## Daughter Honors Her Mother for Lithuanian Contributions

For my entry to the 2003 Essay Contest, I chose to dedicate this essay to my mom, Helen Rogers Hayner, for all her contributions she has made for the preservation of her Lithuanian culture and her generosity to the people of her heritage.

She was born in Averill Park, New York, a small town in upstate New York, on June 29, 1918, child of Joseph and Eva Kardok Rogers. She was one of four children who grew up on a family-owned farm. Life was hard - weeding gardens, taking care of numerous farm animals, and living through the Depression and World War II. Upon graduating from high school in 1936, she pursued work in the city, while still living on the family farm.

She married Bev Hayner, a man from Troy, New York, and they raised two children, my brother, Bob, and myself. Our family was a typical American family of the 1950's. Usually, most Sunday's we would visit my grandparents in Averill Park. I was aware that my grandparents were of Lithuanian descent, but was not aware of their rich culture.

Throughout the years, I learned some basic words like, "karstas, saltas, pienas," and was able to sing a simple children's song.

When our local community college offered a class in Lithuanian Culture and Language, my mom and I eagerly attended. There we met many Lithuanian-Americans also wanting to know more about their heritage. With the assistance of our teachers, Edvardas and Genute Baranauskas, we entered the world of our ancestors. Through their efforts of translating old Lithuanian letters, we were able to re-establish our family ties in Marijampole, Lithuania, and eventually visiting them several times. Words that my mom had forgotten from disuse were amazingly recalled. I know she was delighted that I still showed an interest in learning the language of her heritage. Even though I can't "roll my r's," she is very willing to teach me her first language. We became founding members of the Hudson-Mohawk Council # 136. She designed the Lithuanian costumes, complete with a crown and blouse of embroidered flowers, a vest, and long skirt that we wear at yearly Lithuanian events. Several years ago, she was honored with receiving her Fourth Degree, denoting the highest award for service in her Lithuanian community.

Even at the age of 85, you can find her explaining pictures of past visits to Lithuania. answering questions about customs and everyday life, translating letters, and sending much needed clothes and medical supplies. My mom has been such an inspiration to me by sharing the love she has for her heritage through language, music, food, her perseverance, and commitment to preserve her Lithuanian culture. For all these reasons, I dedicate this essay to my mom. I would also like to encourage our younger generation to take time to listen and learn all they can about those who have made important contributions for human rights, as well as political and religious freedom to ensure the future of all Lithuanians. I thank my Mom for having a rich culture to be proud of !

## The Story of Our Lady of Siluva Shrine in Lithuania Suppressed by Soviets and Nazis for 60 Years Now Available on Internet

Since the recent liberation of Lithuania from the Soviet Union, the Shrine of Our Lady of Siluva has become an important and revealing destination for many thousands of pilgrims from around the world.

In 1608, two hundred fifty years before Lourdes and Fatima, our Blessed Mother appeared in Lithuania in a town called, "Siluva."

The story of Our Lady of Siluva actually began in 1457, when Peter Giedgaudas, a diplomat for Vytautas the Great, built the first church in the area and gave the land to the Catholic Church. On one of his many travels, he went to Rome, and while there, he obtained a magnificent painting of the Blessed Virgin Mary holding the Child Jesus. This he brought back to Lithuania and put it in the sanctuary of the new church in Siluva.

Over the next hundred years, the Catholic Church in Lithuania experienced troubled times. Since much of the nobility and intellectuals turned to Calvinism and Lutheranism, many people fell away from the church. Property owned by the Catholic Church was confiscated by the authorities. In 1570, Father John Halubka, the parish priest of the Siluva Church, fearing that his church would be targeted, took the treasured painting of the Blessed Mother and Child and other church documents. Father Halubka carefully wrapped them, put them in an ironclad wooden chest, and buried them under a large rock near the church. A short time later, the church was seized by the authorities.

Years later, a new law was passed which gave the Catholic Church permission to reclaim its property if it could prove, with official documents, that the property was previously owned by it. The church in Siluva could not prove that 150 years earlier, in 1457, Peter Giedgaudas had deeded the land to it. The church remained the property of the state.

One summer day, in 1608, several children of Siluva were tending their sheep and resting near a large rock. They heard someone crying, and as they looked up, they saw a beautiful lady standing on the rock, shedding tears, and in her arms she held a child.

Frightened, one of the children ran back to the village to tell others of the happening. As the news spread, believers and doubters went to visit the place of the rock. One day, Our Lady appeared, and everyone heard her crying, and saw her tears fall to the large rock on which she

stood. Among the crowd was a Calvinist teacher who earlier had said that "she was the work of the devil," now approached her and asked, "Why are you weeping? Who hurt you?" The reply came, "Formerly in this place my Son was adored and honored, but now, all that the people do is seed and cultivate the land." Having said this, she vanished.

Father John Kazakevicius was appointed to investigate the phenomenon and question all witnesses as to the events. As a matter of historical record, the following is documented.

An old man who had heard of the apparitions remembered that Father Halubka, in 1570, buried a chest near the church in Siluva. Since the man was blind, he had to be led, and as he approached the rock, his sight was immediately restored. He led the authorities to the exact spot where the chest was buried, and when it was opened, they found the painting of the Blessed Virgin Mary and Child, undamaged, together with the documents, also intact, which proved the ownership of the land. Soon the property was returned to the Catholic Church.

Over the years, more miracles were recorded at Siluva, shrines were built, and devotion to Our Lady of Siluva grew until the destruction of freedom in Lithuania during World War II. Since the early 1990's, Lithuania has been free and pilgrims have been able to return to the shrine.



## A New Lithuanian Priest~ Juan Alejandro Dielinikaitis


I attended a New England District Convention in April, 1999, when the District received a \$100,000 endowment from Irene Svilakas-Tamulevich, the interest to be used for scholarships deserving people to OF organizations. A Committee was formed, and I became part of the committee. I went out looking for a Lithuanian Seminarian and Msgr. David Liptak put me in touch with Juan Dielinikaitis, who was being sponsored by Most Rev. Bishop Paul A. Baltakis. Juan was studying to become a priest to serve a Lithuanian community as determined by the bishop. Juan was asked to fill out an application for a scholarship. Brother Juan's parents, Juan Dielinikaits from Alvitas-Vilkaviskis, and Josefa Gudmonas de Dielinikaitis from Burbaicio Kelme had come from Vilkaviskis, Lithuania and settled in Argentina. Juan was born April 19, 1945 in Buenos Aires, Argentina. When he was 12 years old, his mother died, and he and his father moved to San Pablo, Brazil, where he lived for 20 years. He graduated in Business Administration in Brazil and worked at Eastman Kodak in San Pablo until his father died. He had always had a desire to become a priest. He speaks four languages - Lithuanian, Spanish, Portuguese and English. He now plans to learn Italian. He is computer smart and will be missed at Holy Apostles College and Seminary, as he could solve the computer problems arising at the Seminary. When Juan was a Franciscan Brother, he spent his vacations at St. Anthony's Lithuanian Franciscan Monastery in Kennebunkport, Maine. He sent the Scholarship Committee his application, which was approved, and we presented him with \$500. Our Council 6 invited him to Holy Trinity Church functions and installed him as a member of our K of L Council 6. In each subsequent year he received a scholarship of \$500, \$500, and \$800. On April 6, 2002, Brother Juan was installed a Deacon of the church at St. John's Church in Middletown, by Archbishop Sheehan of Santa Fe, New Mexico. (Archbishop Sheehan has since played a big part in the Convention of Bishops in St. Louis, and is now taking the place of the fallen Bishop O'Brien of Phoenix).

On May 18, 2003, June Grenier, K of L Supreme Council Financial Secretary, Lillian

Joseph and I of Council 6 traveled to Maspeth, Long Island to the Transfiguration Church to see Deacon Juan ordained by Bishop Paul Baltakis, OFM. June and I had the honor of presenting the gifts at the Mass. There were 16 priests in attendance - from Cromwell, Conn., Kennebunkport, Maine, Santa Fe, New Mexico and New York. The organ music and choir was stirring. At the church hall, over 150 people attended the reception. A buffet table of many Lithuanian dishes filled four tables, but Kunigas Juan was pleased that koseliena was on the menu, as he missed this delicacy at the New Britain's Joe Lindzius' Seminary. Lietuviskas Raguolis (a celebration cake) was on the dessert table. A delicious cake was presented with "God bless Father Juan" written on it. The reception was planned by five women from the K of L of the parish.

Several priests and laymen spoke . I told how the K of L Sviklas-Tamulevich Scholarship had helped Kunigas Juan to attain his goal. Just think – we were instrumental in bringing a NEW priest into the Lithuanian Community. Kunigas Juan celebrated his first Mass on May 25<sup>th</sup> at the Shrine Church of Our Lady of Mount Carmel, 275 North 8<sup>th</sup> Street, Brooklyn, New York, 11211, where he is now working with Rev. ## St. George's in Bridgeport, Connecticut, Welcomes a New Pastor

On a first Advent Sunday, December 1, 2002, there was a special reason for the usual morning Mass at St. George in Bridgeport, CT, to make it really unusual. Father Jose Rebaque, who gave this parish 11 quality years, 8 of which he served as its Pastor, was honored by the presence of Bridgeport's Bishop W.E. Lori, a religious Sisters' Order, and over 200 parishioners, with Knights of Lithuania Council 141 members among them at his farewell Mass at St. George's.

Father Jose is being transferred to organize a new ministry at St. Joseph Parish in Shelton, CT, to assist with the need of the All American Valley ever growing Hispanic population. Originally, he came to Bridgeport in a992, and, two years later was appointed the administrator of St. George Parish, which historically was a center for the Lithuanian community.

First immigrants from the then Russian Tzarist regime oppressed Lithuania began to arrive in Connecticut through Ellis Island, New York by boat, and landed in Bridgeport at the turn of the 20<sup>th</sup> century, and soon there were enough Lithuanians to form their own Catholic organizations. However, earlier ancestors worshipped at the Sacred Heart Territorial French Parish of St. Anthony's, and also St. Michael's Polish Parish. It is a mere coincidence though, that Sv. Jurgio (St. George) Lithuanian Parish in Bridgeport, Connecticut was first established on February 16, 1907. That same date in 1916 became one of the most prominent dates in Lithuanian history. Lithuania was then proclaimed independent.

In 1912, there were about 1,000 Lithuanian families around St. George Parish. There were a number of prominent priests who served the Bridgeport Lithuanian Parish at different times after its inception meeting in 1907 under Father Joseph Zebris, from Waterbury, CT.

The first official priest at St. George's was Father Plausimaitis, who stayed there for 6 months. Father Pankus led the Parish for 26 years, and during his administration, in 1924, the present Gothic style red brick church was erected. Father Kazlauskas replaced Father Pankus in 1936. He is remembered for renovating the church interior. Probably the most dedicated Pastor of this Lithuanian church has been Rev. Msgr. Francis J. Pranckus, who first came to Bridgeport in 11952, and later became the administrator in 1964. He served almost 55 years of his priesthood until he passed away in September of 2000. Thirty-seven years of this priesthood were given to our Lithuanian Parish at St. George's.

Although, recently, the parish became more Hispanic than Lithuanian or English, (hence the appointment of Rev. Rebaque, the Pastor in 1994 following Msgr. Pranckus' retirement), the statue of Saint George, a patron Saint of Lithuania, stands to the left of the main altar within the church, by the side of Our Lady of Guadalupe, reminding everyone of its Lithuanian roots.


Today, St. George Parish serves as host to a multi-ethnic community where people worship in three languages, and the Installation Mass on the first Sunday of last December gave a tribute to all of those cultures from this area. The first reading was in Spanish, and the second in English and Lithuanian. The Most Rev. William E. Lori, Bishop of Bridgeport, as well as Most Rev. Gustavo Javier Neto, IVE Provincial, introduced two new priests from Argentina -Rev. Julio Lopresti, who now will serve as Pastor of St. George's, and Rev. Jorge Montagna will become its parochial vicar, also serving the University of Bridgeport, which is situated just a few blocks away from St. George Church. Both of the new concelebrants have expressed a firm commitment to carry on the good work begun by Father Jose, and to reach out to the entire Catholic community of the parish, and to continue its evangelization effort. "Vetra" Lithuanian dancers, and a Hispanic group entertained the parishioners during the

reception after the Mass. It has become a tradition since the Lithuanian folk dance group was begun almost 20 years ago, that "Vetra" performs at St. George's every time there is a major holiday in the church or a special celebration hosted by the "Knights of


Lithuania" Council 141, which was established nearby St. George's in 1974, and has been led by one of the most dedicated people in our organization, Clemencine Miller, for the past two decades.

## Knights of Lithuania – Our Beginnings

**1912** -At the Lithuanian Catholic Alliance convention in Boston, Mykolas Norkunas presented his plan for a new type of Lithuanian organization. The organization was aimed at stemming the tide of mixed marriages and the general loss of nationality among the youth.

April 27, 1913, Lawrence Massachusetts – ten delegates net for a two-day convention and laid the foundation for a Lithuanian youth organization, which was called the Lithuanian falcons. At the Lithuanian Catholic Federation Congress held in the summer of 1913, the Congress gave the organization its approval but recommended that the name be changes to Knights of Lithuania.

1914 – Second Convention. There were 12 councils in the Knights of Lithuania. Rev. Motiejus Gustaitis, a distinguished writer, was a guest at that convention. He was so elated over the first year's accomplishments and he put his feelings into verse. This became the organizations' anthem.

1915 – Third Convention: The music for the Vyciu Himnas was presented. It had been written by Professor Aleksandras Aleksis, a young organist who had recently arrived from Lithuania. This gathering also approved the Norkunas-designed membership emblem and decided to publish an organization periodical, Vytis (The Knight). Students Aleksandras M. Račkus and Kazys Pakštas

1916 – There were sixty councils and over 4000 members. Most of the councils were in New England, New York, New Jersey, Pennsylvania and Chicago.




Lithuanian "Lady Birds," 3 - 6 year olds, recite poems about Advent and chant, "Jesus wants to live in our hearts."
