

"ANGELS COME IN MANY FORMS; THIS ONE CAME IN UNIFORM" BY Jean Valente - C-50. Hamden, CT

This is a story of Lithuania.

This is a story of Terese, a girl of sixteen, living in the beautiful country of Lithuania with momyti, tetis, two brothers and little sister. And this is a story of war.

This is the story of Terese's family, forced to abandon their home, fleeing Russian soldiers. Terese escaped into the unknown. Before long, hopeful songs, dreams of the future became overshadowed.

This is the story of Terese and her family, traveling through rough roads in a covered wagon, encountering other refugees. Some were sad, angry, hopeless. Terese soon discovered that all were weary, impoverished, hungry. Hardship prevailed. Terese longed to feed, clothe and comfort Lithuania. Once, when she encountered a baby, scantily clad, she fashioned her warm scarf into a nightshirt for the freezing infant.

Terese came of age in the worst circumstances, caring for others as best she could. Prosperous by contrast, Terese's family shared their provisions. War's ugliness moved closer every day. The families' meager supplies became exhausted. Soon all were in dire straights, nearing *the front*.

This is the story of Terese, running for her life. For days she lost sight of her family, had nothing to eat. Many nights she believed Russian soldiers would kill her before morning.

Low-flying fighter planes strafed the countryside. Terese stumbled and fell, sharp blasts of dirt stinging her face and body as volleys of bullets



blasted the earth around her. The ground shook with the force of exploding bombs.

Through this torment, Terese tried to remain strong. Finally she could endure no more. Overcome by horror, exhausted, she lay down in the mayhem and gave up.

This is the story of a stranger, a German soldier, who, with bullets flying ran to Terese and flung himself over her, covering her body with his. Into the terrified young girl's ear he prayed, speaking soothingly. Even as the battle raged all about them, he admonished her not to forget God, to have faith.

Closing her eyes to the world around her, Terese succumbed to unconsciousness. She awoke to find herself with her family. Somehow they survived.

In this story Terese was never to know the identity of the angel in uniform.

This story is more than a true account of courage and human spirit transcendent. My mind shelters these visions. My heart mimics every shudder, halt and sigh. My blood surges and ebbs with a cadence of days measured before I was.

This story is not mine, yet it is my legacy. It embraces my soul, instructs my character with force and wisdom beyond my being or experience. Because a soldier was there long ago to save the life of young Terese. And because this is the story of Terese, it belongs with me, becomes mine to tell.

This is a story of Lithuania.

This is the story of a brave soldier.

This is the story of Terese.

This is the story of my mother.

K OF L-ERS PUT SMILES ON THE FACES OF A NEEDY LITHUANIAN FAMILY

At the recommendation of Roze Somkaite, member of C-29, Newark, and worker with Containers being sent to Lithuania by LCRA and the Lithuanian National Fund, members were informed by Loretta Stukas, HM, of the special needs of a large family of orphans, the Navickas family, in Krivoniu kaimas, Kaisadoriai, Lithuania.

The mother of this family died of cancer 8 years ago, leaving 10 children of one family, plus a cousin, ranging in age from 6 to 16. Two years later, their father left to marry another woman, leaving the children to fend for themselves. The children have not seen their father since! The government wanted to split the family and place the children into foster homes, but the family asked to stay together, and the government allowed it, placing the younger children on Children's Welfare, and making the oldest child the official guardian. Minimal help was provided for the older children, who, with the younger children, sustained their family, working their land and additional land they rented. They spent their extra energy and minimal saved funds to fix up their little house with paint and other materials they were able to purchase or received from friends. They live in a family spirit, helping one another where they can. The walls of their home were decorated with family photos, showing how much they care for each other.

Over the years, as they grew up, several of the children left the home to start their own families, but continued to help the remaining 7 children as much as possible.

Early this year, another tragedy hit these brave children...an electrical fire broke out and their little home and everything in it burned to a crisp. The children, now mostly teenagers, still chose to stay together on their property. The boys live in a construction trailer, the girls in a lean-to shed that had existed on the property. Ilona and Henry Laucius, who spent the last few years working in Lithuania, visited the family, and found them to be an exemplary family...hard-working, clean, friendly, and caring.

Neighbors and friends joined together to help them build a modest new house to live in. Donations up to \$2,000 have been received, and the house is started, but more money, perhaps \$5,000 or more, is needed to continue the building, hopefully before winter, and added funds are needed to furnish it.


At the K of L Convention, Loretta Stukas told the K of L Foundation members, and later the rest of the delegates about the plight of this family. As always, member immediately came to the family's aid, donating \$420.00 to help them with their building project. Significant in this project was the donation of \$25.00 each from **Robert and Erin Petkus**, Junior K of L-ers from Dayton, the children of Michael and Norma Petkus, who chose to donate their \$25.00 Junior Conventionships to this cause, rather than use the money for their own pleasure.

The funds have been sent out in the name of the K of L, to Lithuanian Catholic Religious Aid, who is coordinating efforts for the Navickas family. If anyone else would like to join in this cause, they may do so by sending their donations to:

--A SPECIAL TRIBUTE TO REV. DR. MATAS CYVAS -"The Great Leader of Council 147"

We would like to commend our great leader, Rev. Dr. Matas Cyvas, the Saviour of our St. Casimir Mission at St. Petersburg Beach, Florida. He was there for the mission's problems: Father Ropolas', OFM, illness and his passing away, etc. He has continuously pitched in to help with other numerous problems. His health and injuries slowed him down somewhat, but not for long. He picked right up again and is "Up and at'em."

Father Cyvas was born on April 30, 1916, and is now 84 years old. He joined our Council on September 27, 1989, 11 years ago. He is now a Third Degree Knight. His accomplishments are never ending. Rev. Dr. Cyvas has been our Spiritual Advisor for our Council #147, since 1996. However, he was "Acting Spiritual Advisor" for a number of years prior, due to the illness and age of Rev. Jonas Gasiunas, who passed away March 9, 1998.

When he celebrated his 80th birthday and 55years of Ordination to the priesthood in 1996, our member, Valeria Lescinskiene, composed a special poem in Lithuanian, as a tribute to Rev. Dr. Matas Cyvas. She read it and presented it to him at our meeting. By special request, it has been published in this issue of the Vytis, exactly as composed, on the opposite page. We are mourning the loss of our Spiritual Advisor and friend, Msgr. Francis John Pranckus, the retired pastor of St. George Church. After serving God for 55 years, he was called home by our heavenly Father on September 6, 2000.

He was born in Lawrence, Massachusetts on March 3, 1919, grew up in New Britain, studied at Marianapolis College in Thompson, CT, Marian Hills Seminary in Hinsdale, IL, St. Procopius Seminary in Lisle, IL, and St. Mary's Seminary in Baltimore. He was ordained in St. Joseph's Cathedral in Hartford on Dec. 22, 1945.

He served in St. Joseph Parish in Waterbury, Holy Trinity Parish in Hartford, and St. Ambrose Parish in Bridgeport. He came to St. George Lithuanian Parish in Bridgeport as assistant to Rev. M. Kazlauskas. In 1964, he became pastor of St. George Church. In 1965, Sacred Heart Church merged with us when that church was demolished to make way for Interstate 95.


In 1983, Pope John Paul II appointed him Prelate of Honor, with the title of Monsignor.

On August 20th, Msgr. made his last, brave attempt to celebrate the Mass prior to our picnic, but was too weak and had to be taken home. Monsignor put up a valiant battle with cancer.


His body lay in state Sunday, Sept. 10, 2000, at St. George Church. Monday morning was the Mass of Christian burial, with 16 priests and prelates in attendance, and a filled church.

Msgr. was a humble, but active Lithuanian. Good-bye, Monsignor. You will be missed, but our memories of you live on!



Cranberry-Pineapple Pie


- 1 pound fresh cranberries
- 1 can (6¹/₂ ounces) pineapple chunks, drained
- 1 cup pineapple juice
- 2 cups sugar Juice of 1 lemon
- 2 tablespoons unflavored gelatin
- 1 9-inch pie shell, baked Whipped cream

Bring cranberries, pineapple, pineapple juice, sugar, lemon juice, and gelatin to a boil. Boil 10 minutes. Cool. Pour into pie shell and chill. Garnish with whipped cream.

Plantation Pecan Pie

- 3 eggs
- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 1/2 cup sugar
- 1/4 cup butter or margarine, melted
- 1 teaspoon vanilla
- 1 cup pecan halves
- 1 9-inch pieshell, unbaked

Preheat oven to 350° F. In a medium bowl, beat eggs thoroughly with a wire whisk or hand beater. Beat in corn syrup, sugar, butter, and vanilla until well blended. Arrange pecan halves in a single layer in bottom of piecrust. Pour egg mixture carefully over the pecans. Bake 1 hour or until knife inserted about 1 inch from the edge comes out clean. Cool.



Coconut-Pumpkin Pie

- 1 can (3¹/₂ ounces) flaked coconut, divided
- 1/4 cup crushed graham cracker crumbs
- 1/3 cup butter or margarine, melted
- 2 tablespoons sugar
- 1 envelope unflavored gelatin
- 3/4 teaspoon cinnamon
- 1/2 teaspoon ground ginger
- 1/2 teaspoon nutmeg
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 3/4 cup sugar, divided
- 3 eggs, separated
- 1/2 cup milk
- 1¹/₄ cups canned pumpkin Whipped cream

Preheat oven to 375° F. Spread coconut on a cookie sheet; bake 8 to 10 minutes or until lightly browned. Reserve two tablespoons for garnish. In a 9-inch pie plate, mix remaining coconut, crumbs, butter, and 2 tablespoons sugar. Press firmly to bottom and side of pie plate. Bake for 7 minutes or until golden. Set aside to cool. In the top of a double boiler, blend gelatin, cinnamon, ginger, nutmeg, salt, and 1/2 cup sugar. In a small bowl, beat egg volks with milk until blended. Stir into gelatin mixture. Blend in pumpkin. Cook over boiling water, stirring often, for 20 minutes or until thickened. Refrigerate until cool but not set. In a large bowl, beat egg whites until soft peaks form. Continue to beat at high speed while sprinkling in remaining 1/4 cup sugar. Gently fold pumpkin mixture into beaten egg whites. Pour into crust; refrigerate until set. Serve topped with whipped cream and a sprinkling of toasted coconut.
