#### K of L Essay Contest 2002 Second Place Winner

#### "Meeting My Last Mentor"

It has been over five years since my best friend and mentor passed away. But, to this day I still feel that meeting him was by far the best experience I had in the K of L.

It was Vincent Boris, whom I had met at a Supreme Council meeting in 1994, who urged me to continue a task I felt was too difficult at the time - assuming the role of Vytis editor. I had been a journalist and writer, but had not actually designed and put together a whole magazine that would be read nationwide. I thought I'd do it for a few months and pass it on. I did not know most of the folks at the national level, and did not speak Lithuanian well. I was a neophyte who had started learning computer skills.

But, acting as a true mentor, Vincent told me L did indeed have the talent and stamina to take on the task. He helped me generate ideas to make the magazine more interesting to readers of all ages, like adding history stories, travelogues and topics of interest to the young. He knew Lithuanian history so well, that many of our conversations were learning experiences and prompted me to explore my heritage more in depth. Vincent was also a political activist, active in Baltic affairs at the national level. He urged me to become more proactive in Lithuania's inclusion to NATO and to obtain a Lithuanian Independence Day proclamation from New York's Mayor Giulliani.

During the 1996 tour of the Baltics with the K of L's Aid to Lithuania, Vince would sit down with a small group from the tour and lead lively conversations on all aspects of the history of not only Lithuania, but Latvia and Estonia as well. It gave me a much greater perspective of those countries and how each is alike and different. Even the tour guides labeled him as the "professor" as they


brushed up on their English speaking skills in conversations.

Vince also loved to sing Lithuanian church hymns. I learned many from him and, consequently, to me singing in a Lithuanian choir was like being in heaven. Attending conventions and singing those songs at daily Mass gave me a greater appreciation for our culture's beautiful hymns.

I am not implying that Vince was the only K of L'er who instilled interest in the organization and my heritage. As a child, I grew up with parents and grandparents who fostered a love of our ethnic heritage. Making a recent visit to Ellis Island and noting the many artifacts from our culture that are displayed there would make any Lithuanian proud.

It is said, that if you influence one person in a positive way in your lifetime, you have dene a good job. Vincent, I hope you are telling your stories and singing songs with many other K of L'ers in heaven. I miss you a lot, but will use your example to become a mentor to the next generation.

A few weeks ago, on a beautiful Saturday afternoon, October 5, 2002, there was an unprecedented event at Our Lady of Sorrows Convent in Brockton, MA. Sister Helen Ivanauskas was being honored as, The Women's Federation Lithuanian-American "Outstanding Woman of the Year 2002." Helen, whose Lithuanian name is Elena Ivanauskaite. is one of the most energetic sisters in her convent, always busy with her charitable endeavors for Lithuania, as well as assisting with the St. Joseph's Manor in Brockton and orphans in the area. Back in 1990, a small group of people in Boston decided that something must be done about the worsening situation with orphanages in Lithuania, and organized a nonprofit corporation to help Lithuanian children. Sister Helen and Romualdas Veitas from Boston

are those restless workers who have been organizing fund raisers and managing various charity projects for over 12 years now. With the help of many people of the Boston Lithuanian community and donors everywhere in the world. the "Lithuanian Children's Relief" has made a significant impact on the lives of thousands of children in Lithuania, most of whom are in the country's sanitariums, hospitals and other medical and schooling institutions. organization has been working closely with the US government, i.e., its foreign financial Aid Agency for International Development with the help of which each dollar donated to LCR resulted in 3 times the amount of aid to Lithuania. In 1998, Sister Helen received a special "Life in Christ" recognition award from "My Brother's Keeper." This religious organization carries a mission "to bring the Love and Hope from Jesus to the ones for whom we are here." Sister Helen Ivanauskas is know as Sesute Elenyte-to many of us who have ever had a chance to help her in those numerous charitable activities, such as participating in a fund raiser, loading one of more than 120 containers shipped to Lietuva, or simply collecting canceled stamps and sending them for a "Save a Stamp - Save a Child" Project. As far as the containers are concerned, those already shipped were full of clothes, baby food, toys, vitamins and school supplies to the children of the orphanages, as well as much needed medical equipment and beds, donated to the Lithuanian hospitals and children's sanitariums. During the last year, 3 containers worth \$15,000 to \$25,000 each were shipped to Kaunas' V. Tumienenes Sanitarium Children's and Druskininkai Children's Sanitarium, "Saulute." Now Sister Helen and Mr. Veitas are looking for necessary medical equipment in order to send a shipment to Kaunas Boarding School for Low Vision Children. The honoring of Sister Helen in Brockton gathered a few hundred people, where Sister Helen was presented with "Outstanding Woman of the Year" award by the Lithuanian-American Women's Federation Council 5-representatives from Worcester, MA. Official congratulations speeches followed later. 

## A Revered Painting of Our Blessed Mother...

An interesting monument of art, a painting of Our Blessed Mother, can be seen at one of the side altars in the church of Troskunai, and it is as revered as the Madonnas at Aursros Vartai and Siluva. The people of Troskunai, like their forefathers, believe that this is no ordinary painting, for two fires, one in 1743, and the other in 1770, destroyed both wooden churches, and in both disasters, Our Blessed Mother survived undamaged.

Father Saulius Filipavicius, the present pastor of the church, had the history of the painting researched, and made the arrangements to have it restored and returned to its original place.

It is believed that the Bernardines who settled in Troskunai, brought the painting with them. The first wooden church, built by them in 1698, had the painting, and, in 1789, an altar was built especially for it. The artist who painted the Madonna with Child iw unknown. The restorers found the date, 1557, on the back side of the portrait, and on the same painting, at the bottom, there is another date, (166?), with the last number illegible. Some feel that it was restored during that year, and the Mysteries of the Rosary were also painted around its edges.

Years later, the picture disappeared and no one had any idea of what became of it. One day, in 1988, Father Kazenas, pastor of the parish at that time, was putting Mary's altar in order, and removed the painting of Her. There he found a dusty cloth hanging, which was probably used as a covering. He had it removed, and much to everyone's amazement, a painting of Our Blessed Mother with Child unexpectedly was exposed.

Art experts think that it may have been put there by the Bernardines during the 1864 uprising against the Czarist government when the monastery was closed. The monks fled, and either had no time, or could not take the painting with them, and so they hid it to keep it out of harm's way. Perhaps they thought they would return some day when the situation calmed down, but this never happened. Those monks who knew where it was hidden died out, and no one knew where the painting was, that is, until 1988.

There is a Latin inscription on the bottom of the picture: MONSTRA TE ESSE MATREM, meaning, "Show that you are a Mother."

Father Kazenas was transferred to another parish, and Father Filipavicius, his successor, became concerned about the painting's future. He invited Balys Pakstas, a renowned restorer, to examine it, and when he did, he said he never saw anything like it anywhere in Lithuania.

The people of Troskunai agreed to raise the money to pay for the expense of restoration, and it was taken to Vilnius where it was done by Tauras Jurkunas under the supervision of Balys Pakstas. After the work was done, the painting was returned in the fall of 1994, and on November 6, was installed to its original location.

Today, worshippers feel that by praying at the altar of Our Blessed Mother, their prayers will be answered. To show their gratitude for the favors granted, artifacts and rosaries are placed at the base of the portrait.

It is amazing, that, no matter where a person stands while looking at the picture, whether from the left or right side, or wherever, it appears that the eyes of Our Blessed Mother are gazing straight at you.

Unlike its predecessors, the present day church in Troskunai is made of brick. Called Holy Trinity (Svc. Trejybes baznycia), construction was started in 1774 and completed in 1787. The bell tower, also of brick, was built in 1800. This church has a special place in my heart, for it was here that my father was baptized in 1893 and attended Mass before leaving for the United States in 1911.

The town of Troskunai is located about 35km. Southeast of Panevezys, or about an hour and a half's drive from Vilnius.

Anyone desiring to see the painting, or to learn about the church history, should contact Father Filipavicius by telephone first, as almost all churches in Lithuania are closed during the day, except when religious services are held.
