

We write to ask your help in a very important project to aid the Church of Lithuania.

At our Priests' League Convention in October of 2002, the Bishops of Lithuania, through Bishop Eugenijus Bartulis, Ordinary of the diocese of Siauliai, asked us to help finance the publication of the *Lithuanian Language* "Breviary," Liturgy of the Hours, for the priests, deacons, religious sisters and brothers, and seminarians of Lithuania.

Some older priests in Lithuania use a Latin "Breviary." Others do the best they can with an English, German or other language "Breviary,"

but many, especially younger priests with no "Breviary" in their own language, feel unable to pray the official prayer book of the Church, and are left to praying the Psalms of reciting the Rosary.

With the monumental Lithuanian translation of the Old Testament by Msgr. Antanas Rubsys, and the publication of the entire Bible in Lithuanian in 1997, the preparation of the Lithuanian "Breviary" has been made possible, and is now nearing completion.

All donations will be welcome. The General Secretary of the Lithuanian Bishops' Conference has assured us that in the Lithuanian "Breviary" there will be printed a memorial page, "IN MEMORIAM" requesting a prayerful remembrance for all donors. Those who have donated \$5,000 or more will be listed on this "IN MEMORIAM" page. Kindly respond by December 8, 2003, Feast of the Immaculate Conception of the Blessed Virgin Mary, to allow for printing deadlines.

Many of us plan a monument of stone in the cemetery. How much more spiritually consoling also to have a "MEMORIAL OF PRAYER" in the hearts and on the lips of those who will pray the "Breviary" in Lithuanian for decades to come.

Your gift will be most appreciated. We invite you to consider making a major donation for the publication of this Lithuanian "Breviary." Your help to priests and religious in Lithuania will do much for the spiritual renewal of the Church in Lithuania, and provide you with a living MEMORIAL of prayer.



I feel truly blessed and honored by the K of L for the generous scholarship. Thank you!





COUNCIL 102 - DETROIT, MICHIGAN


Council 102 of the Knights of Lithuania is a proud member of the Mid-Central District and is celebrating 83 years of membership in the Knights.

We were honored to have hosted the National Convention in 1995, where our good friends and fellow K of L members, Frank Petrauskas and Faustas Strolia were awarded Honorary Membership Medals.

Council 102 has had its own members receive such honors, including Rev. Boreisis and Anna Mae Uznis, both now deceased, and Bob Boris. Bob is the Chairman of the Board of Aid to Lithuania, Inc., the organization he founded in the Knights, and which has been responsible for shipment of medical supplies and humanitarian aid to Lithuania. Bob was honored by the President of Lithuania, with the medal of Gediminas for his work with Aid to Lithuania, Inc. Regina Juska-Svoba, the President of Aid to Lithuania, Inc., is an active member of Council 102, and dedicates much of her time to St. Anthony's Parish, home of our Council. Regina continues to add the leadership efforts needed to bring relief to the people of Lithuania through ATL. Vince Boris, now deceased, was Chairman of the K of L Lithuanian Affairs Committee and was a long time member of Council 102.

Council 102, together with ATL, rescued the contents of St. Peter's Lithuanian Parish in Detroit upon its closing, and arranged to have it shipped to Lithuania where a special chapel was dedicated to the people of Detroit for their generosity. This included pews, statuary, altars and an organ.

As the home council for Aid to Lithuania, Inc., Council 102 supplies many of the dedicated volunteers serving in responsible positions as officers and board members for ATL and reaches thousands of donors through publications, news articles and personal contact, in order to raise the funds needed to ship medical supplies, donate humanitarian aid to desperate organizations, and support the education of seminarians in Lithuania.



With the closing of Council 79 in Southfield, MI recently, Council 102 aggressively solicited members of that Council to join us to continue their cultural and religious interests. That effort has been very successful and many of those members are with us today. Council 102 is working toward continuing the proud cultural and national interests of Lithuania which the Knights began so many years ago and prevails today. As with many other councils, 102 has aging population, all of whom have been K of L members for many years. We try to instill in our children and in their children, the need to continue to maintain an attachment to their Lithuanian roots. With that attachment comes the knowledge of the culture and heritage of a strong and lasting history that has survived adversity at the hands of dictatorships, attacks by ambitious fellow nations, and desires to dominate our spiritual homes with unholy ends. REACHING OUT WITH A HELPING HAND- ATL MEETINGS IN LITHUANIA

The summer of 2003, marked two significant events in Lithuania- the international Song and Dance Festival and the 750th anniversary of King Mindaugas' coronation as Lithuania's first and only king. Spectators from all four corners of the world traveled to witness the events and participate in the celebrations. Many people took excursions to visit Lithuania for the first time. Along with the touring of all the famous historical and cultural treasures of Lithuania, there are many other places and projects that the average traveler tourist does not ever observe.

For nearly the last 13 years the K of L organization's ancillary arm of "Aid to Lithuania, Inc. (ATL) existence, and with the support of many member's financial donations, we have been able to assist and promote many of the requested projects in Lithuania.

The undersigned had the opportunity to witness first hand the day-to day activities of the various projects that ATL supports.

On July 2, 2003, the entire day was spent with ATL in-country representative and the director of the CARITAS programs deacon Balvs Stankus. We visited and toured Mother's Teresa's homeless and emergency shelter and soup kitchen. At the present time 27 men (first floor) and 24 women(second floor) reside in the shelter. Nine residents occupy one room. The space is limited, and the resident keeps all his worldly belongings at the bedside. Those who do not have clothing can obtain the basic necessities from the clothing closet. There are separate kitchens on each floor, and every resident is responsible for meal preparation. The shelter is professionally disinfected on a monthly basis. There is a separate community room that is used for Masses, socializing and events and entertainment. The shelter employs three administrators, several volunteers, and in the near future, the seminarians studying at St. Joseph's will also volunteer to assist. All shelter residents sign a contract agreeing to abide by the shelter's rules and regulations. The average length of stay in the shelter is 30 days. It also depends if the individual finds employment, housing and become self-sufficient and independent. Currently the third floor of the shelter is empty. But during the winter months, mattresses are brought up so that more homeless persons may find a warm shelter from the cold. Last summer Vilnius was douched with torrential rains. There was much damage to the shelter- the basement windows were all broken out; doors, walls, ceilings, tiles, electrical wiring and beams were damaged. A plea for emergency assistance was made. ATL and other generous donors aided in the costs of repairs. A significant amount of the repair work has been completed.

The residents who are not capable or able to prepare their own meals go to soup kitchen located next to the shelter. Mother Teresa's sisters and volunteers prepare and serve the meals. They also treat the residents who have minor medical problems. At the present time six sisters work at the emergency shelter and soup kitchen: 2 from Poland, 2 from India, one from Belgium and one from Hungary. They are assisted by two volunteers. The soup kitchen feeds approximately 100/day, and the shelter medically treats 25-50/day.


We visited the CARITAS pharmacy and spoke with pharmacist Sister Onute. She gave a tour of the small pharmacy and thanked ATL for her computer which is used to categorize all medications received from Catholic Medical Mission Board or elsewhere. She determines the medication and medical supply distribution to the hospitals, clinics, pharmacies and shelters.

The Vilnius Handicraft Center (Trade School) was visited next. Kestutis, the center's director gave an extensive tour and explanation about the progress made since the Center's opening in 2001. Currently 18 students from large families, those who are somewhat physically or mentally challenged and some adults study and live in the facility. Their living quarters are located on the third floor. The trade school has established and started the following programs: culinary, wood carving, art and furniture restoration, sewing, knitting, crocheting, metal work, printing, electrical works, auto mechanics and jewelry repairs. In the near future a computer program will be established. The culinary program is by far the most popular of the studies. The practical work is done next door at the Betanija Soup Kitchen. Local masters of each of the programs teach students. For effective training only three students are assigned to each master instructor. The average training program lasts two years.

There was an opportunity to speak with the local people who come to the Betanija Soup kitchen. On a daily average the soup kitchen feeds 600 people. It is opened daily. A volunteer physician visits weekly to examine and treat patients who have medical ailments. During the holidays (Christmas and Easter) Cardinal Backis visits, dines and interacts with the people. The soup kitchen is clean and modest.

The Mother and Children's Home was next seen. At the present time 10 mothers and 18 children and three pregnant girls reside in the home. The youngest girl is aged 15, while the oldest is 29. There was a chance to speak with some of the moms and children. It is evident that the mothers love and have a special bond with their children. They are concerned about them and their future. There is a communal kitchen wherein the mothers prepare the meals for themselves and their children. Also, there is a community room which is used as a family room, playroom and special events area. A sewing room is located on the second floor where the mothers can learn to sew clothing for themselves and their children. They can also learn to knit and crochet. The Mother and Children's Home employs one staff psychologist,

and four social workers. Two doctors and several university medical and social



students volunteer their services. Rev. Joseph provides moral and religious support to the families. When a new mother with child or pregnant girl arrives at the Home, a contract is initiated with them within the first month. The mothers receive work instruction for independent skills and meal preparation instruction. The psychologist works closely with the mother to determine her and her child's problems or crises. She assists in document preparation for financial assistance and helps rebuild relationships with family and friends. The physician treats the mothers and children's medical problems, gives lectures on health, hygiene, sexually transmitted diseases, HIV and AIDS. It is interesting to note that most of the children's fathers are from Germany, and it is difficult if not impossible to obtain any financial assistance from them for their children (there is no Friend of the Court of Child Support system in place yet). 50% of the mothers are Lithuanian born, and 50% are Lithuanian citizens from Germany and Poland.

The gently used clothes closet is located next to the Mother an Children's Home. The facility is small yet clean and is run by two female volunteers. Gently used clothing, bed linens and toys are donated by local parishes and individuals. Furniture is received from Germany. Families can receive assistance on a quarterly basis only.

The new CARITAS All Saints parish program was next seen. In 05/03, the project was assigned by Cardinal Backis. The parish is located in a highly trafficked poor area near the bus station. The program consists of a day center and a temporary emergency shelter. Twelve youth (6 boys and 6 girls) aged 14-18, reside in the shelter. Children from large families, families with drug problems, and neglected/abused home environments are placed in the shelter. Some of the children themselves have chemical dependency problems. Glue sniffing is prevalent as it is an inexpensive habit. . They attend the local school. While at the shelter the youth learn independent living skills. They clean and maintain their surrounding area and are responsible for their clothing and food preparation. The director and social worker make valiant attempts to work with the parents to reunite the families, but oftentimes are unsuccessful, and the children may reside in the home for up to 3 years. Various activities, groups, sports and pastimes are encouraged. The shelter and day center employs one director and three social workers. A volunteer cook helps with meal preparations. The physical appearance outside and inside of the day center is utmost disturbing. Black mold (pelesai) are prevalent everywhere- walls, ceilings, floor. There is a strong profuse musty odor throughout the center which poses a danger to the staff and children. An emergency request has been made for financial aid to assist in alleviating the danger.

On Thursday, July 3, St. Joseph's Seminary was visited. The current rector assigned in Rev. Robertas Salasevicius, and his assistant is Rev. Albertas. As. Father Robertas was out of the country, Rev. Albertas updated the seminary program and activity. Presently there are 56 clerics from Vilnius (23), Kasiadoriu (14) and

Panevezio (14) dioceses studying at the seminary. All are Lithuanian citizens. There is one guest seminarian from Belgium and two guest seminarians from the Ukraine furthering their studies. ATL supporters have "adopted" 17 seminarians by financing their room and board and education in the amount of \$2,000/year. The programs lasts six years before a seminarian is ordained a priest. The program is intense, and the time passes quickly. It should be happily noted that during the last year, 4 seminarians have been ordained priests! The seminary has a young administration: Rev. Robertas, Rector, was born in 1974; his assistant Rev. Albertas, in 1972, and the spiritual advisor, Rev. Kestutis, in 1970. The youngest seminarian is 19 years old, while the oldest is 35 years old. During their free time the seminarians engage in various sports activities, act as pilgrim and visit parishes, serve as spiritual advisors and counselors in schools and social settings. During summer vacation they spend time at youth camps serving as spiritual advisors, others return home to their families, and others visit churches and lead pilgrimages.

Next we visited the Holy Cross parish where one of the buildings is utilized as a warehouse for the medical supplies and medications received from Catholic Medical Mission Board, from New York. The building is in need of repairs. The leaking roof, broken windows, and gaping cement floors were minimally repaired. No further repairs could be done due to lack of funding. Three large German Shepherds serve as guards to monitor the building from theft.

The archdiocese of Vilnius CARITAS program consists of 26 employees and 130 volunteers. The CARITAS program activities would be impossible to continue without the active and ongoing support of various organizations and individuals and private donors. Visiting the various programs ATL supports, it is evident that all the donations and financial support received from K of L members, councils, districts and individuals is well utilized to aid in Lithuania's less fortunate. Financial assistance from the local government is ever decreasing, while the ongoing maintenance of the programs, the expenses are always increasing. Due to the current situation, financial support is extremely necessary to continue the much needed and required programs. The Knights have always been supportive, generous and have come through whenever the call for need was made. Only with your support of the CARITAS programs, Vilnius Handicraft Center (Trade School) and St. Joseph's Seminary adopt a seminarian program, will the services continue and bring a brighter hope for tomorrow's future today. Vytautas Landsbergis and his wife, Algirdas Saudargas and his wife, bishop Paulius Baltakis, Bishop Boruta, noted professors, educators, clergy, Lithuanian Community President Vytautas Kamantas and his wife, correspondents from "Veidas" and "Elta." Cardinal Backis greeted the guests and gave the invocation. The lectures were read by: Prof. E. Gudavicius-"Mindaugas ir Morta-pirmoji krikscioniu seima Lietuvoje" (Mindaugas and Martha- the first Christian family in Lithuania); dr. D. Baronas-"Karalius krikscionis Mindaugas popieziu akimis" (Christian King Mindaugas in the eyes of the popes); L. Jovaisa- "Mindaugo Kriksto laiku baznycia" (the Christian Church during Mindaugas' time); Prof. A. Bublauskas- "Mindaugo Krikstas: regioninis ir universalus zvilgnis" (Mindaugas' baptism- regional and universal retrospect); and V. Alsauskas-"Valstybes sventes ar istorijos pamokos: Mindaugo karunavimas, Vasario 16-oji ir Kovo 11-oji" (State holidays or historical lessons: the coronation of Mindaugas, Feb. 16th and March 11th). There was an opportunity to meet and speak with Cardinal Backis privately concerning the continued support and ongoing commitment to the CARITAS programs, St. Joseph's seminary program and the Vilnius Handicraft Center (Trade School).

All the meetings were beneficial and most informative and left many good and deep impressions.

Lithuanian-American Tour in
the USA

The world famous Lithuanian Opera singers, tenor, Virgilijus Noreika, baritone, Eduardas Kaniava, and bass, Vladimiras Prudnikovas, came to America for a concert tour in the middle of June, 2003. Accompanied by the "Black Panther" - mezzo soprano, Judita Leitaite, along with a well-known pianist, Nijole Ralyte-Prudnikoviene, the artists began their US tour with a performance at the Lithuanian Youth Center in Chicago, IL, followed by the June 14th performance in Lemont, IL. The next morning, they arrived at the East Coast for a Father's Day show in Waterbury, CT. Although the most

distinguished "Tiger," V. Noreika did not come to Chicago and Waterbury due to coincidental timing of the election for the Lithuanian Parliament (Seimas), both concerts drew heavy crowds. June 21st marked the beginning of the "Lithuanian Days" at the Holy Child Jesus Parish in Richmond Hill, New York. The "Three Tigers" finally came out "in corpore" for their musical performance at the Rev. Murray School Auditorium provided by the Parish Pastor, Rev. Daniel S. Murphy. This was the first time for a Lithuanian-American community celebration in the area. Several hundred people gathered for the concert that night in spite of a heavy rainfall all over New York City. They cheered for a variety program of classical and popular favorites performed by the "Three Tigers," "Black Panther," and even V. and N. Prudnikovas" daughter, Ieva, who came onto the stage to sing as a surprise to many of us.

After a really remarkable show, we also enjoyed a delicious Lithuanian dinner, including our ever-famous "cepelinai" and "kugelis" made for everyone by a Lithuanian and Chek family of Karel and Danute Dvorak. Karel Dvorak was also celebrating his birthday at the time, and the singers, as well as the guests, sang "Ilgiausiu Metu," a popular Lithuanian tune resembling the English, "Happy Birthday to You."

The next morning a majority of the participants came to the 9 o'clock Mass at Holy Child Jesus Church where the Lithuanian Opera Stars now sang "Ave Maria" and other religious hymns for a multinational parish community. On Sunday evening, June 22nd, the "Three Tigers" gave their final concert in Ellizabeth, New Jersey, at the Lithuanian St. Peter and Paul Church Hall, thus concluding their US tour.


