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

AN EASTER MESSAGE FROM BISHOP PAUL A. BALTAKIS

My dear Brothers and Sisters,

Even though Jesus had spent three long years revealing his mission to the apostles, they were still confused and fearful after the Crucifixion. When Jesus healed the blind man in Matthew 8, the blind man also could not see clearly at first. Another touch from Jesus was required.

On Easter morning Jesus greeted the apostles with peace and invited them to touch him and believe. Their minds were opened and they were then able to understand the Scriptures clearly. (Luke 24:37-46.) Similarly, Jesus heals our blindness and opens our hearts and minds to savor the Paschal Mystery.

God's saving action continues in word and actions today especially through the sacraments of the Eucharist, Reconciliation, and the Anointing of the Sick. But sin and life's painful experiences may weaken our faith and cause us to see dimly the divine reality of God's Providence. The blind man did not see clearly at first; neither do we. Convention plans are well underway. The committee met on March 10th and things are really starting to take shape. Please plan on joining your fellow Knights in Florida for this year's convention.


Finally, your Supreme Council met on the 31st of March in Dayton, Ohio. Watch next months issue for a full report of the meeting's proceedings.

VELYKOS (EASTER)

(An excerpt taken from the book, "Lietuviu Paprociai ir Tradicijos Iseivijoje," Lithuanian Customs and Traditions," by Danute Brazyte Bindokiene)

The word for Easter, *Velykos*, has been borrowed from Beylorussian and means "important day." The word is very accurate because Easter was the year's most solemn feast in Lithuania. Easter is not only the feast of Christ's Resurrection, but also nature's awakening from winter's sleep.

The early Easter morn, just before dawn, abounds with magical power. Much of this magic is concentrated in flowing water. Bathing in such water before sunrise prevents all boils, sores, rashes and other skin ailments. If it rains on Easter morning, it is necessary to stand bareheaded in the rain to ensure good growth. Small children who wanted to grow quickly were reminded of this

As the sun rises on Easter morning, it "dances," swaying from side to side and changing color: from green to blue, to red and then golden yellow. This phenomenon can be seen by rising before dawn and watching for the sun's first appearance on the horizon.

Everyone went to the Resurrection services. If on the way you passed a woman, you'll have an accident. To avoid calamity, it was necessary to turn around, return home and then take another road to church.

In Lithuania the Easter morning procession was usually conducted around the church. It was very solemn: church flags were held high, girls strewed flowers, the choir and all the people sang, alternating with a brass band, and the church bells pealed loudly. Three turns were made while singing the Lithuanians' favorite Easter Hymn, "Linksma diena mums prasvito, (A Happy Day Has Dawned for Us). After the services, a blessing was made over the Easter food which was arranged in baskets decorated with greens and placed on the altar-rails.

At the conclusion of the liturgy in church, the people hurried home. In fact, all large and small roads, every path was the scene of races: whoever arrived home first would be successful all year and would complete work on time. Even persons walking tried to pass those ahead and reach home first. It is not surprising that accidents happened during such races. Perhaps that is why it was said that a women met on the road brings disaster, (someone had to be blamed!).

At home, Easter breakfast was eaten. The meal began when the homemaker peeled a blest Easter egg, cut it and gave a piece to every member of the family. This was done so that peace and love would always reign within the family and everyone would live in harmony. Afterward, a variety of other dishes was consumed: meat, sausages, cakes. On Easter, it was necessary to eat well and to satiety, to "recover from Lent" because of the fast all through Lent. If the area had poor families with no Easter food, their neighbors shared what they had and brought the disadvantaged families everything they needed to be satisfied and happy.

Children hunted for hidden Easter eggs left them by the "Velyku Senele (Easter Granny) or Velyke. Bunnies who painted Easter eggs were also a familiar fixture, but they were only helpers for the "Velyku Senele". Very early Easter morning they loaded Easter eggs into a beautiful little cart pulled by a tiny swift horse. The "Velyku Senele" used a sunbeam as a whip. Sometimes the bunnies themselves pulled the cart laden with Easter eggs.

The Easter Granny travels around the country, stopping in every child's yard to leave eggs in baskets placed or hung for that purpose. When they awake, good children find beautifully decorated eggs (and in more recent times, even sweets). Bad children only find a single, plain, completely white egg. If this happens, the child is disgraced. His friends and family laugh at him. Sometimes bunnies accompany the Granny and help her distribute the Easter eggs. They are kept busy not only before Easter and on Easter

day, but all year round, baking cookies for children. When parents leave their children behind, they promise to bring them a gift, bunny cookies. Upon their return, they tell them the following tale:

"I'm walking through the woods (or orchard or past the bushes), and I see a bunny wearing an apron and hat, his sleeves rolled back, taking sweet-smelling cookies from an oven. I say to him: 'May the Lord help you!' He answers, 'Thank you, thank you. Would you like a taste? They're still hot.' Of course, I do! They smell so good, they look so good..."

In the meantime, the child can hardly control himself: "What kind of oven was it?" "Tiny, pretty." "Did you get to taste any cookies" "Yes, of course." "Did you bring me any?"

At this point, the father, mother or other family members pull out the goodies and distribute them to the children who are extremely impressed by the bunny cookies... How wonderful that mom or dad just happened to be passing at the very time the cookies were done!

Bunny cookies are famous throughout Lithuania. It would be good to remember them outside Lithuania as well.

A variety of games were played with Easter eggs. The simplest is an egg-breaking contest. Two players face off, each holding an Easter egg, and hit each other's egg. The one whose egg remains intact is the winner. The egg is held in the fist so that only its tip protrudes. The other player hits it with the tip of his egg. If the egg breaks on the side, the impact was wrong and the owner of the broken egg is not considered the loser. The winner claims the broken egg. After the game the number of eggs won was tallied. It was of paramount importance to have a hardshelled egg that withstands breaking. In selecting a strong egg, the contestant taps an unboiled egg against his teeth. If the sound is clear and sharp the shell is hard: if dull and muffled, the egg will break quickly, it's not even worth boiling.

alecks devised Some smart "unbreakable" egg. It was made this way: a raw egg's shell is pricked at both ends. A thin straw is inserted into one end and used to blow out the contents through the opposite end. Another straw with one end shaped as a funnel is then placed into the hole and melted pine or fir sap is poured until the egg is full. If the sap does not flow smoothly, a helper inserts a straw into the opposite hole and of draws the air out the egg. After the egg is filled with sap, the holes are carefully concealed and the egg is then tinted along with others. It weighs about the same as a real boiled egg. Sometimes the empty shell was filled with melted sugar, but it was much heavier and the sugar hardened unevenly, making it more difficult to play. Of course, if caught, the cheat was punished. The direst penalty was to eat the "Easter egg."

If guests arrive on Easter, they are given Easter eggs as gifts. The guests also bring an Easter egg for each family member (or at least the hosts, and sweets for the children).

The first day of Easter was said to be dedicated to God; people were expected to conduct themselves seriously and quietly, spend time with their family, eat well and "recover from Lent." The second day was for recreation, visiting friends and having company. The third day was devoted to relaxation. People slept late, recovered from all the merrymaking because work was waiting in the wings.

For Easter, homemakers set out Easter dishes which remained on the table all day. When guests arrived, the women could then spend time with the company and did not need to work. The table was covered with a white cloth and decorated with greens or fruit tree branches, (mostly cherry), which were cut and set in water several weeks earlier so they would bloom for Easter. (Easter lilies were unknown). Greens were also attached to the tablecloth hem which hung down from the table. The table was laden with cold Easter dishes: baked ham, goose, suckling pig, a basket or plate full of Easter eggs,

sweet cheese, bread, cakes, etc. Beer (mostly homemade), liqueurs and cider were served as beverages.

Everyone who arrives to extend Easter greetings must be served. It was considered very impolite for the guest to refuse refreshment. Everything had to be at least sampled and the cook praised, else she would feel insulted.

The young who behaved with such solemnity all during Lent wanted to have fun on Easter. They assembled at a larger house to sing and dance. This usually was done in late afternoon or evening. During the day, it was popular to swing in swings and sing. If the Easter weather was warm and fair, the swings were hung from a tall tree so the young could swing higher. Given inclement weather, the swing ropes were tied from barn rafters. People swung not only for the fun of it, but to ensure a good harvest next summer, just as on Shrove Tuesday. While swinging, the girls and young men sang special songs.

A group of young men assembled to practice singing Linksma diena mums prasvito (a popular Easter hymn), some other songs, and make the rounds. These are the so-called "lalauninkai" (from "lalauti to talk loudly and much). In many other countries, such as the United States or England, carolers make the rounds before Christmas singing Christmas carols and songs. They may be compared to Lithuania's Easter "lalauninkai." It is not necessary for the "lalauninkai" to sing the customary ditties, other songs may be selected.

JBANC STATEMENT OF POLICY 2001-2002

The Joint Baltic American National Committee, Inc., representing more than a million Americans of Estonian, Latvian and Lithuanian descent, emphasizes that its top priority is to help Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania achieve membership in the NATO alliance in 2002. It is as essential to the security and independence of the three Baltic countries as it is in the vital interest of the United States.

The security of the United States is indivisible from the security of Europe. A viable Euro-Atlantic community of democratic states and a Europe that is undivided and free should not exclude any European democracy. Therefore, NATO enlargement must continue expeditiously, with all applicants eligible to join

NATO's "open door" policy must not remain declaratory. Since the first round of enlargement in 1998, expectations of a new round have been created that cannot be ignored. In fact, leaving the Baltic countries out of a new round will send a wrong and dangerous message to both the peoples of the three countries as well as Russia. It will create a power vacuum, a "gray zone," that will be an invitation to Russia to fill.

NATO, and an American presence in NATO, is as essential to the Baltic countries as it is essential to all of Europe. It is also essential to the security of the United States.

NATO and U.S. officials have reiterated that history and geography have no bearing on NATO membership and that each country has the right to decide its own security arrangements. Therefore, the process of integrating Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania into the West's most important and effective security arrangement must continue at full speed.

JBANC stresses that there is no turning back. Any backtracking from promises real or implied will inflict irreparable harm to the credibility of NATO AS WELL AS THE United States. Exclusion of the Baltic countries from the world's most viable security structure will create dangers that we may seriously regret.

The Baltic region and central and eastern Europe have seen the dynamic growth of increasingly prosperous market economies. Most importantly, it is a community of states committed to democratic values, stability and security. Of those, Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania stand out.

The inclusion of Poland, Hungary and the Czech Republic has already demonstrated a stronger NATO and strengthened the political, economic, military and social structures of the new members. The Baltic countries derive strength from that and are as able to show their willingness and ability to enhance NATO's military capabilities, as they have in numerous Partnership for Peace activities and keeping peace in Bosnia and Kosovo. They share the values of NATO members, defining their interests in a manner consistent with the North Atlantic Charter.

JBANC believes that any slowdown of Baltic membership in NATO will encourage Russia's still-prevalent imperial inclinations and vindicate its claims to a "red line" that includes former Soviet conquered territory. JBANC warns against any secret agreements that evoke memories of Yalta or any "oral understandings" that would harm Estonia's, Latvia's and Lithuania's independence in any way. JBANC believes that the inclusion of the Baltic countries in NATO will actually enhance Russia's security of its Western borders. NATO, as a defensive alliance, does not threaten Russia.

With the collapse of the USSR, the line dividing Eastern and Western Europe has disappeared. We must avoid a new line: that of NATO members and non-members. This will create new dangers, rather than solutions.

Both recent and long-term history shows that uncertainties and divisions in Europe can be dangerously destabilizing. Indeed, the divisions have drawn the U.S. into two World Wars and seriously contributed to the Cold War. It is historically accurate to state that countries excluded from a collective security arrangement create power vacuums that destabilize security and therefore, will be inherently dangerous to the national interest of the U.S.

It is in America's political and economic interest to be firmly committed to the goal of promoting Europe that is undivided, free and secure. This arrangement will actually prevent American soldiers from dying in Europe again. It can only be achieved through United States involvement in Europe and collective security through NATO.

JBANC firmly believes that Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania must be invited to become NATO members expeditiously, during the next NATO Summit in Prague in 2002. It will guarantee a Europe whole and free, as it will guarantee a peaceful democratic Euro-Atlantic Community that includes the United States.

An important security objective of the Baltic republics is to achieve membership in NATO. Following the NATO summit in 1999, each of the Baltic States submitted their nation's individual Membership Action Plan. These plans define how the aspirant countries will meet eligibility criteria for membership in NATO. The plans were reviewed by NATO members and implemented. This spring, NATO members and advisors will conduct appraisals of the readiness of the nine countries aspiring to become NATO members.

It is expected that the next NATO heads of state summit meeting will occur in the fall of 2002 in Prague. The nine aspiring countries and any other aspirant hope to be invited to become a member and to start final membership negotiations.

Although there are many topics on the current US administrations agenda, it is important that support of Baltic membership in NATO be included.

A Europe "whole and free" is in the national security and economic interests of the United States and the West; a divided Europe, and unstable Europe, is not. Baltic membership in NATO does not threaten stability, but will improve that stability.

The accomplishments of the Baltic countries in the past ten years - maintaining strong and stable democratic governments, bringing about privatization and establishing free market economies, observing human and civil rights of all their people, building effective and democratic armed forces and being active participants in international peacekeeping activities in Bosnia, proves they are qualified to join NATO.

There are historical and legal foundations for the United States to support Baltic membership in NATO.

- Lithuania and the United States began official diplomatic relations in 1922.
- The United States never recognized Lithuania's incorporation to the Soviet Union.
- The US quickly established relations with the newly independent government of Lithuania in September of 1991.
- Since that time a number of bilateral agreements, defense and working groups have been established.
- The signing of the Charter of Partnership in January, 1998 between the United States and
 the Baltic republics unequivocally confirmed the common goal of the United States and the
 Baltic republics to work together as partners in enhancing the security of all states through
 the integration of Baltic countries into the European and transatlantic security, political and
 economic institutions.

The Baltic countries are loyal friends of America and deserve America's friendship and support. Let us fulfill the goals of the United States and the Baltic countries of Estonia, Latvia and Lithuania in Prague. We urge you to encourage President Bush and your colleagues to support Baltic membership in NATO.

If you are not already a member of the Baltic Caucus, we urge you to join this bipartisan institution. The Baltic Caucus was formed in 1998 by your colleagues, John Shimkus and Dennis Kucinich. The purpose of the Baltic Caucus is to keep Congress informed on issues of concern to the Estonian, Latvian and Lithuanian American communities in your district. Joining the Baltic Caucus does not obligate you to endorse any specific legislation, program or course of action. , 1916 metų balandžio 30 dieną, per Atvelyki, Liliūnu kaime, pasiturinčio ūkininko šeimoje gime treciasis sunus. Tevas Matas Cyvas tvirtas. darbštus ir pareigingas Aukštaitijos sūnus, žymiai vyresnis už savo jaunutę žmona, labai apsidžiaugė naujagimiu. Tikėdamasis išauginti ji tikru Tėvynes azuolu, ji pakrikštijo Mato vardu. Dar su pora draugu pradějo tarnauti Šv. Mišioms. Skaitydavo iš kunigu gautas religines knygutes. Veliau įsiraše Į tuo laiku draudžiamus ateitininkus, net buvo išrinktas Į kuopelės valdyba. Baigiant ketvirtaja klase, ateitininkų

kuopa nutarė pašventinti savaja vėliava. Ginmnazijos direktorius sužinojes apie vėliavos šventinima, visa kuopelės Valdyba pašalino iš gimnazijos. Tevai Matui nepareiške jokio priekaisto, dargi reme jo kreipimasi I švietimo Ministerija, kad leistu testi moksla kitoje gimnazijoje. Matas išvyksta I Ramygala. Čia jis apsisprendžia stoti I Kunigu galutinai seminarija ir pašvesti savo gyvenima rupinantis žmoniu sielovada. Baigusi gimnaziją 1934 m. vasaros pradžioje, tevas išveža aštuoniolikmeti Mata I geležinkelio stoti ir atsisveikines iśleidžia ji I Kunigu seminarija egzaminams. Tai buvo savotiškai graudus, bet vyriškas atsisveikinimas - tvirtas rankos paspaudimas, linkējimas sekmēs ir ištvermēs. Išlaikes egzaminus, Matas grižta I namus, tačiau dar prieš mokslų pradžia tėvas staiga miršta, nemates sūnaus išvantinimo I kunigus. Lieka mama su septyniais ivairaus amžiais vaikais. Kaip prisimena Matas: "mama buvo apsukri, darbšti, išmintinga, nuoširdžiai maloni ir per savo psišventima, darba ir kantrybė, užaugino visus vaikus dorais, savo krasta mylinčiais žmonemis.

Vienerius metus praleide Austrijoje, 1945 m. rugsējo mēnesi lydi arkivyskupa Į Čia arkivyskupo Roma. Gregrianum'o rekomenduotas istoja Lietuvoje pradetas universiteta ir tesia Baznytines Teises studijas. 1947m. apgina disertacija gaudamas Bažnytinės Teisės daktaro laipsni. Tais pačiais metais paskiriamas Šv. Kazimiero Kolegijos klieriku prefektu.

1949 m. atvyksta Į JAV. 1951 m. lapkričio men. Atsikelia gyventi ir dirbti Į Albany, NY vyskupiją. 1963 m. paskiriamas Šv. Jurgio, Albany, NY parapijos klebonu. O 1988 metais užtarnautam poilsiui persikelia gyventi I Saint Pete Beach, nes čia jau ankščiau buvo apsigyvenes brolis Juozas.

This year, on February 4th, 2001, at the Martinique Restaurant, North Ballroom, (Chicago), the Knights of Lithuania Mid-America District presented its annual Award of Distinction to Stase Vanagaite Petersoniene. She has been working with the Lithuanian Institute of Education (Lithuanian Pedagogical Institute) for the last thirty years. This spring, she will have been director of this institution for fifteen years.

The Institute has produced over 600 graduates, including Lithuanian teachers, editors of the Lithuanian daily newspaper, "Draugas," activists and leaders of the Lithuanian community in Chicago, and the former president of the Lithuanian-American Council of the United States.

Mrs. Petersonas is the author of four books published in Chicago. She is also co-author of <u>Lithuanian Education in North America</u>, a fifty year history of the Lithuanian School ("Lituanistine Mokykla"), published by the Lithuanian Institute of Education.

Recently, she was elected president of the Association of Lithuanian Writers in America.

Mrs. Petersonas is an active member of the Lithuanian Catholic youth organization, "Ateitis," and has edited their journal, "Ateitis," for three years.

In 1940, she was jailed by the Soviets for her activities as a patriot and partisan during the Soviets' invasion and subsequent occupation of Lithuania. In 1997, the government of Israel honored her for helping Lithuanian Jews during World War II.

The government of Lithuania has honored her with the "Zuvanciuju Gelbejimo Kryzius," in recognition of her aid to the wounded and dying during Lithuania's fight for independence during World War II.

This Lithuanian stamp and label marks the 10th anniversary of the events of Jan. 13, 1991, when 14 people died trying to protect the Vilnius television tower from Soviet troops.

Lithuania lists the 14 people who died 10 years ago trying to protect the Vilnius television tower from Soviet armed forces on a label attached to a commemorative stamp issued Jan. 13.

Soviet forces entered Lithuania in January 1991 to crack down on the republic's independence movement.

The new issue announcement from Lietuvos Pastas describes the events of Jan. 13, 1991:"In the early morning of Jan. 13, Soviet forces attacked the Vilnius tower, which was protected by about 1,000 unarmed people. The attack was led by several tanks firing blanks from their cannons and driving straight into the crowd in front of the building.

After a few people including a young woman were crushed under the tanks' tracks and others were killed or injured by bullets, the crowd scattered, realizing that they could not stop tanks with their bodies.

"In that encounter, 14 people died, and close to 300 were injured."

The 1 lita stamp pictures Lithuania's yellow, green and red flag flying above the television tower.

H. Ratkevicius designed the stamp. A security printer in Budapest, Hungary, printed 500,000 stamps by offset in panes of 25 each. Each pane includes 25 labels.


Romas Pakalnis merited a special recognition in the local "Republican American" for his contributions to the community in small, but lasting ways.

You water that seed, and develop that seed, and then you have a beautiful flower. That's what the Boy Scouts do for a boy, help him develop and live a good life."

Mr. Pakalnis was born Feb. 2, 1925, in Siauliai, Lithuania, son of the late Vladas and Elena (Tupyte) Pakalnis. He was educated in Lithuania and Germany, and had worked as a field secretary for the YMCA/YWCA in Germany, after World War II. He was a communicant of St. Joseph Church and a member of the Knights of Lithuania, C-7 of Waterbury.

He leaves his wife, Ona (Kulbis) Pakalnis, two sons, Linas and Darius Pakalnis, and a daughter, Rasa Briggs, all of the Waterbury area, and five grandchildren.

Eternal rest grant unto him, O Lord, and let perpetual light shine upon him. May he rest in peace!



Fr. Dan's POOD FOR THOUGHT

(Formerly Lithuanian Chefs) by Fr. Daniel Yenkevich

CORNED BEEF & CABBAGE

4 lb (or more) comed beef brisket

2 or 3 onions, whole

6 whole cloves, stick two in each

2 cloves garlic

2 bay leaves

6 carrots, pared

I medium head cabbage, cut in 6

wedges

Place comed beef in a Dutch oven or large heavy pot; barely cover the comed beef with hot water, Add onions, garlic and all seasonings. Cover and simmer for about 1 hour per pound of comed beef, until tender. Remove meat from the liquid, and add corrots and potatoes to the liquid. Bring to gentle boil for 10 minutes. Then add cabbage and cook an additional 20 minutes. When ready to serve, slice the beef across the grain in thin slices. Serve with mustard and horseradish.

LITHUANIAN KUGELIS

6 or 7 large potatoes
1/4 lb fat back or ham fat
2 large onion, chopped
2 eggs slightly beaten
1 tsp salt
1/4 tsp pepper
1/2 cup milk
1/4 cup flour

First dice the fat back of ham fat into small pieces and lightly fry until browned and crisp, then add the chopped onion to it and fry until soft and golden. Grate the potatoes and add the fried fat back or ham fat with the onions while hot to the potatoes. Add the eggs, milk, flour and seasoning and mix well. Taste and adjust salt and pepper. Pour into a 8x8x2 (or larger baking pan that has been slightly greased. Bake in a

pre- heated oven at 400 degrees for about an hour. Top should be golden brown. Enjoy with sour cream.

GRAPEFRUIT & CHICKEN SALAD

2 grapefruit (medium)
1/2 cup plain yogurt
1/4 cup mayonnaise
1 Tosp minced fresh dill or 1 tsp.
dried dill weed
1 1/4 lbs chicken breast, cooked and
cut in 1/2" pieces
1/2 cup chopped celery
2 scallions, chopped
2 Tosp chopped pimiento (optional)
Salt and pepper to taste
Sprigs of fresh dill for garnsh

First cut grapefruit in half crosswise. With grapefruit knife separate each section from the membrane. Cut removed sections into bite-size pieces and set aside. Remove all membrane from shells and discard, set shells aside.

Next, in a bowl combine mayonnaise, yogurt, dill and salt and pepper to taste. Blend well, then add grapefruit, chicken, celery, scallions and pimiento. Blend lightly. Cover and refrigerate until serving time. Wrap grapefruit shells and refrigerate separately. At serving time, scoop about 2/3 cup of chicken salad into each grapefruit shell. Garnish with dill sprig.

CHICKEN MARSALA WITH MUSHROOMS

3 Tbsp flour
1/2 tsp. ground pepper (fresh)
4 skinless boneless chicken breasts,
halved and pounded to 1/4" thick
4 Tbsp butter or margarine
1 Tbsp vegetable oil
1/2 cup chopped onion
2 garlic cloves, chopped
1/2 lb mushrooms, sliced
3 Tbsp dry Marsala
2/3 cup beef stock

Salt to taste

First, mix flour and pepper together in dish; dredge chicken pieces in flour mixture to coat; shake off excess. Secondly, heat 2 Tosp butter in a large frying pan with the vegetable oil over medium heat Cook the chicken until lightly brown, about 3 minutes on each side Remove and keep warm Add onions and garlic and saute for about 3 minutes until tender Add mushrooms and cook until they are lightly browned, 3 to 5 minutes. Next return the chicken to pan, stir in Marsala and beef stock. Bring to a boil, then reduce head and siminer until liquid is reduced by on third Whisk in the remaining butter Season with salt and pepper to taste Serve over buttered, parsleved noodles.

LITHUANIAN - JEWISH COFFEE CAKE

2 cups sugar
1/2 lb of butter
3 cups flour
2 tsp baking soda
3 tsp baking powder
1 pint sour cream
4 eggs
2 tsp vanilla
1 cup sugar
1 tsp cinnamon
1/2 cup chopped nuts

Cream butter with sugar Blend flour, baking soda and baking power together and mix well. Add sour cream, and eggs one at a time and then the vanilla. Pour the batter into an ungreased pan. Make a mixture of 1 cup sugar, cinnamon and chopped nuts. Add most of this mixture to the batter in the pan, mix it in well. Sprinkle the rest of the mixture over the top of the batter. Bake at 350 deg. for 45 minutes to an hour

Judy Landers, Lithuanian Affairs, reported on a recent news bulletin wherein Pope John Paul II has elevated to Cardinal the Archbishop of Vilnius, Audrius Juozas Backis. Selected from a list of 4,000 Bishops, the Pope announced 37 new Cardinals, on Sunday, January

21st.



On becoming a Cardinal, Audrius Backis (for the next 17 years until he reaches the age of 80) will have the right to participate in all the Catholic churches governing decisions and will participate in the selection of the next Pope. His name could also appear on the list of candidates at the time of the election of a new Pope.

The investiture of new Cardinals into the College of Cardinals will take place in Rome on Feb 21. Cardinal Backis is the son of Diplomat Stasys and teacher Ona Backis. Cardinal Backis took his priestly vows 40 years ago and attended high school and the seminary in Paris. He continued his studies at the St. Casimir Lithuanian College Grigaulius University in Rome. He received his doctorate from Laterano University in Rome. When Lithuania regained its independence, Bishop Backis was appointed the Archbishop of Vilnius.

Judy also reported on the twin boys who recently had the much needed eye surgery here in the States. In the Jan 22nd issue of the Lithuanian daily, Draugas, a letter of thanks appeared from the parents of Vytukas and Pauliukas. They expressed their gratitude to those here in the US who donated funds so that the twins could have the operations. 
The musical program, (by the Strolia brothers), was absolutely beautiful, about one hour of continuous Strauss and Opera selections.
