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





THE DECLARATION OF INDEPENDENCE February 16, 1918

The Council of Lithuania in its meeting of February 16, 1918, voted unanimously to address the governments of Russia, Germany and other states with the following declaration:

The Council of Lithuania, sole representative of the Lithuanian people, in conformity with the recognized right to national self-determination and in accordance with the resolution of the Lithuanian Conference held in Vilnius from September 18 to 23, 1917 hereby proclaims the restitution of the independent State of Lithuania, founded on democratic principles, with Vilnius as its capital, and declares the severance of all ties which formerly bound this State to other nations.

The Council of Lithuania also declares that the foundation of the Lithuanian State and relations with other countries will be finally normalized by a Seimas (parliament), elected in a democratic way by the people of Lithuania.

The Council of Lithuania in informing (the nations addressed) to this effect, kindly requests recognition of the independent State of Lithuania.



MONTHS OF THE YEAR IN LITHUANIAN

Upon closer examination, the names given to the months of the year by English-speaking, Germanic or some other nations are derived from the names of ancient gods or Roman emperors. The names of the months in Lithuanian are unique and original. The months of an agricultural nation are named after natural phenomena or tasks performed at a particular time of the year. These names are typical of the Lithuanian nation, her nature and the Lithuanian way of life.

The months of the year in Lithuanian can be explained as follows.

Sausis (January) - the first month of the year. At this time of the year, Lithuania is in the grip of a profound winter. All of nature is covered with a thick blanket of snow. Rivers, streams, ponds, lakes and bogs are under ice. No open water can be found anywhere. If it snows, the snow is fine, dry ("sausas"), blown by the wind. The snow does not come down in wet, heavy, slushy flakes. In other words, it is dry ("sausa") in Lithuania at this time of the year, and therefore the month has been named "sausis."

Vasaris (February). The winter is coming to an end. People are beginning to make plans for summer ("vasara") tasks, to think about the summer. During this month, the first thaws begin: the sun shines more brightly at midday, water begins to drip from the roof and toward evening stretches into gleaming "ice candles" - icicles. Sled tracks rut smooth roads. Everyone feels that though spring has not yet arrived the weather is turning toward spring, toward summer.

Kovas (March) - a time of change, of struggle ("kova") between the cold and spring. One day it's snowing, the next it's freezing, the following day the weather again turns warmer. Hilltops begin to darken for the snow melts there the quickest. Some birds return, among them the rook. The rook (kovas) belongs to the crow family (Corvus frugilegus). It is a large black bird with a blue and purple sheen to the plumage. They circle above the treetops, settle on the fields in scores to march about in search of food. The air is filled by a chorus of caws and croaks as the rooks court, build their nests and mate. The cawing proclaims that spring has nearly arrived. It can thus be said that the month derives its name from two sources: the winter's battle (kova) with spring, and the returning of the rook (kovas).

Balandis (April) is already a spring month. Doves ("balandis") coo and mate on the farm and the cooing of wild doves can be heard in the slowly greening countryside. Other songbirds have yet to return, so the dove's soft cooing is not yet drowned out by the magnificent songbirds.

Gegužis (May) is the most beautiful month in Lithuania. Everything is sprouting, blooming and verdant. In the forest the call of the cuckoo (geguté or gegužé) is heard. The bird is cherished by Lithuanians and gives the month its name.

The cuckoo is a mysterious and magic bird. It is the harbinger of true spring. Until the cuckoo's call is heart, venturing outdoors in bare feet is dangerous even if the weather is warm, because the earth underneath is still frozen and can cause ailments. The cuckoo's call dispels the last vestige of winter and ensures the cold is gone for good.

The cuckoo's first call determines a person's fortune for that year. Upon hearing the cuckoo for the first time, a person frets whether he has money on his person. If he does, he'll have money all year, things will go well; if he has no money, his pockets will be empty all year long, the wind will blow right through them. It is very good to be carrying a full bucket, basket or bag when hearing the first call of the cuckoo. You will then be wealthy (full of everything) the entire year. It is also to one's advantage to be in a happy mood when the cuckoo's first call is heard. A frowning, unhappy person is condemned to live in a foul mood all year

When a person first hears the cuckoo's first "coo-coo" he or she may ask: "How many years will I live? In how many years (months) will I wed? The answer is the number of times the cuckoo calls after the question. Upon hearing the cuckoo's first call, a young woman walks backwards until she backs into a tree. She must then break a small bough from the tree and pluck it clean until it looks like a hook. With this hook she can "catch" the young man she prefers.

If the first cuckoo is heard in the company of a large group, the year will be happy, many dances, weddings and parties will be attended. If the cuckoo happens to call from the tree under which a person is seated, it is a bad sign. The year will be difficult. If this befalls an unmarried girl, she will bear an illegitimate child.

This is but a small sampling of the beliefs related to the cuckoo's return and call. It shows that the cuckoo was a favorite bird. It is thus not surprising that the spring's most beautiful month is named after the cuckoo.

Birželis (June). The month derives its name from the newly budded birch ("beržas") which is the symbol of the miraculously restored nature, youth and fertility. Homes, farms and animals are decorated with birch branches not only at Pentecost, but for other occasions as well. The custom survives from pagan times.

Liepa (July). In the heat of the summer the air is redolent with linden ("liepa") blossoms and resounds with the buzzing of bees as they gather clear golden honey. Lithuanians are known as beekeepers and the linden is a decorative tree favored in villages and forests. The name of this month is thus very significant and appropriate.

Rugpjūtis (August) is a time of toil. Because rye ("rugiai") was Lithuania's major grain crop and life without daily rye bread was inconceivable, the harvest month is named after the cutting (pjauti) of the rye. (In years gone by, rye was cut with sickles), thereby the name of the month "rugpjutis" - month for cutting the rye.

Rugséjis (September) is also related to the

cultivation of rye. Because rye is a winter grain, the fields are prepared in the fall when the seeds are sown. The rye germinates and sprouts before the first frost and then hibernates under a thick blanket of snow. Early in the spring it revives and begins to grow vigorously. Lithuania is a northern country where the summers are relatively short, therefore certain cultivated plants cannot be grown to maturity during the summer and must be sown in the fall.

Spalis (October). This name is difficult to understand for those who have distanced themselves from farm work. Besides rve, flax was a vital crop for the Lithuanian farmer. It was used not only to make the cloth the family needed, but was also sold as a cash crop to buy the necessary articles the land could not produce. Lithuania's flax was of a quality. During high the vears independence flax was exported to distant foreign lands, thus producing income for both farmers and the state.

The name "spalis" is related to flax processing which was done in the fall. The fiber from which linen thread is made is encased in the stem of the flax plant. The stem is covered with a hard material similar to bent-grass or wheat straw. The stem must be broken to remove the fiber. The hard shell crumbles and the fiber can then be processed further. The crumbled particles of the flax stem are called shives ("spaliai"). Sometimes the shives were used as insulation and poured ceilings over the of houses construction, but mostly they were dispersed, buried into the ground to rot.

Lapkritis (November) is the late autumn month whose name is derived from the falling of leaves ("lapu kritimas") and the onset of frost. November is usually cold, wet and muddy. The sun makes only rare appearances and the days are mostly gloomy. The nights are especially dark, suited for get-togethers and the telling of horror stories. In Lithuania, All Souls' Day is celebrated at the beginning of November.

Gruodis (December). The rains of autumn and the mud finally end. The ground

freezes with the cold, it becomes hard and coarse. Every clod of soil hardens, ice covers the puddles. Country roads, a mire of mud in the fall, are now bumpy and lumpy. Wheels shake and jump as they turn unevenly. Soil that has frozen into such lumps is called "gruodas." Hence the month's name.



DID YOU KNOW THAT

A MEDITATION/REFLECTION ROOM HAS BEEN OPENED AT THE "SEIMAS" IN VILNIUS?

From an article that appeared in the "Draugas" daily Lithuanian Newspaper in Chicago this past December, readers were informed that from now on the members of the "Seimas" will have a place where they can reflect and meditate, not only about legislative projects, but also about "eternal values."

Saturday, the last day of the fall session, a special Meditation/Reflection Room was opened. This idea was proposed by Conservative leader, Vytautas Landsbergis. Participating in the opening day ceremonies were; president of the "Seimas," Arturas Paulauskas and several other members.

Up to now, there are no religious articles or symbols in the room. Vytautas Landsbergis says that this was purposely done so that people of different religions can make use of the room.

The only object now, that will help members reflect on things of eternity, is a black marble plaque mounted on one wall.

The Social Democratic Coalition member, Nikolajus Medvedevas, suggested that a sound system be set up in the room, so that sacred music may be played. Christian Democrat, Petras Graziulis, suggested that a cross be placed in the room.

This Meditation/Reflection Room - under the supervision of the "Seimas" Council - was erected at a cost of 100,000 "litai." The authors of the project are, architects Vytautas Nasvytis and Juras Balkevicius.

"40 Conventions and Counting"

As my wife and I are preparing to attend the 2000 K of L Convention in Los Angeles, I realize that this may be the 40th National Convention that I will be attending. Time has really flown! I remember, like it was yesterday, that after I joined the K of L in 1957, Council 3 hosted the 1958 Convention. C-3 also 1983 the 1999 hosted the and Conventions. All our Council members had their "baptism of fire" running these conventions - a great amount of work, and a lot of enjoyment and satisfaction at what we hoped was " a job well done."

At the early conventions I attended, I was in awe of the Supreme Council, the Convention Presidium, and the Honorary Members in attendance. These were the names I had only read about in the *Vytis*. Meeting them and interacting socially with them proved to be a true inspiration to me to continue my activities with the Vyciai. invigorated the Convention delegates when they returned to their Councils to report who was elected and what transpired at the sessions, and the religious and social events. I have been fortunate to have been a delegate to most of the conventions that I attended. I remember vividly some of controversies and heated discussions that arose over these many years - especially where the 50th National Convention should be held. After passionate presentations made in alphabetical order, a second ballot was cast, and "South" Boston won out over Chicago. Chicago was a gracious "loser" and promptly offered to host the 51st Convention, which also was fantastic! Over the years, many topics were debated, and not all the delegates were happy with the voting outcome, but everyone forgot their during the convention, differences enjoying themselves, and left as friends vowing to see each other at the next convention.

Over the years, the Knights of Lithuania National Convention, wherever it has been held, has been a unifying force that many Knights have taken advantage of.

Although many of the faces and issues and projects have changed, the love and integrity in our Lithuanian hearts has not changed, and continues to do and make wonderful things happen at each convention!

About the Song, "Lietuva brangi," (Dear Lithuania)

This poem, "Lietuva brangi," was written by Jonas Maciulis, 1862-1932, a Catholic priest, later monsignor, 1894-1909, professor of moral theology and inspector (assistant to the principal) at the Theological Academy of Petersburg, and from 1909 until his death, rector (principal) of the Theological Seminary in Kaunas. His first poem, "Lietuvos Vargas," (Lithuania's Sorrow), was published in 1885 in Tilsit, in the underground newspaper, "Ausra," (The Dawn). Tilsit was then under German adminstration, while Lithuania, for forty years, was suffering the Press Ban (1864-1904). The Russian Czar's administration forbade printing of publications in Latin letters. The intention was the ruthless Russification of Lithuanians. In 1888, in the year Maciulis was graduating from the seminary in Kaunas, he dedicated the "poemele" ("little" poem), "Lietuva" (85 pages long) to Bishop Antanas Baranauskas, the author of a great literary work, "Anyksciu silelis," (The Forest of Anyksciai). This "poemele" was never printed, but it contained many fragments and hints to one of his most famous poems, "Lietuva brangi" (Dear Lithuania). Maciulis' first collection of 45 poems appeared by the name "Pavasario balsai," (Voices of Spring), in 1895, by the pen name, Maironis. During his lifetime there were altogether six editions of this collection, four of them during the Press Ban. Each editions was revised and expanded. The poem, "Lietuva brangi," appeared in the fifth edition of 1920 with the opening lines: "Grazi tu, mano brangi tevyne," (How beautiful you are, my dear homeland!)

The composer Juozas Naujalis (1869-1934) was the organist at the Cathedral of Kaunas from 1892 until his death. He became especially popular when he wrote the music for Maironis' patriotic poems. As early as 1892 Naujalis wrote hsi first song for men's choir to Maironis' poem, "Jau slaviskos salys is miego sukilo," (The Slavs Already Rose from Their Sleep), which was performed in the same year by the choir of the Theological Academy of Petersburg. By 1905, he had published a collection of "Astuonios lietuviskos tautines dainos," (Eight Lithuanian National Songs), one of them being, "Lietuva brangi," but with a different title: "Lietuvos grozybe," (The

Beauty of Lithuania.") Here the song opened with, "Lietuva brangi, mano tevyne!). (Lithuania, my dear homeland!). When, fifteen years later, this would be printed as a poem by Maironis in the fifth edition of "Pavasario Balsai" for the first time, using his title and his opening lines, people were already used to hearing the Naujalis version which had, by then, made this song-poem popular. The Naujalis compositions were printed in 1908, "Is tautisku dainu," (Fifteen National Songs), in 1917, "Musu muzika," (Our Music), containing many lyrics of Maironis.

SInce the first Soviet occupation in June of 1940, the Lithuanian national anthem, "Lietuva, tevyne musu," (Lithuania, Our Homeland), by Vincas Kudirka, was strictly forbidden. At first, the Soviet regime did not allow anything of Maironis to be printed, recited or sung, either, but in 1947, his works were permitted to commemorate the 15th anniversary of Maironis' death. After this, several editions of "Pavasario balsai" were printed, one in 1958 by VALSTYBINE **GROZINES** LITERATUROS LEIDYKLA" in Vilnius, another in 1976 by "VAGA." (There might be other publishers who printed this collection during the occupation years, but unknown to me). Maironis' poems were again recognized as irreplaceable part of Lithuania's cultural heritage. With the awakening to a new dawn of independence, Lithuanians chose to express their nationalistic feelings at their gatherings, by singing, (very quietly at first), the highly patriotic Maironis-Naujalis song, "LIETUVA BRANGI," as the less dangerous one, in place of the Lithuanian National Anthem.

It is to be noted that Maironis himself used "Lietuva brangi" only for the title. The poem's first and last verses start with, "Grazi tu, mano brangi tevyne." Any time we start singing, by using the words of the title --"Lietuva brangi..." - we misplace the accents to the wrong syllables, distorting the correct sound of our Lithuanian language. However, people, during the occupation, learned this song by rote, as only a few had access to the printed publications. When we gathered for the First World Lithuanian Song Festival in Vilnius, 1994, the choir editions started with, "Lietuva brangi, mano tevyne." This is the way we sang it, and nobody seemed to care.

RECORDS

The ritual Committee should maintain records of work done and points to be awarded on each individual member's record. Keep in mind, the ideal time to apply for ritual degrees is at the beginning of each year.

PROCEDURE AND REQUIREMENT FOR DEGREES

I FIRST DEGREE

- 1. The Council Ritual Committee is responsible for compiling, applying and installing candidates for the First Degree.
- 2. Member may be enrolled in the First Degree after one year in the organization and has accumulated at least (3) points.
- 3. Three copies of the application should be made out one for the council one sent to the District Ritual Committee, and one sent to the Supreme Ritual Chairperson. You must include the date of the installation. The Supreme Ritual Chairman will send out the First Degree membership card.

II SECOND DEGREE

- 1. The Council Ritual Committee is responsible for compiling, applying and installing members for the Second Degree.
- 2. Members may be enrolled in the Second Degree after two years as a First Degree Knight and has accumulated at least (10) points.
- 3. Three copies of the application should be made out one for the council one sent to the District Ritual Committee, and one sent to the Supreme Ritual Chairperson. You must include the date of the installation. The Supreme Ritual Chairperson will send out the Second Degree membership card.

SIMPLE STEPS FOR RITUAL DEGREES

III THIRD DEGREE

- The Council Ritual Committee makes out three copies of the Third Degree application.
- 2. A member is eligible after three years as a Second Degree Knight and has accumulated at least (40) points.
- Triple copies of the application and fee of \$6.00 is sent to the District Ritual Committee. The District Ritual Committee is responsible for processing land the installation of members for the Third Degree.
- 4. The District Ritual Committee sends one copy and fee to the Supreme Council chairperson who will sign the certificate. The signed certificate along with the metal are sent to the District Ritual chairperson. The Supreme Ritual chairperson will send out the Third Degree membership card upon receiving the date of installation. The District Ritual Committee will send one copy of the Third Degree application to the Council for their records.

IV FOURTH DEGREE

- Council Ritual Committee prepares three (3) copies of the Fourth Degree application.
- 2. A member is eligible after four years as a Third Degree Knight. Each applicant must have accumulated at least one hundred (100) points.
- The three copies of the Fourth Degree applications and fee of \$8.00 are sent directly to the Supreme Ritual Chair.
- 4. The Supreme Ritual Committee reviews all the applications. The council is notified when the application has been accepted, along with the date and place of the next Convention Mass for the installation of the Fourth Degree members.
- 5. Upon the decision of the National Ritual Committee, a candidate's inability to attend a National Convention, the National Ritual Committee may permit the Fourth Degree candidate to be awarded at a District Convention Mass. Under extenuating circumstances, the Fourth Degree may be awarded to a candidate other than at a National or District Mass only with the expressed permission of the National Supreme Council President who will determine if the circumstances are justified.
- It is recommended that the Council Ritual Chairperson write to the Supreme Ritual Chairperson requesting permission to award this Fourth Degree other than at the National Convention Mass.

V GENERAL INFORMATION

- 1. All these applications for ritual degrees can be started early in the year.
- All pages of applications should include applicant's name, date, and degree applied for.
- All Council Ritual Chairpersons should include their telephone and fax numbers.
- Begin a degree application with previous degree, date and points. Do not include previous activities.

All of this information was taken from the "Knights of Lithuania Manual-Updated August 1997."

The District and Supreme Ritual Committee members are there to help. Do not hesitate to ask.

And see what happens to the world when I am 86.



FAVORITE RECIPES FROM THE VYTIS KITCHEN

(Recipes sent in by : Mr. JosephR. Chepega, Sr. 26 Malaga Drive, Trenton, NJ 08638-1327)

Jewish Apple Cake

3 cups flour 2 cups sugar

1/2 cup orange juice

1 cup oil

3 tsp. baking powder

1/2 tsp. salt

4 eggs

1 tsp. vanilla

Mix together:

3 or 4 sliced apples, lengthwise

4 tsps. sugar

2 tsps. cinnamon

Cream sugar, shortening, eggs well. Add baking powder, salt, orange juice and vanilla. Beat with wooden spoon until flour is blended in well, so flour will not fly all over the place, then beat well until well mixed.

Grease and flour 10 inch tube pan. Add 1/3 batter and layer of apples, then another 1/3 batter and layer of apples, then the final 1/3 batter. If any apples left, apply this on top. Bake at 350 degrees for 1 hr. to 1 1/4 hr. till done. Place knife through top. If done it will come out clean.

Seven Up Cake

3/4 lb. oleo or butter

3 cups sugar

5 eggs

3 cups flour

2 tsp. lemon extract

3/4 cup Seven Up

Cream butter and sugar until fluffy. Add eggs, one at a time, beating well each time - add lemon extract - Add flour, alternating with 7-up.

Grease and flour 10" tube pan - pre-heat oven. Bake 325 degrees for 1 1/4 hrs.

A trip is being planned to visit and view the library and museum at the Alka followed by lunch at the Immaculate Conception Convent in Putnam. There will also be a tour of the Amber Museum as well as a viewing of articles of Blessed George Matulaitis. Further, we will have a tour of the chapel and a history will be given of the stained glass windows. Arrangements for this trip are being made by Kaye Urban.

A commemoration of Lithuanian Independence will be held on Sunday, Feb 16 with a breakfast hosted by the K of L'ers in the Church hall following a 10:00 A.M. Mass. Irene Petkaitis, Cultural, remindeed everyone of the grim facts leading up to Jan 13, 1991:

Dec. 1990: Lithuanian leader Vytautas Lansbergis warns that Moscow is preparing to "crush Lithuania".

Dec 30, 1991: Lithuania's Parliament declares that food prices won't be raised. There were fears that any prices would give pro-Soviets a convenient pretest for trying tp overthrow the government. Jan 7, 1991: Lithuanian Premier Kazimiera Prunskiene pushes through the price rise anyway; food prices are slated to rise by 300%.

Jan 8, 1991: Thousands of pro-Soviet demonstrators, mostly Russians and Poles, protest against the price rises. Later in the day, Parliament votes to halt the price hikes; Prime Minister Prunskiene resigns in protest. Fresh Soviet troops begin rolling across Baltic borders from Pskov, Russia, allegedly to deal with Baltic youth who were evading the Soviet draft.

Jan 10, 1991: Lithuanian economist Albertas Simenas is appointed Prime Minister (a position he is to hold for a mere 57 hours) - Soviet President Gorbachev telegrams Lithuania's Parliament urging legislators "to revoke anti-constitutional acts" - namely Lithuania's Declaration of Independence made 10 months earlier. Gorbachev also suggests that presidential rule from Moscow could also be imposed if Lithuanians do not abrogate proindepende nce laws. The Lithuanians refuse. The U.S. and Iraq are on the brink of war and Baltic leaders warn that the attempted overthrow of their governments could coincide with the start of the Persian Gulf conflict. "The Kremlin always does its dirty work during times of international crisis." Jan 11, 1991: Soviet forces take over the Defense Dept. buildings around the country. Vytautas Lansbergis appeals to the Lithuanians to "Defend our homeland with our endurance, our peacefulness, our unity, and our Moral Strength." Jan 11 - 12 noon: Soviet troops occupy the Vilnius Press Building, firing 5 rounds in the air, injuring 4 people. Jan 11- 1:00 P.M.: Lansbergis attempts to phone Gorbachev. Lansbergis is told that the Soviet leader is "out to lunch". Jan 12 -4:00 A.M. Lansbergis repeatedly tries and fails to reach Gorbachev by phone.

Jan 12: Lansbergis puts out an urgent message to his countrymen, "Come to Vilnius and defend your independence." Thousands surround the Parliament and the TV Tower.

Jan 12 - 11:00 P.M. The pro-Soviet National Salvation Commission proclaims that it has taken power. Jan 13, midnight: Soviet personnel carriers begin moving through Vilnius. Prime Minister Simenas apparently flees the city, fearing for his life. A new Prime Minister is named.

Jan 13 - 2:00 A.M.: The TV Tower is attacked. Soldiers shoot at unarmed demonstrators and tanks crush several people to death. In the end, 13 Lithuanians are killed and hundreds wounded. As the attack begins, loudspeakers blaring throughout the city announce that the Salvation Committee has taken over.

Jan 13 - later in the day: Believing that an attack on Parliament is imminent, barricades are erected around the building. In the coming days, the government is not overthrown but Soviet forces continue to occupy many Vilnius buildings. They occupy the TV Tower for the next 8 months, until Lithuania secures independence following a failed Kremlin coup in August.

In Moscow, following the killings in Vilnius, pro-democracy demonstrators rally in support of Lithuania. One banner reads: "Today Lithuania, Tomorrow Latvia and Estonia, The Day After Russia."

City Paper asked Vytautas Lansbergis: What were some of the consequences of that January crackdown? Lansbergis: "Well, to start with, we received greater support from the West after all these events. But generally, I would say that the crackdown that night is a memory that is very deep in the souls of the Lithuanian people. Everyone remembers that night; they remember that whole period, but especially that night. That's a part of our lives and it will remain so for many generations to come."

Judy Landes, Lithuanian Affairs, gave a heart-warming report on the wonderful works of the First Lady of Lithuania, Alma Adamkiene, who collected donations to be

used towards Christmas gifts as part of a charity drive in support of underprivileged Lithuanian children... She started this fund for children in March of 1999 and her main goal is to help children in impoverished areas. She and her volunteers spent the days of Dec 11 through Dec 13 driving around Vilnius with a caravan of trucks decorated with Christmas lights in order to gather the gifts. The Coca-Cola Company provided the trucks at no charge. TV 3 donated airtime. A Santa and elf were brought about as a result of local businesses. especially young business people. The First Lady's main concern was about the needs of children in villages as children in cities have more opportunities. Sometimes the village children need more warmth than others. 80% of the funds received are geared to improve education in rural areas. Alma Adamkiene is also patron of 2 children's hospitals. Santa, accompanied by musicians on Dec 22 and 23 delivered gifts to villages and hospitals.
