NATO ENLARGEMENT

The next few months will be a critical time for Lithuania's aspiration in becoming a NATO member. In the very near future, President Bush and his advisors will decide which countries to invite into NATO. We must continue our participation in letter writing to President Bush, our Congressmen and Senators. We must continue to contact and ask our friends and neighbors to sign NATO petitions and get the message to our elected officials. It is clear that the invitation to join NATO is the priority and the goal of the Government and the people of Lithuania. President Adamkus, in his recent letter to me and to other Lithuanian-American Organizations, urged us to continue to work together to successfully Promote Lithuania's candidacy into NATO. He also emphasized that without our wholehearted support the NATO entry could not be achieved. Let me restate several points that we must continue to undertake:

-To effectuate the promise made by President George W. Bush in the course of his campaign, to lead the effort to expand NATO in 2002 and thereby assure that Lithuania is among the invited members at that time.

-To influence members of his administration, Senate and Congress, governors and mayors, by emphasizing that NATO expansion is the most effective means to create a free, unified and secure Europe.

-To inform the Lithuanian community of the importance of NATO enlargement and to form a positive opinion among the public, political leaders and media.

-To encourage our local Councils and representatives to organize delegations to visit and inform our elected representatives.

-To urge influential and prominent people to positively commit themselves to NATO enlargement and Lithuania's invitation in the year 2002.

We must make Lithuania's admission into NATO our commitment and our goal. By all of us working together, we will prevail.

Action in/by Lithuania for NATO admission

-In early May, prime ministers of the "Vilnius Ten" countries met in the Slovakian capital of Bratislava. The "Vilnius Nine" group was formed after the last year's Vilnius conference, and now, joined by Croatia, it is called the "Vilnius Ten." The prime ministers of Albania, Bulgaria, Croatia, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Macedonia, Romania, Slovakia and Slovnia, together with Czech President Vaclav Havel, Poland's ex-foreign minister Bronislaw Geremek, and former U.S. presidential adviser for national security Zbigniew Brzezinski, attended the international conference, "Europe's New Democratic States: Leadership and Responsibility." Lithuanian Prime Minister, Rolandas Paksas, speaking at the conference urged the countries of the West not to delay NATO enlargement. He stated, "There will be no losers in NATO enlargement, while the Alliance, the new member states and even the enlargement opponent, Russia, will benefit." Paksas reminded that Lithuania is not only a country seeking security guarantees, but also a country capable of making its own contribution to the collective defense system and called the issue of the Baltic states' NATO membership "the most important question of all at present." Czech President, Vaclav Havel, underscored that he failed "to understand why these three free countries shouldn't be offered membership as soon as possible, especially as they are working hard to be ready for it." "I therefore believe that an invitation to join the Alliance should be extended to them at the next NATO summit in Prague."

-On May 4, President Valdas Adamkus received Foreign Minister of Hungary, Janos Martonyi. The Hungarian Foreign Minister reassured President Adamkus of his country's support for Lithuania's membership into NATO.

-In Lithuania, just like in the United States, there are many political views, however, there is complete agreement on NATO and European Union. On May 23, ten Lithuanian parties signed a historic agreement reaffirming the countries' aspiration to NATO membership and active participation in European Union's (EU) common foreign and security policy. The agreement on Lithuania's Defense Policy in 2001-2004 was signed by representatives of both

ruling and opposition parties, along with other political organizations, at a solemn ceremony at the Parliament (Seimas). "Only belonging to NATO's collective defense system, can Lithuania ensure its long-term and stable security, " reads the document. "We have demonstrated our unity." "It is a very good sign before the upcoming NATO Parliamentary Assembly's session and the 2002 NATO summit meeting," said **Arturas Paulauskas**, the leader of the ruling Social Liberal Union and Parliament Chairman.

-NATO confirmed that it planned a meeting on June 13. Heads of State from alliance members would be invited to attend. The NATO Summit is intended to address problems in the Balkans, the U.S.' plans to develop an antimissile defense system and enlargement of the alliance. "The decision to call a NATO summit meeting in Brussels this June to, among other matters, discuss the alliance's enlargement indicates that the debates on the issue are held on the top level," said Lithuanian Foreign Ministry's Director of Information and Culture department, Petras Zapolskas. He also stated the time cycle between the meetings in Brussels and Prague in 2002 should give enough time for the alliance to assess progress made by individual candidates in the implementation of their Membership Action Plans. "Lithuania's agenda remains unchanged -Lithuania hopes to receive and invitation to NATO in Prague in 2002, " Zapolskas said.

-Lithuanian Parliament Chairman Arturas Paulauskas, met President of German Bundestag Wolfgang Thierse. Paulauskas spoke about Germany's importance in Lithuanian bids to join NATO and the EU. Paulauskas recalled statements Germany has made in the past, that it is Lithuania's advocate in Euro-Atlantic integration. He said he expected Germany's policy and support for Lithuania would remain consistent in the future. Thierse gave assurances of his country's support for Lithuania's objectives of joining the EU and NATO.

LITHUANIA'S Military preparedness for NATO entry

-On May 8-10, the military exercises called, "Blue Hope '01" by the command of the joint Lithuanian-Polish battalion, "LITPOLBAT" were held at the officers' tactical training center in Nemencine. This is the second round of exercises by the battalion's headquarters this year, devoted to peacekeeping activities. This was in preparation before the international exercises, "Amber Hope 2001," where "LITPOLBAT" troops will be participating along with other forces.

-Swedish advisors began to train the Lithuanian Volunteer National Defense Forces with instructors provided by the Swedish National Guard's training center. Swedish officers trained Lithuanian soldiers for territorial defense. Theoretical foundations were taught at the headquarters of the Lithuanian volunteer forces in Vilnius, while training on the ground occurred at the National Defense Volunteer Forces' Major Bulvicius Training Center in Raudondvaris.

New briefs from Lithuanian Newspapers

-Lithuania uses taxpayers' money to educate qualified nurses for foreign countries nursing specialists train to go abroad for jobs. A nurse getting 520 litai (\$130) per month in Lithuania, can earn as much as \$2,000 abroad. Moreover, the work and social conditions outside Lithuania are better. There is a high demand for nurses in Ireland and Norway: others find jobs in Sweden, Finland and Iceland. The professional level of Lithuanian nurses conforms to the level needed in those countries. -Lithuanian exports grew by 15 per cent, and imports by 14.2 per cent in the first guarter of this year, compared to the same period in 2000, the Department of Statistics announced. In January-March, 2001, Lithuania's exports amounted to 4.288 billion litai, and imports totaled 5.690 billion litai. Lithuanian exports to the European Union (EU) accounted for 50.1 per cent of the overall exports of the country.

-More than 34,000 students of secondary schools took the compulsory examinations. 12,000 chose a state exam which, at the same time represents a university exam. This year, the National Examination Center is organizing an overall 7 state graduation examinations which universities recognize as entrance exams. After passing the compulsory exam, students will take optional ones. The main session of secondary school examinations will end on June 12.

-Dairy product exports from Lithuania rose by a fifth in the January-April period of this

year, while dairy product imports declined nearly threefold over the same period. Over the four months, Lithuania exported 24, 830 tons of dairy products, a 19.4 increase on the same time last year when this figure stood at 20, 801 tons. Sour cream exports increased 11.2 times to 1,020 tons, yogurt exports increased eight times to 145,000 tons, milk sugar exports rose fivefold to 1,970 tons. In January-April, Lithuania exported 10,010 tons of cheese, up by 15.9 per cent versus the respective period in 2000, and butter exports were down by 19 per cent to 2,470 tons. Estonia, Latvia and the European Union re the main markets for Lithuanian dairy exports.

-Prime Minister Rolandas Paksas was concerned about a possibility of losing his seat. The President's office and the ruling coalition have started considering changing the incumbent premier for another politician from the Liberal Union. "It has been proposed to select a more determined and obedient person," Paksas spoke out at the Saturday held congress of the Liberal Union. However, even though some of the Liberal Union members were not satisfied with their leadership and its actions, the party reelected Paksas for the second term.

"Political life is not a Gospel; the situation can change," Social Democrat leader **Algirdas Brazauskas** said. He did not rule out the possibility that Social Democrats and Social Liberals might form a ruling coalition in the future. However, he denied reports about ongoing negotiations between Social Democrats and Social Liberals on formation of a new coalition.

-President Valdas Adamkus alluded that, if Social Democrats find a political partner to form a new majority, he would agree with the formation of a New Cabinet. "From a viewpoint of democratic politics, all political streams or parties are absolutely free to choose their political way, that is, in their opinion, the best for the State," Adamkus said. He underscored, however, the openness in the political life. Hence, negotiations on new power should proceed openly. Social Democrats say they would take over the initiative if the present power coalition falters. Party leaders are inclined to wait until the ruling coalition fails to govern, while some Social Democrat party members urge the leadership to be more active and "take the power right now."

European Union Activity

-Finnish President, **Tarja Halonen**, told Lithuanian Foreign Minister, **Antanas Valionis**, in Helsinki on May 21, that Finland supports Lithuania's bid for membership in the European Union. She noted with satisfaction, that Lithuania had reached the midpoint of its EU admission negotiations when it closed two more chapters on May 17.

Lithuania hosted the international conference, "European Integration: Economic and Securtiy: Implications for Central and Eastern Europe," on May 21. At the conference, President Adamkus said, "It is gratifying that more and more often Vilnius is chosen as the venue for important discussions on the European and Euro-Atlantic issues. I believe that European integration and security deserve to be discussed in Vilnius. Actually, it is not only we who want to keep the finger on the pulse of the European unification. I hope that our European partners also find it useful to come here, as they can get enriched with the ideas and learn about the concerns originating in a very distinctive cultural and political background." He also said, "Today a most threatening challenge to Lithuania is the prospect of failing to catch up with the social and economic development of Europe. Therefore, it is imperative for us to fully integrate with the rest of Europe sooner, rather than later."

Feeling good about yourself and in control of your life is tremendously important at any age---but especially as you grow older, when you may feel besieged by many threats to your well-being.

Over time, your youthful appearance and vigor may have diminished. You may have had to give up activities you once enjoyed. Perhaps you do not feel as productive as before retirement; perhaps you no longer have the financial security of former years. You may have suffered illness or loss of eyesight, hearing, bladder control, mobility. And most painful of all, you have probably experienced the deaths of people very dear to you.

This parade of losses can make you question your very purpose in living and can arouse many fears: Can I make it without my helpmate of so many years? How will I manage to take care of myself? Will I become a useless burden to my relatives? Will I be able to adjust to living somewhere else? What if I don't have enough time left to accomplish all I wanted to? Will I be able to withstand the pain of my illness? What is death like?

Working your way through.

The fear of aging is the common denominator in all these reactions. How can you and I best face the real fears and anxieties, then, that accompany aging?

1. Keep on giving of yourself--and receive graciously. The world needs you! To feel needed and to meet the needs of other people, especially members of your immediate family, can be a main source of meaning and hope for you. Your age equips you to make unique contributions. These contributions lie in the realm of the wisdom that hindsight can give, the foresight that experience can provide, and the compassion that suffering can foster.

Take the risk of meeting new people and making new friends. You can learn to appreciate these people and put some of your old ideas to the test of new information and challenges from them.

If you remain open and listen well and are gracious to those around you, you will cultivate enduring and fulfilling relationships.

2. Make friends of all ages. An 86year-old once said to me: "If I had not made many friends of all ages, I wouldn't have any friends now. I would have outlived them all and been alone in the world!"

If you have friends only in your own age group, you might tend to "pool," and thus reinforce all your fears of aging. If you have older friends, however, you can borrow from their wisdom about coping with getting older. You will find that some of them look upon their years as the advantage of seniority rather than the curse of aging.

When you cultivate younger friends, their spirit of youth will renew your own youth; their visions will inspire you. Their consultation with you as an older person will emphasize some of the advantages of your years. And, indeed, there are many. You will see your younger friends struggling through problems that you can thank God are in the past for you! And your memories and experience will give them clues and cues for their life pilgrimages.

3. Learn new skills. Olympic gold medal winners frequently find they are "over the hill" by the time of the next Olympiad. Their one skill is no longer of use to them. If you identify yourself with one skill, and then outlive that skill, life might begin to seem over for you.

Don't be afraid to learn new skills. You can learn very complex new tasks, while shedding some that are obsolete. Diversify your skills and develop abilities that defy the passing of years. I am grateful that I learned the additional skill of writing.

As I write these skills to you, I have a skill that remains useful to me at 71 years of age. In fact, being 71 enhances this skill, as art is enhanced with age. You can do similar things that are unique to you.

4.Come to terms with the losses you have sustained. Allow yourself to mourn the sorrowful loss of your brother or sister, your mother or father, your child, your spouse, your close friend.

You must grieve fully, giving grief the time to do its work. You will move through stages of shock, numbness, alternately accepting and rejecting the tragic reality, pouring out your sorrow in tears, and ultimately coming to a sense of peace with yourself and God.

Grieving takes time, but should not become a way of life. You must not make your loss an idol around which you organize your whole life. Give yourself the time that you need to grieve, but envision a time when you are going to reorganize your life and get on with the challenges life has for you.

5. Don't wallow in self-pity and despair. People who stand up well to hardship assume that a certain amount of "bad luck," suffering, disappointment, and grief are the common lot of all people. The fear of aging, on the other hand, thrives on the assumption that I am somehow an exception and that this just shouldn't be happening to me.

If feelings of hopelessness deepen into a clinical depression, this can be a hazard to your health. You may even so resent the process of aging that you are tempted to end your life *now*. Yet, depression is one of the most treatable emotional disorders. If your own efforts at pulling out of despair are not enough, consult your physician.

6. Don't be afraid to ask for help. Maintaining independence and control over your own decision-making are highly prized rights. But you may find that some of the problems you face as you grow older require more expertise or resources than you possess. Take advantage of the services in your community—whether you need a different living situation, help around the home, transportation, counseling, medical assistance, financial advice. Use your social network family and friends – to locate the help that you need. Relying on others for help does not mean becoming totally dependent on them.

7. Take inventory of factors that age you. Smoking, cholesterol-rich foods, excessive exposure to the sun, a sedentary life-style, driving without seatbelts fastened—these practices can make your "health age" much higher than your actual age.

Look at your family heritage for indications of your probable longevity. If you have parents who are still living or lived to an advanced age, try to determine the secret of their longevity. What were their health habits? Do you have similar ones? Did they have good medical care? Do you have excellent medical care and follow your doctor's instructions? If your parents died prematurely, what caused their death?

Longevity is a combination of good heredity and good health habits. When you know the facts about your heritage, you can take sensible precautions to "outwit the genetic odds."

8. Turn to God who is faithful throughout the years. Amidst all the changes of aging, it helps to maintain continuity with your past. You need to continue to weave the threads in the pattern of your life that have been strong and constant. Many older adults find their faith to be just such an ongoing thread in their life.

Especially at this time when you are not as physically active as you once were, you can direct your energies to your interior, spiritual life. You can bask in the reassuring presence of the God who gave you life itself and who has attended you throughout all the days of your life. You can take this opportunity to prayerfully assess your past and come to terms with it, forgiving and asking forgiveness. And you can transform any fear of old age into an awesome reverence of God, whose love is timeless, whose promise of life lasts forever.

Take heart. As an older adult, you now have the experience and strength and wisdom to deal well with life's challenges even the challenge of aging itself. If you can affirm your aging, and refuse to let your life get stagnant, your aging will present you with rich opportunities to explore new dimensions of yourself.

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

Friend of Lithuania



I am very pleased to announce that this year's candidate to receive the KNIGHTS OF LITHUANIA, FRIEND OF LITHUANIA AWARD, is Ginger L. Houghton of Schenectady, New York.

Ginger is a Certified Registered Nurse Anesthetist (CRNA) with strong clinical, teaching and managerial experience in the health care field. She holds the National Certification of Nurse Anesthetists Registered Nurse, State of New York. Her education includes classes at the Schenectady Cooperative Program for Licensed Practical Nurses, Associate in Applied Science from Hudson Valley C.C., evening courses at the Schenectady C.C., and a Bachelor of Science Degree from the University of the State of New York in Albany, New York. Ginger has many certifications. including Advanced Cardiac Life Support, Advanced First Aid Instructor and CPR Cardiopulmonary Resuscitation Instructor. Ginger holds the rank of Lieutenant Colonel, Chief Nurse/Nurse Administrator in the U.S. Air National Guard

Since the re-establishment of Lithuania's independence, her work for Lithuania has been nothing short of monumental. Through her efforts, an open heart surgery was provided to a Lithuanian patient in 1977, an electric wheelchair was shipped to a patient, an electric bed shipped to a quadriplegic along with two years of cardiac medication. Working with Lithuanian friend, Bob Duda, Ginger sends humanitarian support to three families in Lithuania as part of "Saulute Kids" program, including three new computers to each of their "Saulute Kids." In April, 2000, she and Bob organized the 109th Air National Guard medical deployment unit for a two-week exercise with Lithuanian Medical Teams in the Kaunas area. It was very well received and favorably written up in the Kauno Diena newspaper. A second deployment exercise is planned for 2002.

Through Ginger's efforts, seven Heart-Lung machines were shipped through the "Great Circle Tour," and eleven containers of medical supplies to Lithuanian Hospitals. Working with the Shriners' Hospital in Springfield, MA., an eleven year old boy was provided with a right arm prosthesis. Also, a Nurse Educator has been provided to Kaunas Poly Clinic from Saint Peter's Hospital. Ginger has worked closely with the local K of L chapter to assist Lithuania, and has worked closely with me in providing prescription eye glasses to a needy family in Lithuania.

In progress is, to provide an Orthopedic Surgeon to Kaunas Poly Clinic and to a hospital in Marijampole for Orthopedic surgeries, in September. Her contacts with St. Peter's hospital provide the use of warehouse space, temperature controlled storage, loading and dock equipment, including the use of a fork lift.

Over the years we have presented the "Friend of Lithuania" Award to a varied group of people. I am very pleased that we will be presenting this year's award to Ginger Houghton, who has done so much for the sick and the needy in Lithuania.







Since Holy Trinity Church, Hartford, is having a special Mass for the Lithuanian-American



Conditions were deplorable and children

were forced into labor camps. An appeal was made to the UN in 1941. This process was resumed in 1944 and 1945 through 1950.

The NATO Parliamentary Assembly was probably the largest international event that Lithuania has seen in the last decade. John Shimkus. 

In the June issue of "Vytis - The Knight," I was very delighted to read the article about "Siluva" written by Mrs. Elinor Sluzas. I would like to express some of my thoughts.

Not too many people realize that the Blessed Mother's appearance in the town of Siluva, in Lithuania, was the first in Europe (in 1608), and, as Mrs. Sluzas states, "two hundred years before Lourdes and Fatima." This was a real honor that was bestowed on Lithuania, which was even recognized and recorded by the Vatican as a true miracle.

It is a shame that religious disputes and politics have hindered this miracle from being more widely known throughout the world.

As the UNESCO President stated in Vilnius this year, Lithuania is a beautiful country, with a remarkable history, art, architecture and culture, but there is very little written, or other information available for foreign visitors in any language. This is also true about Siluva.

An effort should be made to publicize this miracle to the Catholics of the world, and not just to remind us and keep it hidden as was done in the past.


