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

JUDGES:	One from each District plus last year's First Place Winner.

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## Notice of Approved Changes to the Knights of Lithuania National Scholarship Program Announced at the Philadelphia National Convention (July 28-August 1, 1999)



To prepare for the next generation of potential scholarship recipients, the Knights of Lithuania Scholarship Committee made one major change to the Scholarship Program beginning for the 2000 awards, to be announced at the National Convention in Los Angeles. Please read below the change is in **BOLD**. This change was approved by the Scholarship Committee by all 5 members as of July 1999.

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Please read about the current key requirements.

The Knights of Lithuania Scholarship Program is intended to help a worthy and deserving Knight obtain a college education. Applicants must be a member of the organization for at least <u>two</u> years in order to be eligible to apply for a scholarship award. (This will be verified with the National Financial Secretary.) The Scholarship Program is intended to be a stimulus for young Lithuanian-Americans to join and be active in our organization. Service to the Knights of Lithuania organization is of prime importance to be considered for this award.

Scholarships are awarded annually as a grant. Applications must be complete (i.e., picture, transcripts, recommendations, etc) to be considered by the Scholarship Committee. Applications must be submitted usually no later than June 30th of each year. The awards are paid to the recipient in two installments. \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* APPLICANTS MAY NOW APPLY FOR A SCHOLARSHIP MORE THAN ONCE. THIS IS OFFICIAL NOTIFICATION THAT AN APPLICANT MAY WIN MORE THAN ONE YEAR.\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\*

There are various scholarships available with individual amounts decided upon by the Scholarship Committee by vote each year.

Each applicant has the responsibility of completing the application and securing entrance to the college of his/her choice. If the recipient of an award drops out of college, or if his/her scholastic standing becomes unsatisfactory to the college, the unexpended balance of the award may be forfeited at the discretion of the Scholarship Committee.

Scholarship awards may be made to a person for undergraduate or graduate work. There is no age limitation. Organizational activity within the Knights of Lithuania is one of the most important criteria for obtaining a scholarship along with the following requirements and stipulations.

An applicant's qualifications will be based on recommendations made by his/her 1) Council President or Council 3rd Vice President; 2) Spiritual Advisor or Pastor; 3) Former Teacher; 4) Character Reference. Applicants will be evaluated on scholastic records, financial need, and most importantly, K of L involvement. The applications will be carefully studied by the Scholarship Committee and decisions of the committee are final. The recipients of the Scholarship Awards will be announced at the annual National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania.

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# The Miracle of My Sister, Ona Vainiute - Genciene

Ona Vainiute Genciene, her husband Dominikas and their daughters Albina, Evita, Genute and Jadvyga were deported from their farm in Laigiai, Lithuania to Siberia in 1947 by the Soviets.

They were given 15 minutes to leave their farm, forced at gunpoint by Soviet soldiers (NKVD) to climb on the trucks and taken to the railroad station. At the station they were pushed into freight cars with barely enough room to sit down. Women, men and children all together. For a toilet there was just a hole in the floor of the car. There were no doctors traveling with them. The travel to Siberia took 2 weeks, nobody was allowed to leave the freight car.

If somebody died, they were just thrown out into the snow for the wolves, only with the silent burial prayers of those still alive.

When the train reached Krasnoyarsk, Siberia, the deportees were taken to a labor camp in the forest.

Two days later Ona's husband, Dominikas died. A day after that. Ona went to an improvised hospital and her fifth child, a boy, was born. Dominikas never knew that he now had a son.

Ona saw through a window of the hospital how her husband's body was being taken to the camp's cemetery.

My sister wrote me later that her heart almost stopped that day. It is a miracle she survived and was able to raise and educate all her children.

First she was begging, she could not work, because of the needs of the baby and her other small children, which were 8, 6,4 and 2 years old. When the other women saw her with the baby in her arms and the other children holding onto her skirt, they could not hold their tears. Whenever I think about it or write about it, even now I have to weep.

The other women did not have much themselves, but they helped as much as they could, though they were all living on a starvation diet.

When Stalin died and Krushchew came into

power, my sister was allowed to write letters and receive packages. At that time my wife, Ellen, and I had four children and I was making only \$50.00 a week. We saved \$10.00 a week to send packages to my sister Ona in Siberia. We were able to do this on our small income, because my wife Ellen was very thrifty. She made clothes for the children from secondhand wearables given to us (displaced persons, DP's or Dievo Pauksteliai) by our American neighbors or earlier immigrants-older Lithuanians. They helped sometimes with food too, especially on Thanksgiving or Christmas.

Helping my sister Ona in Siberia in her most dire need, was a rewarding sacrifice, but at the same time a heartbreaking affair.

For every package we sent, a service charge and soviet dues amounted to the value of the parcel. It was called "prepaid Soviet dues". If you didn't pay it your relatives would not get the package, because they did not have the money to pay the dues.

Thus, despite as much as we hated the communists, we had to pay the "Soviet dues" to help our relative, a widow with five children.

The Soviets used the dues for spying in America and for propaganda telling the ignorant Americans "how good life is in the Soviet paradise".

Later the deportees were allowed to go home. They had to pay their own fare, despite that they were forcibly brought to Siberia in cattle cars. The fare amounted to a yearly pay for "work". Then they were robbed of every kopek they had hoped to take home to start a new life. My sister wrote, that, if not for the packages we sent (part she did sell) she would not have been able to return to Lithuania. Back in Lithuania, partly with our help, she was able to raise and educate her children.

The eldest, Albina became a railroad engineer, Evita an architect, Genute a chemical engineer, Jadvyga a clerk and Albinas became a truckdriver.

My sister left her valley of tears surrounded by her children and grandchildren in 1988. May God give her a very deserved eternal rest. If she is not in heaven, we don't have much hope to get there.


Rest in peace my dearest sister Ona Vainiute Genciene.

I wrote the above with the hope that my children, their children and other who would read these lines will get a better picture of the soviet "paradise" as it was then.

In my opinion, it hasn't changed much. Russia is still in the economic grips of the communist bosses. There is no freedom and Russia is not returning any lands: Finland's Karelija, Japan's Kurille Islands, East

## Book Review: Raised to the Light: Stories of Hope and Transformation

Loretta Girzaitis © 1999, St. Mary's Press 196 pages, \$11.95



Although not considered a self-help book, this collection of short stories about real people and their life struggles is something one can read as inspiration each day, in the morning, on the train, at the waiting room. Reading these tales of real life people will help put one's own life into perspective and one can walk away with a good and grateful feeling.

The chapters are arranged in twenty-one categories labeled Time for God, Birth, Planting, Suffering, Wisdom, etc. Each section is prefaced by a few paragraphs of description and relevant free-form descriptive poetry by Girzaitis is scattered throughout the book. These short missives involve situations that ordinary individuals go through, how they handled them and the lessons learned in doing so.

A story about a Lithuanian American, Dr. Gintautas Sabitaitis, related the program Partnership for Hope, which was begun in 1995. It followed the "sister cities" of Cleveland, Ohio and Klaipeda, Lithuania and how the generosity of Dr. Sabitaitis and others in time and money aided Lithuanian children who needed desperate Prussia, Chechnia, which were liberated again "to slavery by the Russian bayonets".

All these countries and their people will be free if the West will keep believing that the freedom is indivisible and only then will come the end of the slavery of the hidden communism.

PS: I wrote the above lines with a heavy heart and many times my tears were running down my face remembering my sister Ona's life in the communist hell.

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medical attention in the former communist country. More publicized was the story of Tomas, a child born without a lower jaw and chin, who was flown to Cleveland in order to obtain the necessary surgery with the monetary help of a ninety three year old Cleveland woman and many of her senior citizen friends. The compassion and caring of these individuals helped Klaipeda medically advance. It reminds one of the work done by Aid to Lithuania and others in the K of L who are helping Lithuania advance to modern medicine, as well as giving aid to poverty stricken children, seniors and citizens of Lithuania who are finding times rough since the collapse of the soviet system.

Stories involving homosexuality in the chapter entitled *Time for Acceptance* may be a bit hard to take for those of us who are not used to reading about homosexuals in a religious setting. This was the only chapter that had too much of a "liberal spin" for my liking, not because of the plights of the gay men involved, but because of their cover up in a church setting, albeit not a Catholic one. It does not depict honesty, and in my opinion, the men should not have worked in a religious environment as ministers preaching the gospel, but rather as lay assistants.

Bill Huebsch, author, teacher and founder of the Vatican II Center, said the book is a great treasure for anyone attempting to connect faith with life, and he added that he'd like to "put the book in the hands of every person who has ever faced a personal struggle.

I'd recommend this book as food for thought when one is feeling depressed about their own situation in life, as it is indeed an uplifting experience.

# ST. COSOMOE ON THE ONTEENET

b: 1461 d: 1484 Feastday: March 4 Patron Saint of Poland and Lithuania

To honor our beloved Saint Casimir this year, rather than another story about his life, the editors thought we might give readers an idea of what one would find when researching St. Casimir on the Internet. Begin

by selecting a search engine, such as Alta Vista, HotBot, Lycos.etc. and simply type in St Casimir. From a search on many of them, the results one finds are quite similar. First of all, there are many churches and cemeteries bearing the name of our beloved patron located in the US, Canada, Lithuania, Australia and other places. Of the more interesting is the Jesuit Church of St. Casimir in Vilnius which gives a good overview of the church as well as its interesting history. Because our patron is shared with the Polish people, many churches and cemeteries are listed as Polish. There is even a French-Canadian site "Caverne de St. Casimir" for those who want to brush up on their French. Some of the Lithuanian sites have problems with the diacritical characters and depending on the type of computer used, may not translate correctly. This is the problem for many who produce these sites, one has to check them on various search engines and platforms (IBM, Mac, etc.), so that all viewers receive the same fonts.

One can even find a listing for "Harley-Davidson of St. Casimir" which turns out to be a Polish motorcycle group located in Canada.

To teach your children or grandchildren who this special saint is, the editors recommend a website called: *Catholic Online Saints* which does not replace the popular Butler's Lives of the Saints, but allows no excuses in finding out about St. Casimir or a multitude



of others (*Saints/Catholic.org* will get you there.) Probably the most striking paragraphs that stike a chord with young people are the following:

"Casimir realized from an early age that his life belonged to someone else, but to a much higher King than his father. Despite pressure, humiliation, and rejection, he stood by that loyalty through his whole life. Born the third of thirteen children in 1461, Casimir was committed to God from childhood. Some of that commitment was the result of a tutor, John Dlugosz, whose holiness encouraged Casimir on his own journey.

It may be hard for us to imagine royal luxury as

a pressure. But for Casimir, the riches around him were temptations to forget his true loyalties. Rebelling against the rich, fashionable clothes he was expected to enjoy, he wore the plainest of clothes.

Rejecting even ordinary comforts, he slept little, spending his nights in prayer. And when he did sleep, he lay on the floor not on a royal bed. Even though he was a prince, many of those around him must have laughed and joked at his choices. Yet, in the face of any pressure, Casimir was always friendly and calm."

"He died at the age of 23 in 1484 from lung disease. He was buried with his favorite song, a Latin hymn to Mary called "Omni die dic Mariae" which we know as "Daily, Daily Sing to Mary."

The Catholic Encyclopedia also has a listing, but refers to "St. Casimir of Poland" under it's www.newadvent.org site.

Finally, to understand the feast day and how it's celebrated in Lithuania, one of the best sites is the Lithuanian American Community's *St. Casimir Customs and Traditions* which includes a tradition of giving honey cookie hearts, along with recipes to make your own and verbos, dried flower arrangements customarily used on Palm Sunday in Lithuania. ## Musings over Lithuanian: Sometimes Fun, Often Fascinating, and Always Challenging

Many of our readers, like myself, are secondgeneration Lithuanians, i.e. American-born of foreignborn parents. Our first speech was nothing more than the style of that era. A mixture of English with a Lithuanian twist, lots of Polish and a dash of Russian, undergirded with solid basic Lithuanian.

Lithuanian, like any language, has its double entendre that lends itself to humor. When directing a guest to put a garment on a hanger, one is tempted to allude to the gallows by saying: "Čia gali pasikarti" that is, "You may hang yourself here!"

If you like puns, perhaps you can appreciate my version of the origin of the word "to faint," i.e. "nualpti." It seems that Mikas and Petras enjoyed skiing, so off they went to Switzerland to the mountains. When Mikas reached the peak of the Alps and glanced below at the enormous depth, he blanched and then fainted. Thus the etymology of the word "nualpti," in my dictionary meaning to tumble from the Alps!

In the past decade, I had occasion to spend several weeks at a time with relatives from the "Old Country" as we used to call it. The conversations often provoked innocent laughter. "Don't you use this word any more, I would ask. "Only in the villages," was the smiling retort. So, for instance, I stopped using "rubežius" for the border of a country, and switched to "sienas." My listeners keeled over with chuckles when I said "poperiuoti" as the verb "to wallpaper," instead of "tepetuoti." But look! Our folks had no such thing as wallpaper in their native cottages of rough-hewn planks. Here in the USA, on seeing someone hanging wallpaper, for these immigrants it was simply logic to use the equivalent word "to paper." At one point I explained to a cousin that when she listened to me speak, I was a museum artifact ("exponatas") for her, displaying the language of a century ago.

Even so, let's stick to those treasured nostalgic phrases we absorbed from Mom and Dad. I even stumped a professional DP couple on one occasion when I used the word "pavenis" to mean the shade of a tree. "No, no," my hosts objected. Your word means "one by one" since they thought I was saying "pavienis." OK, so I was wrong, I thought. But curiosity drove me to the dictionary, and sure enough there was my little-known friend "pavenis" for shade, used in some areas of the homeland, though not universally.

On another occasion I was momentarily embarrassed at the church door as I greeted exiting parishioners. The gospel of the day included Christ's invitation to imitate Him. "I am meek and gentle of heart." Oops! "You mispronounced a word; it should be 'ramus not 'romus' chirped a self-appointed teacher. OK, so I goofed again. But hold it. I checked the text, and sure enough it was indeed "romus." A vicious criminal could be calm ("ramus"), but "romus" reflects an inner beauty announced by our word "gentle." I'm told that "ramus" is no longer used in ordinary conversation. But so what. Let's revive this beautiful word!

And don't you love that elegant noun "bičiulis," that derives, as I understand, from "bite" - the word for "bee." "Draugas" is a friend, but "bičiulis" is an intimate friend. Given the Lithuanian fondness for bees, when a bond deepened, one or the other person might present the gift of a beehive as a sign of that friendship. As readers most likely know, Lithuanian uses separate verbs to indicate when a living being expires. For animals we say "isgaišti" or "pastipti," but for humans we reserve the infinitive "mirti." Out of reverence for bees, nevertheless, we extend "mirti "to them, too.

At your next council meeting, recite your reminiscences of language experiences. This could be a rewarding and relaxing time for some innocent mirth. Better still, send in your stories to our house journal to share with others.


On the Feast of St. Casimir, March 4, Msgr.

Vocations, the College made an appeal for financial support and a recruitment drive for new benefactors.

Father Kazys Mellius, of the Vilnius Archdiocese, successfully defended his doctoral thesis in Canon Law at the Pontifical Lateran University on April 28. That evening there was a dinner at the College honoring the new Doctor in Canon Law.

The official closing of the academic year took place

May 31 in the College Chapel. Te Deum was sung.

On June 24, Father Juozas Siurys of the Telsiai diocese successfully defended his doctoral thesis in Canon Law at the Pontifical Lateran University. That evening a dinner was held honoring the New Doctor in Canon Law.

On June 29 a number of the students at the College, along with the Sisters and some of the Staff departed on a bus for Lithuania hired by the College. The bus also carried the personal properties of the students who completed their studies this year.

July and August the College is closed for vacation and various repairs on the College.

The Bishops of Lithuania visited the College's Chapel in the Campo Verano Cemetery on the 15th where they prayed for those buried there as well as for the benefactors of the College.

On the 17th The Bishops of Lithuania, the Priests at the College and other Lithuanian priests studying in Rome concelebrated Mass with the Holy Father in the Chapel of his summer residence in Castel Gandolfo.

October 11 was the official opening of the academic year at the College.

On the 30th Robertas Salasevicius was ordained a Deacon in the Basilica of St. John Lateran. H.E. Archbishop A.J. Backis, the College Staff and several of the College students participated.

On November 2 a Mass was held in the College chapel at Campo Verano (Rome's main cemetery) for the deceased benefactors of the College and the Priests buried there. Besides the students at the College, a large number of Lithuanians studying in





Rome participated.

November 16 was the Feast of Ausros Vartai Marijos (Our Lady of the Dawn Gate).

On the first Saturday of each month, students from Lithuania, priests and laity, gather to celebrate Mass in the Lithuanian Chapel (Ausros Vartai) at St. Peter's Basilica.

On Christmas Eve, Kucios was held and Midnight Mass was offered for all the College's benefactors, living and deceased.

On New Years Eve all the residents of the College celebrated a Mass of Thanksgiving in the College Chapel.



To honor this special saint, we've included some editor's favorites, one from a Lithuanian chef who wants to remain anonymous. Enjoy!

#### **Shepherd's Pie**

2 pounds ground chuck

- 1/2 yellow onion chopped
- 1/2 cup celery chopped
- 2 cloves garlic pressed
- 1/4 cup beef base
- 1 cup water
- 2 tablespoons flour
- 2 pounds potatoes peeled and boiled 1/4 stick butter

4 ounces cheddar cheese - shredded

Saute beef, onion, celery and garlic until done. Drain the beef mixture. Make a gravy with the beef base and water and whisk in enough flour to thicken. When gravy comes to a boil, add the beef mixture. Cook and drain potatoes and mash with butter. Blanch carrots (cook briefly in boiling water) Then add to beef mixture. Place beef mixture in 2 qt. casserole or baking pan. Spoon mashed potatoes on top of beef; bake 20 minutes at 350 degrees. Top with cheese and let sit until cheese is melted about 5 minutes.

NOTES : Beef base is a commercial product usually found in the supermarket on the soup and bouillon shelves. One cup of beef bouillon or stock can be substituted for beef base and water.

#### **Steak & Guinness Pie**

pie pastry for double 10-12 in. pie 1 2-lb Round steak 1 TBSP Flour 1 TBSP Brown sugar 1 TBSP Raisins 5 small-med onions 1 bottle Guinness stout 8 Slices bacon 3 TBSP shortening Chopped parsley

For double-crust pie in deep pie dish. - Cut the steak into bite sized cubes, roll in seasoned flour, and brown in the shortening with the bacon, chopped small. Place the meat in a casserole, peel and chop the onions, and fry until golden before adding them to the meat. Add the raisins and brown sugar, pour in the Guinness, cover tightly and simmer over a low heat or in a very moderate oven (325-350F) for 2 1/2 hours. Stir occasionally, and add a little more Guinness or water if the rich brown gravy gets too thick. Meanwhile, line a deep pie dish with half the pie crust: bake it: then add the Guinness/beef mixture from the casserole, cover with the top layer of pie crust, and bake until finished, probably about 10 more minutes.

#### **Irish Soda Bread**

3 cups Bread flour

1 cup graham flour

- 1/2 cup Sugar, 1 1/3 TBSP Salt
- 1 1/3 TBSP Butter, 1 cup Raisins
- **3 TBSP Caraway seeds**
- 1 1/2 tsp Baking soda

1 1/2 cup Buttermilk, 2 tsp Dry yeast

In large mixing bowl, combine flour, baking powder, salt and sugar. Cut in cold butter with pastry blender or two knives until fine. Stir in raisins. In bowl beat eggs, stir in buttermilk and soda. Make well in dry ingredients and add liquids all at once, mixing lightly with fork until blended. Turn dough on to floured surface and knead lightly for 10 seconds. Shape dough into ball and place on buttered baking sheet. Flatten ball into 8 or 9-inch loaf. Grease sharp knife with butter and cut 1/4-inch deep cross from edge to edge to mark into quarters. Brush top with melted butter and sprinkle with caraway seeds; bake in preheated 375F oven 40- 45 minutes or until golden brown. Remove from baking sheet and cool to lukewarm.

#### **Corned Beef & Cabbage**

- 5 lbs. Corned beef brisket
- 1 lg Onion stuck with
- 6 whole cloves
- 6 Carrots, peeled and halved
- 8 medium Potatoes, washed, quartered
- 1 tsp Dried Thyme
- 1 small Bunch Parsley
- 1 Head Cabbage (appr 2 lbs), quartered

HORSERADISH SAUCE:

- 1/2 pint Whipping Cream
- 2 TBSP mayonnaise
- 2-4 TBSP prepared horseradish

Put beef in a large pot and cover with cold water. Bring to a boil with the lid off the pot. ADD thyme, parsley and onion.Turn to simmer and cook for 3 hours. Skim fat from top as it rises. Add cabbage, potatoes, and carrots. Simmer for 20-30 minutes until cabbage is cooked. Remove the meat and cut into pieces. Place on center of a large platter. Strain the cabbage and season it heavily with black pepper. Surround the beef with the cabbage, carrots and potatoes. Serve with horseradish sauce.

Horseradish Sauce: Whip cream until it stand in peaks. Fold in mayonnaise and horseradish.

To the Editor:

I was fortunate to happen upon this address as it was happening. Let me tell you, this man was incredible in his strength to give this speech. It was, I would guess, one of the few times that some of the people in attendance that day were completely speechless! It is a subject that I feel strongly about, as the people that know me are already aware of, so allow me a few minutes of your time and please read this portion of his message.

#### Eduardas Zemaitis, VYTIS correspondent Council C146, Harrisburg, Pa

"I wish we all could have heard his message six months ago, when he gave his presentation. It is funny how the media selects the information they feel is important to report to the public.

On Thursday, May 27, 1999, Darrell Scott, the father of Rachel Scott, a victim of the Columbine High School shootings in Littleton, Colorado, was invited to address the House Judiciary Committee:

What he said to our national leaders during this special session of Congress was painfully truthful. It needs to be heard by every parent, every teacher, every politician, every sociologist, every psychologist, and every so-called expert! These courageous words spoken by Darrell Scott are powerful, penetrating, and deeply personal. There is no doubt that God sent this man as a voice crying in the wilderness.

The following is a portion of the transcript:

"Since the dawn of creation there has been both good and evil in the heart of men and women. We all contain the seeds of kindness or the seeds of violence. The death of my wonderful daughter, Rachel Jo Scott, and the deaths of that heroic teacher, and the other eleven children who died must not be in vain. Their blood cries out for answers. The first recorded act of violence was when Cain slew his brother Abel out in the field. The villain was not the club he used. Neither was it the NCA, the National Club Association. The true killer was Cain, and the reason for the murder could only be found in Cain's heart.

I wrote a poem just four nights ago that expresses my feelings best. This was written way before I knew I would be speaking here today.

> Your laws ignore our deepest needs Your words are empty air You've stripped away our heritage You've outlawed simple prayer Now gunshots fill our classrooms And precious children die You seek for answers everywhere And ask the question "Why" You regulate restrictive laws Through legislative creed And yet you fail to understand That God is what we need!

I challenge every young person in America, and around the world, to realize that on April 20, 1999, at Columbine High School - prayer was brought back to our schools."
