

The Congress Hotel was built in 1893 for the Columbian World's Exposition. It's architecture was designed to blend with that of the Auditorium Theatre, and the hotel itself at one time was connected to the theatre, prior to the construction of the Congress Parkway. Architecture students from all over the world today come to Chicago to study the architecture of the Congress Plaza Hotel. Clinton J. Warren was the architect of our north tower, with Louis Sullivan and Dankmar Adler serving as consultants. Our south tower, constructed in 1902 and 1907, was designed by the renowned architectural firm Holabird and Roche (now Holabird and Root).

Many famous people have stayed at the Congress Plaza Hotel, including U.S. Presidents Grover Cleveland and Theodore Roosevelt. The world famous Gold Room has hosted many historical events. Other well-known guests of the Congress Plaza Hotel include Jean Harlow, Thomas Edison, Benny Goodman, Ruby Davis, Ossie Davis, Bruce Springsteen and Frank Lloyd Wright. Also actor Dennis Franz of "NYPD Blue" and "Hill Street Blues" fame was once a Congress Plaza Hotel employee.

The Congress Plaza Hotel became part of the Albert Pick hotel family in 1950, and was known as the Pick Congress. Later, the hotel adopted the Americana Hotel franchise, and was known as the Americana Congress. In 1994, the Congress Plaza Hotel became part of the Ramada franchise, was known as the Ramada Congress Hotel. Recently renovated in 1998, the Congress Plaza Hotel, independently owned, changed the name to The Congress Plaza Hotel & Convention Center a popular place to stay for convention, business, and leisure travelers.

The Congress Plaza Hotel is located across from Grant Park and the world famous Buckingham Fountain. At the corner of Congress Parkway and Michigan Avenue, the hotel is just a short stroll from The Art Institute of Chicago, the Shedd Aquarium, the Field Museum of Natural History, as well as Chicago's Magnificent Mile. State Street (That Great Street) shopping, with the landmark Marshall Field's, is just a few blocks away. Chicago's beautiful lakefront can be seen from many of the hotel's guest rooms.

Lithuanian Affairs Update -

By John R. Mankus, Chairman, National Lithuanian Affairs Committee



Post September 11 events

- -The vulnerability of the Ignalina Soviet-built nuclear power plant to terrorist attacks is of great concern to the Lithuanian government, despite security upgrades following the September 11 events in United States. The Ignalina Nuclear Power Station is located 130 kilometers north of Vilnius. President Adamkus met with government leaders, addressing possible accidental and terrorist attacks. In recent weeks, antiaircraft guns have been placed around the perimeter of the plant and a no-fly zone has been declared in the vicinity. Additional guards have also been stationed at the plant. The meetings at the president's palace also included the giant Mazeikiai Oil Refinery, which handles the bulk of the oil products processed and exported in Lithuania
- Lithuania is to send 12 medical doctors to the Czech military field hospital in Afghanistan as Lithuanian contribution to the anti terrorist efforts.

President Valdas Adamkus

President Valdas Adamkus, conferred the Order of the Lithuanian Grand Duke Gediminas, one
of Lithuania's highest state medals on Strobe Talbott, Professor of Yale University, former US deputy
Secretary of State. Talbott, an adviser to former President Bill Clinton, is a strong advocate for

Lithuania's membership in NATO. President Valdas Adamkus presented Talbott with the Order of Grand Duke Gediminas at an awards ceremony in Vilnius, "I thank you on behalf of the entire nation". Lithuanian officials are very optimistic about receiving an invitation to join the alliance during next year's NATO summit in Prague, the Czech capital. Talbott said that he also shared those high hopes. "I am very optimistic about next year."

- President **Valdas Adamkus** met with **Lord Russell Johnston**, President of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe, and discussed the issues relating to Lithuania's chairmanship in the CE Council of Ministers, human rights in Lithuania and the international situation. During the working breakfast Lord Russell Johnston commended Lithuania on progress in building a democratic state. "Within a surprisingly short time from beneficiary Lithuania has become a contributor," President of the CE Parliamentary Assembly said. The President also informed Lord Russell Johnston about Lithuania's efforts to ensure respect for human rights and measures taken to combat illicit trafficking in human beings and drugs.
- Lithuanian President **Valdas Adamkus** urged Eastern Europe countries to do more to stem illegal trade across their borders and via banks used by terrorists. "*Corruption, drug trafficking, money laundering, illegal migration, organized crime are just a few areas our countries have been working hard but rather ineffectively at," said the President at a 16-nation Warsaw conference on terrorism. "<i>Our cooperation can be especially effective in shutting down the channels that feed terrorist networks.*" Adamkus, who was in Washington on September 11 and saw the Pentagon burning after it was attacked, said ex-communist states should do all they can to aid the U.S. in its war on terrorism. "*In times of need, our nations have always looked to America for support*, he said "*Now America needs our support and they must get it-lasting and unwavering.*"
- -Analysts from the influential Brookings Institution in Washington have reportedly thrown their support behind **Baltic NATO membership**, BNS reported. It said the Baltic states, Slovakia and Slovenia should be invited next year, while Romania and Bulgaria should be told they will be next in line. A paper on the think tank's web said the Baltic states should be admitted as a bloc, arguing that the move now had widespread support in the United States and Europe, and that Russian objections were less vehement than earlier.
- A total of 3.2 million foreigners visited Lithuania during the first nine months of this year, a rise of 1.5

percent over the same period last year. The *Lithuanian State Tourism Department* also insisted that the September 11th events in the United States did not dent the interest of tourists. It said a total of 363,400 foreigners visited Lithuania in September, up by 3.1 percent over last year.

- **Vilnius**, to many Jews, was known as the **Jerusalem of the North**, for its thriving Yiddish language theaters, libraries, and schools that clustered around the 17th-century buildings of the Jewish quarter. Today, very few traces of the city's rich Jewish past remain. "*Where's the Jewish face of Vilnius?*" sighed Lithuanian Jewish leader, **Emanuelis Zingeris** on a recent tour of the area. "*Jewish shops and cafes once filled these streets. Now, nothing.*" In September (2000), while serving in parliament, Zingeris pushed a plan through the legislature to restore scores of Jewish landmarks destroyed during the Nazi occupation. Zingeris, a recent Lithuanian parliamentarian who now chairs the <u>Jewish Cultural Fund</u>, said the restoration will be a fitting memorial to the thousands of Lithuanian Jews killed during Nazi occupation.

Mazeikiai Oil update

- Lithuania's Mazeikiai Oil is the largest company anywhere in the Baltic states. With a gross revenue approaching 1 billion dollars a year. It is the most important company in Lithuania. It includes an oil refinery, a pipeline and an oil import-export terminal and accounts for approximately eight percent of all economic activity in Lithuania. A sale of 33 percent of Mazeikiai Oil was made to U.S. based Williams International last year, the sale was highly controversial. It even led to the collapse of one government in late 1999. Critics said the sale was badly thought out and would damage the economy. Recently, Prime Minister Brazauskas caused an uproar in a session of the parliament by saying that official salary of Mazeikiu Nafta executives was only 430 litas, therefore, they paid no taxes to the government. According to unofficial information, the executives of the company earn more than a ten times that amount. Nationalists also argued Lithuania was selling out to foreigners and that such a vital enterprise should be kept entirely in Lithuanian hands. Proponents argued that only the American investors were in a position to save the technologically outdated company with promised injections of hundreds of millions of dollars. Still others argued that the American connection would boost national security by entrenching Lithuania even more firmly in the Western camp.

NATO activity

- As recently as a year or two ago, the three Baltic countries were still seen as long shots for **NATO** membership, mainly because of vehement Russian opposition to their entry. But there is growing optimism that the Baltic states now have excellent chances of entering the alliance and much sooner rather than later; officials say they're confident they'll be invited to join during next year's **NATO** summit in Prague. "The signals are strong. We're optimistic that the year 2002 will be the year of Baltic accession," said Lithuanian Foreign Ministry spokesman Petras Zapolskas. Many hardened **NATO** watchers appear to agree. **Nicholas Redman**, a defense analyst in England for the Oxford Analytica, said he was more bullish about Baltic prospects now, than just a few months ago. "While the outlook could change, I think it's more likely than not that all three Baltics will get invitations in 2002," he said.
- Russian President **Vladimir Putin** has suggested that **he wouldn't try to stop Baltic membership in NATO**, though he insisted expansion to the region is a bad idea, BNS reported.

 Asked on a live discussion aired on America's NPR radio about Baltic membership, Putin responded by saying that NATO was set up to counteract the Soviet Union and so it no longer had the same value.

 But pressed by NPR's Robert Siegel specifically on the question of Baltic entry into the U.S. led alliance, Putin said: "We, of course, are not in a position to tell people what to do. We cannot forbid people to make certain choices if they want to increase the security of their nations in a particular way."

Lietuvos Vyčiai susibure Į daugiau nei 50 kuopų ivairiose JAV vietovese. Visos kuopos Vyčiu veikia savarankiskai. Dabartinis pirminikas yra Robertas A. Martinas.

Šiuo metu internete su didelēmis pastangomis galima surasti šiek tiek ankščiau pateiktos informacijos apie Siluva, bet reikia žinoti Šiluvos vardą. Kitokius atvēju surasti labai sunku. Our Lady of Filuva

(This is a condensed version of the Lithuanian article on this subject which was written by Algis Liepinaitis (C-157) and sent to DRAUGAS and other Ltihuanian publications).

During the 2001 national Knights of Lithuania Convention in Lake Buena Vista, Florida, the following resolution was passed regarding Our Lady of Šiluva.

WHEREAS...Our Blessed Lady appeared in SILUVA, 200 years before Lourdes and Fatima, and

WHEREAS...devotion to our Lady of Siluva is not well-known,

WHEREAS...we wish to continue our investigative work in furthering the devotion to Our Lady of Siluva throughout the world, BE IT RESOLVED that we, the delegates to the 88th National Convention unanimously support this endeavor.

To this end, the K of L committee is endeavoring to disseminate the story of Our Lady of Siluva on the Internet. The Lourdes apparitions of 1858 and the Fatima apparitions of 1917 are available, but not that of Siluva where Our Lady appeared as early as 1608. According to Rev. Stasys Yla's account, the appearance of Our Lady in Siluva was the first recorded in Europe


and the second in the world. The first apparition of Mary took place in Guadalupe, Mexico in 1531.

Once the information surfaces on the Internet, more people will know about the first European Marian apparition in Šiluva, and will want to visit and pray at this shrine. "Words"

There are many ways of acquiring a foreign language. My learning Lithuanian as an adult is somewhat unusual in that I am building up vocabulary via biblical Lithuanian. Here is how it came about.

The Lithuanian language lector at my parish church died. For quite a while, there was no successor.

I pondered the situation. What strength did I possess to succeed the previous lector? First, I was familiar with oral Lithuanian. I spoke it as a child. My parents, with whom I dwelled, spoke it sporadically throughout their lives. Lithuanian readings of gospels reached my ears at Sunday Mass. I retained knowledge of Lithuanian pronunciation after having heard it all my life. A weakness, though, was that I had not read Lithuanian all that time.

Second, I considered my experience other foreign languages. university, I majored in German and minored in French, which I mastered by matching written word with spoken sound. My ear for foreign languages was an asset. I felt confident that I could master matching written Lithuanian words with already familiar spoken Lithuanian sounds. A weakness, however, was that the extent of my Lithuanian vocabulary was less than 100 words at the time.

After tallying my strengths and weaknesses and praying to God, I volunteered to be Lithuanian language lector at my parish church. The result was that my pastor leapt at the opportunity to fill the vacancy.

My pastor and I arranged audio taping sessions of Antrasis skaitinys. He read. I listened and took notes while my recorder taped the readings. I took the audio tape home, played it, and wrote down Lithuanian phonetically. I read the phonetic version a few times, then opened my Misiolelis and matched the written Lithuanian words to the sounds I had learned from the tape. I translated the Lithuanian into English by using a Lithuanian/English dictionary. I practiced daily until I was satisfied with my enunciation.

They say practice makes perfect. My hours of reading practice have led to success in the pulpit. By tedious, yet worthwhile repetition, I have added many words to my Lithuanian vocabulary. You'd be surprised how much biblical vocabulary can carry over into everyday speech.

Another, even greater benefit has come to me because of lectoring. I have drawn ever more close to my God. After I read in Lithuanian for the very first time on February 4, 2001, I felt I had experienced a Roman Catholic mitzvah." I had spiritually become an "adult." I was God's instrument. It was His Word that I read, not mere human words. My Lithuanian diction emphasis aided the congregation in attending to God's Word, heeding it, and practicing it in their lives. It is, first and foremost, for the honor and glory of God that I read. Growth in my Lithuanian vocabulary is an accompaniment.

<u>Dekojame Dievui!</u> Praise to the Spirit who prompted me to lector and to build my Lithuanian vocabulary on His Word!

Over the past 10 years, I have researched our Lithuanian "family tree" and recorded Lithuanian history, customs and traditions for my family. I am trying to keep our heritage alive and celebrate the people that we are. This is my legacy to my family - to give them a deeper understanding and appreciation of their Lithuanian heritage.

1880 January 6 - Casimira Kaupas born in Ramygala, Lithuania.

1902 October 27 - Casimira Kaupas begins training with Sisters of Mercy of the Holy Cross. Ingenbohl, Switzerland.

1905 November 2 - Casimira and two companions receive religious training with Sisters, Servants of the Immaculate Heart of Mary, Scranton, PA.

1907 April 19 - Pope Pius X approved establishment of the Congregation of the Sisters of Saint Casimir.

1907 August 30 - Profession of Mother Maria Kaupas, Mother Immaculata Dvaranauskas, Mother Concepta Unguraitis.

1907 October 7 - First school opened at Mt. Carmel, Pennsylvania.

1909 Most Reverend E.J. Quigley, Archbishop of Chicago, selected site for Motherhouse in Chicago.

1911 Motherhouse in Chicago dedicated. St. Casimir Academy opened in the Motherhouse.

1913 Mother Maria Kaupas elected first Superior General of Sisters of St. Casimir.

1920 Mother Maria and four sisters establish a foundation of the Sisters of St. Casimir in Pazaislis, Lithuania.

1928 Mother Maria begins healthcare ministry at Holy Cross Hospital, Chicago, IL

1932 Villa Joseph Marie High School for Girls opens in Newtown, Pennsylvania.

1933 Lithuanian Government bestows highest decoration, the Order of the Grand Duke Gediminas, on Mother Maria, SSC, in recognition of her work for the Lithuanians in America

1933 Mother Maria diagnosed with cancer.

1934 The Lithuanian Sisters of St. Casimir separate from the U.S. Foundation.

1937 The Congregation's apostolate broadens to non-Lithuanian parishes with the opening of two schools in New Mexico.

1940 Mother Maria dies in Chicago.

1986 June Maria Kaupas named "Servant of God"

1995 November Petition of SSC Superior General to introduce the Cause of Beatification of Maria Kaupas.

1996 March Rome grants approval to proceed with the Cause of Beatification of Maria Kaupas.

1999 May Exhumation of Maria Kaupas from St. Casimir Cemetery in Chicago, IL. Her blessed remains were placed in a newly built white carrara marble sarcophagus in the SSC Motherhouse Chapel.


2000 February Sister Margaret Petcavage, Vice-Postulator for the Cause of Mother Maria completes the "Positio," 972 pages that reveal the heroic and virtuous life of Mother Maria.

2000 October Positio printed. The Relator General, Rev. Ambrose Eszer, OP, wrote a wonderful presentation for the beginning of the book. The Positio now goes to a Commission for further investigation and will need to be "defended" by the Promoter of Faith. If Positio is accepted by the Commission and receives approval of the Holy Father, Mother Maria will then be declared "Venerable."

2001 Cardinal Francis George personally delivered the completed "Positio" to Pope John Paul II.



100 Years of Service for God and Country

Holy Trinity Parish, Newark, New Jersey

In September, 2001, Holy Trinity Lithuanian Parish of Newark, New Jersey, celebrated 100 years of existence. A major source of energy for the parish is the Knights of Lithuania Council 29, whose members are usually at the helm of parish activities, and who work hard to keep the parish alive and Lithuanian! As a tribute to the parish and C-29 members, we offer some highlights of Holy Trinity's history.

The early Lithuanian immigrants to various cities of the US found themselves in a strange land, where the customs, language, work and people were different, and turned to their religion, whose traditions they had grown up with, for consolation. In 1887, the 25 families of early immigrants to the Newark, NJ area were granted permission to establish a parish, to be named Holy Trinity. They planned to have a church around which to organize and thus maintain their culture in a foreign land.

Initially, the families worshipped in various churches of Newark, until they were able to purchase a plot of land at 205 Adams St., with

the help of the Lithuanian-American St. George Society of Newark. A small 40x90 foot wooden church was built on the plot. The first church services in the new church were held on September 25, 1901, with Holy Trinity's first pastor, Rev. Zebris, presiding. The structure would later be used as a parish hall.

As most immigrant parishes of that period, Holy Trinity's first years were not without problems. Although by 1904, the parish congregation grew to more than 700, mostly newly-arrived immigrants, the parish experienced financial and leadership problems. Pastors were changed frequently, new buildings were started, but parish debts stalled their completion. A new rectory was built in 1905, a new brick church was begun in 1917.

In 1922, at the urging of the parishioners, Bishop O'Conner gave the parish another chance to survive by appointing Msgr. Ignotas Kelmelis as pastor. Msgr. Kelmelis breathed a new life into the parish, by organizing parish meetings, and providing spiritual help for all. He managed to pay off the debts, complete construction of the church, and put the parish back on its feet.

The new church was a magnificent sight to behold! Three marble altars, the main one in honor of the Holy Trinity, the others, in honor of the Blessed Virgin Mary and St. Joseph, were decorated with beautiful paintings and statues. Stations of the Cross reflected the deep love for God held by the Lithuanian people.

In 1963, the parish hall, with two floors, was built, and became a cultural center.

Although there was no school, the Lithuanian Franciscan Sisters provided the parish youth with a solid religious foundation and the Lithuanian language on weekends. K of L C-29 also erected a beautiful Lithuanian Cross on the parish grounds, next to the new hall, which remains as a symbol of the parish's Lithuanian heritage.

When Msgr. Kelmelis retired in 1968, a "native son" of Holy Trinity, Msgr. John Scharnus returned as pastor of Holy Trinity. He reduced the parish debt substantially, and kept the parish active as a religious and cultural center. He put Vatican II recommended changes into effect. The parish celebrated its Diamond Jubilee in 1976, with Archbishop Gerity and many priests and parishioners in attendance at the Mass and Banquet.

On New Year's Day, 1981, an electrical fire damaged Holy Trinity Church fatally, and the church was demolished. The lower hall of the parish center was converted into a church, with the use of some of the salvageable art work and equipment from the burned church. Services continue there.

On March 4, 1984, the parish commemorated the 500th Anniversary of the death of St. Casimir, patron saint of Lithuania, with a Mass and Banquet. This commemoration continues to be an annual tradition observed in March, under the auspices of the Knights of Lithuania.

After Msgr. Scharnus' retirement, the parish experienced frequent change management, but held firm in its determination to stay alive. In 1995, Rev. Peter Uhde was -appointed administrator. He also served as administrator of the Portuguese parish of the Epiphany, who still do not have their own church, but use the facilities of another church in the Ironbound district of Newark. A friendship developed between wonderful Epiphany's Portuguese parishioners and the Lithuanians of Holy Trinity. The Portuguese youth serve at Mass, assist at other services, and help with grounds-keeping at Holy Trinity. The adults of Epiphany help maintain Holy Trinity parish facilities. In return, they use Holy Trinity parish facilities when needed. This fall, Rev. Uhde was transferred to another parish, and Rev. Clement Klug, CSSR, was assigned pastor of Holy Trinity, and immediately, another wonderful friendship formed between clergy and parishioners.

Rev. Klug is a native-born American and New Jersey-ite of German Descent. He was ordained into the Redemptorist Order in 1965, and spent the last 34 years serving in Brazil. At the request of Theodore Cardinal McCarrick, then Archbishop of Newark, he returned to the US and agreed to be pastor of Holy Trinity Lithuanian R.C. Church, and also of the Church of the Epiphany. He has also agreed to serve as Spiritual Advisor of K of L C-29. Not only the K of L, but all the parishioners are grateful for his arrival.

Holy Trinity proudly celebrated its Centennial with a Mass, concelebrated by Bishop Paulius Baltakis, Rev. Peter Uhde, Rev. James Sherrin, and Rev. John Dennehy, and an elegant banquet in May, and then with a beautiful concert in October, by the "Azuoliukas" Boys' Choir, visiting from Lithuania. The events brought old and new parishioners together, and, hopefully, will again enhance the life of the parish.

Although there are fewer parishioners than at its onset, Holy Trinity parishioners still enjoy a partially Lithuanian Mass every Sunday, with Lithuanian readings and singing of Lithuanian hymns by the parish choir. Members of the parish still see the parish as a place to meet with their fellow Lithuanians.

Our Father has bestowed many blessings on Holy Trinity's Lithuanian Parish. As we thank Him, we continue to pray that the dream of Holy Trinity Parish, which became a reality through the persistence and dedication of its founders, will not die. May God hear our prayers so that Lithuanian hymns continue to ring out joyously in Holy Trinity Lithuanian Church for yet another 100 years. AD MULTO ANNOS! ILGIAUSIU METU HOLY TRINITY PARISH!

St. George School: Pride, Prayer, and Passion for America.

"United" was the operative word.

After the heinous attack on America which killed or injured thousands of innocent victims and disrupted so many families' lives on September 11, 2001, the pupils and their teachers at St. George School in the Port Richmond section of Philadelphia, PA, united in love for their country.

Kindergarteners made garland chains out of strips of red, white and blue construction paper. Second graders learned about the meaning of the colors of the American flag as they decorated white paper plates with red and blue magic markers. Nearly all of the pupils drew the American flag surrounded by stars in the center of their artwork. Many pupils printed, "I love America," "God bless America," or simply, "Love America" on their plates which were displayed in a group in the hallway near the entrance of the school. Many pupils drew posters in support of their country and the rescue workers. Eighth graders prepared for an essay contest with the theme of, "What Memorial Day Means to Me."

Msgr. Joseph Anderloins, STD,HM, National Spiritual Advisor of the Knights of Lithuania, and pastor of St. George's, felt something more could be done to unite school and community in a public display of patriotism. He set aside one Friday afternoon as Red, White and Blue Pride Day, and invited pupils, school personnel, parishioners, police, and firefighters to participate in a prayer service and pride awareness rally.

Accordingly, at 1:00 P.M. on September 21, school teachers, pupils, and members of the community began to gather in the St. George school yard for the rally. School children toted helium-filled red, white, or blue balloons. Some carried hand-drawn posters showing their appreciation of their country and the people involved in the rescue efforts. The songs, "Auld Lang Syne," "What a Wonderful World," "I'd Like to Teach the World to Sing," and "Everything is Beautiful," were played through a loudspeaker and greeted the arrivals, who wore red, white and blue clothing to show their support for America.

At 1:30 P.M., Msgr. Anderlonis, dressed in the official garb of a prelate, stepped out onto the metal stairway leading from the church to the school yard, and introduced members of the police and fire departments to the participants. Standing at attention, all sang our national anthem, "The Star-Spangled Banner," with respect and with more than a little emotion. Msgr. then prayed for God's mercy upon those who lost their lives or who were injured in the attacks of Sept. 11. He prayed for families and friends of the victims, and for the rescue workers who were valiantly moving debris in an attempt to find and preserve human life. He also asked God to bless America and unite us in love for our homeland. All those gathered then recited the Pledge of Allegiance to our flag.


Upon signal, the children, in their love and their innocence, enthusiastically released their balloons, symbols of freedom and support for America, to the heavens above. An updraft lifted the colorful balloons, and —was it God's will?—carried them westward, toward the traditional location of the Isles of the Blessed. For minutes, children and adults gazed at the orbs as they drifted ever upward. Tears of gratitude, appreciation, or prayerful supplication were present in the eyes of many community members as they watched the balloons disappear from view. A resounding chorus of "God bless America" concluded the program.

ATL Vice President Mike Shea and Secretary-Treasurer Theresa (Stasiulaitis) Shea met with Cardinal Backis in Rome recently and discussed the recently obtained building in Vilnius that was acquired by the generosity of American benefactors. The purpose of obtaining the building is to establish a trade school for young Lithuanians to learn some of the skills needed for them to be able to obtain meaningful employment in the workplace. Many of these

young people have not and will not go on for higher education due to life's circumstances. It is vital, therefore, for them to have skills to become self-sustaining in the future of Lithuania.

Some of the specific needs expressed by the Cardinal included:

New European sewing machines for students to learn sewing, tailoring and completing alterations. The machines would be up-to-date, non-computerized basic machines that can be obtained in the European community.

Kitchen equipment for students to learn cooking, baking, food handling and preparation, presentations and serving skills.

Tools and power equipment to teach plumbing, electrical operations and carpentry.

These would be skills that would last a lifetime and provide families with employment opportunities that would not be available to them otherwise.

ATL has been approached to assist the Cardinal in this major project. However, this appeal is beyond the normal reach of the programs that ATL has adopted, and for which the funds donated by our generous givers has been intended. A special appeal is needed to help Lithuania fulfill the goal of teaching future generations to be able to gain employment in the workplace.
