

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

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

To My Fellow Knights

The Washington Times on April 18th published an attractive multi-faceted supplement on Lithuania. It included information on Lithuania's NATO membership aims and subsequent meetings meeting in Vilnius.

Our Lithuanian Ambassador to the United States Vygaudas Ušackas reiterates President Adamkus's stance on the importance of NATO for Lithuania. Visiting in Chicago recently, the ambassador said, "We look upon President George W. Bush and the American people to lead the process of completing the unification of Europe through the subsequent enlargement of NATO at the next Summit in 2002."

It is important to project a strong unified voice. The Knights of Lithuania was one of the major Lithuanian organizations in the U.S. which pledged to pool efforts for this cause. Our representatives attended this meeting in Washington on March 11th, the 11th anniversary of Lithuanian independence. The signatories of the document noted that about 1 million people of Lithuanian descent living in the U.S. could unite their efforts and become an influential group asking the U.S. administration to support Lithuania's NATO aims.

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Have We Forgotten?

In 1608, two hundred years before Lourdes and Fatima, our Blessed Mother appeared in Lithuania in a town called, "*Siluva*."

The story of Our Lady of Siluva actually began in 1457, when Peter Giedgaudas, a diplomat for Vytautas the Great, built the first church in the area and gave the land to the Catholic Church. On one of his many travels he went to Rome, and while there, he obtained a magnificent painting of the Blessed Virgin Mary holding the Child Jesus. This he brought back to Lithuania and put it in the sanctuary of the new church in Siluva.

Over the next hundred years, the Catholic Church in Lithuania experienced troubled times. Since much of the nobility and intellectuals turned to Calvinism and Lutheranism, many people fell away from the church. Property owned by the Catholic Church was confiscated by the authorities. In 1570, Father John Halubka, the parish priest of the Siluva church, fearing that his church would be targeted, took the treasured painting of the Blessed Mother and Child and other church documents. Father Halubka carefully wrapped them, put them in a wooden chest, and buried them under a large rock near the church. His actions were truly inspired, because a short time later, the church was seized by the authorities.

Years later, a new law was passed which gave the Catholic Church permission to reclaim their property if they could prove, with official documents, that the property was previously owned by them. The church in Siluva could not prove that 150 years earlier, in 1547, Peter Giedgaudas had deeded the land to them. The church remained the property of the state.

One warm summer day in 1608, several children of Siluva were tending their sheep anciresting near a large rock. They heard someone crying, and as they looked up, they saw a beautiful lady standing on the rock, shedding bitter tears, and in her arms she held a child.

Frightened, one of the children ran back to the village to tell others of the happening. As the news spread, the believers and doubters went to visit the place of the rock. One day Our Lady appeared, and everyone there heard her crying and saw her tears fall to the large rock on which she stood. Among the crowd was a Calvinist teacher who earlier had said that "she was the work of the devil," now approached her and asked, "Why are you weeping? Who hurt you? The reply came, "Formerly in this place my Son was adored and honored, but now, all that the people do is seed and cultivate the land." Having said this, she vanished.

The bishop appointed Father John Kazakevicius to investigate the phenomenon and question all witnesses as to the events. As a matter of historical record, the following is documented,

An old man who had heard of the apparitions remembered that Father Halubka, in 1570, buried a wooden chest near the church in Siluva. Since the man was blind, he had to be led, and as he approached the rock, his sight was immediately restored. Happily he led the authorities to the exact spot where the chest was buried, and when it was opened, they found the beautiful painting of the Blessed Virgin Mary and Child, undamaged, together with the documents, also intact, which proved the ownership of the land. Soon the property was returned to the Catholic Church.

Over the years many miracles have been recorded and the shrine has experienced numerous changes, and larger churches had to be built to accommodate the pilgrims. Devotion to Our Lady of Siluva was growing until the Soviet Union seized Lithuania in 1940.

Since 1940, this world has seen many changes, and today we find ourselves surrounded by moral decay, and many have lost their way.

Our Lady of Siluva is a most powerful intercessor before God. She once brought Lithuania back to the Church; so let us pray that,

> "moved by your tears, may we, as our forefathers did, revive the spirit of adoration of your Son in our hearts, strengthen the tottering structure of the shrine that is the family, bring back your wandering children, and forgive the sins of our nation."

Our Lady of Siluva, intercede for you wandering children... bring them home to Jesus.

The June Tragedies have been remembered as yet another instance of "man's inhumanity to man," as sleeping Lithuanians were torn from their beds and deported to distant slave labor camps in boxcars, sometimes in only these underwear. Sometimes families were fragmented; sometimes the whole family - including children - was deported.

Now that we live in a society conditioned to accept the unacceptable, those who have the insight of the significance and are driven by a social conscience must remember to empower the always timely relevance of deeds of envy, betrayal, hatred and horror; yet, must promote healing of our wounds to progress.

Now that we live in a society traveling the more accessible roads of pleasure and self-interest, who cares? Perhaps too few, but they work harder to increase social conscience in spite of the abuse of words such as "inhumane." How can anyone adequately describe a "hate crime of such magnitude?

There are many touched by the deportations, even in America. Broken families meant brothers unable to reach brothers sent to remote foreign camps - there were no status reports; children grew up in America never having seen their grandparents. In at least one instance, new wealth enabled a man to learn of his father's execution and locate his grave...almost 50 years later!

To avoid nurturing anger, but to contribute to the prevention of a recurrence of political deportations and death, we need to rally to the cause of NATO membership for the European democracies, including our beloved Lithuania.

Remembering ...

My Dad, John Yanusevicius, is 86 years old. He has been ill for approximately 4 years with Progressive Supranuclear Palsy (PSP). This illness presents itself as Parkinson's disease in the beginning, and then, through additional exams and deduction, a diagnosis of PSP is made. This is the same illness that Dudley Moore has.


Our mom died in 1992 of lung cancer, and our father has been alone since. He has 3 daughters. My dad was born in the USA, but when he was 6 went back to live in Lithuania with his mother, father and brother. When he turned 16, an uncle brought him back to America to live. He spoke little English and went to night school to try and learn. A watch was stolen, and he was accused, (the foreigner did it). He was thrown out of school. My dad is one of the most honest men I have ever known. He never stole the watch. He told me that.

He met my mother, Adele Lunevitz, and in 1938 they were married, and made their home in Hamden, Connecticut. They struggled. We lived in a 4-room cinder block foundation home. They had 3 kids, and my grandfather lived with us for a while. We were poor, but I always thought we were rich because my dad never made us feel any other way. My parents were involved with the **Knights of Lithuania** for many, many years. All three of us children married and had children, and all became members of the **K** of L Council - 50 in New Haven, CT.

My father is now unable to walk, has trouble seeing (at times), has limited use of his right arm, and is unable to speak at great lengths. He has been ill for a long time. Please, Sister, publish this letter, so that maybe the Lithuanians that subscribe to your magazine will send my dad letters or cards to wish him well. Do You Remember?

The following article consists of excerpts from a talk given to Council 26 by its Spiritual Advisor, Rev. John Petrauskas, M.I C. at a recent meeting. How many of you remember the wonderful Fourth of July Lithuanian picnics at Marianapolis College? Well, this is how it all began-

Back in 1931, the Marian Fathers purchased the Ream estate in Putnam, Connecticut and moved their college, St. Mary's, there from Hinsdale, Illinois. The first two years were spent in getting settled and preparing the facility for students. Rev. John Novickas, MIC, was the Headmaster, with Rev. John J. Jakaitis, MIC, the Superior. By 1933, they needed money and met with the Lithuanian Catholic Federation in Norwood, Massachusetts on March 10 to devise a plan on how to raise the much-needed dollars. It was decided to hold a gigantic picnic to be called, "Lithuanian Day," for all Lithuanians. Of course, the major question was, "Would they come?" The date selected was the fourth of July, and the place was to be St. Mary's College (which was renamed "Marianapolis"). Invitations were sent to eighteen parish choirs, asking them to participate in the choral program.

In a May progress meeting that was held at the offices of the newspaper, "Darbininkas," a tentative program was laid out and adopted. The main events would be - an outdoor Solemn High Mass, with a guest priest giving the sermon, a sports program, and finally, a song festival. At this time, eight choirs had sent in their acceptance to perform. All day long there would be various games of chance and other moneymaking attractions. It was also decided to have a program book with paid advertisements. This would list the activities, along with the names of the participants. Picnic proceeds were to be jointly shared with Marianapolis and "Darbininkas."

The next two meetings took place at Marianapolis College where preparations were finalized. Rev. Jakaitis was named the general chairman. The celebrant of the Mass would be Rev. Casimir Urbonavicius, and Brother John Banys would select the music for the Song Festival. A baseball game between the Waterbury and Norwood Knights of Lithuania would be the featured game. Joseph Zemaitis, the choir director and organist from St. Casimir's Parish in Worcester, would direct the combined choirs. They would sing three songs and the Lithuanian National Anthem as a combined choir, and then each choir would sing two songs individually. Fifteen choirs, totaling 700 voices, had sent in their acceptance.

In 1933, many people did not have automobiles, and a way had to be found as to how to get people there. The train company was contacted, and they said they would provide a special express train from Boston, but Marianapolis had to guarantee a minimum of 300 passengers. Arrangements were made with a stop in Norwood. The round-trip fare from Boston was to be \$1.75. The estimated travel time was about one hour and ten minutes. A corresponding trip by bus would take a total of three and a half hours one way. In less than four months, plans were made and executed, and the eventful day was about to arrive.

It rained on July 3rd and everyone was praying for a sunny 4th. The day arrived and the weather was perfect! At 8:05 a.m., the special train left South Station in Boston with 400 passengers in eight coaches. In Norwood, four more coaches were added and 200 additional passengers boarded. Everyone was happy and looking forward with anticipation to a wonderful day. At 9:35 a.m., the train pulled into the spur track at the Thompson railroad. Visualize a long unbroken line of people hurrying up the hill to the gates of Marianapolis. Once there, they had to walk approximately a halfmile to where the 10:00 a.m. Mass was to take place. People did not seem to mind the walk, and their excitement seemed to inspire them to press onward. They all arrived on time.

Rev. Casimir Matulaitis, a priest from Lithuania, gave the sermon. He praised the Lithuanian-Americans for all of their accomplishments and commended them for their efforts to promote the Lithuanian culture and charitable works by establishing churches, schools, religious orders, hospitals, orphanages, numerous organizations, along with daily and weekly newspapers. Polyna Stoska sang a solo, "Salve Regina," during the Mass. (In later years she performed at the Metropolitan Opera and became a star of Broadway musical plays and the concert tour circuit). The Mass was deeply moving and impressive.

There was no problem in feeding this vast assembly of people. The dining facilities of the school offered a delicious lunch, as well as did the many outside booths run by the South Boston, Norwood, Providence and the two Worcester Parishes. Many people also brought their own lunches and took advantage of the lawns and fields for a more personal picnic with family and friends.

In the afternoon, the featured baseball game took place. The Norwood Knights of Lithuania were victorious against the Waterbury Knights, winning by a score of 13 to 3. While the baseball game was being played, there was a track meet with athletes from Holy Cross College, Classical High School, Boston English High School, and Marianapolis College. The star athlete was George Planskis of South Boston, who won the broad jump, the high jump and the shot put. The Norwood South Boston girls' volleyball game attracted considerable interest, with a lot of spectator cheering. The Worcester group triumphed, two to one, in the best of three.

Upon conclusion of all the sports activities, the Song Festival took place. Lithuanian people are a nation with a love for singing. Visualize a choir of 700, raising up their voices in song. The appreciative audience listened with rapt attention. It was like listening to choirs of angels.

Remember when the plans were being formulated for this picnic, the question was, "Would they come?" Well, they did! Not only did they come by train, but there were 45 buses, and it was estimated that more than 2,500 private automobiles were parked inside the gates of the college. The local newspaper, "The Putnam Patriot," headlined this special Lithuanian Day, and reported that, "Ten thousand or more people, the largest number ever assembled in this part of Windham County, attended the first Lithuanian Day of New England. People were present from every state in New England, plus New York and New Jersey."

It was a happy crowd, with singing, merrymaking and visiting with relatives and friends. All age groups were represented, from the very young to the elderly. Some wondered if the young adults would attend, and they did, in large numbers, proving to the pessimists who figured they would not come, that they were wrong.


The day was perfect. All enjoyed the Mass and various events. Imagine if you were there at this first gigantic picnic; praying, singing, socializing, entering into various games, etc. It would be an event you would remember for the rest of your life.

The July picnics lived on for the next 37 years, but they never had as many people as those that attended this first one. Unfortunately, the last picnic was held in 1970. At this time, "Darbininkas" published an article in their newspaper stating, that due to technical difficulties, the demise of the picnic was brought about. However, they stated that guests would always be welcome, and they were encouraged to visit.

<u>Note</u>: In the early 30's, (St. Mary's) Marianapolis College was a Junior College and a preparatory school. By the late 30's, it developed into a four-year college. But, by the 50's, it reverted to a preparatory school only.

Rev. Anthony Zakarauskas Serving God and His people for 60 years

On May 3, 2001, Rev. Anthony J. Zakarauskas celebrated his 60th Anniversary of Ordination to the Priesthood. He was born on July 3, 1917 in Cicero, Illinois, and graduated St. Anthony School and Quigley Preparatory Seminary, and St. Mary of the Lake Seminary in 1941 with B.A., M.A., and S.T.L. degrees. He was ordained as a priest at age 23 (the youngest man on record in the Archdiocese of Chicago, according to "Chicago Sun Times") by Archbishop Stritch. He had to obtain a special dispensation from Rome in order to be ordained at that age. Then he attended the Graduate School at De Paul University and Loyola University.

Assignments: Father was an Associate Pastor at Nativity B.V.M. Parish (1941-1949); Holy Cross Parish (1949-1951); St. George Parish (1951-1956); Chaplain of the Sisters of St. Casimir Motherhouse (1956-1966); Chaplain of Holy Cross Hospital (1966-1970); Pastor of Nativity B.V.M. Parish (1970-1987).

He has been an active member of the Knights of Lithuania C-112 for over 60 years, Moderator of the K of L Mid-America District for 50 years; and Master of Ceremonies at the "Memories of Lithuania" Banquet for 35 years. At present, he is still active as the Knights of Lithuania Mid-America District Spiritual Advisor.

In his early years at Nativity B.V.M. Parish, Father Zakarauskas founded a Girls' Glee Club, School Band, CYO Boys' Club, Girls' Junior Sodality, Boy Scout Troop, Cub Scout Pack, Girl Scout Troop and a Youth Center; he was very effective working with young people.

Special Affiliations and Memberships: Father was a Professor at Quigley Preparatory Seminary-North, at St. Casimir Junior College, St. Casimir Academy and Maria High School; Member of the Board of Consultors to Cardinal Cody; Member of Catholic Family Consultation Service. He also served as an Associate Judge in the Beatification Process of Mother Maria Kaupas, foundress of the Sisters of St. Casimir; Member of the Committee forming the Chicago Priests' Senate; a Member of the Archdiocesan School Board Nominating Staff: Chaplain of the Knights of Columbus; Chaplain of the International Order of Alhambra; Chaplain of the Lithuanian National Guard (Chicago); Vice-President of Our Lady of Siluva Chapel Committee (Washington, D.C.); and Vice-President of the Lithuanian Martyrs' Chapel Committee (Rome).

In retirement, Father Zakarauskas continues to assist with Holy Masses and confessions in Nativity B.V.M. Parish and in the Sisters of St. Casimir Motherhouse Chapel.

Fr. Edward Stockus Retires ...

Father Edward S. Stockus, who was ordained at the age of 60, is retiring from the active ministry. He has been named pastor emeritus of St. Hugh Parish in Lyons, IL, where he was pastor in 1994.

Rev. Stockus, now 70, has been serving as associate pastor at St. Catherine of Alexandria Parish, Oak Lawn, IL, since 1999. He also served at the parish earlier as a deacon before studying for the priesthood.

A mechanical engineer for many years, he was ordained to the permanent diaconate in 1974. After the death of his wife, Barbara, in 1986, he studied for the priesthood at Sacred Heart Seminary in Hales Corners, Wisconsin. He was ordained in 1991.

Born in Chicago, he attended St. Rita High School and the Illinois Institute of Technology. He served in the U.S. Air Force during the Korean War.

Fr. Stockus is the cousin of Mary Kincius, C-36 and Vytis Business Manager.



Someone you Should Know

Tribute convert: The Berklee College of Music paid tribute to Boston's senior composer, Jeronimas Kacinskas, 93, in a special concert April 8, in the David Friend Recital Hall at Berklee.

Before World War II, Kacinskas was a leading figure in the musical life of his native Lithuania, where he conducted both, the Vilnius State Opera and the Vilnius Symphony Orchestra on hundreds of occasions. In 1944, he and his wife were forced to flee under dangerous circumstances. He reached America, and in 1949 began constructing a new musical life for himself on the faculty of Berklee.

The program includes a "Nonet" he composed in 1938 for the International Society of Contemporary Music/World Music Days in London, and which was thought lost until the parts turned up in Prague a few years ago.

The program also includes two recent works, the Fourth String Quartet (1997), played by the Esterhazy String Quartet, and "2000 Year Anniversary of Jesus Christ's Holy Message to the People" for brass octet, which will receive its premiere.



Whereas, in the past the Knights of Lithuania organization and its Constitution have made no distinction between a person who has received Honorary Membership as a member of the Knights of Lithuania and those who received it as an outstanding Catholic Lithuanian who's achievements were exemplary and who were not members of the Knights of Lithuania, and

Whereas, in Article VIII of the Constitution concerning Members Rights, all Honorary Members regardless of whether they are regular K of L members or not, are given the right to be delegates at National Conventions, vote at Supreme Council, District and Council meetings and be elected to offices an the National, District or Council levels, we feel it is necessary to make some distinction, therefore,

Be it resolved that starting January 1, 2002, Article V, Section 2, Paragraph (a.) (ii.) be deleted in its entirety.


Article V, Section 2 Paragraph (a) should read as follows:

## Knights of Lithuania National Scholarship Program for 2001 Awards Announced at the 88<sup>th</sup> National Convention in Orlando, Florida

The Knights of Lithuania Scholarship Program is intended to help a worthy and deserving Knight obtain a college education. Applicants must be a member of the organization for at least <u>two</u> years in order to be eligible to apply for a scholarship award. (This will be verified with the National Financial Secretary.) The Scholarship Program is intended to be a stimulus for young Lithuanian-Americans to join and be active in our organization. Service to the Knights of Lithuania organization is of prime importance to be considered for this award.

Scholarships are awarded annually as a grant. Applications must be complete (i.e., picture, transcripts, recommendations, etc) to be considered by the Scholarship Committee. Applications must be submitted usually no later than June 30th of each year. The awards are paid to the recipient in two installments. \*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* APPLICANTS MAY NOW APPLY FOR A SCHOLARSHIP MORE THAN ONCE. THIS IS OFFICIAL NOTIFICATION THAT AN APPLICANT MAY WIN MORE THAN ONE YEAR.\*\*\*\*\*\*\*\* There are various scholarships available with individual amounts decided upon by the Scholarship Committee by vote each year.

Each applicant has the responsibility of completing the application and securing entrance to the college of his/her choice. If the recipient of an award drops out of college, or if his/her scholastic standing becomes unsatisfactory to the college, the unexpended balance of the award may be forfeited at the discretion of the Scholarship Committee.

Scholarship awards may be made to a person for undergraduate or graduate work. There is no age limitation. Organizational activity within the Knights of Lithuania is one of the most important criteria for obtaining a scholarship along with the following requirements and stipulations.

An applicant's *qualifications* will be based on recommendations made by his/her 1) Council President or Council 3rd Vice President; 2) Spiritual Advisor or Pastor; 3) Former Teacher; 4) Character Reference. Applicants will be evaluated on scholastic records, financial need, and most importantly, K of L involvement. The Scholarship Committee will carefully study the applications and decisions of the committee are final. The recipients of the Scholarship Awards will be announced at the annual National Convention of the Knights of Lithuania.







Once again, we have lost a member. Mary McGinley went to her glory on March 28th. Amzina Atsilsi, Mary.




We are keeping in mind the August convention being held in Orlando,

## PANCAKES/BLYNAI, SKLINDŽIAI

1 cup flour 1 tbspn. Sour cream 4 eggs 1 cup milk ½ tsp. salt

Separate egg yolks from whites. Beat yolks til light, stir into sifted flour, add crem, milk and salt. Fold in stiffly beaten egg whites. Fry on butter. Use one large tablespoon of batter per pancake. Serve with honey or preserves.

Apple pancakes: add peeled, thinly sliced or grated tart apple to batter.

## TORTE "NAPOLEON" NAPOLEONAS

4 cups flour 1 lb. lightly salted butter 1 pint sour cream

Sift flour onto pastry board. With pastry blender or two knives, gradually cut softened butter into flour until crumbly. Blend in sour cream. With hands, form dough into 11 or 12 egg-sized round balls. Refrigerate overnight in covered bowl. Before baking, let dough stand at room temperature about 15 minutes. Roll each ball almost wafer thin on very lightly floured board. Roughly fit into 12inch ungreased pie pan. Prick all over with a fork. Bake each layer at 350 degrees, 4 to 5 minutes. Cool. Stack layers atop each other. With very sharp knife, even the sides, saving trimmings for crumbs. Put layers together with

### (FILLING FOR NAPOLEONAS)

 ½ Ib. unsalted butter
 2 cups powdered sugar
 8 egg yolks
 1 pkg. Vanilla pudding mix
 2 cups milk
 ½ cup half and half or Carnation milk
 2 tsp. vanilla juice of one lemon

Cream butter, yolks and sugar. Stir pudding mix into 1 cup cold milk. Bring to boil, stirring constantly. Gradually pour and stir pudding into butter and yolks. Scald and slowly pour in 1 cup milk, cream and vanilla. Slowly add heated lemon juice. Cool. Spread about 1 tbspn. between each layer. Frost sides and top with same filling, sprinkle with finely crumbed layer trimmings.

One or two layers may be spread with stewed apricot or apple puree or berry preserves.


## COLD BEET SOUP ŠALTIBARŠČIAI

3 bouillon cubes 4 cups boiling water 1 No. 2 can shoe-string beets 2 -3 blossoms fresh dill 1 stalk green onion 1 small cucumber 1 hard boiled egg ½ pt. Sour cream scolve cubes in boiling water Ad

Dissolve cubes in boiling water. Add beets. Cool slightly. Add finely cut onion, diced peeled cucumber, finely chopped dill, and salt to taste. Blend in cream. Add diced egg. Chill several hours. Serve in chilled soup bowls, with hot potatoes boiled in jackets. Buttermilk may be substituted for cream.

For variation, add small can deveined shrimp (well rinsed) before chilling soup.

## About the Text:

In 1892, in honor of the four hundredth anniversary of Christopher Columbus's arrival in the New World, President Benjamin Harrison proclaimed a national school celebration. For the occasion, Francis Bellamy, of Boston, Massachusetts, felt that the nation's schoolchildren should state a simple yet heartfelt patriotic pledge, one that would be a part of a flag-raising ceremony. The now familiar Pledge of Allegiance was the result, and it first appeared in the September 1892 issue of *The Youth's Companion*, of which Bellamy was editor. On Columbus Day of that year, children first recited America's Pledge of Allegiance in classrooms across the country.

The pledge has undergone some revisions in the past one hundred years. The original version was lengthened in 1923 and again in 1924. After the United States entered the second World War, Congress established guidelines for the treatment of the national flag, and included formal guidelines concerning reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. The proper position for reciting the pledge included standing with one's right hand over one's heart or, in the case of military personnel, at attention. Men were to remove their hats, and uniformed personnel were to salute. The year 1954 brought another revision to the Pledge when Congress voted to add two words: "under God." The Pledge was now not only a patriotic declaration, but a public prayer as well, one that all Americans continue to recite with pride.
