Serves 10

1 Tbs. powdered mustard

1 Tbs. sugar

2 tsp. salt

4 cups thinly <u>sliced</u> onions (not chopped)

1 lb. fresh mushrooms, sliced 2 lbs. fillet of beef (1/4" thick, 1/4" wide strips of tender beef)

l tsp. freshly ground pepper l pint sour cream

4 to 5 Tbs. vegetable oil

Combine mustard, 1 Tbs. sugar, 2 tsp. salt and hot water (about a tablespoon) to form thick paste. Let mustard mixture rest at room temperature for about 15 minutes.

Heat 5 Tbs. vegetable oil. Drop in onions and mushrooms, cover and reduce heat to low. Simmer 20-30 minutes until vegetables are soft. Drain.

Return mixture to pan.

Brown meat in skillet. (Set aside.)

Transfer meat to vegetables. Stir in pepper, mustard paste. Stir in sour cream, a small amount at a time. Reduce heat to low. Cover and simmer until sauce is heated through. Add more salt if you desire.

Serve with noodles, spaetzle or your favorite potato.





(Wilkes Barre, PA) Auxiliary Bishop J. M. Dougherty was principal celebrant of a Pontifical Concelebrated Mass of Christian Burial on March 30 in Holy Trinity Church for Msgr. Francis Yashkas, a resident of Little Flower Manor in Wilkes-Barre and pastor emeritus of St. Ann's Church, Luzerne. A priest in the Scranton Diocese for 50 years, he died after a long illness. 

Comparable to the pranks of Halloween was the eve of St. John the Baptist (Joninės) where farmers could expect pranksters to pull up a bean crop and leave it by the door.

Swimming season in the Lithuanian lakes commenced on the feast of SS. Peter and Paul (June 29) and closed on August 15, the feast of the Assumption.

For the summer feast of the Assumption (Aug. 15) garden bouquets of zinnias, asters, dahlias, gladioli and sprigs of ruta were blessed at the BVM altar. After the <u>Zolines</u> blessing, the bouquets are taken home and dried. If anyone died during the year, the dried flowers were placed in the coffin with the deceased as a reminder of the Assumption.

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
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BIRŽELIS - 1996 - JUNE

In Lithuania, the entire month is dedicated to the Sacred Heart of Jesus. The faithful are exhorted to daily prayer befitting the never-ending love and mercy of the Redeemer. Special services (berželinės) are held in the churches throughout the month. It is recommended that we pray the Litany of the Sacred Heart as a family unit at home.

- June 2 In Lithuania, the first Sunday of June is observed as "Father's Day."
- June 6/9 The Feast of the Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ (*Devintinės*) which in Lithuania is celebrated on the Thursday following Trinity Sunday. (In the US, this feast is observed on the Sunday following Trinity Sunday.)
- June 14 The Day of Mourning and Hope. This secular commemorative day calls to mind that most traumatic event of modern Lithuanian history, the mass arrest and deportation of untold thousands of Lithuanians, which began on this date in 1941. It was a desperate act of terrorism by the the occupying Soviet forces before they retreated in the face of the German onslaught.
- June 16 In the U.S., the third Sunday in June is observed as "Father's Day."
- June 24 The Solemnity of the Birth of St. John, the Baptist. In Lithuania, the feast day is also known as "Jonines." The name reflects an unsuccessful attempt to superimpose a Christian significance on an older (pagan) tradition of a mid-year festival. The Christian relevance has been lost; but, the name and the all-night revelry starting on the eve of St. John's Day continue.
- June 28 On this date in 1932, the most beloved Lithuanian poet, prelate Jonas Mačiulis-Maironis died in Kaunas. Among his works set to music were: "Marija, Marija," "Lietuva Brangi" and "Kur Bega Šesupė."
