

We have been active in fund raising. We had two Chinese Auctions, a spaghetti dinner that raised \$500 for St. Jude's Children's Hospital, and






The members with friends and relatives took a bus trip to Washington, D.C., on October 12, and a bus trip to New York City is planned for November 9.

On behalf of the Supreme Council, I would like to assure each and everyone of you of our prayers at this time and thank you for the privilege of serving you.



Chicago District K of L Choir Celebrates 80th Anniversary

The early Knights of Lithuania Choir in 1918 Chicago.

The Chicago District (MAMD) Knights of Lithuania Choir (1916-1996) is probably the only remaining Chicago area Lithuanian choir formed during the early part of our century that is still active after 80 years. It has also outlasted almost every Lithuanian parish choir in the Chicago area and the "Pirmyn", "Birute" and "Kestutis" choirs that once had both prestigious pasts and several prestigious directors.

The district choir has had five active choir directors since 1916: Anthony Pocius (1916-25 and again 1928-32), Joseph Sauris (1932-36), Stanley "Jimmy" Rakauskas (1936-38), Joseph Sauris (1938-41), Leonard J. Šimutis (1941-42 and 1945-51) and Faustas Strolia (1960 until the present). The choir was inactive from 1925-28,1942-45 (wartime), and, from 1951-60.

Here is a brief history of the Chicago District Knights of Lithuania choir since its inception in 1916:

A notice appeared in the February 18,1916, issue of VYTIS (Vol. II, p. 5) with a call for choristers to come to an organizational meeting at St. George Hall (Chicago) on Feb. 24, 1916. The meeting was called by the Chicago District Choir Organizational Committee - Leonard Šimutis, K of L district president, P. Baluds, and, J. Jonca. During this meeting Aleksandras Aleksandravičius/Aleksis was named the director of the choir and John Kazanauskas was elected as Mr. Aleksis rehearsed the choir for several months and then resigned in order to accept an organist position in Brooklyn, NY. He did not have the opportunity to perform with the choir in

concert. After a period of inactivity, an announcement was made during the August 27,1916 Chicago District meeting that the District Choir was again being organized. The first rehearsal was to take place on September 1, 1916 at the Mark Square Park Hall with Anthony Pocius as the new director.

The first concert by the newly organized Chicago District 52 voice Choir took place on December 10, 1916 at St. George Hall in the Bridgeport area of Chicago. An orchestra assisted the choir in several works. A number of duets, quartets and solos were also performed during this first concert.

Among the choir members who participated in that concert was Antoinette Peštininkaitė (she later became Mrs. John Kazanauskas). She was also a cousin of Mrs. Anthony Pocius, wife of the K of L District choir director.

Mrs. Peštininkaitė-Kazanauskas died on April 12,1996 at the age of almost 100 years and was probably the last surviving member of that first Chicago District Choir. Other active Knights of Lithuania members who sang in that first concert were the first editors of VYTIS - Alexander Račus and Kazys Pakštas.

After a few years of inactivity the choir was reorganized in 1928 through the efforts of Ignas Sakalas, P. Čižauskas and P. Gritenis. The District choir was then renamed the "Dainos" K of L choir and prof. A Pocius was again invited to direct the group. Their printed programs, with the "Dainos" nomenclature, indicate that their first season began in 1928/29 and ended with the 4th season

1931/1932 with Anthony Pocius giving up the directorship after that season.

The district choir had been known as the K of L "Dainos" choir during the period between 1928 and 1937. On October 24,1937, during a Chicago District meeting the name was changed back from "Dainos choras" to the original name, "Vyčių choras", (VYTIS, November 1937, p.9). Stanley "Jimmie" Rakauskas was then the director of the choir.

Based upon the limited number of choir programs that are available for the years between 1918-41 when Pocius, Sauris and Rakauskas were directors the choir rosters indicated large memberships. Their repertoires were varied and included a number of non-Lithuanian compositions with performances at Lithuanian parish halls, churches, Sokol Hall, The Lithuanian Auditorium, Ashland Blvd. Auditorium, Olympic Ballroom, the downtown Aryan Grotto Theater, Kimball Hall, the University of Chicago and elsewhere. Their

programs consisted of operettas, cantatas, the utilization of many soloists and Lithuanian choral compositions as they became more readily available. The choirs of this period usually utilized orchestral accompaniments

On September 19, 1941, Leonard J. Šimutis, the son of Leonard Šimutis (1892-1975), met with Harriet Lukas, Phyllis Pechukas and Don Varnas who represented the Chicago District Knights of Lithuania. Leonard J. Šimutis, who was 21 yeas old and a music student at DePaul University, was invited to direct the Chicago District K of L district choir and choir rehearsals began on Tuesday, October 7,1941. The new director had been a member of the district choir when it participated in the song festival at the 1939 New York World's Fair. Among the 53 choirs that participated were two other Knights of Lithuania choirs from other areas. The song festival was directed by Prof. Juozas Žilevičius.

Between 1941-42 and 1945-51 (Leonard J.

Simutis as director) the choral repertoire consisted mainly of Lithuanian and non-Lithuanian choral literature with the presentation of only one cantata. The choir sang a cappella (unaccompanied) almost Among the several notable exclusively. performances that took place one was at the Amalgamated Center Auditorium on May 7,1950 when the choir performed with the Community Symphony Orchestra and the Amalgamated Chorus conducted by Dr. Leon Stein. The K of L choir, with Leonard J. Simutis as director, has also performed at De Paul University, Eleventh Street Theater, Kimball Hall, radio stations W.B.E.Z, W.G.N. and W.C.F.L and elsewhere. A recording of Lithuanian songs was made on June 16, 1948, at the Chicago Board of Education radio station at the request of David Nyvall, Jr. a music supervisor for the Chicago Board of Education and a faculty member at De Paul University. Leonard J. Simutis resigned as the district choir director in 1951 because of his teaching obligations at De Paul Teachers College University. Chicago and elsewhere.

The Chicago District Choir was inactive between 1951 and 1960. Eleanor Laurin, Chicago K of L District president, Estelle Rogers, a district K of L choir member since November 8,1949 and Loretta (Kassel) Stukas revived the organization in 1960. Faustas Strolia accepted the invitation to direct the choir and has been its director since 1960. The reactivated district choir made its first public appearance on February 11, 1961 at the Morrison Hotel during the very first K of L "Memories of Lithuania" banquet. Prof. Dr. Jack Stukas who was honored at this banquet was also the first recipient of the yearly Mid America District "Award of Distinction".

Because of the influence of the entertainment media, especially television, and, in some cases fear of traveling after dark, most choral groups now have difficulty recruiting and retaining new members. However, the present K of L District choir has survived over the years and has been actively engaged in making 5 recordings, 3 videotapes, 5 films for Lithuanian Television in Chicago and often appears in concert. repertoire is essentially based on compositions composed by Lithuanian composers. The choir is often invited to sing a Lithuanian mass at non-Lithuanian parishes. They have performed "Cavalleria Rusticana" the Chicago Lithuanian Opera Co. productions of "Aida", "Cavalleria Rusticana" and the Verdi"'Requiem". They have performed at all of the Lithuanian Song and Dance Festivals since 1964, the New York 1964 Worlds' Fair, in Canada, Washington, D.C., Springfield, IL, Racine, WI, Omaha, NE, at the Daley Center and McCormick Place in Chicago, and elsewhere.



An 80th anniversary celebration of the Knights of Lithuania choir took place on October 13, 1996 at the Immaculate Conception Parish Hall in Chicago.

- Their own viability and growth, and concomitantly, continuity of Lithuanian culture and history.
 - 2. Maximization of Aid to Lithuania.

Undoubtedly many opine that they do not fall into the "do nothings". Do we not send packages to Lithuania, pay our dues, buy chances, attend Knight's and parlor meetings talking about Lithuania's plight? Don't we greet each other, "Kaip tau einas?" But, haven't we lulled ourselves into a self serving complacency?

I know I have. Your essay subject has spurred me to rethink my meager contributions, my clone's and myriads of Lithuanian organizations.

Normally, I would have lazed by this opportunity except for recollection of a statement by Hines Nordhoff, Volkswagen's organizer, while listening to the heroically soaring music of Beethoven's Fifth. His philosophy, "The moment of satisfaction is the moment of danger."

Individual and group evaluation under this standard would conclude we're in a lot of danger.

"How should the change's in Lithuania affect the focus of the Knights of Lithuania?"

The key to any problem solution is, isolation and definition, evaluation of solutions and marshaling forces for execution. The operative term is in your question, "focus".

Prior to solving others' problems, we must solve our own.

We need infusion of younger generations.
 And as sacrilegious as it may be perceived,



welcome our non-Catholic brethren. After all, we Catholics don't have exclusivity to Lithuanianism.

2. Alone, we can't undertake significant long term projects requiring large sums of money. By linking arms with many Lithuanian organizations, focused on a common project, we could forge miracles. This should be one of our primary goals, spearheading an amalgamation in support of major long term growth projects. Such, would serve many show unified Lithuanian-American purposes, support and provide hands-on experience in entrepreneurship and independent business operations.

For example, if each organization alone spent \$1,000. in a local newspaper, only a small population is reached. However, if 30 banded together for a page in the *Washington Post* or *New York Times*, the message expands to millions.

Possible Solutions

Membership: Lets work on our kids, grandkids and everyone we know. Lets not exclude those without Lithuanian blood. One of the most energetic, supportive workers, Betty Griskos was only married to a Lithuanian.

Lithuania:

- A farm equipment co-op so that small farmers can take advantage of mechanization on a pay or crop share basis.
- A farm production and marketing co-op which would provide credit for seeds, fertilizer, etc., and as a marketing and distribution facility for product.
- A centralized marketing and distribution center for the many cottage industry products illustrative of our culture.

Let us organize, pick a project and in lockstep support it. ❖❖❖

The Founding of The Sisters of St. Casimir



This is the third in a series of articles on American Catholic Religious orders and how each evolved.

Casimira Kaupas, the future Mother Maria, would have to travel a long and involved

journey before she could realize her deep desire to consecrate herself to God. Casimira was born in the quiet village of Gudeliai in Lithuania on January 6, 1880. From her father, Anufras Kaupas, who was a spiritual leader not only in his own family but also among his neighbors, she learned to urge others to good. In 1897, she came to Saint Joseph Parish in Scranton, PA, to be a housekeeper for her brother-priest, Anthony Kaupas, who was the pastor.

During these four years, as housekeeper, she witnessed and heard the concern of the Lithuanian priests as they would meet in St. Joseph's rectory to discuss the needs of the Lithuanian immigrants. It was at this time that Dr. John Sliupas and Rev. Dembskis agitated vigorously and spread atheistic Darwinism. She was well-informed about both as about the so-called "Sliuptamiai." (Followers of Sliupas, who promoted a materialist and atheist liberalism.) More than once she would say to her brother: "If only I were a man or were educated, I would give it to those Sliuptamiai!" She saw how easy it was to establish schools in America and how good it would be if the Lithuanians had schools in their parishes. This would be wonderful in Lithuania also, but who could even dream of this during Russian dominance?

It was during her four year stay in Scranton that Casimira met Sisters (Sister Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary - IHM) for the first time and was attracted to an apostolic religious life. In 1902, Casimira returned to Lithuania and while there she resolved to become a teaching religious to help the Lithuanian Americans concerning matters of faith, since it was impossible to do so in her

native land. Reverend A. Milukas who was studying in Fribourg, Switzerland and other Lithuanian priests in America were of the opinion that the Lithuanians ought to establish an independent Lithuanian congregation. Casimira agreed to establish this Congregation and studied for three years in Ingenbohl, Switzerland. During this time, she asked her brother, Father A. Kaupas and his friend, Father Milukas to find a priest in the United States who would assume responsibility for the Congregation.

In 1905 Rev. Doctor Anthony Staniukynas agreed to accept this role. He succeeded in getting his bishop, Bishop JW. Shanahan of Harrisburg, PA, to sponsor the Congregation. At the Bishop's request, Mother M. Cyril, IHM of Scranton, PA accepted Casimira and her two companions Judith Dvaranauskaite (Mother M. Immaculata) and Antanina Unguraiciute (Mother M. Concepta) into the novitiate of the Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary at Marywood.

In 1913, Sister Maria was elected first Superior General, an office to which she was reelected until her death. For twenty-seven years, she carried out these responsibilities with great humility and charity. She opened and staffed numerous schools throughout the United States, and built and staffed hospitals. In 1920, after World War I ceased, she and four Sisters traveled to Lithuania and established a foundation of the Sisters of St. Casimir, known as Pazaislis, in Kaunas, Lithuania.

She extended the apostolate of the Congregation to New Mexico in 1937 and was planning to send her Sisters to Argentina, South America, but this became a reality only in 1941 after her death.

The charisma and mission of Mother Maria continues to live through the ministries of the Sisters of St. Casimir as they fulfill their proclaimed mission, "to teach and evangelize; care for the sick, the aging and others who are hurting; provide a sense of belonging to people of various cultures and share Christ's special love for the poor." This

dedication is carried out in various ways through the institutions they sponsor, namely, Holy Cross Hospital, and Maria High School both in Chicago, along with Villa Joseph Marie High School and Saint Joseph Nursing Home in Holland, PA. The Sisters also staff elementary schools and do pastoral ministry, social work and catechetical work in the Chicago area, Pennsylvania, Florida, Maryland and New Mexico. In Argentina, South America, the Sisters of St. Casimir minister in the cities of Avelleneda, Rosario and Cordoba.

During the last years of her life, Mother Maria suffered from cancer. She died in Chicago on April 17, 1940, at the age of 60, a true example of courage, patience in suffering and acceptance of God's will. Throughout her life Mother Maria was acclaimed as a holy woman. Three years after her death Samuel Cardinal Stritch of Chicago gave approval for a prayer to be said praying for her Beatification. In 1988 Rome declared Mother Maria to be called SERVANT OF GOD. The Congregation continues to pursue her Cause for Beatification.

With the fall of the iron curtain in 1991, the Chicago Sisters of St. Casimir quickly rallied to now, openly assist their Lithuanian counterparts. Presently they travel freely to Pazaislis to assist the Sisters with leadership, administrative skills and long range planning. A few Chicago Sisters have even remained in Lithuania as teachers. Several Sisters from Lithuania have come to Chicago to study English and Theology in order to be better trained to carry out their ministry at home.

With a firm hope and trust in Divine Providence, Mother Maria Kaupas set out to establish a religious Community for the preservation of the faith and the glory of God. In the planning days of this new Congregation, one priest stated to her, "As I see it, Casimira, you can become a notable person in Church history." This prophetic statement became a fact in the beatification process which is presently in progress. It continues to be fulfilled through the dedication and ministry of each Sister of St. Casimir living in the United States, Argentina and Lithuania.

Ammaculate Mary, your praises we sing!

On December 8, we celebrate the Feast of the Immaculate Conception of the Virgin Mary. The focal point of this celebration is the belief that Mary was preserved from sin from the very first moment of her life - from conception.

The observance of a feast day honoring the conception of Mary by St. Anne was begun in the Eastern Church as early as 750 AD. It was celebrated in conjunction with the feast of St. Anne which fell on December 9. A ninth century calendar from Naples listed the feast as the Conception of Mary and in 1050 Pope Leo IX

recommended observance of the feast. In the East, it became an obligatory holy day by edict of Emperor Emmanuel in 1166.

Having originated in Greek monasteries, the feast of the Immaculate Conception was brought back to England by the crusaders in the 10th Century. It spread on the continent during the 12 Century especially after the observance was adopted by the Franciscans. The feast was added to the Roman Calendar in 1476 by Pope Sixtus IV. In 1439, the Council of Basle decided to make it a universal feast.



Shortly thereafter, the Sistine Chapel was dedicated to the Conception of Mary.

In 1708, Pope Clement XI made the feast a holy day of obligation for the universal church and on December 8, 1854, Pope Pius IX formally defined the dogma of the Immaculate Conception.

Eight years earlier, in 1846, the Bishops in the United States had made the Immaculate Conception the patronal feast of the United States.

The apparitions of Our Lady at Lourdes, France, in 1858 has been inter-

preted as a heavenly confirmation of the dogma.

The relevance of this feast is reflected in the prayers composed for the liturgy of this feast. As we celebrate the singular privilege of Mary's preservation from sin, we pray that we, too, may be redeemed from the wounds of original sin. The existence of original sin and its effects on the descendants of Adam and Eve are presupposed; otherwise a feast of the Immaculate Conception would have little meaning.

The Vigil of Christmas Eve

Although many have modified this sacred tradition of our Lithuanian past, it is indeed a tradition special to many of us, even if only in memories. Those lucky enough to have experienced a Lithuanian Grandmother have most probably experienced one of her special Kučios dinners on Christmas Eve.

On Christmas Eve, everything had to be neat and tidy in the cottage or home. From the ceiling would dangle garlands or straw sculptures. The atmosphere would be a pleasant blend of freshly cut evergreens mixed with the aroma of ceremonial foods for the evening meal. The anticipation of the four long weeks of Advent would culminate in the most reverent, beautiful legacy, tradition and heritage Vigil of Christmas Eve.

Earlier, the father of the home would enter with a sheaf of grain which he would place in a corner. This represents the home's guardian angel. The family table would be adorned as a symbol of Bethlehem, being hallowed by the hay placed under the fine linen cloth. Since sunset, the youngest child had been peering through the window waiting for the first evening star that symbolically would allow the meal to begin. Members and guests would gather around a food laden table beginning the ages-long vigil feast with the breaking of the plotkele, or Christmas wafer. The eldest member of the family would break the first wafer to share with all as prayers were said.

In many homes, an extra place was set for a relative who had died that year, so that the spirit would join in the special meal. Twelve meatless dishes were then served including herring, poppy seed milk, potatoes, mushroom and cabbage dishes, other vegetable and fruit dishes and fish. Everyone is supposed to at least taste each of the dishes for good luck



during the coming year, as the Lithuanians were very superstitious.

The meal is eaten in a solemn manner without alcohol. Rather fruit juice or cider is served.

After the meal, the mood lightens and predictions and forecasts were done about the coming year about health, love and happiness. One told by my grandfather was for the unmarried girls to listen to the direction the baying dogs (or wolves) were barking. From this direction was to come their future husbands.

The family would usually gather around the decorated fir tree and sing Christmas carols and some families exchange gifts.

Many of our councils host a special Kučios dinner a solemn remembrance to our heritage. It is a great way to introduce the young to the custom and to bring back good memories of those past Kučios meals many of us may still remember.

Council 3 in Philadelphia is hosting their 12th annual Kučios on December 14. For the past eleven years C-3 prepared an enjoyable evening while having this traditional supper maintaining many of the Lithuanian traditions including hay under the tablecloth and a tree adorned with handmade ornaments. Many other councils also host a Kučios and those lucky enough to live near one of them should consider attending. It's a lovely way to introduce non-Lithuanians to some of our special customs.

Kučios Memories

Donna Gustaitis Kamm C-147 St. Petersburg, FL

It was the afternoon before Christmas we left St. Petersburg, Florida as the Arctic winds from the north ripped the outdoor decorations and a dark cloud floating above the treetops foretold stormy weather.

We drove way down south to Fort Myers to join my son, David Kamm and his family to attend the traditional Kučios feast. We were told that as a family we wore going to a special Kučios arranged by an local organization, LITHUANIAN FORUM. Lithuanians and those of their descent came from near suburbs, and far away places. There were families, couples and singles, well over a hundred people.

Tables were nicely decorated and laden with traditional food, 12 meatless dishes. Mr. Vilius Brazenas the leader of the Forum was the master of ceremonies. He led all in saying Grace and passed the plotkele wafers for each person to share. This reminded me of the Last Supper. He then asked everyone to introduce themselves giving us a chance to meet new people. My son, family and I represented four generations of Lithuanian Americans.

Following the Kučios festivities the hour was nearing midnight and as a custom, we all braved to cold to attend Midnight Mass at St. Francis Church in Ft. Myers, one of the oldest Catholic churches in the area, built at the turn of the century. It stands majestically as a landmark beacon, surrounded with old white houses, some with picket fences.

Upon entering this church one gets the feeling of warmth and welcome and it seems that one has been there before with its old pews and kneelers, cement floors and beautiful windows. The focal point is the altar 7-steps above the floor level surrounded by beautiful Christmas flowers.

The pastor with four priests and four altar servers celebrated Mass with the formality befitting the event, the Birthday of Christ Our King. About 99 singers in the choir sang the entire Handel's Messiah, followed by a thunderous applause.

Upon leaving the church, outdoors a fierce storm raged blowing leaves and branches, ringing

with it rain and in our imagination, snow flakes. Although it was late upon return to my son's home, my daughter-in-law, Joan, sat at the piano, her son, Rexx, with his trombone, and another daughter-in-law, Carol, on the flute playing and singing the beautiful, "O Holy Night". Truly a memorable Christmas.

Bertha Stoskus New England District President

Growing up with my siblings, mother made all the holidays special. Christmas Eve Kučios we had all the traditional foods - Plotkelis (wafers), herring, boiled potatoes, sautęed cabbage, poppy seed milk (in her later years Mom equated this with Sominex), etc. But she would also include the Maneschwitz Kosher wine, a sweet wine. Being naive, we thought all wines were sweet, but later found out differently.

We do not serve the Kosher wine any longer at our Kučios, but the next generation is ready to take on the traditions grandmother nurtured.

Irena Gecas C-12, NYC, Scholarship Com. Chair

As a child growing up in Dayton, Ohio, Kučios was my favorite day of the year. With two sisters, Rita and Vida, we assisted our mother, Eugenija, making all the traditional Lithuanian dishes. As she prepared the food, she always recounted stories of her childhood in Lithuania growing up with two brothers and a sister. To add to the festivities of the day, December 24th was also my sister, Rita's birthday. In addition to the twelve dishes that needed to be meticulously prepared for a family of six, my mother also needed to make my sister's birthday cake. Since it was a special occasion, my family was always treated to a special multi-layered "torte". Kučios was strictly observed. However, after the meal was eaten, it became a celebration for my sister's birthday. My mother always wanted to make the holiday separate from her birthday.

From year to year, the torte always varied, sometimes it was chocolate or lemon, and at times we were treated to the "Napoleonas". (See Lith. Chefs section.)

Lithuanian Chefs

The following are a few favorite recipes for Kučios and the Christmas holidays.

TORTE "NAPOLEONAS" Irena Gecas, C-12, NYC

Cake Layers: 4 cups flour 1 lb. lightly salted butter 1 pint sour cream

Sift flour into a large mixing bowl. With a pastry blender, slowly cut softened butter into flour into crumbly. Blend in sour cream. With hands form dough into 11 or 12 egg-sized round balls. Refrigerate overnight in covered bowl. Before baking, let dough soften for about 10 minutes. Roll out each dough ball until it is wafer thin to fit the size of a 12 inch pie pan. Bake on a slightly floured pan. Prick holes in dough before baking. Bake each layer at 350 degrees for 3-5 minutes depending on your oven.

Cool each layer separately. With a sharp knife, even out the sides to form a circle. Save these trimmings to top the cake.

Filling:
1 1/2 lb. unsalted butter
2 cups powdered sugar
8 egg yolks
1 package vanilla pudding mix
2 cups milk
1/2 cup half & half or Carnation condensed milk
2 tsp. vanilla
Lemon juice to flavor

Cream butter, yolks and sugar. Stir in dry pudding mix into 1 cup cold milk. Bring to a boil, stirring constantly. Gradually pour and stir pudding into butter and yolks mixture. Heat other cup of milk and pour in milk. cream, and vanilla to the mixture. Slowly add lemon juice. Cool mixture thoroughly. When cool, begin layering cake with filling. Spread about 1 tablespoon between each layer. Frost sides and top with same filling. Sprinkle with crumbs from cake trimmings. Additional fillings that

can be used: apricot fruit or berry preserves.

LITH. MUSHROOM SOUP Bertha Kuzma, John Baltrus and C-19, Pittsburgh, PA

1/2 lb. dried mushrooms or 1 quart canned mushrooms (drained)
1 qt. sauerkraut juice and some sauerkraut
3 more quarts water
1 clove garlic
1 small bay leaf
1 cup rice or barley

Soak mushrooms overnight. Rinse about 3 times to clean them. Add mushrooms to water and bring to a boil. Add salt, pepper, garlic, bay leaf and juice. Let simmer for 1 hr. (if canned mushrooms are used, boil only 1/2 hour). Add rice or barley and cook until tender.

Soup thickening: In a small frypan, add 1 or 2 tablespoons butter, fry 1 chopped onion until brown. Add 1 or 2 tablespoons flour, stir well, and then let cool. Add thickener to the soup and boil for an additional 1/2 hour.

84th NATIONAL CONVENTION NEWS:

A Short Biography of host council C#96, Dayton

By Fran Petkus & Elinor Sluzas

To get acquainted with us, the following is a short biography of C #96 - your 84th National Convention host:

The Knights of Lithuania in Dayton, Ohio was first organized in 1917 but was unchartered. This group of young Lithuanians remained active until 1921. The Knights of Lithuania brass band, which they had formed, served the parish and community for many years.

It wasn't until February of 1932 that Daytonian Vincent Damasus of the national board and Frank Gudelis, of Dayton, officially reorganized the council known as C#96. One of the charter members is still a member, Veronica Omlor. Our council is very family orientated as many of our members are third and fourth generation Knights. We are very much involved with our parish - Holy Cross Lithuanian Roman Catholic Church. We continue to meet the goals of our organization through many charity projects and remain aware of the needs of our Lithuanian people here and in Lithuania.

Like many of you, in the past we presented plays in Lithuanian, had Lithuanian language classes and K of L Lithuanian Dance groups. Today we continue to be active in the Knights of Lithuania's many projects and wherever possible share our rich heritage with the Dayton community.

In the late 30's - 1942, C #96 had a Junior Council. Our Regular and Junior Councils were very strong but with the outbreak of WWII we found our young men going off to serve their country. The women of our council kept us alive. However, the Juniors, lacking leadership, became inactive. In 1955 the Juniors were reorganized and have remained active to this day and move into the Regular Council when they become of age. Our Juniors are invited to participate in Regular Council activities. They have several projects of their own to keep them busy. One in particular is their annual

May Crowning of the Blessed Mother and hosting their Mother's Day Breakfast.

Many of our members have held positions not only on the council level but, also the district and national levels. As a very active council, we have been blessed over the years to see seven members elevated to Honorary Membership. Twelve members have received the Knights of Lithuania Scholarship Awards.

C #96 hosted its first national convention in 1937. This was followed with the council hosting three more conventions in 1952, 1967 and 1976. Many of our young members are part of the 84th National Convention committee! We look forward to seeing all of you in August! (Must warn you from our Dayton conventions a few inter-council marriages emerged!)


