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

Dear Fellow Members:

Each month as I prepare this message I can't believe it's been a month since the last one. Well, this month is no exception. I hope everyone had an enjoyable Easter season and are looking forward to spring. I wish to extend a HAPPY MOTHER'S Day to all our K of L Moms, may your day be a great one.

As you know the SC met an March 30th in Dayton, Ohio. Again, a big thank you to Dayton Council 96 for all their hard work. We look forward to visiting Dayton again in the future. I'm happy to report that the meeting went very well. Some of the highlights from the meeting are listed below:

- The National Convention plans are being tweaked and it won't be long before its convention time. I encourage everyone to attend this year's convention. We really feel that the new format will be a positive for the membership and the more attendees the better. This will allow us to get a more accurate opinion from our delegates. Also, the convention schedule is completed and will be printed in the June issue of VYTIS. Please watch for it.
- The role of the K of L in working towards the inclusion of the Baltic Nations in the next round of NATO expansions was also discussed. Beginning last month we have been publishing articles in VYTIS asking you to begin a new letter writing campaign, this month is no different. This past February I received, as National President, an invitation that came as not only a surprise, but also a most welcome and honored one. The invitation was from the Archbishop of Vilnius to attend the **Consistory of Cardinals in Rome,** Italy, at which he would be elevated to Cardinal of the Roman Catholic Church. After a few guick telephone calls my plans were in place and I was ready to be your representative in Rome.



Father Gintaras Grusas of Los Angeles, California, and one of his brother priests from Lithuania, led us on a guided evening tour that was truly remarkable. Once they were seated His Holiness, Pope John Paul II, appeared from the entrance of St. Peter's Basilica to even louder cheers and applause. The sight before us was overwhelming. As we looked on not only was the Holy Father and the soon to be new Cardinals there in from of us but also almost all the existing Cardinals of the world, a huge representation of the world's Bishops, Monsignors and

Priests. Also in attendance were representatives of nearly all the World's Governments in addition to Papal Knights and other dignitaries.


During the two and half-hour 3 ceremony, His Holiness as well as their official commission gave each of the new Cardinals their red hat. After which the now New Cardinals were welcomed into the brotherhood of the College by all the other **Cardinals present.** The Lithuanian's in the Square made their presence when Archbishop Bačkis known received his hat, which was clear to see due to large video monitors that were erected in the square.

You see, in order for His Holiness to reach and bless as many people as possible as Mass concluded the Pope Mobile ascended the stairs in front of the outdoor Alter and as soon as he had completed the Final Blessing, the Pope stepped into the waiting vehicle and after circling the entire Alter was headed down the main isle of the square. After blessing the crowds, the Pope departed the square, during which time I was able to get a few close up photos of him.

Thursday evening saw everyone attending a reception hosted by Honorary Member, Msgr. Al Bartkus, at the Lithuanian Pontifical College in honor of Cardinal Bačkis. During the reception, the new Cardinal from

Latvia, Cardinal Pujats, arrived to offer his congratulations as well. After greeting everyone and accepting yet more congratulations, the Cardinal made sure that everyone had something to eat and drink. True to Lithuanian hospitality.

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LITHUANIAN AFFAIRS UPDATE

(March 28, 2001) by John R. Mankus, Chairman, National Lithuanian Affairs Committee

Since being elected Lithuanian Affairs Chairman, I have published and mailed out a total of four Newsletters and forwarded to our VYTIS editor three articles for publication in the VYTIS. At this writing, I hope to publish one Newsletter every two months, and to have an abridged version for publication in the VYTIS, in conjunction with any appropriate Lithuanian Affairs District and Council information that may be of interest to our members. I hope to continue with attendance and presentation at various DISTRICT meetings to discuss Lithuanian Affairs Activities with our members, and to distribute Newsletters to attendees. In the past six months, I have received a number of requests from members to send Newsletters directly to them, to which I have tried to comply. At this date, I have averaged over 60 Newlsetters mailings per issue, to Council and District leaders, Supreme Council officers and individual members. This is in addition to 70-100 Newsletters distributed at District and Council meetings. I have asked District leaders, officers and individual members receiving my Lithuanian Affairs Newsletters to share them with their district and council members.

Lithuanian Independence Day Commemoration at Lithuanian Embassy

On February 15th, I participated at the Lithuanian Independence Day Commemoration at the Lithuanian Embassy. Guests included Senator Richard Durbin, Congressman John Shimkus, movie star Ruta Lee and husband Web Low, former National Security Advisor to President Jimmy Carter, Zbignew Brzezinski, a number of Lithuanian American leaders from various organizations, United States Government Federal State Officials, and a number of notables, Ambassadors and businessmen. Nearly two hundred fifty people attended the Independence Day Commemoration at the Embassy. Ruta Lee was her magnificent self as the master of ceremonies, Senator Durbin and Congressman Shimkus praised Lithuania's accomplishments during the past year, especially in its efforts to prepare for an invitation to join NATO. It was also a time to thank and bid farewell to Ambassador Stasys Sakalauskas, as he is being transferred to a different post and will be leaving Washington DC at the end of February. During his three and a half years tenure as Ambassador to the United States, Mr. Sakalauskas has been an energetic spokesman and worker for Lithuania, and a good friend. Prior to my attendance at the Commemoration, I was forwarded a greeting and a thank you by Ambassador Sakalauskas from Foreign Minister Antanas Valionis for our support to Lithuania.

JBANC Conference, March 8-10th.

On March 8-11th, Supreme Council President, Rob Martin, First Vice-President, Bernice Aviza and I attended the JBANC Conference in Washington DC, participated at the presentations by Senate/House Foreign Relations/Appropriations Committee staff members at the Capitol, attended a briefing and Q&A's with NSC (National Security Council) policy level staff at the NSC offices and attended the Baltic leadership conference at the hotel. On Friday evening, Rob Martin, Bernice Aviza, my wife and I had a private meeting with new Ambassador Vygaudas Ušackas at the Lithuanian Embassy. We welcomed him to Washington and updated him on the latest Knights of Lithuania activities. The Ambassador discussed a number of topics high on his agenda, including his highest priority, Lithuania's position to NATO enlargement, increased trade with the US, business opportunities in Lithuania, etc. On Sunday, Bernice Aviza and I participated at a round table meeting with

Ambassador Usackas, his staff and Leaders of Lithuanian American Organizations at the Lithuanian Embassy on mutually important topics, especially in the area of preparation of Lithuania to join NATO. As a group, we all agreed to cooperate and work with Lithuania, and signed a statement to work for and to seek that Lithuania is invited to join NATO in 2002. The document describes membership in NATO as the best and most efficient measure to ensure Lithuania's security. Two top level Lithuanian Government officials participated in the Embassy meeting and at the JBANC Conference. Chairman of the Lithuanian Parliament Foreign Affairs Committee, Alvydas Medalinskas, who recently met with NATO Parliamentary Assembly's Secretary General, Simon Lunn, shared his views at the Embassy meeting, and was a presenter at the JBANC Conference. Lithuanian Deputy Foreign Minister and Coordinator of Lithuania's NATO integration efforts. Giedras Čekuolis, was a participant and also shared his views at the meeting. Cekuolis met with officials from the U.S. Department of State and discussed NATO expansion, bilateral U.S.-Lithuanian relations and security issues in the Baltic Sea region.

Brief biographies of two new faces to many of us, Ambassador Vygaudas Ušackas and Minister of Foreign Affairs, Antanas Valionis

VYGAUDAS USACKAS - Ambassador of the Republic of Lithuania to the United States - Born in Skuodas, Lithuania, on December 16, 1964. Received Degree in Law (May, 1990) from Vilnius University. Graduation thesis: "Thomas Jefferson's Philosophy." Political Science studies at University of Oslo, Norway and University of Aarhus, Denmark, He has held a number of professional positions in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs, including, from 1991 to 1992, he was Second Secretary of the Western European Division serving as Desk Officer for the EC and NATO. Counselor of the Mission of the Republic of Lithuania to the European Communities, and Liaison Officer to NATO FROM 1992 TO 1996. Mr. Ušackas has the rank of Envoy Extraordinary and Minister Plenipotentiary for Lithuania. He was appointed Deputy Foreign Minister in July, 1999, and Chief Negotiator for Lithuania's Accession to the European Union in January 2000, Prior to his current assignment, Mr., Ušackas served as Political Director in the Ministry of Foreign Affairs from 1996 to 1999. On December 7, 2000 he was appointed Ambassador for Special Missions. Married to Loreta Usackiene. They have two children, son Raimundas and daughter Paula, Foreign Languages: English, Russian, French.

ANTANAS VALIONIS - Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Llithuania

Apointed Minister of Foreign Affairs of the Republic of Lithuania on October 30, 2000.

Born on September 21, 1950. He received his Ph.D, Doctor of Social Sciences (Political Science) from Warsaw University in 1994. Dissertation: Transformation of Lithuanian Political System in 1998-1993. Diploma, 1974, Faculty of Mechanics, Kaunas Polytechnic Institute. His professional positions include: Ambassador Extraordinary and Plenipotentiary of the Republic of Lithuania to the Republics of Poland, Romania and Bulgaria. Between 1976 and 1990, he held a number of management positions in the Ministry of Agriculture, Food Industry Department, Division of Perspective Planning. Industry Transport and Department in the Taurage and Kaunas Regions and Foreign Relations Department.

But, in order to become a **NATO** member, we have to form an army able to defend itself, instead of waiting for help from Poles, Germans or Americans.-- Lithuanian Army Commander **Brigade General Jonas Kronkaitis.**

From newspapers in Lithuania

Only Algirdas Brazauskas and the New Democracy Party head, Kazimiera Prunskiene ratings saw positive changes during the last two months. The sharpest drop of 7.35 and 5.6 per cent in popularity was observed in the ratings of Center Union Party leader, Kestutis Glaveckas and incumbent President Valdas Adamkus.

The Conservative Party President, Vytautas Landsbergis, is looking for a replacement, as two local sections of the Conservatives have already nominated former premeier, MP Andrius Kubilius to run for the presidency.

Vilnius Archbishop, the new Cardinal of Lithuanis, Audrys Bačkis, often says that his new title was an honor to the entire Lithuanian nation, where 90 per cent of the population consider themselves Catholics. New Lithuanian Cardinal Audrys Bačkis is also known as a diplomat of outstanding capabilities. Cardinal Bačkis has a command of French, English, Spanish, Portuguese, Italian, German, Dutch and Latin languages and has diplomatic experience from work in the Philippines, Costa Rica, Turkey, Nigeria, Holland. Seimas Chairman, Arturas Paulauskas, initiated a meeting with Cardinal Audrys Juozas Bačkis to discuss the Church activities and some legal acts, with major attention given to a bill on charity and relief. Cardinal A. J. Backis claimed the present law restricted the Church pursued goals and support for the impoverished, as offerings are put on the same line with relief, which are subject to taxes.

All Lithuanian dailies reported of Latvian President Vaira Vike-Freiberga's state visit to Vilnius. It was the first official trip by Vike-Freiberga to Lithuania after she was elected Latvian president in the summer of 1999. The newspapers noted both state leaders communicated in English. President Vike-Freiberg lived in Canada. President Adamkus in the U.S.

Action Item - NATO

In May, Vilnius will host the North Atlantic Parliamentary Assembly, whose participants will include MP'S from NATO member states, candidate countries and countries involved in the Partnership for Peace Program. I urge all our members to continue their participation in letter writing and to contact their friends and neighbors to ask for their assistance in getting the message to our elected officials. It is clear that the invitation to join NATO is the priority and the goal of the Government and the people of Lithuania. Let us increase our effort in this worthy objective. Lithuania is free. We can do it.

Elsie was instrumental in the formation of C-156, Shamokin, PA., which is part of the Amber District. Elsie has served on the Supreme Council Ritual Committee at various times. She was chair for one term and is on the committee at present.

On the District level, Elsie has held office of President for a three-year term, and has served as Vice-president. Elsie chaired arrangements for a District weekend at Kennebunkport, ME, a first for the District. Serving on the Committee for Lithuanian Day at the Capital Mall in Harrisburg resulted in a new council for the District, C-146, Harrisburg, PA.

As a member of Council - 144, Elsie has held the office of President, Vice-president, Trustee and presently, Financial Secretary. Elsie has chaired or been on numerous committees for her council. She was part of the many bus trips the council took -Baltimore, Toronto, Chicago, New York City, Brooklyn, Washington, D.C., etc.. These trips involved Lithuanian Culture or Political activities. She has assisted Sr. Angela with the Junior's program at Camp Ausra.

Elsie has been very active in her parish, Annunciation BVM, and sister parish, St. Ann's. Along with being in the choir, she helps with parish functions.

Elsie was instrumental in soliciting donations to send two K of L young people to Australia for the 1987 World Youth Congress. In 1992, she made arrangements for K of L'ers from Pennsylvania to attend a luncheon and dinner at Indiantown Gap to meet and hear four members of the Lithuanian Seimas who were here to observe how the US National Guard operates. Elsie continues to be on the list when dignitaries come in to that area.

Locally, Elsie works at the Library Book Sale for their annual fund raiser.

This covers, in part, the many works Elsie has performed and continues to perform for the Knights of Lithuania. Because of her dedication, ELSIE KOSMISKY has earned the right to become an Honorary Member in 2001.


"The Seven Last Words"

Over 1200 people filled the pews and lined the walls of St. Andrew the Apostle Church in Calumet City, Illinois, Sunday, April 1st, for a return performance of Theodore Dubois' cantata, *"The Seven Last Words of Christ."* Whether it was Dubois' skill of portraying intense emotion through music, or director Faustas Strolia's artistic interpretation in expressing that emotion, many of those attending the performance were brought to tears during the final chorus of this sacred choral composition. Strolia returned as guest conductor after having retired as Parish Music Director of St. Andrew's in 1996. The last performance of Dubois' classic work at St. Andrew's was in 1995.

Strolia expressed his joy to be back as he announced to all, "It's nice to receive such a warm welcome home." This welcome was especially evident at the concert's conclusion as well-wishers flocked around Strolia to express their congratulations and delight with his return. Strolia was also presented with a Lithuanian sash commemorating the milestone of his recent 70th birthday.

Over 125 voices were joined together from the St. Andrew the Apostle Parish Choir and School Children's Choir, Knights of Lithuania Choir and the Blessed George Matulaitis Catholic Mission Choir of Lemont. Former choir members traveled from as far as Michigan and Florida to participate in Strolia's return to the director's podium. The concert included sacred works of Bach, Mozart, and Schubert. For first time participant Jim Brewer, a member of St. Andrew's choir, the repertoire was overwhelming. "It was hard work, and Faustas is a perfectionist," Brewer said. "It was everything everyone said it would be and more."

Dubois' work became an annual tradition with Strolia since 1969, growing larger every year. It appears as though he is going to take retirement a little more seriously now. When questioned about next year, he replied," This is my last one. I really shouldn't do any more."

Memorial Day Remembrance...

"The Knight Who Went to War"

Tom Brokaw, a noted NBC News television commentator and journalist, recently wrote a book titled, "The Greatest Generation" after visiting the battlefields of Normandy. He came to understand what this generation meant to history, and as he wrote, the greatest generation any society ever produced. He wrote stories of individual men and women who returned home to build modern America, married in record numbers, and gave birth to another distinctive generation. To that list I would like to add *Albert J. Yatkauskas*.

Many members of the Knights of Lithuania came home to adjust to civilian life, and I was one of them, having served in the Marines. I belonged to Council 124 in Jersey City, New Jersey, and had the pleasure of meeting my fellow Knights from other Councils. Those who returned rarely talked about their experiences, and one of them was Al Yatkauskas of Council 12 in New York City. All I heard about Al was, that he lost a leg while serving in the Air Corps.

We went our separate ways, and lost track of each other. A few weeks ago, while sorting out my archives, I came across one page from the issue of the New York Daily News, dated Thursday, May 6, 1965. The paper at that time was writing a daily series about returning veterans, and what caught my eye was the story about Albert Yatkauskas, my fellow Knight. He was interviewed by the paper, and I would like to summarize what Al said.

Al joined the Army Air Corps on June 2, 1942. After completing gunnery training, he became a tail gunner on a B-24 bomber. In February, 1944, he joined the 15th Air Force based in Naples, Italy. He was involved in 33 bombing missions, and was beginning to think nothing could touch him. His plane was named, "Nobody's Baby," and took off on his 34th mission on August 7, 1944 to bomb synthetic oil refineries in Germany, near the Polish border.

At precisely 11:33 A.M., they were hit by anti-aircraft flak as they were coming off target. The number 3 engine started burning, and the flames spread. The bombardier, who normally is part of this crew, was in another formation that day and took a picture of the burning plane. Seven of the crew bailed out. Al had to back in the waist of the B-24 to get his parachute. There he was bumped around when the plane got out of control, but he did get out. The co-pilot and top gunner were killed; the pilot was badly wounded and went down with the plane.

As Al's chute opened, his flying helmet and gloves flew off. The anti-aircraft guns were still barking as he landed in a ravine surrounded by bushes and trees. Hiding his parachute, he checked himself for any sprains or injuries and found none. When he heard footsteps, he hid himself, face down in a pile of leaves. They were so close he thought he would be stepped on, and as they faded away, he looked up and saw a German officer, pistol in hand, walking away.

Al thought he was home free because Russian lines were about thirty miles away, however, civilians spotted him, and, even though his hands were up to surrender, they started shooting at him. Thinking they were probably members of the Home Guard trying to kill him, Al started to run and was shot in the left leg. Al went down. After they caught up to him, they were kicking him in the body and face. When he covered his face with his hands, the kicking stopped, but when he opened his eves he saw a pistol pointed at his head. A German soldier came along and stopped them, otherwise he would have been killed. He asked for medical help. The soldier nodded and left. His attackers stripped him of his uniform, boots and shoes, leaving him with only his underwear. Much to Al's surprise, his wristwatch was not taken.

As he lay on the warm August soil Wracked with pain, a soldier guard was sleeping nearby. With no first aid kit, the only thing Al could do was to apply pressure on the femoral artery to keep from bleeding to death. Amazingly, though screaming with pain and without the benefit of morphine, he never passed out. Finally, at 6 o'clock, a horse-drawn cart filled with straw came, and the medic with two guards took Al to the hospital.

The medics had to use paper bandages, as they were short on supplies. Al was put in a room with his ball turret gunner, and a pilot and nose gunner from another plane. The second day, he was brought into the operating room, and after awakening, the others were silent. They knew his left leg was removed above the knee, but Al did not. When he looked down, he knew why everyone was so quiet.

After being there thirteen days, they were taken to a prisoner of war camp, their new home, by train. A British doctor, a fellow prisoner, examined Al and issued a call for blood donors. The British surgeon and his British medics took care of him, and Al slowly recovered. How they managed to set up blood transfusions without any medical equipment amazed him. Later, these same medics told Al they had no hope for him when he was first brought in. Al believes their efforts saved his life.

In October of 1944, the Swiss Red Cross repatriation committee came to the camp and informed Al that he was on the next list to be sent home. In the middle of January he was put on a hospital train for Lake Geneva, Switzerland, for the prisoner of war exchange with disabled German soldiers returning from camps in the United States. The next day, Al was sent to Marseilles, France and boarded the Swedish passenger liner, "Gripsholm" for the trip to New York, arriving around Washington's birthday to see the beautiful Statue of Liberty.

After spending time at two hospitals recovering from treatments of his amputation, Al was discharged on October 12, 1945. Considering what Al went through, he adjusted very nicely after returning home. Despite his handicap, he became an active Knight of Council 12, participating in many social activities, and met a charming young lady from Council 110, Maspeth, New York. He and the former Emily Razickas recently celebrated their 51st wedding anniversary.

They were the parents of four sons. Twins were the first to join the family, John and Albert. John is a sales representative in advertising. Albert is a colonel in the army, and expects to retire early in 2001.

Matthew is a priest. He was ordained at St. Patrick's Cathedral in New York City on May 13, 1989 by Cardinal John O'Connor. At present, he is at the Holy Name of Mary parish in Croton-on-the Hudson, New York.

Paul, the youngest, was born with a disability, and passed away at the age of 19.

Al was awarded five theatre campaign ribbons, a Purple Heart, and Air Medal with cluster, and a Distinguished Unit Citation Badge, but he would gladly exchange all of them for a healthy leg.

Even though Al and Emily presently reside in Little River, South Carolina, their home for the past twenty years, they are still members of Council 12.

There are undoubtedly other Knights who nobly served in "the war to end all wars," and someday, perhaps their stories will be told. The sacrifices of "The Greatest Generation" should not be forgotten.



Knights of Lithuania National Scholarship Program for 2001 Awards Announced at the 88th National Convention in Orlando, Florida

The Knights of Lithuania Scholarship Program is intended to help a worthy and deserving Knight obtain a college education. Applicants must be a member of the organization for at least <u>two</u> years in order to be eligible to apply for a scholarship award. (This will be verified with the National Financial Secretary.) The Scholarship Program is intended to be a stimulus for young Lithuanian-Americans to join and be active in our organization. Service to the Knights of Lithuania organization is of prime importance to be considered for this award.

Scholarships are awarded annually as a grant. Applications must be complete (i.e., picture, transcripts, recommendations, etc) to be considered by the Scholarship Committee. Applications must be submitted usually no later than June 30th of each year. The awards are paid to the recipient in two installments. ******** APPLICANTS MAY NOW APPLY FOR A SCHOLARSHIP MORE THAN ONCE. THIS IS OFFICIAL NOTIFICATION THAT AN APPLICANT MAY WIN MORE THAN ONE YEAR.******** There are various scholarships available with individual amounts decided upon by the Scholarship Committee by vote each year.

Each applicant has the responsibility of completing the application and securing entrance to the college of his/her choice. If the recipient of an award drops out of college, or if his/her scholastic standing becomes unsatisfactory to the college, the unexpended balance of the award may be forfeited at the discretion of the Scholarship Committee.

Scholarship awards may be made to a person for undergraduate or graduate work. There is no age limitation. Organizational activity within the Knights of Lithuania is one of the most important criteria for obtaining a scholarship along with the following requirements and stipulations.

An applicant's *qualifications* will be based on recommendations made by his/her 1) Council President or Council 3rd Vice President; 2) Spiritual Advisor or Pastor; 3) Former Teacher; 4) Character Reference. Applicants will be evaluated on scholastic records, financial need, and most importantly, K of L involvement. The Scholarship Committee will carefully study the applications and decisions of the committee are final. The recipients of the Scholarship Awards will be announced at the annual National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania.

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KNIGHTS' KITCHEN KORNER



You asked for it! Pressed Country Cheese. (Mary Lapinskas' Recipe)

To make a cheesecloth: (Commercially purchased is a bit flimsy for repeated use).


Square (18 inches) folded in half to make rectangle. If you pull out a thread approximately every inch, the whey drains quicker. Sew 2 inches from SW (southwest) corner (bottom) toward NE (northeast) corner (top).

Cloth should be white and like "butcher-linen" - woven loose enough for the "thread pullling." A rough-woven dishcloth is also suitable. (Sew to shape).

<u>Supplies needed</u>: Cheesecloth, 2 approx 12 inch cutting boards, huge rock or about 3 bricks, string, jelly roll pan, or... to catch whey during pressing.

Cheese:

1 gallon milk (Can use whole, 2%, 1% or skim) 1 to 2 quarts buttermilk ("to taste")



If you stop at this point, you have home-made cottage cheese. Can "cream" it with some sour cream or you can go "lowfat."

Shake down the curds gently, to eliminate air pockets in cloth triangle. Twist end of cloth and tie as close to filling as possible. Place between 2 cutting boards in jelly roll pan (or...). Tilt boards about 2 inches toward narrow end of cloth. Place HEAVY rocks on top. Press approx 4-8 hours or when firm enough "to taste." (This cook thought cutting boards and rocks better than a cheese press). (I agree).

In warm weather, pressing on a large refrigerator shelf is "preferable," but the cheese won't spoil before becoming firm and then refrigerated.

Untie gently and "peel off" cheesecloth. Can leave uncovered for about ½ hour to "dry" the surface. Refrigerate on flat surface. Keep covered in the refrigerator so that the cheese doesn't absorb the taste/smell of other food in the frig.

Can keep this recipe "lowfat" by using skim milk or can make richer by adding some sour cream to the curds before pressing. (Introduce sour cream so curdling is prevented). (Kaip su barsciais/like with beet soup).

Inspired by the late Archbishop George Matulaitis who made a difference in Lithuania, Kay Urban has named April 1st to be "Make a Difference Day". Therefore, council members were asked to make a difference by taking time to do something special for a shut-in, sick, or needy person on one particular day and jot this down on paper which will be turned in and read by the Board at the next meeting. What a great way of making us aware of Kay's inspiration, Blessed George Matulaitis who was born in Mariampole, Lithuania, on April 13, 1876, the youngest of 8 children. He was left an orphan by the age of 10. In his early teens, George developed TB of the bone in his leg which tormented him all of his life.

When George was 18, his cousin arranged for him to go to Poland for medical treatment. While there, George realized his vocation and entered the seminary in 1891. He studied at the Grand Seminary in Warsaw and finished graduate studies at the Catholic Theology Academy of in St. Petersburg, Russia. He received his doctorate in theology at the University of Friburg, Switzerland. He was ordained a priest for the Diocese of Kielce.

In 1913, Fr. George visited the US and established the first Marian House in Chicago. In 1915 he established a Marian Religious House and Novitiate at Bielany, a suburb of Warsaw. In the Spring of 1918, he reopened the Marian Monastery at Mariampole, Lithuania with its own novitiate. Pope Benedict XV named Fr. George as Bishop of Lithuania on December 1, 1918. On September 1, 1925, Pius XI elevated George to Titular Archbishop and appointed him Apostolic Visitator to Lithuania to restore harmony between the State and the Holv See. The Archbishop visited Hartford in the summer of 1926 and established the Immaculate Conception in Putnam, CT during that year. Archbishop Matulaitis died on January 27, 1927 of a ruptured appendix. It took 34 years for the Archbishop to be beatified.

Judy Landers, Lithuanian Affairs, reported on the commemoration of Lithuanian Independence Day whereby a small reception was held at the State Capitol in Hartford with Governor John Roland on March 15. In attendance were K of L'ers Alyce Gegesky, Judy Landers, Dana Grajauskas, Irene Petkaitis, Carol Balskus and Kristina Serksnas. Holy Trinity Church members Danguole Banevicius and Victor Kogelis, Janina Nawarskas, Representative Ruth Fahrbach, Alyce Gegesky's nephew, Daniel Moreland.
