

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To My Fellow Knights

September 8th is the feast of Our Lady of Šiluva.

In Šiluva crowds of pilgrims will gather throughout the novena to pray to Our Lady at the site where she first appeared in 1608. On this feast in 1991, Cardinal Vincentas Sladkevicius and the Chairman of the Parliament Vytautas Landsbergis entrusted Lithuania to the Immaculate Heart of the Blessed Virgin Mary. Pope John Paul II visited Šiluva and prayed in the chapel of the Appearance on September 7, 1993. The Šiluva Devotions are one of the most important religious and cultural events in Lithuania.

We in the United States have several shrines honoring Our Lady of Šiluva in the form of pictures, statues, windows, and altars. Prayers and processions take place in Chicago and other areas of the country at which many of us participate. Faustas Strolia HM composed the compellingly moving hymn recounting the story. It is almost 50 years ago that American Lithuanian Catholics sacrificed to build the beautiful shrine to Our Lady of Šiluva in the Great Upper Church of the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington. (With the stress of time, it presently needs rejuvenation and renovation through the assistance of the present Lithuanian community.) We anticipate a prayerful and joyous 50th celebration at which many of us will want to participate.

The Knights of Lithuania have honored Our Lady of Šiluva by publicizing her story in their website, spreading her devotion, and initiating the Our Lady of Šiluva Fund as one of its charities. Visit www.knightsoflithuania.com for more information. When in Lithuania, be sure to visit Šiluva.

September 8th is the feast of Our Lady of Šiluva, and it is time to plan ahead on how we will celebrate this feast day in our areas and how we will share the treasure of this apparition with others.

Apie Romano reikšmę kalbėjo ALTo pirmininkas


Rocco Staino, JAV Bibliotekų draugijos direktorius, atvykęs iš Connecticut, įvertino "Džiunglių" romaną literatūriniu požiūriu ir toliau pakvietė ALTo pirmininką Saulių Kuprį tarti žodį. ALTo pirmininkas pristatė lietuvius svečius, kurie dalyvavo

iškilmėse. Tarp jų buvo LR Generalinis konsulas Arvydas Daunoravičius, Garbės konsulas Stasys Balzekas, LB Kultūros tarybos pirmininkė Marija Remienė, LB Vidurio Vakarų apygardos pirmininkė Ausrelė Sakalaitė, LB Brighton Parko apylinkės pirmininkė Salomėja Daulienė, Amerikos Lietuvių Romos Katalikų Federacijos apskrities pirmininkas Algis Kazlauskas, ALTo Fondo pirmininkė Matilda Marcinkienė.

ALTo pirmininkas Saulius Kuprys savo kalboje sakė: "Šiandien mes pagerbiame tūkstančius imigrantų darbininkų, kurie perėjo per šiuos vartus į 400 akrų plota sudarančias Čikagos skerdyklas. Šiandien mes prisimename autorių Upton Sinclair ir jo istorinį kūrinį "Džiunglės", kuriame pagrindinis veikėjas Jurgis Rudkus, tapęs pramonės laikotarpio įvaizdžiu, vaizduojantis žmogaus kovą prieš galingųjų ir turtingųjų vykdoma išnaudojimą. Bandykime suprasti ta laikotarpi, kokiomis aplinkybėmis Jurgis Rudkus atvyko į Čikagą. Jo tėvynė Lietuva buvo caristinės Rusijos okupuota. Jauni vyrai, norėdami išvengti tarnavimo rusų kariuomenėje, ieškojo prieglobsčio keliaudami į kitą Atlanto krantą. Taip pat Rusijos valdžia įsakė visas knygas Lietuvoje leisti tik rusiškomis raidėmis, vadinama kirilica. Lietuviškas knygas buvo galima spausdinti tik užsienyje ir slapta gabenti per sieną." Savo kalboje ALTo pirmininkas pabrėžė, kad nepaisant sunkių darbo sąlygų skerdyklose, čia dirbantys lietuviai išvystė stiprų kultūrinį ir dvasinį gyvenimą. Jie leido tris dienraščius, skerdyklų artimose apylinkėse pastatė net šešias bažnyčias su mokyklom. "Iš tikrujų mes šiandien minime savo protėvių dvasią, ir konkrečiai Upton Sinclair literatūrinį paminkla. Tai paminklai, kurie ištvers laiko vėjus, kai iš statytinių paminklų beliks tik smėlis."

Gyvo liudininko prisiminimai ir svečių žodis

Toliau kalbėjo profesinės sąjungos direktorius Jorge Romirez, kuris apibudino Darbo sąjungų svarbą ir jų šiandieninį aktualumą. Ypatingai gyvai pristatė skerdyklų istoriją Lesley Oriar, Darbo istorijos draugijos pirmininkas, kuris pats jaunas būdamas prieš H Pasaulinį Karą dirbo šiose skerdyklose. Toliau kalbėjo atstovai iš Federalinių įstaigų – JAV Maisto ir vaistų administracijos ir JAV Žemės ūkio departamento. Jie abu pabrėžė šios knygos įtaką, kuri radikaliai pakeitė Federalinės valdžios požiūrį į maisto gamybos priežiūrą. Programą baigė Illinois Knygos centro atstovė bei Čikagos bibliotekų vyriausia direktorė.




Paminklinės lentelės tekstas

Toliau kalbėjo Sally Reed, JAV Bibliotekų draugijos direktorė atvykusi iš Filadelfijos. Ji perskaitė numatytą paminklinės lentelės tekstą. Viena lentelės kopija bus saugoma Vašingtone, Maisto ir vaistų administracijos įstaigoje. Kita Bronzos lentelė bus vėliau įmontuota prie dabartinių skerdyklos vartų. Paminklinėje lentelėje rašoma: "Upton Sinclair romane "Džiunglės" 1906 m. aprašytos pasibaisėtinos darbo sąlygos už šių skerdyklų vartų. Veikale atpasakota lietuvio emigranto Jurgio Rudkaus kova už žmogiškumą sujaudino šalį, paspartino darbo sąjungų plėtrą ir paskatino Maisto ir vaistų švaros įstatymo priėmimą. Ši vieta įvardinta kaip literatūrinis paminklas." Tekstą pasirašė: JAV Bibliotekų draugija, Illinois knygos centras, Maisto ir prekybos darbininkų sąjunga, Romano autoriaus palikuonys – Weidman šeima, Amerikos Lietuvių Taryba, Federalinė Maisto ir vaistų administracija.

Dalyvavo žiniasklaidos atstovai

Abu pagrindiniai Čikagos dienraščiai "Chicago Tribune" ir "Chicago Sun-Times" atsiuntė savo atstovus su fotografais. Taip pat dalyvavo "Lietuvos ryto" atstovas Algis Vaškevičius. Iškilmes filmavo Amerikos lietuvių televizijos vadovas Arvydas Reneckis. ALTo įstaiga perdavė spaudos pranešimą Lietuvos žiniasklaidai. Čikagos Knygos centras dalyviams dovanojo kasetėse įkalbėtą visą romaną, išleistą Blackstone leidyklos.

Įškilmių programa neužsitęsė ir dalyviai dar ilgai kalbėjosi su svečiais ir dalinosi prisiminimais apie tuos laikus, kai per šiuos vartus žygiuodavo tūkstančiai lietuvių.



ALTo informacija

Chicago Commemorates the Centennial of Upton Sinclair's novel, "The Jungle," in which is described the life of Lithuanian families who lived in the stockyard area and worked in the slaughterhouses. Various dignitaries were in attendance. John Daley, Cook County District Board Rep., (brother of the Mayor.) In his speech, he respectfully remembered all those who worked in the stockyard slaughterhouses, including his own father, who was also Mayor of Chicago for many years. James Balcher, District Alerman, also addressed those gathered and remembered the contribution of the immigrants to the growth and expansion of the city of Chicago. Rocco Staino, Director of the organization, "Friends of Libraries USA," who arrived from Connecticut, in his address emphasized the great literary value of "The Jungle." He then invited the president of ALTAS, Saulius Kuprys, to address the assembly. Saulius then introduced the guests who participated in the ceremony, among whom were the General Consul of the Lithuanian Republic, Arvydas Daunoravicius; Honorary Consul, Stanley Balzekas; Lithuanian Cultural Community Board Rep., Marija Remiene; Lithuanian Community Mid-west Association president, Salomeja Dauliene; President of the American Lithuanian Roman Catholic Federation, Algis Kazlauskas; and President of the American Lithuanian Foundation, Matilda Marcinkiene.

Saulius Kuprys then led the participants to visualize how young men, such as one of the main characters of "The Jungle," Jurgis Rudkus, came to Chicago from across the Atlantic in order to avoid obligatory service in the Russian army, and sought shelter here.

In spite of hard work under unbearable conditions in the stockyards, the Lithuanians developed a strongly spiritual and cultural life. They published 3 daily newspapers, and built six churches and schools in the surrounding area. "Today, we truly commemorate the spirit of our forefathers, as well as the literary work of Upton Sinclair, a work which is definitely a monument which will withstand the winds of time, when other concrete memorials will disintegrate into sand."

The memorial plaque reads as is illustrated on the opposite page (6). One copy will be kept in Washington, at the Food & Drug Administration Institute. The other bronze plaque will be mounted on the historical staockyard gate, through which so many thousands of our Lithuanians daily passed to work.

JBANC Meets with Rep. Alcee Hastings on Eve of OSCE Parliamentary Assembly Annual Session

Washington DC (JBANC) ---Members of the Joint Baltic American National Committee, Inc. (JBANC) met on June 28th with Congressman Alcee L. Hastings to discuss the upcoming session of the Parliamentary Assembly of the Organization for Security and Co-operation in Europe (OSCEPA). Hastings, a Florida Democrat, is the current President of the Assembly. The 14th Annual Session of the OSCEPA is being held in Washington DC on July 1-5.

At last year's meeting in Edinburgh, Scotland, the Assembly passed a resolution critical of the minority situation in Latvia and Estonia. JBANC sharply contested this assessment as unfair in singling out the two Baltic countries, not taking into account the efforts of those governments to improve the civil society climate, and not explaining the historical background. JBANC presented Rep. Hastings with a briefing packet with current information about civil society in Latvia and Estonia. In addition, there was information about President Bush's recent trip to Latvia; along with the recent resolutions in the Parliamentary Assembly of the Council of Europe, and the European Union, seeking Russia's acknowledgement of Soviet crimes. There was also information about the plight of the Maris, a Finno-Ugric minority living in Russia, who have been the brunt of increasing human rights violations.

JBANC also appealed to Congressman Hastings to support H. Con. Res. 128, the House legislation introduced by Congressman John Shimkus (R-IL) supporting a Russian admission of the occupation of the Baltics. The Russian Federation continues to deny this fact; an ongoing effort to change the historical record. In a letter to Rep. Hastings, JBANC chair, Lya Karm, wrote that goodwill could instead "help Russia come to terms with its own past, which is critical for dealing with the future. This is vital not only for Russia's neighbors, but for Russia's own interests."

Now with 27 so-sponsors, it is expected that H. Con. Res. 128 will be voted on in the coming weeks. If in mid-July, it would be timed with the traditional Captive Nations Week, and also the 65th anniversary on July 23rd of the foundation of the U.S. policy of non-recognition of the Soviet occupation and take over of the Baltic countries. The Senate has already passed their version of the legislation on May 19.

The OSCEPA is composed of parliamentarians of over 50 countries from Europe, along with the U.S. and Canada. This meeting will be the first such session ever held in the United States. The Assembly

evolved from the first Helsinki Conference meeting in 1975, which now marks the 30th anniversary of that first extensive Cold-War era discussion on security, human rights, and other issues.

Alcee Hastings was first elected to the House in 1992, and has long served as a Commissioner of the CSCE (or Helsinki Commission,) the U.S. government agency monitoring and encouraging compliance of the Helsinki Accords and other commitments to the OSCE. Commissioners serve from the Executive branch along with nine Senators and nine House Members. The current chairman is Sen. Sam Brownback (R-KS), with House co-chairman Chris Smith (R-NJ). The organizations continue to focus on human and religious rights issues, election monitoring, human trafficking, and promotion of democratic values in Belarus, Moldova, and elsewhere.

Meeting with Hastings and his Chief of Staff, Fred Turner, were Estonian American National Council President, Mati Koiva, American Latvian Association Vice-President, Dr. Juris Mezinskis, along with Dalia Grobovaite and Karl Altau of JBANC.


The fun began on Friday as we out of towner's





JACK SHARKEY



Jack Sharkey, born October 6, 1902 in Binghamton, New York, United States – died August 17, 1994 in Beverly, Massachusetts, was a heavyweight boxing champion.

Born in an era when prizefighters, actors and others in the public spotlight adopted an "American-sounding" pseudonym, **Josef Paul Zukauskas** took the family name of a popular retired Irish boxer and future Hall of Famer, "Sailor Tom" Sharkey (1873-1953).


In 1929, in a fight held in Yankee Stadium, Jack Sharkey knocked out the former lightheavyweight champion, Tommy Loughran to win the United States heavyweight title. His victory earned him the opportunity to fight for the vacant world title against the German contender, Max Schmeling. In their June 12, championship fight, Sharkey 1930 disqualified in the fourth round after delivering a punch that landed below Schmeling's belt. This is the only occasion in boxing history when the heavyweight championship was won by disqualification.

In October of 1931, Sharkey defeated the highly regarded Italian heavyweight, Primo Carnera, and was then given another chance to fight for the title. On June 21, 1932 at the Madison Square Garden Bowl in Long Island City, New York, Jack Sharkey defeated Max Schmeling in their rematch to win the world Heavyweight Boxing Championship in a very controversial split decision.

Sharkey lost his championship on June 29, 1933 in his second fight with Primo Carnera. In 1994, Jack Sharkey was inducted into the International Boxing Hall of Fame. (From: Wikipedia, the free encyclopedia.) Additional websites:

C-3 hopes that all councils have a wonderful, enjoyable summer, as we did


C-30 Westfield, MA
