

The Story of "Lituanica"

Stephan Darius and Stanley Girenas, two Lithuanian-born pilots, returned to their adopted homes in Chicago after serving in the United States Army during the First World War. They expressed a desire to conquer the fearsome Atlantic Ocean, and to fly non-stop to the land of their birth, Lithuania. They teamed up and pooled their resources together.

Their hopes for a successful flight to Lithuania were buoyed with the knowledge that a heavily loaded Bellanca airplane took off from Floyd Bennett Field in Brooklyn, New York, on July 28, 1931 with Russell Boardman and John Polando, and flew, nonstop, more than 5,000 miles to Istanbul, Turkey.

They purchased a six-seater airplane in 1932, a Bellanca CH-300 Pacemaker, from an airport company. This model was similar to the one flown non-stop to Turkey, and was no stranger to Darius, as he had flown it for about a thousand hours in a three-year period before buying it. This model, at that time, was the most popular aircraft for transatlantic flight.

After announcing their plan to fly non-stop from New York to Kaunas, the Lithuanian community in Chicago formed a Flight Organization Committee to raise the necessary funds to finance this undertaking. This was no easy task, for these were the days of the "Great Depression," when the nation's economy was struggling with a very high unemployment rate, and money was hard to come by. The Lithuanian communities throughout the United States joined forces and contributed as much as they could for this patriotic cause.

The Bellanca, in its present configuration, was not designed for the planned 45 hour, 5,000 mile non-stop flight. It had to be overhauled, and extensive modifications were needed first. New custom-made gasoline tanks were installed in the cabin to replace the passenger seats, a larger oil tank was placed under the pilot's seat, a new and more powerful engine with a new steel propeller were purchased. The wing span was increased by four feet to give it better take-off capability, and because of the added weight to the airplane, larger tires were needed, and the landing gear had to be strengthened.

As time passed on, the next concern was, what to name the airplane. Captain Petras Jurgela, one of the committee members, wrote to Lithuanian newspapers, published in the United States, requesting suggestions from their readers about a suitable name for the airplane. Mr. Jurgela went on to say, that the name should be meaningful, symbolic, sound nice, and be short enough. He felt the name should be Lithuanian, but should also sound nice in English, because the pilots are Lithuanian-Americans, and Lithuanian-Americans organized and supported the flight. Of course, the pilots could select a name themselves, but it was important that the Lithuanian community express their opinion about the name. Both pilots supported the idea.

Some of the names suggested were: Sv. Kazimiero Dvasia (Soul of St. Casimir); Mazoji Gelele (Small Flower); Amerikos Lietuvis (Lithuanian-American); Vytautas. However, the name at that time which pleased Darius and Girenas the most, was submitted by a Lithuanian-American from Alaska: "Litvega" (Lit for Lithuania, and Vega, the name of a star).

Later, as more names were being considered, Darius leaned towards "Lietuviu Siela" (Soul of Lithuanians), or Diktatorius (Dictator).

On April 5th, the flight committee discussed the names submitted. They wanted a name that could be easily pronounced by Americans, Lithuanians, and other nationalities, and one that would not require a translation to explain its meaning.

Ten days later, with the approval of Darius and Girenas, the choice was made. They selected the name submitted by Anthony Vaivada, the editor of the Chicago newspaper, *Naujienos*, because it encompassed all Lithuanian interests, ideas and culture.

The name: LITUANICA.

On May 6th, at the Chicago Municipal Airport (Midway), the airplane was christened LITUANICA by Prelate Msgr. M. Krusas. Darius' mother performed the traditional ceremony by smashing a bottle of champagne on the hub of the propeller.

The next morning, a large crowd gathered at Midway to bid a fond farewell, and to wish both pilots good luck. The LITUANICA took off and headed east towards New York, and its tragic date with destiny. After an overnight stop at Newark Airport in New Jersey, Lituanica arrived at Floyd Bennett Field, in Brooklyn, New York on May 8.

During the early morning hours of July 15, 1933, the Lituanica gently lifted off the runway at Floyd Bennett Field and headed east towards their goal, Kaunas, the provisional capital of Lithuania at that time.


Tragedy, unfortunately, ended their dreams in a forest in Soldin, Germany, now a part of Poland. They were approximately four hours of flying time from their final destination, Kaunas.

The flight of Darius and Girenas was done purely out of love for their homeland and without any financial considerations. They may have failed in their objective, but the fact that their courage and determination conquered the treacherous North Atlantic had an enormous impact on Lithuanians living both at home and abroad.



Lithuanian Affairs Update

(June 25, 2003)

POLITICAL NEWS

In my Lithuanian Affairs updates over the past years, I have urged our members to contact their Senators for their support of Lithuania's entry into NATO. I thank you for your diligence and your hard work. Our goals have been achieved. We have a great opportunity to thank those in the political arena who supported membership of Lithuania into NATO. The ratification on the accession of Bulgaria, Estonia, Latvia, Lithuania, Romania, Slovakia and Slovenia was approved unanimously by the Senate on May 8, by a vote of 96-0. These seven countries will become part of the NATO alliance and will join the 19 present NATO members in May, 2004. The following Senators deserve special thanks for leading the debate to a successful conclusion: Sen. Richard Lugar (R-IN), Chairman, Senate Foreign Relations Committee (SFRC), Sen. Joe Biden (D-DE), Ranking Member, SFRC, Sen. Bill Frist (R-TN), the Majority Leader, Sen. George Allen (R-VA), Chairman, Subcommittee on Europe, SFRC, Sen. George Voinovich (R-OH), SFRC, Sen. Richard Durbin (D-IL), Co-chairman, Senate Baltic Freedom Caucus, Sen. Gordon Smith (R-OR), Co-Chairman, Senate Baltic Freedom Caucus.

President Rolandas Paksas signs Lithuania's May 10-11 European Union referendum into law; it was approved by 91 percent of voters. The final turnout figure was 63 percent, far surpassing the 50 percent needed to make the referendum valid. With its approval, Lithuania became the first of three Baltic countries to vote itself into the powerful European bloc. EU backers in Latvia and Estonia, which hold their referendums in September, have said overwhelming support for membership in Lithuania should help their cause, generating a pro-EU momentum across the Baltics. Latvians and Estonians have generally been more skeptical about the EU, with only 55-60 percent of those asked in opinion polls saying they would vote yes.

Russia continues to press NATO for guarantees that no Alliance bases will be established in the Baltic states, something both NATO and the soon-to-be NATO- member Baltics have said they are not inclined to provide. While there do not appear to be plans to establish NATO outposts in the region, it has also not been completely ruled out. "We intend to put the question firmly of the formulation of precise and unequivocal guarantees that arms and military forces of third countries will not be deployed on the territory of the Baltic countries," the Russian Foreign Ministry said earlier this week.

Lithuanian Parliament approved of sending troops to Irag. On May 29th, the Lithuanian Seimas decided as a matter of urgency, to send up to 130 Lithuanian troops to Iraq to take part in the US-led international peace stabilization mission. The State Defense Council also approved of the dispatch of troops to the international peace stabilization mission in a sitting on May 26th. According to the plan, two groups of 50 troops each will be sent to the missions with Denmark and Poland. The first military unit could leave for Iraq in early June. The Lithuanian soldiers would serve with the Danish contingent. The second unit should leave for Iraq in August and will be a part of the Polish contingent. Tasks of the Lithuanian soldiers are likely to traditionally include keeping or stabilization of peace: protecting different objects, ensuring public order, assisting in rendering humanitarian aid.

ECONOMIC NEWS

Lithuania is among 20 most attractive world countries for investment. Lithuania occupies 15th place among the most attractive world countries for investment, according to Ernst & Young European Investment Monitor. "The most important factor in attracting investments to Lithuania is, constantly improving investment conditions and a strong banking sector, making it possible to offer attractive credit conditions to investors," says Ruta Skyriene, Executive Director of Investors' Forum.

Microsoft has purchased licenses for software developed by the Lithuanian IT company Alna and will integrate this software into internal information systems in its head office. According to Lithuanian Development Agency report, the MSGi Filter software developed by Alna helps to find information in stored 3-mail messages. "Software developed by our programmers is not only known, but appreciated in many countries of the world," said Tomas Milaknis, Director General of Alna. Alna has already developed 7 software products which are very successful all over the world. Software developed by Alna has been purchased by more than 70 world famous companies including Nestle, Siemens and Dolby Digital Surround.

Lithuania's Economy retains the fastest growth in the Baltic States. Industrial sales in January-April 2003 rose by 17.4%, compared to the same period of the previous year, making Lithuania the leader among the Baltic states in industrial growth, according to the report issued by the Lithuanian Department of Statistics on June 6th. Respective figures were 9.8% in Latvia and 10% in Estonia.

It's one thing to have a website...now we have to let the world know about it. That becomes PHASE TWO.



For First and Second Degrees, send one copy to the Supreme Council Ritual Chair, one copy to the District Ritual Chair, and the final copy is for your Council. Membership cards will be sent to the Council Ritual Chair for presentation.

For Third Degrees, send all three copies to your District Ritual Chair, along with a \$6.00 fee for each application. After approval, one copy will be sent to the Supreme Council Ritual Chair for review. Medals, certificates and membership cards will be sent to the District Ritual Chair for presentation at a district function. The other copies are for the district and the council.

For Fourth Degrees, send one copy to the Supreme Council Ritual Chair, along with an \$8.00 fee for each application. After approval by the five members of the committee, notification will be made of approval. The medals, certificates and membership cards will be presented at the National Convention Closing Mass.

Please inform the committee if your candidates will be able or unable to attend the Convention. If a candidate is unable to attend the whole convention, they need only attend the Sunday Closing Mass to receive their degree.

50 Years Since the Death of Antanas Pocius...

one of the first directors (1916-1932) of the Knights of Lithuania Choir in Chicago.

The K of L Choir of Chicago, presently directed by Alma Preisaitiene, commemorated its former director, Antanas Pocius, on January 16, 2003, on the occasion of the 50th anniversary of his death, with a moment of silence and "Amzina Atilsi."

Its former director, Faustas Strolia, came to the choir rehearsal with four large posters containing blown up pictures of Mr. Pocius, his K of L choir and other choirs, printed musical programs, and articles from the Chicago Lithuanian Daily newspaper, "Draugas," and a portrait of him in "The Herald Examiner," with the inscription: "COMPOSER HONORED" - Anthony Pocius, celebrated composer, right, is shown receiving the honorary Grand Duke Gediminas Cross, which was bestowed upon him by the Republic or Lithuania from Antanas Kalvaitis, the Lithuanian consul in Chicago. Faustas also made a short presentation about this very influential Lithuanian leader in Chicago.

Antanas Pocius was born on June 10, 1884, in Jurbarkas, Lithuania. He arrived in America in 1905, only one year after the lifting of the forty-year press ban, imposed by the Russian authorities on Lithuanian publications printed in the Latin alphabet. So, he had hardly any printed Lithuanian music to start his activities among his own people in Chicago. Although he had learned to play the flute, violin, and double bass from childhood, studied organ with Juozas Naujalis in Kaunas, and worked as an organist at some Lithuanian churches in Chicago, he was not content with his musical abilities, and first tried to achieve his full musical education. After obtaining the Master's degree from the American

Conservatory of Music and doing some postgraduate work at DePaul University's School of Music, in 1914 he established his own music school, the Beethoven Conservatory, which by 1932 had 10 teachers and 200 students.

On March 2, 1916, through the special efforts of the K of L Chicago District President, Leonardas Simutis, Sr., P. Baltutis and J. Joncius, the Chicago-based K of L Choir was established, with Aleksas Aleksandravicius as its first director. When, after a few months, Aleksandravicius had to leave Chicago, never to return again, Antanas Pocius became the first really working director of the K of L choir, and this all happened during these same busy years of his in Chicago (1916-1932).

By the time he became the organist at St. George's church (1926-1953) in Chicago -Bridgeport - (the same vicinity of his conservatory), he had many alumni and students to help him form orchestral ensembles (as many as 100 musicians) with which they accompanied choirs in performance of cantatas and operettas. By 1927, he had even organized a 60-member school orchestra at St. George's school.

At St. George's Church, Pocius established not only a big church choir, but also a separate women's choir. At a 1943 "Draugas" concert, Pocius, besides being accompanist to soloists Antanas Kaminskas, Genovaite Klevickaite and Genovaite Giedraitiene, appeared with his girls' string ensemble. In one of these poster pictures of the string ensemble, we were happy to recognize 2 young ladies - one, our present choir member, Maryte Balandyte Kincius, and Loretta Zailyte Gestautas (another K of L 'er). At this "Draugas" concert, he also performed with a 'selected voices' women's choir, "Antifonalis" (established in 1938)and a "Sasnausko" men's choir consisting of Chicago Lithuanian organists and best choristers of Lithuanian churches. In 1939, this men's choir performed with the Metropolitan Opera star, Anna Kaskas, at the Chicago Civic Opera House during the "Draugas" Jubilee Concert.

Antanas Pocius initiated a line of Music and Song Festivals in Chicago - in 1916, 1920, 1928, 1930, 1933, 1934, 1935 (during the International Exhibition he combined a chorus of 1200 singers), 1938 and 1940. In 1911, he established the Lithuanian Organists' Association, who regularly printed "Muzikos Zinios" (Music News) since 1934.

Today, this organization is called by a different name - the Lithuanian Musicians' Alliance of North America - and it still continues to print this Lithuanian Music Journal. We were honored that evening (January 16, 2003), by the visit of one of its editors, Kazys Skaisgirys. He not only attended our rehearsal, but also wrote a beautiful article in "Draugas," remembering this event.

Pocius wrote and performed some 7 operettas for adults and children and numerous songs for solo and choir. But, his most outstanding contribution to Lithuanian music literature may be his "GIESMYNAS" (Hymn Book), a 206 page collection of mostly Lithuanian religious songs, printed in 1938 by the Chicago Chapter of the Lithuanian Organists' Alliance.

Antanas Pocius, who died January 19, 1953, in Chicago, was one of the outstanding leaders of Lithuanian musical life in Chicago.

Hobo Scholar ~

Coupon King

This is the story of a remarkable Lithuanian, "Bob" Bulchis, a member of Council 144.

Being a child of poverty and the Depression years did not hinder Bob from achieving a college education and eventually, a Master's degree from Yale, with honors. He attributes this to having been blessed with excellent genes inherited from his ancestors.

Bob is a great supporter of Lithuania. Through the years, he has hosted many Lithuanians visiting Oregon, is a sponsor of a child with Orphan Care, and has sent many computers and English books to Lithuania. The timing of his shipment of 29 computers to the Medical School of the University of Vilnius was so critical in establishing the Library, that they posted his name prominently in the Library. His contribution to the University of Vilnius enabled two young women to spend time one summer in England to pursue their study of the English language. He has made a donation of 1250 shares of stock in the Litimpex Bank to a Lithuanian organization. Bob's Lithuanian relatives are not forgotten, either.

Lithuania is not the only place to receive Bob's generosity. During the last twelve years, he has enabled Minersville High School to award scholarship funds to two seniors. Last year, he was able to deliver over \$13,000 worth of groceries to St. Vincent de Paul Food Bank in Corvallis with his coupon shopping. Sizable amounts of pertinent supplies were also given to St. Teresa, St. Bridget, and St. Monica Homes for young mothers in Salem, OR, and some surplus coupons are given to the veterans' overseas program. Bob is linked to several other people who clip coupons and trade their treasures back and forth.

Newspaper articles have featured Bob as the "Coupon King." He is relentless in his efforts in clipping coupons. Through Bob's devotion to clipping coupons, several organizations are the beneficiaries of his hard work. Council 144 receives countless boxes of toothbrushes, large tubes of toothpaste, Band Aids, over the counter medications, deodorants and other articles that are sent to Lithuanian orphanages, schools, daycares and needy in various places Robert "Bob" Bulchis, the son of Lithuanian immigrant parents, was born January 30, 1915, in Minersville, PA, where he grew up. Times were not easy. His widowed mother remarried when Bob was in the sixth grade. His mother even tried her hand at working a still during prohibition, but that was short-lived when a neighbor informed her that the Government Revenuers were at her parents' house. The Revenuers did come, but all had been well hidden. That ended her business venture.

Bob was no stranger to running off to neighboring cities even at the early age of 6. At 14, when things got unbearable at home, he hit the road again, hitch-hiking and riding the rods (freight train) even to Washington, DC.

He decided to return to Minersville and complete high school. Fortunately, Bob was an excellent student. After high school graduation in 1931, Bob left Minersville, hitch-hiking to destinations unknown. His travels carried him across the country, visiting relatives and taking small jobs in between.

As Bob wound his way to the west, he was able to look up some of his relatives for a little hospitality and a bed. He ended up in Wenatchee, WA, with a job picking apples for five cents a box. There he received a letter from Congressman Brumm, of Minersville, that he had a chance to apply to Annapolis US Naval Academy. Because Bob could not pass the physical exam for admission, Annapolis was now out of the question, it was time to leave Minersville again. His hobo life continued as he became experienced in "riding the rods." The term, "riding the rods" referred to the use of the supporting rods under the old railroad cars as a precarious perch. Bob never saw anyone really ride the rods. That was only for the movies. He stated, "We learned where to ride, where to catch trains, all about the hobo jungles which were present in every freight yard, techniques for getting food, the availability of bed and board in store front missions, etc. While in Beach, he watched Sir Malcolm Davtona Campbell break the world speed record for an automobile.

Bob celebrated his 18th birthday in Seatlle as the Civilian Conservation Corps was inaugurated. He applied and was accepted for service in the CCC's in April, 1933, and assigned to Company 937. Room, board, clothing and tools were provided by the government. The enrollee was expected to work a 40 hour week and to follow

the camp rules. Bob's CCC assignments included work in the Wenatchee and Olympic National Forests. While serving in these CCC camps, each enrollee was taught a new skill and could also attend classes to better his education. Bob served for 15 months.

Bob then contacted the Forest Ranger at Quilcene and in June, 1935 reported to Quilcene for his first job with the U.S. Forest Service. From that day forward, he became selfsufficient, but still used his hobo skills to travel. In 1939, Bob had graduated from the University of Washington and was now assigned to a new job at the Snider Ranger District. At this same time, he had been offered a scholarship from 2 colleges, both Duke and Yale. Bob chose the Yale School of Forestry and graduated from both, the University of Washington and Yale, Cum Laude. At the U of W College of Forestry, Bob earned the highest grade point average in a freshman class of over 250 students.

Following graduation, he received a job offer with the Civil Service Region in New York City as a Rating Examiner for \$35.00 per week. This job ended any desires to enter the Forestry Profession. With the exception of the break of WWII and serving in the Navy, his Civil Service career spanned from 1940 until retirement in 1971.

Before going overseas, Bob had married his wife, Helen, in 1943. They raised four children, and enjoyed many wonderful years together. In her later years, Helen suffered from Alzheimer's and passed away on January 23, 1998. Bob's devotion to Helen in the nursing home and his unselfishness toward the others on his daily visits led to an article published about him in the Corvallis Gazette-Times.

The Knights of Lithuania Council 144 are proud to have Bob as a member and greatly appreciate his hard work.



Mid-America Sings...



If you want to reach Andy Rozger at his apartment in the Pttsburgh suburb of Baldwin, you'd better call in the morning. By midmorning, it is hard to reach the long-time member of the Knights of Lithuania, Council 63.

Andy marked his 90th birthday on April 14. This year also marks Andy's 63rd year as a member of the K of L.

The son of Peter and Anna Yanusaitis Rozger, he was born in the Esplen neighborhood of Pittsburgh. "Almost everybody was Lithuanian there," Andy said. "If a kid was Irish, he was almost ashamed to admit it." The middle child in a family of five, he graduated from Langley High School in 1931.

His first jobs included driving a bakery truck and working for a company on Neville Island that made oil-drilling equipment. He served in the Army from 1942 to 1945. After the service, he went to work for the Post Office, where he was employed until his retirement in 1971. He joined the Knights of Lithuania in 1940, first as a member of Council 62 in Esplen. After that Council was disbanded, he joined Council 63. A faithful delegate at many national Knights' conventions, he served as sergeant-at-arms for many years. It was his responsibility to help keep order at what were sometimes noisy and contentious meetings.

The Pittsburgh Council meets on the same afternoon as the Lithuanian Citizens' Society of Western Pennsylvania. This meant that Andy's 90th birthday was marked with cards and singing at both meeting.

Archbishop Charles (Kazimieras) A. Salatka died on March 31, 2003. He was born February 26, 1918 in Grand Rapids, Michigan. He became the first American Lithuanian bishop. He was ordained in 1945. In December of 1961he was consecrated bishop and assigned to Grand Rapids as auxiliary bishop. From 1968, Bishop Salatka served as bishop of Marquette, Michigan. From 1977 he served as the archbishop of Oklahoma City until his retirement in 1992. Archbishop was an honorary member of the Knights of Lithuania.

And most of all remember Each day - right from the start, I will be forever near, For I live within your heart. **Monsignor Joseph Prunskis** (1907 - 2003) grew up in the Utena district of Lithuania. Priest, journalist, writer, philanthropist, he was ordained in 1932 and honored with the monsignorate in 1987. Monsignor began his journalism career in Lithuania, contributing to several publications and then becoming editor of several others. He accepted the invitation to edit *XX Amžius*, the official Catholic Lithuanian paper, when he was only in his early 20's. Before being pressed to leave the country with the Soviet takeover, Monsignor had been director of the Bureau of the Press.

In the United States, Monsignor worked at St. George Parish in Chicago's Bridgeport area from 1941 - 1969. Beginning in 1955, he was a regular speaker on the Voice of America. For 24 years, Fr. J. Prunskis served as editor of Draugas and for which he became one of its best benefactors. He taught journalism at the Pedagogical Institute in Chicago, attended the International Journalists conventions in and other Budapest, Nice. international conferences, and traveled the world. Not many can boast of writing over 10,000 articles some under different pen names.

Monsignor Prunskis also loved to work with He participated the Scouts and the vouth. Ateitininkai, a Lithuanian Catholic Action organization. He has sponsored various literary contests among them our annual K Of L Essay Contest. Monsignor left his library to the sisters of St. Casimir, his archives to the Balzekas Museum, and selected books to Lithuania. Monsignor is the proud recipient of many distinctive medals and tributes, but the most outstanding is the Order of Gediminas Medal of Honor from Lithuania. The Knights of Lithuania are indebted to Honorary Member Monsignor Joseph Prunskis for his many kindnesses to the organization.

A Cultural Note... Birds of Lithuania

One of the harbingers of spring is the various birds that return north after spending winter in warmer climates. I would like to acquaint you with some of the birds that are found in Lithuania.

Those of you who have visited Lithuania and gone out to the countryside, you saw tall posts with large birds resting on them. That is Lithuania's largest bird, the stork, gandras, most liked, whose arrival is always anxiously awaited.

To make it easier for the storks to build their large nests, farmers place wagon wheels or platforms into trees, on poles or on top of roofs. The stork is considered just like a family member. After wintering in the south, he always returns to his old nest.

It is believed that the stork brings good luck to the homestead, that lightning will not strike that house. It is deemed extremely unlucky if a stork, upon return, suddenly abandons his nest. Then tragedy is expected to visit the household.


The stork, gandras, is important to the farmer, because he eats bugs, toads, mice and snakes that are harmful to the farmer's crop.

With the cuckoo's, gegutes, sorrowful "kuku," people know that spring has fully arrived. It was believed that the cuckoo's cuckooing portents good or bad luck. If, for the first time, one hears the cuckoo, gegute, with money on him, that means the person will be rich that year.

The cuckoo is about the size of a dove, has a long tail and short yellow legs. They live in forests, orchards and parks, anywhere where there are lots of other birds. Gegute is the only bird that does not make a nest; she lays her eggs in other small birds' nests. There is a legend, that when God created the birds, while other birds were building their nests, the cuckoo was just flitting around. She never built a nest, but did want to have children, so she laid her eggs in the robin's nest. The eggs hatched, and the robin took care of hers and the cuckoo's. Now the cuckoo wanted to see her offspring, but they would not acknowledge her and the robin shooed her away. The cuckoo was very sad, but the robin was adamant. So the cuckoo went to appeal to the Lord. The verdict was, that since the cuckoo was too lazy to build a nest for her children, the cuckoo would no longer be able to sing a lovely bird song, but would only be able to "cuckoo" and the cuckoo will never build her next, but will continue to lay her eggs into other birds' nests, and the cuckoo's children will be brought up by other birds. Thus, it is said that the gegute's tinny ku-ku is her lamenting for her children.


