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The Feast of St. John the Baptist Joninės June 24th

A very popular Feast Day for Lithuanians, below is a history of the celebration taken with permission from the works of C-112 member, Danuté Brazyté Bindokiené's book, Lithuanian Customs and Traditions. We found it very interesting and wanted to share it with you. We hope you enjoy it.

This is a midsummer feast celebrated since earliest unrecorded times not only in Lithuania but in most other European countries. After the spread of Christianity, this pagan festival was made to coincide with the Christian feast of St. John the Baptist. John the Baptist was a favorite saint in Lithuania, as seen from the large numbers of men bearing his name. Although the calendar boasts many other St. Johns, the people claimed they were all mere Johnnies and the real feast of St. John was on June 24th. It was this day that all Johns (Jonai) celebrated their names days.

The feast of St. John (Jonines) was the most joyous and popular summer festival. That day marked the year's shortest night and longest day. In fact, in Lithuania night almost never comes on St. John's: as the last rays of the sunset dim in the west, the east begins to lighten with the first beams of dawn. St. John's night was filled with omens and magic, secrets and dangers. It is famous for its bonfires. Bonfires are lit on hilltops to be more visible. When the Lithuanians were pagan, the bonfires burned all night to light the fields where evil spirits and witches flew about in order to harm the livestock and crops. The light of the bonfires frightens the ghosts away.

On St. John's night, witches and warlocks gather in special spots and hold banquets; afterwards they discuss how to do harm and mischief to humans. As they fly over the fields, they damage medicinal herbs by removing the healing properties, they dry cows' udders, sicken the sheep, put curses on the rye, flax and other crops. Consequently, diverse means were employed to protect nature and people's property against the witches' spells.

In more recent times, bonfires were lit for recreation. The young and old sang, danced and feasted at the bonfires. St. John's night was intended for the young who never slept that night in order not to miss the sunrise. For at dawn the sun once more "Dances" and changes color as it rises (as it does on Easter morning). It is very useful to see the "dancing" sun for it brings happiness and health all year. On St. John's night even water has miraculous powers. Bathing in flowing water or even rolling naked in the dewy grass will prevent all skin ailments – the skin will be white, clean and always appear youthful.

One more magic event takes place on St. John's night: the fern blooms. Country people, accustomed as they were to various natural phenomena and familiar with the flora around them, knew that all plants began from seed. They grow, bloom and produce fruit or seed, thus propagating themselves. Everyone knew that mushrooms had no seed (at least this is what people believed), but mushrooms were not really "plants". They were almost magical, suddenly popping up from the earth after a rain and just as suddenly vanishing. Small children and slightly simple-minded adults were teased and sent "to bring back or buy mushroom seeds."

But the fern was another matter. The plant was luxurious, green; it grew everywhere, especially in forests and damp fields: it was like other local plants though no one had ever managed to find fern seeds or see its flower. How did it propagate then? Therein lies the belief that the fern blossom is miraculous. The plant blooms at the most magical time of the year, St. John's night. Whoever finds that flower is able to understand the language of birds and animals and all the tongues of the world; he knows what others are thinking, where fortunes are buried and is able to see Death (he can tell who will live and who will die). These properties of the fern blossom are known not only to humans but to witches and all demonic creatures as well. They make every effort to seize the fern blossom for themselves. If a human sits among the ferns waiting for them to bloom on that night, the spirits, demons and witches use various methods to frighten and entice him to divert his attention away from the fern. As soon as the human glances away, the fern blossom opens and a spectre seizes it. There are stories about a man on St. John's night crossing a forest where ferns grow and accidentally finding a fern flower: the flower falls into his boot. Suddenly everything brightened, the man was able to understand the language of nocturnal birds and animals and even hear what the fireflies whispered to each other. He knew he had found the miraculous fern blossom! The stories usually end with the man sitting down to rest and removing his footwear - the magical flower falls out and all the miracles end ...

The fern's bloom is like a shiny, sparkling red or rainbow -colored light. It opens at exactly midnight on St. John's night. The flower can be plucked if a circle is traced around the fern clump with a mountain ash stick (for the mountain ash šermukšnis - is a magical tree feared by evil spirits and witches. They can be warded off with a mountain ash stick) or any blessed silver object. Sit inside the circle and absolutely never move your eves from the fern regardless of what happens around. The fern only blooms for a twinkling of an eye. As already mentioned, spirits and witches try to distract the person's attention. It appears they are always successful for a human has yet to find the flower of the fern ...

St. John's On night people engage in prognostication in an effort to learn the future. A girl braids a wreath, stands with her back against a tree and throws the wreath over her head trying to hook it on a branch. The number of times it takes to succeed represents the number of years before she weds. Wreaths are made and given girls' and boys' names. They are thrown into the water (Preferably a stream). The ones that come together represent the boy and girl who will make a couple; if a wreath sinks, the person will soon die; it the wreath floats easily and does not snag on grasses or twigs the person's life will be happy and easy.


Young men and women link arms and jump over the bonfire's dying embers. If their arms remain linked, they will wed; if they jump effortlessly, if the smoke does not cause their eyes to water and their shoes or clothing remain unsinged, everything will go well that year: love, happiness and wealth awaits them. If the smoke causes the eyes to tear, much hardship (tears) will have to be borne.

At a time when people relied in their daily lives more on folk medicine than on manufactured drugs, the eve of St. John's was vital for gathering medicinal plants. It was believed that witches destroyed the power of such plants on St. John's night. On the eve, women, children and older men (who had less farm work) went into the fields, bogs and forests to gather medicinal plants, enough to treat not only humans but also livestock all year. They picked chamomile, centaury, marsh trefoil, wormwood, thyme, valerian, fennel, mint, rue (people believed that the rue cured 99 illnesses), and other local medicinal plants.

The plants were carefully tied into bundles, dried, hung in the attic and later sorted and put away for winter. They were used in many ways: brewed as tea, immersed in whiskey, crushed and mixed with grease, etc.

The omens of St. John's night no longer hold lifeor-death meaning for us as they did in ancient times, but we can take pride in them, try them out just for fun and to diversify a midsummer night's festivities. Bonfires and fireside refreshments are an essential part of St. John's night. It is also a good opportunity for Lithuanian songs about youth and love as well as terrifying stories about witches, soothsayers, evil demons and the fern blossom. Children are intrigued by the magic aura of the fern flower, especially when they are asked: "And what would you do if you found the fern's blossom? How would you use the magic powers?"

My early childhood remembrances of Easter season festivities in Lithuania began with Palm Sunday. On Palm Sunday the women carried juniper branches to church and the men long willow branches. A site to behold - like a forest! During Holy Week we did our spring cleaning, the family enjoyed the "pirtis" steam bath. The holiday baking was done on Good Friday. On Holy Saturday the meat dishes were prepared. Also, we colored and decorated the "Margučiai", which I learned at an early age from Mother. All adult family members went to church for the all night vigil. This included a replica of Christ in the tomb, guarded by young village men and the Choir leading in the singing.

At dawn on "Velykos" a solemn procession with the Risen Christ, victorious over death, heralded the beginning of the Resurrection Mass. A race home followed Mass to a great breakfast. We observed the 40 days of Lent and fasting and self denial. We were ready for a fest!

On a white linen table cloth, was a center piece of an Easter Lamb Cake and our colored eggs and "Margučiai". The menu consisted of homemade "dešros", "koselena", ham, horseradish, cheese cake, and "piragas" and to wash it all down, "Krupnikas". Our Easter festivities and traditions continued until Low Sunday. The village women would exchange loom patterns during this season.

I remember the celebration of St. John's night, "Jonine's". After dark we would light a bonfire on the largest hill in the village. We

sang, danced and feasted and made merry until midnight. Then we searched for the fern blossoms, "papartis", which is said to bloom at midnight. We never managed to find one. It was our most joyous and popular summer festival.

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I recall with joy making wreaths from birch branches and field flowers to adorn the heads of our cattle on the feast of Pentecost, "Sekmines", the shepherd's feast day. My youngest brother, the shepherd, had a break from his duties and was guest of honor at our celebration. He made his own horn out of willow, which he used during his days as shepherd of our flock. My father made a swing that was attached to a tree and was decorated with green branches. It was a treat to us youngsters as we did not have the amusements of today.

I remember as a young girl, the Feast of the Assumption of Mary, "Žoline" and the blessing of flowers. The women carried large bouquets of field and garden flowers to be blessed at church. They were later dried to protect the home and barns from fire and lightning. It was a beautiful site to behold. The custom should be preserved in our parishes.

I recall the three day village weddings, Christenings and our beautiful and traditional "Kučios".

I hold dearly these Lithuanian memories, customs and traditions that contain such symbolism and should be passed on and preserved for future Lithuanian generations.

2006 HONORARY MEMBERSHIP DESIGNEE **THERESA F. STROLIA** COUNCIL 157 - LEMONT, IL

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Theresa (Pupinik) Strolia was born on Chicago's north side and benefited from the education provided by the Sisters of St. Casimir at St. Michael's School. She graduated from Josephinum High School and has a B.A. from Mundelein College. Her membership in the Knights of Lithuania began in the late 1950's during her high school years, when, as a member of Council 5 in St. Michael's Parish, she quickly became active as chairperson of committees for fundraising, dances, picnics, hayrides, bingos, hosting March 4th St. Casimir celebrations and communion breakfasts. During these years she also held various council offices and worked hard on numerous other council projects.

In 1962, Theresa married Faustas Strolia, HM, director of the Mid-America District Choir. The Knights of Lithuania 4th Degree was conferred upon Theresa in 1966 when she was a member of Council 36. She assisted in organizing the ILL-IND District Juniors in 1976. While she and Faustas were raising four sons, her national level involvement included Financial Secretary and six years as Vytis Council News Editor.

Theresa helped to organize Council 157, a new council in Lemont, IL, where she served as Recording Secretary. She is also the current First Vice-President of the Mid-America District, having also been Recording Secretary and

Corresponding Secretary. In addition, Theresa is a member of the MAMD Institute and the national St. Casimir's Guild. She is also Secretary of the Our Lady of Siluva Fund. The Knights of Lithuania conventions have also benefited from Theresa's presence as she served on committees such as Mandate and Resolutions as well as Presidium Recording Secretary. During recent years she has been Chairperson of the Resolutions Committee.

When the Chicago District hosted the national convention in 1964 and 1980, she was a member of the committee. When Council 36 hosted the National Convention she was the Registration Co-Chairman.

Theresa was an economist for the US Department of Labor, Bureau of Labor Statistics, from the time she graduated from college until she retired.

She has been a member of the MAMD Choir since 1960 and held several offices during the last 40 years including Secretary and Librarian. She gave her time and talent to assist Faustas in his many projects....making two records, various TV movies for Lithuanian TV and three videos which include "Our Lithuanian Heritage" which tells the story of the Chicago area Lithuanian Churches built by our Grandparents. Theresa did all the research on these churches. Choir participation has resulted in numerous trips throughout the United States and Canada as well as participation in the 1994 and 1998 Song Festivals in Lithuania.

Theresa has organized pilgrimages to shrines for the Mid-America District. She began with a trip to the National Shrine of the Immaculate Conception in Washington, DC. Other pilgrimages include shrines in Illinois, Wisconsin and Missouri. While she continues her active involvement in the Knights of Lithuania, Theresa's favorite past-time is being with 12 grandchildren.

This is only a brief synopsis of Theresa Strolia's service to "God and Country" and we believe that she is worthy of the title "Honorary Member".

2006 HONORARY MEMBERSHIP DESIGNEE WALTER SVEKLA COUNCIL 3 - PHILADELPHIA, PA

Walter Svekla has been an active member of the Knights of Lithuania Council 3, Philadelphia, PA since 1957. He received his 4th Degree at the 1967 National Convention.

At the Council level, Walter has held the office of President – 2 years; Vice-President – 4 years; Recording Secretary – 1 year; Financial Secretary – 2 years; Trustee – 3 years; Treasurer – '65, '66, '70, '79 and from '90 to the present for 14 consecutive years. He was a member of C-3's Choir in the '60's under the direction of Stanley Petraitis, Choirmaster. Walter also participated in C-3's many shows and musicals.

Walter served on most of C-3 Committees which includes the Lithuanian Affairs Letter Writing Committees of the '60's. In addition he has also served on their Ritual, Cultural, Council Anniversary Celebration, Picnic, Christmas Party, St. Casimir's Day, Dinner Dance, Bazaar and numerous other committees. He has performed the duties of Emcee at C-3's Annual Kucios numerous times. Walter was an active committee member of the National Conventions held in Philadelphia, PA in '58, '68, '83 and '99.

Walter was a delegate many times to the former NY-NJ District Conventions as well as the current Amber District. He was a participating member of the District Ritual Committee in '63. When the District Conventions were held in Philadelphia,



Walter was always an active committee member and worked diligently assisting in the preparatory activities needed to ensure a successful event.

On the National level, Walter was a member of the Scholarship Committee from '67 to '75. In August "75 he assumed the Chairmanship of the National Scholarship Committee for the next six years until '81. At that time scholarships were awarded based on annual donations and not from large bequests as is the case today. The highlight of Walter's Chairmanship was a joint effort with George Mikalauskas of C-96, Dayton, OH, in '79 and '80. George crafted and donated a large Wayside Cross to the Scholarship Committee. Councils and individuals were given the opportunity to win this shrine by donating \$100. This effort spurred scholarship donations for many years. In addition, Walter also served as Supreme Council Trustee from '65 to '66.

Walter attended almost all of the National Conventions since becoming a K of L'er. He was a Council 3 delegate for most of them. During these years of attendance he served as Convention Sergeant-at-Arms; worked on the Resolutions Committee; participated as a National Financial Committee member; and was Emcee at the Convention Closing Banquet in St. Petersburg, FL in '91. Walter served as Parliamentarian of the National Convention in Secaucus, NJ.

Walter attended St. George School and served as an alter boy from grade school until he graduated from College. He attended Northeast Catholic High School and went on to achieve a degree in Engineering from Vilanova University and a Master's Degree from Drexel University. Walter served a stint in the U.S. Army and upon his discharge went to work for the Dept. of Defense at the Frankford Arsenal. After 40 years of service he retired in July '99.

Walter and his wife, Irene, and sons, Walter Jr. and Andrew, live in Cherry Hill, NJ. All are members of Council 3.

Walter Svekla continues to be a loyal and responsible Knight. He is a prime and outstanding example of one living up to the K of L motto "For God and Country" and worthy of the title "Honorary Member".

First, thanks to all who are energizing issues relating to Lithuania and Lithuanian American events. Your work has been fruitful, recognized, and appreciated. Please continue. The need for attention has never waned, although issues have changed.

The anniversary of the June tragedies / deportations is approaching. Please use your outlets to remind the world of these events, be it by letters to legislators, city officials, or a brief note to local newspapers, etc. Continuing action to remember these events keeps a perspective open and helps prevent reoccurrence. World opinion doesn't "just happen"; it is shaped by information.

I hope that you all digested the request for letters to Lithuanian soldiers in Afghanistan in the Mar/Apr Vytis. We are free to voice our support and appreciation to those in uniform who promote peace. Our American soldiers are also not to be forgotten and prayer circles or K of L meeting prayers are powerful protection for our troops. Many Knights have close ones in harm's way in distant lands. Pray for them.

The demilitarization of Kaliningrad is a topic for continuing follow-up.

The status of Lithuanian churches closing is a continuing need for attention.

Former KGB-Man, Russian President Putin continues to be unpredictable, irresponsible, and destructive to goals of world stability. Monitor news of Russian activities. Please check Jbanc.org - Baltic link BAFL news.

The rigged elections which took place in Belarus (Moscow's Lukashenko took over 80% of the vote?!?) continue to present a daunting problem. Some news reports stress that Russian missiles transported to Belarus are headed toward Iran. Stressors multiply at the hands of Putin.

The Russian Federation continues to refuse to recognize the forceful subjugation of the Baltics and also refuses to discuss compensation for the occupation.

The relatives of thousands of Polish soldiers (and others) massacred in Katyn Forest "by Josef Stalin" are initiating legal action against Russia in the European Court of Human Rights. Some 15,000 bodies have been found and the rest are thought to be still buried in secret mass graves.

Addictive personalities and alcoholism continue to plague the Baltics.

Human trafficking has been addressed but continues. Slavery exists.

The Victims of Communism Memorial continues to progress. Recently, Estonia made a large donation. Although the project had started somewhat chaotically, completion is near and the dedication is expected this fall. On April 26, the Foundation honored former president of Poland, Lech Walesa.

The Lithuanian Parliament is having some significant upheavals. May the cool heads prevail.

The dandelions - valued in Lithuania - are everywhere. Those yellow fields beautiful or baaaad?

Proposed Resolution for Term Limits for Chairmen of Supreme Council Committees

We, members of Knights of Lithuania Council 82, Gary, Indiana, gathered at Dyer-Schererville Library, October 8, 2005, presented this Resolution for Term Limits for Chairmen of Supreme Council Committees:

WHEREAS ... currently, the chairmanship position of Lithuanian Affairs, Lithuanian Language and Culture, Publicity and Archives Committees on the Supreme Council are elected each year but have no term limits set on them, and

WHEREAS ... all Officer positions on the Supreme Council are limited to three consecutive terms, therefore

BE IT RESOLVED ... that these Chairmanship positions be subject to the same term limitations that are currently set for all Officers, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED ... that if approved, this ruling will take effect beginning with this year's elections.

Chairman called for member vote and the resolution was passed, unanimously, and the Secretary is directed to send copies of the resolution for Supreme Council consideration to Agnes Mickunas, HM, President of the Knights of Lithuania Supreme Council, and to Dolores Herbert, Secretary, Knights of Lithuania Supreme Council.

Proposed Resolution to change Term Lengths of Supreme Council Trustees

We, the Presidents of the Amber, Mid-America, Mid-Atlantic, and New England Districts, present this proposed change to the constitution regarding the term of office of Supreme Council Trustees. We have presented this to the members of the Supreme Council during their meeting on May 6, 2006 in Philadelphia, PA at which time they voted to endorse it as well. We now present it to you our membership for your consideration.

WHEREAS.....the constitution currently calls for two trustees as members of the Supreme Council; and said trustees to be elected each year allowing for three consecutive terms per trustee, this has caused from time to time for the trustees to be elected concurrently, which does not allow for proper training of the trustees from a senior elected trustee to a junior elected trustee. And as currently the duties of the trustees include the auditing of all nationally held funds which is a most important service to the organization and is deserving of having an experienced trustee in office at all times,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED.... That the delegates of the 93rd National Convention vote to change the term of each trustee to one consecutive term of three years and these terms not to be served concurrently. And that in the event of a trustee's resignation, their replacement only fulfills the remaining term.

If passed by the delegates of the 93rd National Convention this resolution takes effect with this year's elections allowing for one trustee to be elected to a two year term and one to be elected for a full three year term so that the proper rotation process can be implemented.

This resolution will change Article X, paragraph 4 of the Constitution to read:

A Supreme Council Officer is elected for a one year term and can succeed himself or herself for only two additional successive years, except for Trustees who will be elected for three year terms and these terms not to be served concurrently.



Bacon Bread (Duona Su Lašiniukais) From Miss Marge Rudaitis

Ingredients

c. Milk
T. Butter
4 c. Sugar
tsp. Salt
oz. Cake Yeast
c. Lukewarm Water
Egg (well beaten)
c. Flour
lb. Bacon (diced finely)

Honey Cake (Meduolis) From Mrs. Ann Juraitis

Ingredients

6 egg yolks 1 c. white sugar 1 c. hot honey 1 c. oil 1 tsp. vanilla 2 c. flour 1 tsp. soda 1 tsp. salt ¹/₄ tsp. cloves 6 egg whites (beaten)

Cottage Cheese Squares (Varskeciai) From Mrs. Mary Slapkus

Ingredients

2 lbs. cottage cheese 2 c. flour ½ lb. butter (melted) 6 eggs 2 tsp. salt

Directions

Heat milk and add butter, sugar and salt. Let cool to luke-warm. Add yeast which has been dissolved in lukewarm water. Add egg and flour or just enough to make a dough firm enough to knead. Knead until it no longer sticks to board and is smooth and elastic. Let rise until double in bulk; then punch down and add bacon. Knead again, to mix in bacon. Place in two oiled pans, let rise again until double in bulk. Bake at 350°-375° about 1 hour or until done. Yield: 2 loaves.

Directions

Beat egg yolks; add sugar; beat till thick. Add oil, hot honey, vanilla and blend well. Mix dry ingredients and add to first mixture, blending well. Fold in egg whites. Pour in an angel food pan and bake in a 325° oven for 1 hour.

Directions

Mix together about ingredients except the butter and form into a ball and place in refrigerator overnight, or leave in freezer section for 1 hour. Cut ball or dough in 4 parts. Form 4 balls and roll out dough to desired thickness. Cut into 2 inch squares and cook in boiling water for 5 minutes. When cooked remove from water. Pout melted butter over them and serve hot with melted butter poured over them "and mixed gently.



PENTECOST - SEKMINĖS June 11th

Here again printed with permission from the works of C-112 member, Danuté Brazyté Bindokiené's book, **Lithuanian Customs and Traditions** is a bit more about our Lithuanian Culture and the observences of this time of year. We found it very interesting and wanted to share it with you.

On Pentecost the entire Christian world commemorates the descent of the Holy Sprit. Ancient Lithuanians, while still pagans, celebrated at this time of year a spring and plant festival many of whose customs have been shifted to today's Pentecost. In fact, many Lithuanian feasts are a happy combination of old-pagan and new-Christian methods of celebrating. They do not compete or interfere with one another, but engender very rich and beautiful traditions which embellish the nation's countenance.

The plant which best represents Pentecost is the young, verdant, fragrant and newly sprouted birch. It was mandatory to decorate homes at Pentecost with birches or at least birch branches. Two young birches were placed on either side of an entry door to ensure that the resident spouses will live in harmony all year. People inserted birch branches under the roof of at leas along the ceiling so that when the Holy Spirit (which was pictured as a white dove) flies into the home it has a place to perch and rest. Then every member of the household will live in peace, will be happy and successful.

After Pentecost the birch branches and other greens are not discarded: they are dried and reverently kept all year. Smoke from such dried birch branches can frighten evil spirits away and protect a newly erected building from all evils; it is capable of turning aside a dark storm cloud, etc.

The Pentecost table laden with food is also decorated with birch branches. The focal dish is scrambled eggs. In certain Lithuanian regions the homemaker made cheese and meat dumplings (virtinukai). Every person in the family had to eat a minimum of seven dumplings to ensure good health all year.

In the past, Pentecost was a special feast for shepherds. They ate, amused themselves and took a rest from tending their flocks that day. The night before, they made wreaths from wild flowers that dotted all meadows. These garlands they draped on the cows which were driven home so adorned. For this the farmer's wife gave them gifts. Although we no longer have shepherds or herds of cattle, we still have the saying aimed at a woman or girl wearing too many flowers (a very flowery dress or hat or a huge flower corsage) that she is "wreathed like a cow at Pentecost."


Because shepherds were usually children (up to 13 or 14 years old, or sometimes only 10-11), Pentecost can easily be turned into a special feast for children.

First, children must make every effort to rise early. If a person sleeps late on Pentecost, he'll be sleepy, lazy

and sluggish all year. Children should be hit lightly with a green birch branch to make them alert, happy and healthy. Because shepherds received gifts on Pentecost, small presents may be prepared for the children, especially sweets (shepherd gifts were usually eggs, cake, special buns and sometimes even money).


On Pentecost, children are allowed to cook breakfast in the form of scrambled eggs for the entire family. Friends of the children and neighborhood boys and girls may be invited to the Pentecost festivities. If we wish to keep the old Lithuanian shepherd tradition, the children of several families may assemble in one home, each bringing a dish personally prepared for the feast (mother can help, of course). For their feast, shepherds cooked their food outside over a bonfire; this is a fine opportunity to hold the celebration by a bonfire, cook sausages, barbeque, etc. To make it more fun the children can organize a "Pentecost orchestra" imitating the music of shepherd horns, flutes, whistles and other instruments. This is easily accomplished by purchasing inexpensive horns, mouth harmonicas, reed-pipes and other similar instruments, one for every child. In Lithuania, of course, the shepherds played on pipes and whistles they made themselves from willow bark, but we can make do with store-bought toys.

On Pentecost, it is also customary to swing on swings. A swing was attached to a tall tree in the yard, the ropes decorated with greens and flowers. Your people swung and sang. All in all, Pentecost is best celebrated outdoors, in the woods or fields. Young people assemble, bring food and drink, hire a musician and spend the day in nature. The girls attempt to learn who will love them, whom they'll wed. They fashion wreaths from field flowers, then attach to some a piece of paper bearing a boy's name. One wreath has their own name. In the evening, the wreaths are placed in water (a pond, pool or even a bathtub filled with water). In the morning the girl looks to see which boy's name is next to hers. This will be her intended. If the girl's wreath floats by itself, she will remain unattached all year. It is a bad sign if the girl's wreath sinks: she will fall gravely ill that year, will be unhappy or may even die.



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
