I was quite lucky as a young child to attend the kucios meals of two distinctly different Lithuanian grand-mothers. Both were masters at Lithuanian foods, one adding American shortcuts to her recipes and excelling in oven baked foods, such as kugelis and special holiday breads, the other extremely old world preparing everything from scratch and excelling in fried potato pancakes, virtini, and "žagarėliai" or love-knots, those delicate powdered sugar covered cookies. Each of them would spend days before Christmas Eve shopping, preparing, chopping, baking, cooking, frying and getting everything prepared to their strict standards.

Appreciation for these wonderful grandmothers did not really happen until they were no longer around. My mother and those of us who were once the helpers try each year (sometimes unsuccessfully) to reproduce these wonderful dishes. Each sibling tends to be fond of a particular dish, and although they differ from the original recipes, the breads, the cabbage, the mushrooms, the silkies are indeed all there; each one of the cooks feeling a special pride and we, indeed, get so much more out of it than what was put into it.

In this special season of thanks, VYTIS editors wish to convey a special Ačiū for all the support, especially to the feature and council news writers and photographers, contributors and well wishers. The special place left vacant each Christmas Eve will constantly remind us of those who are "here in memory" and helped to instill a love for Lithuanian customs, foods, songs and traditions - grandparents, relatives, mentors and friends.


ADOPT A SEMINARIAN St. Joseph's Provincial Seminary in Vilnius

Archbishop Audrys J. Bačkis of Vilnius cited one of Lithuania's greatest needs as spiritual renewal. During the 50 years of Soviet occupation, atheism was imposed on this nation where 85% of the population were nominally Catholic. The moral and spiritual values of the people were devastated resulting in abortion (authorities acknowledge that women in the Soviet Union had an average of three abortions), the divorce rate is higher than Western Europe, it is estimated that alcoholism affects 50% of the population, the number of dysfunctional families is appalling, the suicide rate for teenagers and young adults in Lithuania is the highest in Europe. The church stands alone offering hope and direction. It is encouraging to see younger priests, religious sisters and seminarians are more involved in these social issues.

The need for improved seminary formation to prepare young men to face the challenges of today and to bring the church into alignment with the directives of Vatican II, became apparent when Archbishop Bačkis was appointed chief pastor of the Vilnius Archdiocese. The doors to newly built St. Joseph's Provincial Seminary in Vilnius were opened in Fall of this year to 70 seminarians from Vilnius, Panevežys and Kaišadorys. The Archbishop has gathered the finest teachers and professors from not only Lithuania but other European countries as well. The young men who complete the six year course will be well prepared to face the challenges of today and the new millennium.

The cost of building a modern seminary and hiring an excellent faculty has prompted the Archbishop to approach Aid to Lithuania and ask assistance in



securing scholarship funds. It costs \$2,000.00 per year to provide for one seminarian. When this project was announced during the 85th National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania in Waterbury, CT, the response was exciting. Four people came forward and donated \$2,000.00 each thereby "adopting" the first four seminarians for one year. Sixty-six more scholarships are needed!

Any individual, group, parish, K of L Council etc. willing to donate \$2,000.00 will be assigned an "adopted seminarian-son" by the Seminary Rector. The donor will receive the name and photo of his or her "adopted-seminarian son" and will be able to correspond with him ,if they so desire. Probably the greatest benefit will be to know that you and your loved ones are continually in the prayers of your "adopted seminarian-son".

What a wonderful way to assure the people of Lithuania the spiritual assistance they need to rebuild a strong nation based on solid Christian values, where people will learn again, to love one another as our Father loves us.

BEMEMBERED BHRISTMAS IN

ne of the best remembered Christmases was spent in my grandparents' cottage, in a quiet village northwest of Vilnius, Lithuania.

Christmas in Lithuania was always a time for a happy get together of families and neighbors.

All necessary farm chores and work were attended to in the daytime, while the evenings were associated with songs, friendly gatherings and prayers.

The beginning of the festivities was (and still is) the day before Christmas, when everyone arose at 3 o'clock to be greeted by a dark, snow-silent morning. Preparations for the Christmas Eve supper and the Christmas Day dinner started immediately. Enthusiastic hands shared familiar tasks in the warm kitchen and in a short while the cottage was filled with the teasing odors of baking, stewing and roasting foods.

MHE MITCHEN

Grandmother's kitchen was lucky; it had an oven and a separate stove. The oven was a clay affair with a cavernous mouth that baked four enormous loaves of bread at one sitting, each 20 inches in diameter.

While the elders were busy, the young ones beautified the shrine in the kitchen corner, containing the statue of the Blessed Virgin, with branches of yew, linden and cut-out paper stars. The candles (grandmother's special hand-made with beeswax, melted down from the honeycomb) were placed at each side of the statue.

There were no Christmas trees, in fact they were unheard of; but garlands and swags of winter greenery, laurel, juniper berries and mistletoe were suspended from the rafters and festooned along the walls.

MORK COMPLETED

When the moon shone down on the straw-covered homes, and all work was completed, everyone, young and old, gathered around the table in memory of a Little Child's birthday.

Clean, fresh hay covered the long table, and over the dried grass and clover a heavy linen cloth was spread. A finer linen tablecloth was the background for all the food. The hay, we were reminded, symbolized the hay-filled manger prepared by Mary for her Infant and the coarse linen cover was His spread. The Christmas wafers, on the prettiest dish held the center of the table.

Seated in silence, grandfather blessed himself, and asked God to bless the food on the table, his house and all who are in it. Then he broke the wafers into as many fragments



as there were people around the table, removed a portion for himself, then passed the dish to the right.

Each one blessed himself before he

received the wafer, took a wafer then passed the dish to the right.

BEET SOUP

First from God's bounty were bowls of beet soup with plump, flavorful mushrooms; an assortment of fish and herring; a "gruel" made from barley, cooked to a thick substance that went so well with poppy seed milk. To make the milk required many pairs of strong, young muscles. This pleasant task was conferred upon the younger generation, because pulverizing the seed was a long process. They took turns in rolling the wooden pestle in the crock of poppy seeds. And when the white milk appeared from the crushed seeds, the result when mixed with honey and cooled boiled water was delicious.

Hard, square bite sized biscuits (an oyster cracker size and thickness) were dropped into the milk and left to soften before eating. Stewed prunes, and a jellied pudding made from whole cooked oats was served with syrup.

No one hurried. Everyone ate as much as he could. The day's fast had been long. Finally, all were pleasantly content. Then, blades of grass were drawn from underneath the linen cloth, and as each one extracted, a stalk, the other waited quietly to see its length, for its size signified the height his crop of flax would reach the following year. Families took pride in the yield of the tall-stemmed blue flowered plant which means a long linen thread for weaving garments, bed linen, towels, table-cloths and sacks.

FTER SUPPER

Supper over, all bowls and spoons were replaced on the linen cloth and left to remain on the table overnight because the little souls would come to earth and would be very hungry indeed, if nothing remained for them. A large cloth was spread over bowls, spoons and food. The little souls, when they finished their earthly food of poppy seed milk and biscuits, washed and returned everything so that their hosts would find all in perfect order.

Later on, the countryside rang with vigorous voices. The young were all out, supplied with braided bands of softened straw to bind the new slips of fruit that had been grafted into the trees a few months before. No one knew why that was done. No one could remember; and yet the old custom was persevered in without question simply because there was so much joy in doing it in the tranquil night.

Shortly afterward, murmurs and good natured grumbles were heard. Counting and pairing off all the fence pickets had begun. If one's count ended with a pair; that meant the counter would wed an unmarried individual. If an odd number was the result, then groans howled through the laughter in the night, because that meant the counter would marry a widow or a widower. The boys complained - not too much; but the girls - much!

Christmas morning, the household arose at 3 o'clock again; dressed warmly in their fur jackets and coats, climbed into sleighs piled with hay and woolen blankets, and set out for church for the six o'clock Mass. Church was ten miles away which meant fast riding on speedy sleighs.

MOLVES PROWLED

The sleighs, filled with families,

crunched over the snow in a convoy, and as they sped along the harness bells jingled and the runners sang a musical monotone. Wolves prowled about but disappeared when they heard the jangling bells. Sometimes deep drifts had to be broken through, but drivers and strong horses managed skillfully, and all reached the churchyard in time.

In the church, candle-flame and lamp glow revealed the traditional Christmas colors: red handkerchiefs worn by the girls, the greenery and firs around the altar, and the white candles made by the housewives donated for the Christmas holy days. Gay colors were never worn during Advent. Christmas morning brought out the cherished red kerchiefs, corals and amber beads; for the traditions of the day merited gladdened hearts and colorful dress. After Mass, lines were formed in orderly fashion in the aisles. On the corner of the altar a miniature Holy Family, animals and shepherds were waiting for the people. From the small crib, ribbons were tied and hung in streamers.

Each one waited to rock the Christ Child in His bed, so very gently, and to leave a gift of coin beside it.

The return trip was cold. Mother was weatherwise; she had prepared a large pot of fragrant tea made from mint and camomile tea, blended with various aromatic leaves and left it on the stove's edge ready-made, to thaw the pilgrims at journey's end.

The Christmas table, a symposium of good cheer and good country living, dispensed a rising bouquet of culinary fragrances that made all mouths feel like water-troughs. The appearance of a golden roasted suckling pig was oh so welcome to the excited hungry appetites. There was duck, lamb and sausage; chopped cabbage slaw, pickled beets and spiced cucumbers, chopped red beets mixed with small pieces of fried-out salt pork; dried

yellow peas, cooked, drained and served with gobs of rich butter; and red tinted horseradish; what tears were wasted in its making! Also sour milk, golden speckled cheeses, and the favorite Lithuanian

Christmas breads filled with raisins and topped with sugar and poppy seeds.

Beverages were milk, coffee, tea and a sweet drink made from rye. Grandfather's hand-carved wooden bowls contained fruits and nuts for all those who still felt hollows in their stomachs.

Gifts were never exchanged. Grandfather asked each young person, "Will you stay with me next year?" He quickly smiled when the anticipated promise came and placed a silver piece in each palm. The boys tied their silver coins onto their shirts for safe-keeping and thereafter sported their precious pieces on every shirt they wore.

SINGING YMNS

Then the beloved Christmas song, hymns and carols were sung. When the family singing ended, visits were made to the neighbors' cottages where the youth sang the songs again. No home was overlooked. The children equipped with all types of sleds and skates went to sample the hill or skate on the river; while the older folk rested and prayed.

When the sun had disappeared, the young people gathered in a neighbors house to play Christmas games and dance to the music of the accordion and violins. At midnight, tired but very happy, they separated; and as they went their ways, strains of Christmas melodies floated gently over the peaceful countryside, while the sky beamed with sparkling stars and regarded them in smiling silence. "Linksmų Kalėdų" had been a very Merry Christmas.

Born of Lithuanian immigrant parents, I was enrolled in a Saturday Lithuanian school to learn more about my heritage and the associated culture of my fore fathers. At home and also at school, I learned to speak and read the oldest living European language; participated in the Easter and Kūčios customs as practiced by morn and dad. Many essays and articles have been written about these customs as well as the Lithuanian language, the agriculture and the evolution of the amber jewel. Also important and most enjoyable is the Lithuanian music with the wonderful meaningful songs and dances, which have survived many hard times throughout the centuries. During the 1980's and 1990's, the various ballads and patriotic hymns buoyed the spirits of all the freedom fighters in the United States and abroad. The more you listen to this wonderful music, you begin to grasp the delightful and pleasant sounds. The hymns are soothing, meaningful and sometimes sad. Our church organist, recently arrived from Lithuania has put new meaning into the prayers and songs. I possess all the verses of "Kai Aš Turėjo", also the 12 stanzas of "Mudu Du Broliukai". These were some of the common songs 60 years ago and many American-Lithuanians must remember these. All aspects of the Lithuanian culture are treasures and important. It just seems the songs and dances of Lithuania have not gotten much noteworthy literary attention. Only recently, our Vytis magazine is now including sheet music in their issues. Let us keep our Lithuanian music alive and well!!

This year we had 95 players, young and old, men and women of all nationalities including Lithuanians, of course. Last year we had 81 players. The format was Florida Scramble best ball, which allows all team members to contribute. It was a 9am shot gun start which means that all foursomes started at the same time from different holes, thus finishing about the same time for lunch.

The Lithuanian Open is not only a fun time, it also supports the Lithuanian Children's Relief Inc.(LCR), a worthy charity that is based in South Boston, MA. The LCR earmarks the money we raise at the tournament for the purchase and delivery of medicine for children in Lithuania suffering with Tuberculosis. The medicine is sent to Dr. Dana Šlapkauskaite (an angel of mercy) who administers to TB patients at the Pulmonary and Tuberculosis Center in Vilnius, Lithuania.

This year's Lithuanian Open winners were Peter Van Wagenen, Steve Kelley, Jack Basile and Steve Nickerson with a score of 12 under par. Second place team was John and Jerald Blaze, Chris and Bill Tillo. Third place team was Tomas Kiliulis, Keith Girovard, Kevin Blanchette and Steve Blake.

Note that the trophy held by Steve Kelley in the photo was made in Lithuania from Lithuanian oak. Many thanks to my

Amateur Radio friend W3POA, Bernie Zilaitis and his Lithuanian wife Irena for not only having the new trophy made in Lithuania, then hand carrying it in, but also donating it to the Lithuanian Open.

The Lithuanian Open tradition is that the trophy be held for one year by the winning team and then handed over to the next year winners, so no one keeps it. I had invited President Valdas Adamkus (a golfer and President of Lithuania) to play in the open. In return, I received a letter from the Deputy Adviser to the President on Foreign Policy sending his regrets saying; "that due to tight schedule President Valdas Adamkus will neither be able to open nor participate at the annual Lithuanian Open golf tournament."

Neringa Campers Recall Lithuanian Martyr of the Titanic

In a small rural camp in Marlboro, Vermont, Lithuanian children learned about Father Juozas Montvila, who reboarded the Titanic as it sank to minister to the dying.

He has been compared to St. Maximilian Kolbe and called a martyr of the Titanic. Father Juozas Montvila was a 27-year-old priest from Lithuania who boarded the ill-fated liner as a second-class passenger headed for the United States, where he planned to minister to the growing Lithuanian immigrant community.

After the Titanic hit an iceberg on April 15, 1912, the priest-gave up his seat in a lifeboat so that he could remain on the sinking ship to console those facing death and hear their confessions.

This summer, the self-sacrifice of the young priest was commemorated by children at Camp Neringa, a Lithuanian camp in southern Vermont. The children performed a play all in Lithuanian about the sinking of the ship and the priest's actions.

The camp is operated by the Lithuanian Sisters of the Immaculate Conception based in Putnam, Conn. It offers children of Lithuanian heritage a place to learn about their history, culture and traditions along with their Catholic faith.

The camp served 110 campers ages 7 to 16 from the United States, Canada and Lithuania during the July session, when the Titanic skit was performed. The campers dressed in period clothes and crammed into & makeshift lifeboat while others lay "drowned" on a blue tarp in front of one of the camp's buildings. Most on the "boat" were dressed as first-class passengers, while most who drowned were from steerage.

Records indicate that when the Titanic went down after hitting an iceberg, about 1,500 people, many of them third-class passengers, perished and only 700 were saved. The ship did not have enough lifeboats and those that were put into the water were not filled to

capacity.

Sister Igne Marijosius, a Neringa board member and a former camp director, said it was "incredible" for the children to learn that there was a Lithuanian priest on the Titanic who gave up his life for another.

"It's important to know that one of our countrymen was there and part of the experience the world is talking about (because of the movie) and that he gave up his life," she said in an interview.

Wearing a white alb and green stole, Ginta Adornkaitis, a 14-year-old from Milton, Mass., portrayed Father Montvila. Two campers covered in a white blanket portrayed the iceberg and crashed into a porch that symbolized the ship. Those portraying passengers thrashed about trying to keep their balance. When the priest was offered a seat in the lifeboat, he declined, offering it instead to the camper portraying the young woman who later credited the priest with saving her life.

Later, speaking English, young Ginta said he had not heard of the priest until he came to the camp, but now he is one of the boy's heroes because "he fulfilled his duty to God to help others."

Father Montvila never stopped being a priest, Sister Marijosius said, "and was a missionary to the the end," helping to ensure eternal life for those facing death in the North Atlantic.

Father Montvila was born in 1885, the youngest of 10 children. After ordination Father Montvila worked in Lipskas as a book and Catholic newspaper illustrator and ministered to the spiritual needs Easternrite Catholics, who were persecuted by the czarist regime and been forced to worship in secret.

Later, he was forbidden to work as a priest in Lithuania. He decided to emigrate so he could work with the Lithuanians in the U.S. Some reports indicate he was headed to Brooklyn; others that he was going to Worcester, MA.

Father Montvila's body was never recovered. He is considered a hero in Lithuania.

Fitting Tribute to Our Grand Lady

TINA SHATAS

We lost Tina Shatas, our grand lady at age 94 and a 84 year member of the K. of L. I dare say no other K. of L'er has reached this milestone.

It is with deep sorrow that we report the death of our Grand Lady on September 1st.

Tina was born on Fern St., Athol in the same home she left to meet her Lord. Born in 1904 she was the daughter of Antanas and Mariana Bendinskas Andraliūnai. She attended the local schools and later on married Paul Shatas. They were blessed with two daughters: Dr.

Ann Marie and Margaret of Detroit. Tina's father goes down in Lithuanian history as the first Lithuanian to settle in the Athol area. Tina's parents did much to aid the new Lithuanian immigrants. They sent for them, greeted them and found them jobs, also allowed them to reside with them until they found their own flats. Tina once said that her home was like a rooming house, alays full of new immigrants. This characteristic of her parents rubbed on on Tina and her children. Tina's sister Margaret Kucinskas of Detroit opened her door to the displaced persons from Germany after the war. She sponsored them, met them at the train station, found them jobs and apartments.

When our council was formed in May 1914, the founder of the K. of L. Mykolas Norkūnas signed up 98 charter members, among which were Tina's parents. Tina was 10 years old and she also became a charter member of Council 10. She did not have to pay dues until age 16. She has been an intestrupted active member for 84 years a hard one to beat. Tina was the recipient of honors from the them Mass Governor Michael Dukakis and from the state senate. She was also hon-



ored at a K. of L. banquet.

Tina was married to Paul Shatas who died in a tragic rail-road accident in 1975 in Vermont. They raised two daughters and gave them an excellend college education.

Tina was active throughout her lonmg life. She loved St. Francis parish and her Lithuanian heritage. In her later years she visited Lithuania with her daughter Dr. Marie Ann. Tina was an active member of the parish guild, also an avid gardener.

On many occasions her flowers graced the altars of St. Francis church, She was last seen at our annual Lithuanian Independence Day celebration and she was in good spirits and a sound mind.

She was a devoted wife, caring mother and good neighbor. She was a generour person. Always with a smile and good word to all. These traits she inherited from her devoted parents. She will be lovingly remembered and sadly missed by her loving family, the entire parish and last but not least C-10.

The K. of L. ritual wake was headed by Bill Wišniauskas. Her funeral was largely attended. The eulogies were given by Rev. Messian and K. of L'ers and family friend Jackie Doherty. The Lithuanian juosta was placed on the coffin by Nellie Melaika and Pamela Bouthilier. The funeral dinner was served to about 125 persons.

Our deepest sympathy is extended to daughters, Dr. Marie Ann and Margaret and relatives and friends.

It is with great sorrow we bid a fond farewell to Rev. Anthony Miciunas, M.I.C., Spiritual Moderator of Council 36. Chicago. Father Miciunas passed away September 22, 1998.

Father Miciunas was born October 8,

1915 in Chicago, IL. He attended parochial schools in Chicago, high school in Clarendon Hills, IL and Thompson, CT and earned his B.A. at Marianapolis College, Thompson, CT.

After his ordination in Chicago in 1940 he did graduate work at Laval University, Quebec, Canada, and Marquette University, Milwaukee, WI, receiving a Masters Degree in Philosophy and a minor in Journalism in 1944.

From 1944 to 1952 Father was superior of the Marion Fathers monastery in Chicago, editor of the religious magazine Laivas, and business manager of the Lithuanian Daily Draugas. He later served five years as pastor of St. Peter's Church in Kenosha, WI, returning to Chicago in 1957 as superior of the Marian Fathers monastery and general administrator of the Daily Draugas. In 1960 he was again assigned to be pastor of St. Peter's in Kenosha.

In 1963 he was assigned to Rome as consultant to the Marian Father's headquarters. During his six years in Rome he met the present Pope John Paul II on several occasions. At that time, however, the Pope was still a Cardinal. He returned to Chicago in 1969 to become superior of the Marian Fathers Monastery and editor of the Marian magazine. Later Father was assigned to a church in Worcester, MA where he spent

fifteen years. He then returned to Kenosha where he celebrated his Golden Anniversary in 1990. It should be noted that Father was also Spiritual Advisor of Council 40, Kenosha, during his assignments at St. Peter's Church Father Miciunas has earned his eternal rest. May perpetual light shine upon him.

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A Diplomat Who Cared For People

THE STORY OF CHIUNE SUGIHARA

is story is one of the most important stories about the Holocaust, and is about a man who defied the orders of his superiors "because he cared for people and respected life.

Holocaust survivors remember very well Oscar Schindler, a German industrialist, who was responsible for saving the lives of many hundreds of Jews. Jeopardizing his own credibility and safety, he convinced the Nazis that it was in their best interests to allow him to use Jewish labor in his factories.

Few have a better claim to be remembered in the Holocaust Museum than a diplomat named Chiune Sugihara, who served in the Japanese Consulate of prewar Kaunas, the capital of Lithuania at that time.

He was born on January 1, 1900. He had an unusual talent for languages, and was initially trained as a specialist in Russian. In addition, he was fluent in Chinese, German, French and English. He joined Japan's Foreign Ministry at the age of 19, served in occupied Manchuria before being sent to Helsinki, where he stayed for two years. When war broke out, he was transferred to the Consulate in Kaunas. His task was really espionage, particularly monitoring troop movements.

When the Nazis invaded Poland in September 1939, thousands of Jews fled across the Polish-Lithuanian border to seek safety and refuge. Many of them joined their fellow Jews in Kaunas.

In early 1940, Lithuania was still considered independent even though there were thousands of Red Army troops stationed on its territory. After the collapse of the Allies in the West in the summer of 1940, Stalin's grip on Lithuania tightened.

The first months of Soviet occupation put the Jewish community in Kaunas, and elsewhere, in a desperate position. To remain was to risk persecution, especially for the wealthy, educated, and politically-active Jews. To flee westward would court disaster, and yet

foreign travel elsewhere was all but impossible.

A young Dutch Jew came to the Japanese Consulate and proved that there was one possible route to freedom. The Dutch colony of Curacao (located in the. West Indies, comprising two groups of islands in the Caribbean Sea) was one of the few places in the world which did not require an entry visa. He asked for, and was granted, a transit visa.

Within hours, word spread throughout the Jewish community, and crowds gathered at the gates of the consulate. The grown-ups shouted in Polish, a language Sugihara did not understand. Five people were invited to come inside, and Russian became the language of conversation. They were Jews from Poland, they said, escaping from the Nazis, and wanted to travel east through the Soviet Union and eventually reach Japan. Once in Tokyo, they hoped to gain papers from the still- functioning Polish Embassy to travel to Canada. Others would go to Shanghai, which also did not require a visa or entry permit.

Sugihara told them he could issue a few transit visas, but not hundreds. He would have to get permission from his superiors in Tokyo, first, to grant such large numbers. He cabled Tokyo three times, and each time his request was denied. He made up his mind to do "what human beings should do", as he would later state. He worked day and night for a month issuing transit papers, and when the Soviets closed the consulate, he continued doing so from his hotel.

Thoughts began running through his mind, and he had to make such a difficult decision. If the Nazis found out what he was doing, would he put himself and his family, who were with him in Kaunas, in jeopardy? On September 1, he and his family were ordered to leave Lithuania, and Tokyo reassigned him to Berlin. Even as he was leaving the hotel, he continued to stamp those precious papers in the street, at the railway station, and even from the window of his train. As it started to move, refugees ran alongside, and he threw them out the open window to waiting hands. The crowd cried:

"We will never forget you! We will see you again!"

As many as 6,000 Jews, perhaps even thousands more, may have escaped death thanks to Sugihara's courage. With Japan's defeat in the war, the Sugihara family was imprisoned by the Soviets in a Rumanian camp for 18 months. A few months after they returned home, he was dismissed from diplomatic service. Although no formal reason was given, he felt certain it was because he issued those transit visas to the Jews against his government's instructions.

In August 1968, Jehoshua Nishri, a recipient of one of those visas handed out in 1940, was appointed to the Israeli Embassy in Tokyo. He made a surprise phone call to Sugihara to thank him personally for what he did. Now that he was found, Sugihara finally received the recognition that he so justly deserved. In 1968, the Hebrew University in Jerusalem offered his youngest son a full scholarship. The following year, Sempo (as the refugees called him) travelled to Israel to receive a citation from the Holocaust Memorial Museum. He became the first Japanese citizen to be awarded Israel's equivalent of the Nobel Peace Prize, given by the government to foreign nationals who helped Jews during the war.

Tributes from grateful Jews poured around the world in July of 1986 when news was received that Sugihara died of a heart attack. His passing was virtually unnoticed by the Japanese until the Soviet Union collapsed in the summer of 1991, and Lithuania regained her independence. In October, a Japanese Foreign Ministry official was preparing to visit the Baltic States when he learned that one of free Lithuania's actions was to name a street in Vilnius, their capital, to honor Sugihara.

In the Baltics, where the Soviet version of history made the discussion of world events and the fate of Jews even more difficult than in Japan, the Japanese diplomat's role was finally receiving long overdue attention at home.

A dusty file was located in the archives of the Foreign Ministry, and an official invitation for tea was given to Mrs. Sugihara by way of an apology. A few months later, the Prime Minister admitted to the Japanese Parliament that the treatment of Sugihara had been "very regretful". This reversal in policy resulted in a substantial reaction elsewhere in Japan. In 1992, Mrs.

Sugihara was flown to Lithuania to reminisce in front of her old home in Kaunas. In 1992, six years after his death, a monument was dedicated to him at his birthplace of Yaotsu. Located on a hill that is now known as "The Hill of Humanity", a group of Sugihara survivors traveled to Japan to rededicate it in the presence of several high government officials.

In May of 1992, a Tokyo-based theater company inaugurated a play called "Sempo Sugihara" which toured Japan, and two years later performed in Kaunas and Vilnius.

At the Ninth Fort in Kaunas, where countless numbers of Jews and others were murdered by the Nazis, there is now a new display in Sugihara's honor, including material donated by his family during their visit.

Chiune Sugihara has shown that the courage of one man can make a big difference in history.

Kaleda Santa's Predecessor in Old Lithuan

"I am Kaleda. I bring happiness, good harvest and in every manner, well being."

Such was the greeting Lithuanians of olden days received on Christmas Eve from their 'Father Christmas' predecessor to (but not to be con-

fused with) the modern day Santa Claus.

Kaleda, the fictional Father Christmas or the Old Man of Christmas was, to the Lithuanians of old the personification of the Christmas Season. He came from a 'far off land' and brought promise of what the Lithuanian peasants yearned for most happiness, prosperity and a good harvest.

Usually, on Christmas Eve, an old man from a neighboring village would enact the part of Kaleda. He dressed up in a white sheepskin coat, sashed with a linen belt, and a tall sheepskin hat. Under the coat, he put a pillow on his back to imitate a hunchback, and attached a long, white beard to his face. He carried a crooked cane and a bag filled with nuts and other harvest 'goodies'.

As he proceeded on his house-to-house trek, he was frequently followed by a group of excited children, who clung to him and pulled at his belt, asking for treats.

When he came to a house, he rapped on a door with his cane. To the question, "Who's





there?"

He replied: "I am Kaleda. I bring happiness, good harvest and every manner of well being. I come from another land, where the hills are made of flour, the rivers flow with honey, lakes are filled with beer, and where the rain is made of candy and the snow of doughnuts. I carry a bag of treasures - good fortune, plen-

tiful crops, and many other blessings. Please open the door and don't send me back just yet."

Upon entering the house, Kaleda would take various kinds of grain from his bag and sprinkle it over the householders. An ancient superstition attributes good luck in harvesting to the sprinkling of grain. To the young maidens of the house, he would offer soaps and wild herbs for preserving their beauty. Extending best wishes to the family, he would sing a Christmas Carol or two, entertain the children with some funny stories and a few dances, and present them with some nuts from his bag.

In return, the father of the house would treat the old man to some refreshments and Kaleda would continue on to another home.

Kaleda was considered to be the bearer of good fortune - so was always a most welcome visitor on that magical Christmas Eve night.

Christmas Eve Biscuits Prėskučiai, šližikai

1/4 cup warm water (105F to 115F) 1 package dry yeast 3/4 cup milk 1/4 cup sugar 1 teaspoon salt 1 egg, beaten 1/4 cup butter, melted 3 1/2 to 4 cups flour

Dissolve yeast in warm water in large bowl; let stand 5 minutes. Add milk, egg and butter to yeast mixture. Combine flour, 2-3 cups all-purpose flour sugar and salt; stir well. Gradually stir flour mixture into yeast mixture. Add more flour if needed to make a stiff dough. Turn dough into floured board, divide into balls and roll the balls into finger-width coils; cut coils into 1/4 inch pieces; place on a slightly greased cookie sheet and bake at 350F degrees until golden brown.

These can be eaten from dessert bowls with poppy seed milk poured over them

Herring with Mushrooms Silkės su grybais

1 pound mushrooms, washed and sliced

4 herrings or one 32 ounce jar

marinated herring 3 onions, sliced into rings 1 teaspoon vinegar 1/2 tsp. Sugar 1/4 tsp. salt 1/4 tsp. Pepper 3 tablespoons oil

Cut into 4-inch squares Bring the four corners with boiled potatoes. together to make round, watertight

dumplings.

Drop a few at a time into boiling salted water, and cook for 15 minutes. If any stick to the bottom of the pot, prod them gently until they rise.

Meanwhile, brown whole breadcrumbs in the 3 tablespoons from Treasures of Lithuanian herrings, soak them in cold water butter and keep warm. Drain each for 24 hours, changing the water dumpling as it is done and roll it

peas 2 tablespoons green onion, chopped

Rinse sauerkraut and drain in colander; set aside. In skillet heat oil and saute onion until tender.

In salad bowl. sauerkraut, frozen green peas, sauteed onions with the oil and green onions. Let the salad sit for ½ hour or until green peas thaw to room temperature.

without Cabbage Soup

Boil ½ pound mixed vegetables and 1/2 half pound pork bones to make a broth. Strain and bring to a boil again. Boil chopped cabbage with onion and a pinch of caraway uncovered in a small amount of water. Mix 3 on a floured board to a thickness of tablespoons of flour with 1 cup of sour cream, add to broth with and place a plum in the center of cabbage and salt to taste. Serve

Christmas Eve

The people in Lithuania are rich in the splendor and variety of their Christmas holiday traditions. Many of these customs are still maintained within the homes of Lithuanian-Americans, who learned from their immigrant parents or grandparents. Lithuanian Christmas customs center around the church and family. Children are encouraged to do special tasks for their parents; with each good deed marked by placing a piece of straw in a homemade manger; the intent being to make it as soft as possible for the infant Jesus.

The highlight of the Lithuanian Christmas is Christmas Eve, as so aptly told by Vytautas Belaijus from his article, "An Old Fashioned Christmas Eve in Lithuania":

"In Lithuania, we do not anticipate Christmas Day as much as we do Christmas Eve or Kūčios. This is the day of days and the eve of eves. In our district, we never heard of Santa Claus and never received any Christmas gifts. Even so, there was still a great deal of color to Kucios. Long before sunset, my two brothers and I dashed over to Auntie's house. Shaking the snow from our Klumpos (wooden shoes), we entered reciting the customary prayer, "Garbe Jezui Kristui (Praise be Jesus Christ); "Per Amžius Amen" (for ever and ever) would be the reply. With the rising of the evening star, the table was covered with a fine white linen tablecloth, whereupon hav was strown. A picture of the Nativity or the Madonna and Child was made the centerpiece with figurines of cattle and donkeys nearby to imitate the setting of our Savior's birth. Now the family gathered about the table. The dishes were set on the hay; a twelve course dinner honoring the twelve apostles was served, truly a festive meal that only Kūčios could offer.

First we prayed. Then the plotkele, a big square wafer bearing the image of Christ was broken into as many pieces as people at the table; each member kissed the blessed wafer before eating it. Then followed the magnificent feast - chopped herring with seasoning, herring cutlets rolled in flour and linseed oil, fried fish, boiled potatoes, biscuits of Baravyku - the king of mushrooms; slizikai - a batter biscuit; some plain, others mixed with poppy seeds. Then followed a hot porridge, kisielius, of oat flour mixed with water and sometimes in the crust of rye bread, leavened for about 12 hours, cooked and eaten with poppy seed milk. A fruit compote and mead, a sweet drink made of hops and honey, completed the meal.

As the custom, the meal lasts for three hours and to ensure this, the people tell stories on the Nativity and kindred subjects, including any miraculous events. On Christmas Eve, we were told, the wafers turned sweeter and even animals would speak with a human voice to praise the lord's name. The hours never pass more quickly than the three hours of kucios night.

Carols were sung and games were played. Because an apple is reminiscent in the lives of Adam and Eve, a game of prediction ensued. The apple was cut and divided among the participants. If the apple was cut into an even number, all will be well until the next kucios, but if an odd number resulted, one of the guests would be missed at the next Kūčios. Another game is played with sheaves of hay. Sheaves are pulled from under each plate; the one whose sheaf is the longest, will live the longest. After the dinner, the hay was gathered from the table and taken to the stalls of the cattle, so that they, too might share in the feast."
